#### Town Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Brookline, County of Hillsborough, and State of N. H., qualified to vote in Town and State Affairs;

You are hereby notified to meet in Daniels Academy Hall, in said town on Tuesday, March 9, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects, and any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

- 1. To choose all town officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray town charges for the ensuing year.
- 3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and all other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative to same.
- 4. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
- 5. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 6. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Public Library.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to allow any discount on taxes.
- 9. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cemeteries.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks when assessing, instead of mailing.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to secure State Aid for permanent improvement of highways or take any action relative thereto.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for fire hose and other necessary equipment.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to pay Firemen attending chimney fires fifty cents an hour for time spent at same.
  - 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize clerk hire

for the Board of Selectmen and raise and appropriate money necessary for same.

- 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize Selectmen to enter into contract with Brookline Grange No. 211 for the leasing of Daniels Academy Building or take any action thereof.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by tax deeds.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into contract of Snow Removal, or take any action relative thereto.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the control of White Pine Blister rust.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to accept the following legacies: \$500.00 from the Estate of Mrs. Ellen Swett for the perpetual care of the Needham Hunter Swett Lot in the South Cemetery, with a request that the stones are kept cleaned and repaired whenever needed; \$100.00 from the Estate of Samuel A. W. Ball for the perpetual care of the Jonas Kendall Lot in Lakeside Cemetery; \$100.00 from George H. Kendall for the perpetual care of the Daniel Kendall Lot in South Cemetery; \$200.00 from William M. Murphy for the perpetual care of the Caroline A. Murphy Lot in Pine Grove Cemetery.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to rescind the Australia Ballot System and adopt the Non-partisan Ballot System. Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened 1943.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to insure fire station, trucks and equipment or take any action relative thereto.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to increase the pay of labor employed on town roads.
- 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Brookline:

I herewith present my fourth annual report, the twenty-fourth in the series. I propose to present only two topics, besides the usual statistical tables which follow.

#### Schools Must Go On

During such difficult times, it is with some hesitation that we attempt to interpret the schools to the public. The demands are so heavy in this and that respect that one hardly knows which to put into effect and which to eliminate for so many appear to be worthy. I notice the people of experience find themselves in a similar predicament. Therefore, it seems to me that we should have a great deal of sympathy for the young people who experience difficulty in adjusting themselves to the war conditions.

The growth of children cannot be stopped until this struggle is over. Their growth is continuous and schools must go on with their development. British leaders have learned that the war only intensifies the need for good schools. The future strength and leadership of America is now in school.

I trust each and everyone is following the evolution of the school from peace-time to war-time preparation. Accelerated programs in higher institutions cause changes in our high schools and grades. Scrap collections, sale of war stamps, participation in various drives, rationing programs affect the school's former program. Through it all, I find a wonderful spirit of loyalty and a desire to do one's part.

#### PERSONNEL

I could devote my complete discourse on this subject. As suggested before, these are no ordinary times and the need for competent teachers was never greater. Teachers are entitled to a wage consistent with their importance and comparable to that received in other walks of life. There is enough unrest in the world and there will be enough after the war without having a group of dissatisfied

and underpaid people in charge of our schools and children. We shall need those who can hold their heads up and be proud of the treatment given them by their communities. Appreciation may even be a partial substitute for monetary consideration.

We have had plenty of difficulties with the retention of recruiting of a teaching staff. I urge you to be just as generous in the matter of teachers' salaries as you can. I well remember my statement of last year regarding adequate salaries. No sooner had I made that statement than was it out-of-date. Conditions in the teacher market grew steadily worse and we were confronted with serious problems. We have been fortunate to make the changes as effective as they have been.

You are extremely fortunate to have the staff as now constituted. The work proceeds with a minimum of interruption. Mrs. Marguerite O'Neil was moved from the Intermediate to the Grammar room and Miss Helen Underwood, Keene Teachers' College '42, was employed for the Intermediate Grades. Mrs. Elizabeth Scully continues in the Primary Room,

I express my appreciation for the faithful work of the teachers, for the considerate attention the School Board has given to the work, and for the support of the entire citizenry.

On examining the children in the fall Dr. Winograd, the school physician, noted a nutritional improvement in them. With the continued hot lunch and additional milk in school I am sure the health and vigor of the children will prove most gratifying.

The dental clinic held in May was very well patronized. Thirty-seven pupils had their work completed. Here I want to thank the committee of women who so untiringly worked on the clinic and the various organizations who loaned funds to financially sponsor it.

All pupils from the second grade up were recently given the audiometer test. Only two pupils showed a very slight hearing impairment.

The fine cooperation of teachers and parents greatly help to promote a good health program and is greatly appreciated.


