COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

In compliance with the General Laws of the State of New Hampshire we herewith submit the annual report of Belknap County showing its financial condition and matters of interest together with the report of the Superintendent of the County Farm, Treasurer, Clerk of the Court, Solicitor, Jailer, Sheriff, Physicians and Auditors.

The financial condition of the County is very gratifying. The Cash balance in the Treasury at the date of this report is \$17,796.99. The net debt of the County is \$36,716.40, a decrease of the net debt during the past year of \$6,144.08. The debt is made up as follows:

The report of the Treasurer gives in detail the receipts and disbursements.

The changes in the law at the last session of the Legislature relating to children between the ages of 3 and 15 years has made a slight increase in the external poor account, from what they would have otherwise been. In some of the towns it will be noticed the expense of external poor has increased somewhat over last year. This is owing in a great measure to sickness which the County is called upon to pay, principally among old people who have a horror of going to the Alms-house and through the intercession of neighbors and friends we have allowed them to remain outside. Another cause for this increase has been that the Overseers of the Poor in towns do not settle their accounts with the towns until February, consequently wait until the last of January before settling with the County and as our year ends Dec. 31, the bills are necessarily left over. This year every town in the County was notified to call and settle on or before Dec. 31, and we are pleased to state that they all responded to the call and we can say there are now no unsettled bills against the County, except one, a bill for wood which the Commissioners of 1892 contracted by exchanging timber, and the party having until April 1, 1896, to cut the timber. We not being satisfied that we could according to law allow him to cut the timber we referred the matter to the County Solicitor and he informed us that the contract was illegal and that we could not deliver the timber. The County has had the wood and used it and this bill is unsettled.

Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Thyng were appointed Superintendent and Matron of the County Farm and Almshouse and they have filled their difficult positions with credit to themselves, profitably to the County and beneficially to the inmates.

The Farm Physician Dr. H. C. Wells has been faithful in his attendance upon the sick and it has seemed to be a pleas-

ure to him to relieve the suffering of the poor unfortunate people.

We have the past year extended the steam plant to the men's attic so that the whole house is now heated by steam and the inmates are made as comfortable as it is possible to make them.

We have also extended the water to the barn, together with a steam pipe for the purpose of steaming the food for the stock during the cold season.

After making up our report we concluded that with the amount of money now in the Treasury we could safely pay the balance of the floating debt amounting to \$4,513.39, thereby saving \$180.53 in interest money and we have paid those notes and interest which leaves the bonds as the only indebtedness of the County.

LACONIA, Feb. 1, 1895.

The representatives of the various Towns and Wards in the County met in convention at the Court House in Laconia at 3 o'clock p. m. of the above date.

Mr. McDonald of Centre Harbor, absent.

On motion of Mr. Martin of Laconia, voted that the sum of five hundred dollars above recommended be appropriated and expended in reindexing the Belknap County records.

On motion of Mr. Jewett of Laconia, the following Committee was appointed to decide and select the method of reindexing under the above vote. Committee appointed was: S. S. Jewett, Samuel H. Martin and George H. Saltmarsh of Laconia.

On motion of Mr. Towle of Meredith, voted that all the remaining sums above recommended by the Commissioners for the years 1895 and 1896 be and are hereby appropriated.

On motion of Mr. Morrill of Gilford, voted to amend House Bill No. 57, referring to Belknap County Convention by substituting four for five so that said bill shall read Sect. 1. The salary of the Solicitor of Belknap County shall hereafter be four hundred dollars per annum payable as now provided by law.

Sect. 2. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

Sect. 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

On motion of Mr. Jewett of Laconia, an informal vote was taken to get the sense of the Convention as to the advisability of changing the boilers at the County Farm.

The sense of the Convention was in favor of changing the same.

On motion of Mr. Varney of Gilmanton, voted that the Commissioners be instructed to make an estimate of the probable cost of changing the boilers at the County Farm and report to the Convention at a future time.

On motion of Mr. Hill of Tilton, that a sum not exceeding three hundred dollars be appropriated for the following repairs on the County jail with instructions to the County Commissioners and Sheriff to carry out the same, viz :

To procure sufficient bedsteads for the use of the inmates of the jail ; to procure lining for the West end cell in the jail and to make a door out of the jail at the West end.

On motion of Mr. Tetley of Laconia, voted that the matter of electric lights for the use of the County Farm buildings be indefinitely postponed.

On motion of Mr. Saltmarsh of Laconia, the Convention adjourned until the call of the Chairman.

On motion of Mr. Martin of Laconia, voted to authorize the County Commissioners to bargain for and execute such deeds as are necessary to procure a suitable driveway into the County Court House yard with Dr. A. W. Abbott.

On motion of Mr. Towle of Meredith, voted to adjourn.

Solicitor's Report.

There were 25 continued cases on the State Docket, March term, 1895, which were disposed of as follows: 20 marked not to be brought forward; of these 18 were for liquor offenses and the respondents had left the county and never been arrested; 1 for assault, and 1 for burglary wherein the bail had been forfeited and paid to the county; in one case the respondent was sent to prison for 3 years; 1 case was nol prossed; 1 quashed by order of court at law term; 1 continued, and in 1 case the respondent was sentenced and paid the fine.

At this term 35 indictments and 2 informations were returned, and 2 appeals from the Police Court and 1 libel against liquor were entered. The appeals were dismissed on payment of costs. In the libel proceeding the liquor was forfeited to the county. The 2 informations were for offenses against the liquor law. In one case there was a plea of guilty and sentence, the other was nol prossed. Of the indictments 20 were for violations of the liquor law, and in every case a plea of guilty was entered, sentences imposed and two parties put in jail; 2 were for illegal fishing, pleas guilty and fines paid; 2 for assault on officer, pleas guilty, sentences, but sentences not imposed; 3 for burglary against one person, in one case there was a verdict for the respondent because of a misstatement of fact in the indictment, to the other two he plead guilty and was sent to jail for one year; 1 indictment for tramp with plea guilty and a jail sentence of three months; 1 for cruelty to a child, plea guilty and a jail sentence of nine months; 1 for larceny, plea guilty and a jail sentence of six months: 1 for

house of ill fame, trial, verdict guilty and a jail sentence of four months, with an additional sentence of three months against the same person for being a common seller of liquor; 1 for perjury, trial, verdict not guilty by order of the court; 3 for receiving stolen goods against the same person. The man fled the state, was not arrested and the cases were continued.

At the September term 1895, the 4 continued cases were continued because the respondents were out of the state and their whereabouts unknown. At this term 39 indictments and 1 information was returned; 30 were for liquor offenses, 1 was nol prossed, 5 continued, and in 24 there were pleas of guilty and proper sentences; 3 for burglary, which were continued as the parties were in jail in Concord for similar offenses in Merrimack County and were later sent to prison; 2 for aggravated assault and were continued; 2 for adultery, 1 plead guilty and was sentenced, 1 was tried and acquitted; 1 tramp plead guilty and was sentenced, 1 was tried and acquitted; 1 tramp plead guilty and was sentenced to 15 months in prison; 1 for house of ill fame, trial, acquittal. The information was for obstructing an officer conveying information to a witness that the officer was searching for him. The respondent was acquitted, but was fined \$25 for contempt of court in the same matter. In connection with the same case another person was fined \$100 for contempt of court. Two persons were arrested for not responding to subpoenas for the grand jury and were dismissed after paying about \$15 costs each. An appeal from a Justice of the Peace and one from the Laconia Police Court were entered and nol prossed.

The above indictments, informations and arrests during the past year have been against 43 different individuals.

In July 1894 recognizances were given before the Laconia Police Court for the appearance of the respondents at the September term of the Supreme Court with the conditions that in the meantime the liquor law should not be violated.

That conditions was broken and I brought four actions of debt to recover the amount of the bonds, \$200 in each case. These actions were entered March term, 1895, and continued to the September term. At that term in three cases the defendants defaulted and had a hearing before the county commissioners under the statute to see if they would not recommend that the amount of the judgments be reduced. The commissioners did recommend that nothing should be paid. I opposed such a course and asked for the full amount in each case. The court ordered judgment for the whole amount in one case and for \$100 each in the other two, stating that people should understand that the law means what it says. The money is now in the county treasury. The fourth case was continued.

I have prosecuted several cases before the Laconia Police Court and Justices of the Peace with beneficial results to the county, financially and otherwise.

Some over a month ago three tramps were sent to jail from Tilton to wait the action of the grand jury upon complaints endorsed by me. Once since that time have the town authorities been asked for assistance by strangers, and when they were informed that if they pressed their request complaints would be made against them under the tramp law, they immediately left town and none of their kind have since appeared.

It would be well to adopt the same course in other towns.

There is not an open liquor saloon in the county to my knowledge or belief. For this the people are indebted to the active work of a few individuals and the police authorities of Laconia, who have not only acted on their own motion but have fully cooperated with me.
