**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**  
**TOWN WARRANT**

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*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deerfield in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*  
(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Deerfield on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,103.04 for Town Road Aid, the state to contribute \$7,353.58.

4. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds.

6. To see if the Town will vote to amend the rules governing the establishment of the Advisory Budget Committee as passed at the 1963 Town Meeting by striking out condition number one and inserting in its place the following: It shall consist of nine members. As the members terms expire the Moderator, Town Clerk and Town Treasurer shall appoint, within thirty days after the Annual Town Meeting, three citizens to serve on the Advisory Budget Committee for



a period of three years and shall also designate a temporary chairman to call the first meeting of the committee.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$700.00 to increase the salaries of town officials.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 to be used to improve the property deeded to the Town by Mr. and Mrs. John Petersen.

9. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Regulations as adopted at the Town Meeting, March 4, 1961 by adding the following: No trailer park or mobile home site, or any like venture by any other name, shall be allowed within the corporate limits of the Town of Deerfield. 1b. All distances to be measured from the nearest limits of ownership.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust in Deerfield.

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$21,681.71 from the Estate of Charles C. Prescott for school purposes. These funds to be turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds to be held as an endowment, the income to be used for school purposes.

12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Washington Tilton, Olive Tilton Johnson and Nancy Tilton Stevens. This fund to be placed in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds to be held "in trust however" the interest only to be used for the care of the W. V. B. Tilton Lot at the Tilton Cemetery, Number Six District.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Washington Tilton, Olive Tilton Johnson and Nancy Tilton Stevens in memory of their grandparents, Joseph Batchelder Tilton and Nancy Adams Tilton. This fund to be placed in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds to

be held "in trust however" the interest only to be used for the care of the Josiah Batchelder Tilton Lot, Deerfield Parade Cemetery.

14. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 as a Trust Fund in memory of Mary Elizabeth Griffith Butler. This fund to be placed in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds to be held "in trust however" the interest only to be used for the care of the Mary E. G. Butler Lot in Tilton Cemetery, District Number Six.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$500.00 from the Estate of Charles G. Robinson. This sum to be placed in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds of the Town of Deerfield and to be known as the Charles G. Robinson Fund; to be held "in trust however" the income only to be used to provide for perpetual care of the Freese Robinson Lots in the Freese-Fogg Cemetery, North Road, Deerfield.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the Merrimack Valley Regional Association.

17. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, Blake's Hill Road (State 51) from a point beginning at Junction of Coffeetown Road west (State 90) to Northwood Line.

18. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue and return to the abutting property owners, Coffeetown Road East (State 109) from closed end at Mountain Avenue (State 110) to junction Mountain Avenue (State 109).

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for road signs.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls to remain open until 7:00 P.M. unless otherwise voted by the meeting.

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Excerpts from the town records of the 1952 Town Meeting Article 8, Item 7: The duties and responsibilities of the Advisory Budget Committee shall be as follows:

(a) To meet with the selectmen and with the school board to discuss and advise with them regarding appropriate sums to be recommended to the voters for their action at the regular Town Meeting and School Meeting.

These articles were changed in the 1962 Town Meeting and again in 1963 but remain essentially the same regarding their duty to meet with the Board of Selectmen and the School Board members.

## **REPORT OF THE ADVISORY BUDGET COMMITTEE**

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The Advisory Budget Committee met with the Selectmen and School Board members. Individual items of the budgets were discussed and, other than minor changes as regarding salaries, all monies asked for seemed, according to the evidence presented, necessary and within reason.

## **REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF**

---

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2,280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy—both industrial and recreational—is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area—4,350,000 acres—is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

**SCHOOL WARRANT**

---

*To the inhabitants of the school district in the Town of Deerfield qualified to vote in district affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the sixth day of March 1965, at one o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against such appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income, the school board to certify



to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Article 9. To see if the school district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age Survivors and Disability Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated Amended by Chapter 302 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.75 as included in the budget to defray the school district's cost thereof, such plan to be retroactive to July 1, 1964.

Article 10. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the school district will authorize the school Board to execute on behalf of the district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the district will designate the school district treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

Article 11. To see if the school district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election.

Article 12. To see if the school district wishes to exclude from the plan services in any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis.

Article 13. To see if the school district will vote to accept a piano from Mr. Robert Farr.

Article 14. To see if the school district will vote to accept for school purposes the sum of \$21,689.01, to be known as the Charles C. Prescott Fund; a grandfather clock and family portraits from the estate of the late Charles C. Prescott, said clock and pictures to be displayed in the George B. White School.

Article 15. To see if the school district will vote to authorize the school district treasurer to withdraw annually 75% of the net income of the Charles C. Prescott Fund in the hands of the Trustees of Trust Funds to be used over and above the annual school district budget for music education and establishment and maintenance of a school library, the remaining 25% of such income to be accumulated and added to the principal of said Fund.

Article 16. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to defray any costs incurred by the area school district planning committee.

Article 17. To see if the school district will vote to authorize a tax commission audit and to raise and appropriate \$125.00 to cover the cost of same, said amount included in the budget as presented.

Article 18. To see if the school district will vote to authorize the school board to spend for excess 1964-65 tuition the sum of \$1,334.06, this amount being the N. H. Sweepstakes revenue in excess of the amount certified by the N. H. Tax Commission.

Article 19. To see if the school district will vote to authorize the school board to pay no more than the state average for tuition for high school students of the district.

## **SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT**

---

After several years of slow and delayed starts, the Co-operative School Movement has made big strides in New Hampshire in the past eighteen months. In any given case there are usually special factors which play a deciding role, but basic to all of them is the recognition that there is intrinsic value in a larger school unit, larger than most of our New Hampshire school districts. It is safe to say that within a relatively short time, historically speaking, all of our present school districts will become parts of co-operative schools or, closely related, the area school. The influence of the basic thinking in the Interim Commission's report to the last legislature is a primary factor.

Most of these co-operative school districts comprise grades 1-12 inclusive, with the lower grades being kept in existing elementary schools even, in some cases in one room schools in relatively isolated areas. A common break for a new school building often is grade 7. This is done, in some cases, to get a school of desirable size but also to take advantage of specialized areas such as shop, home economics, science, guidance, not to mention athletics. This age group needs special attention and should profit from departmentalized teaching. Since 1918 this writer has always been in relatively small schools but never away from the so-called junior high program, (with the exception of two years in the White Mountains).

Although Deerfield now has a "freedom of choice" for its high school pupils, this situation may not always exist. Deerfield should be willing to study any and all plans for co-operative schools, area schools, local solutions, and any

others, to enable it to make the right decisions for educating its youth. Deerfield must guard against being an island in a sea of reorganized school districts. It should be able to find one plan to the educational advantage of its youth. We must be interested in the best education possible within a reasonable net cost to the district.

Your continued support to the Deerfield schools is appreciated.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

---

The Deerfield School Board takes pleasure in making this report to the voters of the Deerfield school district with one regret. Our chairman, Admiral P. E. Pendleton, is no longer with us due to his unexpected death on December 9, 1964. He gave freely of his time for the betterment of the School and Town and may we always remember that his sole purpose was for the best of Deerfield.

This report covers the operation of the Deerfield School district for the fiscal year 1963-64 with some information about the present and some thoughts for the future.

### BUDGET

The 1963-64 budget was prepared by Mr. Wadsworth Winslow, Jr., Mr. Perley E. Pendleton and Mr. James L. Leary, with the assistance of our Superintendent Mr. C. Maurice Gray, and our Principal, Mr. John Anderson. The sum of \$83,677.25 was voted for the budget at the district meeting. At the termination of the fiscal year, June 30, 1964, there was an unexpended balance of \$5,471.16. This was due primarily to a number of high school students who did not attend during the second semester and therefore it was not necessary to pay their tuition. Tuition is and always will be a problem as there is no sure way of predicting the number of high school students we will have during the year.

### NEW TEACHERS

During the summer of 1963 we were fortunate in that our principal, Mr. John Anderson decided to return to teach the 7th and 8th grades in addition to being principal. The 5th and 6th grades were without a teacher as Mrs. Helen Donaldson did not return. Due to the efforts of our Superinten-

dent, we were able to obtain Mr. Clifford H. Perkins, Mrs. Low returned to teach the 3rd and 4th grades and Mrs. Bennett for the 2nd grade. Mrs. Stevens remained to teach the 1st grade.

## TRANSPORTATION

This was the last year for our 9 passenger Ford station wagon which was driven by Mrs. Theresa Stevens. The wagon served us well and more than payed for itself. On December 3, 1963, we took delivery of a new 60 passenger bus leased from P & S Leasing Corp. of Manchester. This lease was necessary to provide adequate transportation. Actually with the new bus we were able to improve the transportation by shortening the travel time by more than one hour each day.

## A LOOK AT THE PRESENT

This present school year started with our entire teaching staff returning giving us a well balanced and trained faculty. Our Superintendent searched all summer for a new teacher to take the third grade due to the separation of the third and fourth grades when we added the new classroom.

## NEW ROOM

The new classroom was completed and ready for use by the opening of school. The room was built by the low bidder, Caron Construction Co. of Manchester, for a total cost of \$3,820.12. The Board was pleased to see the voters recognize the need and vote the necessary money with a minimum of argument. The temporary wall was installed as per request of the voters and the type selected has proven very satisfactory in sound proofing qualities plus durability and appearance.

## NEW TEACHERS

We are pleased to say that since Miss Juanita Felch has joined our able teaching staff to teach the third grade, she

has proven her ability and interest in the students and the school.

This year also brought to our school two student teachers through the efforts of Mr. Anderson. Miss Murch and Miss Bresnahan worked diligently with Mrs. Low and Mrs. Bennett respectively giving our students the benefit of more individual attention.

### TRANSPORTATION

In our budget request of 1964-65 we requested \$1,100 for replacement of the station wagon by a new 12 passenger wagon. During the year we found that a 12 passenger wagon would not serve the transportation needs adequately. We were able to lease for 3 years a 30 passenger bus at a cost of \$1,000 per year plus gas and driver. At the termination of three years we will be able to purchase the bus for \$1 or start a new lease at the option of the voters.

### ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT

Mr. Roland L. Schoepf joined Mr. C. Maurice Gray as his assistant in June of 1964. Since Mr. Schoepf has joined our union, Deerfield has received much additional help. We trust the future will be as productive as the first semester.

### FUTURE

Deerfield is fast approaching a problem of overcrowding. This year (1964-65) our enrollment in grades one through eight is 156. It has been over 160 this year and is expected to exceed 169 before the end of the year. We are graduating 16 from the eighth grade in June and will be accepting 30 in the first grade in September.

If this trend in population, which the census indicates is true, continues, the time is fast approaching when some action must be taken. The following are three of the more promising approaches.

1. A major addition to the present school at a cost in the vicinity of \$75,000 plus additional operating expenses each year of about \$12,000.
2. Send the 7th and 8th grade students to a school out of town and pay their tuition and provide transportation. We asked Raymond for tuition costs for the 1965-66 school year to get an idea of costs and they indicate they would charge \$287 per student.
3. Participate in some form of Cooperative. Cooperatives of this size cost about \$500 to \$525 per student per year.

The problem is not an easy one and considerable study is necessary to determine the best solution for the good of our children. March of 1966 looks like the deadline for a decision.

We trust this report has been of assistance to you and that you will help in the coming year to give your time and energy to help solve the major overcrowding condition.

## REPORT OF COOPERATIVE STUDY COMMITTEE

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Following the March School District meeting 1964, in which the district voted to have the Moderator appoint three people to the Cooperative Study Committee, the following persons were appointed by Mr. Charles Copeland: Mr. James L. Leary, Mrs. Jane Dearborn, and Mr. John E. Grace.

On Nov. 12, 1964, Mr. James O'Neal and Mr. Paul Kilminster addressed approximately fifty people in the town hall concerning the cooperative movement with a short question and answer period following.

Shortly after this meeting Mrs. Jane Dearborn resigned as she would not have enough time to give to the study. Mr. Copeland then appointed Mrs. Marion Stewart to take her place.

An area planning board has been formed on a temporary basis with Dr. Thomas G. Abell as temporary chairman and Mr. James L. Leary as temporary secretary. At the present time there are four towns officially studying the cooperative idea. These towns are: Deerfield, Candia, Epping and Raymond.

We are looking forward to giving you more information as we start to gain momentum. At present we are waiting for more towns to join our study.
