RECORD OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Dunbarton, N. H., March 9, 1943

Meeting called to order and warrant read by the Moderator Louis D. Holcombe, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Weston P. Lord, C. Allen Fuller, Jr., Charles A. Little and Earle H. Stone served as Inspectors of Elections.

ARTICLE 1. Check list posted and polls opened for balloting.

On motion of John G. Pride, voted that Articles 2 and 8 inclusive be held in abeyance until after the noon recess.

Voted that the town officers not elected by ballot be elected in open meeting.

The following named officers were elected:

Auditors—David Story and Earle H. Stone.

Fence Viewers—John W. Farrar, Walter C. Blackman, Lincoln W. Burnham.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber—Walter C. Blackman, William L. Merrill, Caleb A. Fuller, Jr., Abraham L. Burnham.

Overseer of the Poor—Louis D. Holcombe.

Hog Reeves—George H. Brown, Frances Merrill.

ARTICLE 9. On motion of James R. Horner, Jr., voted to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 10. On motion of Caleb A. Fuller, Jr., voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the support of the Library.

ARTICLE 11. On motion of Walter C. Blackman, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the care of cemeteries. \$100 for the Center Cemetery, \$50 for the North Cemetery, \$50 for the East Cemetery.

ARTICLE 12. On motion of Frank E. Woodbury, Jr.,

voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for re-checking of an area for White Pine Blister Rust.

ARTICLE 13. On motion of C. Allen Fuller, Jr., voted that Article 13 be held in abeyance until after the noon recess.

ARTICLE 14. On motion of James R. Horner, Jr., voted to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 15. Motion of C. Allen Fuller, Jr., to allow 2% discount on all taxes paid on or before the 1st of July. Amendment by Frank E. Woodbury, Jr., that the discount of 2% be allowed two weeks after the bills are mailed if not mailed before July 1st. Motion passed as amended.

ARTICLE 16. Voted to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 17. On motion of Frank E. Woodbury, Jr., voted that the article be laid on the table until after the noon recess.

ARTICLE 18. On motion of Weston P. Lord, voted to pass over the article.

ARTICLE 19. On motion of C. Allen Fuller, Jr., voted to accept the reports of agents, auditors, committees and other officers heretofore chosen as printed in the annual report.

ARTICLE 2. On motion of John G. Pride, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3500 to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. On motion of William L. Merrill, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2600 for town highways.

ARTICLE 4. On motion of William L. Merrill, voted to take \$1600 from surplus for winter maintenance.

ARTICLE 5. On motion of William L. Merrill, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$584.70 for Class V roads to match a sum of \$2338.80 from the State, or such lesser amount necessary to match a lesser sum from the State.

ARTICLE 6. On motion of John G. Pride, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1300 for care of town poor, dependent soldiers, old age assistance.

ARTICLE 7. On motion of John G. Pride, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for war emergency.

ARTICLE 8. On motion of Lyman H. Nutt, voted to pass over the article.

ARTICLE 13. On motion of Iru M. Waite, voted to pass over the article.

On motion of C. Allen Fuller, Jr., voted to take Article 17 from the table.

ARTICLE 17. On motion of Robert Baker, voted to adopt the non-partisan Ballot System, to conform with a recent act of the State Legislature. On motion of Iru M. Waite, voted that all town officers who serve without pay be warranted the one dollar filing fee.

ARTICLE 20. On motion of John G. Pride, voted that the selectmen be instructed to set aside the sum of \$2000. Same to be taken out of surplus for the purpose of after war aid to our citizens in the service.

On motion of John G. Pride, voted that the selectmen be instructed to paint the town hall. The colors to remain the same as at the present time.

On motion of James R. Horner, Jr., voted that the selectmen be instructed to immediately take steps to repair the roof of the town hall to prevent snow slides.

Motion of Weston P. Lord that the dumping of junk in the town be under the supervision of the selectmen, and that land be acquired for that purpose, all the expenses of the same to be taken from the surplus.

Amendment by Eli Noyes that the dumps beside the highways be cleaned up. Motion passed as amended.

On motion of William L. Merrill, voted to close the polls at 5 o'clock.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Dunbarton, N. H., in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Dunbarton on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town highways.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a fixed sum of money for winter maintenance.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$292.65 for Class V roads to match a sum of \$1,170.61.

ARTICLE 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for care of town poor, dependent soldiers, old age assistance.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for fire hose and water holes.

ARTICLE 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Library.

ARTICLE 10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for rechecking of an area for white pine blister rust.

ARTICLE 12. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of snow removal equipment and for overhauling the town tractor.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes paid on or before the first of July.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to invest some of the money appropriated for soldiers in war bonds.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

ARTICLE 18. To hear all the Reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Crises like the present test the quality and sincerity of everyone's patriotism and citizenship. The times make such unavoidable demands for universal cooperation in the many lines of essential regular and emergency public endeavor that the response given may well be assumed to be the real measure of one's love of country and his appreciation of the opportunities it offers. Ranking high in the list of public endeavor is the protection of our forests from fire. It calls for full and generous cooperation by each of us. Fire statistics indicate that better than 98 per cent of all fires in New Hampshire are man-caused. If human carelessness could be eliminated from the problem, the number of fires would drop to a mere minimum of less than 2 per cent of present figures and fire costs and losses would reduce in proportion. While this goal will not be achieved because of the perversity of human nature, the record can be vastly improved through individual discipline, alertness and cooperation.

Discipline calls for personal restraint from following unrestricted natural impulses to do as one pleases with regard to fire; alertness in cautioning others against imprudent and illegal burning and in promptly reporting fires to the local forest fire warden; cooperation in complying with laws, rules, and regulations governing the kindling and care of fires, smoking, safety of mechanical units using fire in and near woodlands and assisting the local warden in extinguishing such fires as may occur.

The possibilities of disastrous and expensive woods fires are constantly becoming more real. The hurricane felled an estimated one and one-half billion board feet of standing timber, much of which was never cleaned up. To this haz-

ard has been and is being added extensive areas of slash from additional hundreds of millions cut to produce vitally needed wood for the war effort. With the stage so set, greater caution is increasingly necessary. It will pay substantial dividends in unburned forest areas and the saving of unnecessary fire expense.

The year 1943 was an extremely fortunate one because of favorable weather conditions. Many towns had no fires, some had minor fires while a few had expensive ones. The public controls the answer to the 1944 and future years' fire records. If the public is careful and cooperative the record will be good.

Your town warden is, perhaps, more perplexed and anxious during these war years than ever before because of increased forest fire hazards and diminishing supplies of available man-power. He looks directly to you to aid him. Will you? You can aid him most effectively by always securing the required permit before attempting to burn and by complying fully with permit requirements; by being patient when he advises of departmental restrictions on permit burning or that he deems it unsafe to burn; and by giving him the needed assistance in extinguishing fires when he needs your help. To do so is to meet one real test of citizenship.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Dunbarton :

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

Three changes in our teaching staff have occurred since a year ago. Mrs. Marjory Frink, a graduate of Keene and an experienced teacher, replaced Mrs. Marshall when the latter resigned. Mrs. Marshall over a period of years has won the respect of many people as a conscientious and gifted teacher. Dunbarton is indeed indebted to her for the contribution she has made to our schools.

After the resignation of Miss Stacey this past fall, Mrs. Grace Webster of New Boston, a graduate of Salem Teachers' College with further study at the N. E. Conservatory of Music as well as summer courses at Keene and Plymouth, assumed the position at the South Dunbarton School.

Mrs. Katherine Bartlett of Grasmere was engaged as music teacher, replacing Mrs. Buswell who had resigned.

The enrollment last year as will be seen by the table at the end of this report was 81 as compared with 79 the year before, showing no marked change.

Teachers and pupils have cooperated in a fine manner to meet the increased demands of war and to prepare our students for the peace which will follow. The aims and objectives of instruction have been the training of youth for the immediate tasks at hand as well as to equip them with the knowledge and experience needed to live in the world of the future as worthy citizens.

Immediate demands for assistance in the war effort have

been efficiently and cheerfully met in our town and in neighboring schools. These include help in planting and harvesting farm crops, sale of war stamps in an ever increasing volume, issuance of Ration Book Four, Junior Red Cross activities, salvage collections, and the like.

Teaching of the basic skills is the essential task of the schools and it is our policy to see that the job is thoroughly done by means of the best accepted methods. In order for pupils to succeed in school work it is necessary that they possess a good foundation in reading habits and abilities. For this reason the major part of book expenditures has been to equip elementary grades with a good reading system supplemented by workbook exercises for reading growth with correct language habits in writing and speaking.

We as citizens owe our gratitude to the teachers who have remained loyal to their profession of teaching and to the married women who have assumed teaching positions which otherwise could not have been filled. Like their sisters in the armed forces, the Wits, our Women In Teaching Service, are protecting our social structure from danger. What our civilization may be tomorrow depends in large measure upon what the present generation becomes.

The future offers a great challenge. The shortage of teachers was acute last year; now it is alarming. It will remain serious even after the war because new teachers are being trained in smaller and smaller numbers. Teacher college enrollments now are the smallest in many years. Consolidated schools and better salaries are measures which will be adopted in the most progressive towns to provide better advantages for children and to secure the best of available teachers.

The cooperation of parents, other citizens, and members of the school organization is greatly appreciated.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

Every child should make a regular annual gain; therefore, each pupil is weighed and measured at the beginning of the school year, then several times before the close of school in June, so that we may ascertain their rate of growth according to the scale prepared by the State Board of Health. The normal weight is judged according to the height and age of the child.

About 80 pupils were examined the first of the school year, and the parents notified of any weakness or defect found.

Frequent use of the clinics affords opportunity for an early diagnosis, treatments and corrections without any or but little expense.

Due to the shortage of doctors in the fall of 1943, we have been unable to take advantage of the heart clinics usually held once a month at the Elliot Hospital. This same condition existed in the dental profession, and we regret that we have been unable to hold our usual dental clinic this year. Our last clinic was given September, 1942. We have been more fortunate with the orthopedic clinics for treatments by appointment only were given to several of our physically handicapped children in two towns in this Union. The past year has been unusually free from any kind of an epidemic.

A talk was given at the Center School on the blood bank at the time the Red Cross was asking for blood donors.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with our past policy we are submitting a financial statement covering White Pine Blister Rust Control which was conducted in your town during the season of 1943.

Being mindful of the labor shortage, and the needs of agriculture every effort was made to the end that blister rust control would not interfere with farm activities. Consequently, it was sometimes necessary to defer or suspend control work either during the planting or harvesting season. In some instances high school boys were employed and it can be said to their credit that excellent service was rendered. While rates of pay for unskilled labor were higher than in the past, nevertheless, they were held to the local scale set up by the towns.

As formerly, the training and supervision of the crews was handled by the District Blister Rust Leader, an employee of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, but working under the direction of this office. We greatly appreciate the assistance given him by the members of the Board.

Since the present war has demanded so much lumber, a great reduction has taken place in the stands of merchantable white pine, thus leaving a great deal of young growth. Since the younger pines are quickly killed by the Rust, it is very important that this disease be kept under control in the interest of a future crop of pine.

It is recommended that this letter and the accompanying financial statement be printed in the town's annual report.
