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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE (L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampton Falls in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton Falls on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Twenty-Nine Dollars and Twenty-five Cents (\$229.25), the State contributing Nine Hundred Sixteen Dollars and Ninety-eight Cents (\$916.98), to be spent on Town Road Aid.

4. To raise and appropriate for economic advancement of the Town through the publicity and promotional service of the Seacoast Regional Development Association the sum of Sixty-nine Dollars (\$69.00).

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Seventy Dollars and Seventeen Cents (\$470.17) to reimburse the Treasurer of the Board of Library Trustees.

6. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

7. To see what action for fire protection the Town will take in regard to putting in a pipe line from the fire hydrant at the bridge to hydrants at Whittier's Park and the Common and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

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8. To see if the Town will vote to restrict all privately owned directional signs at the Town Common to a panel subordirate to public signs there, to be erected at owner's expense under directions of the Selectmen.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the recommendations of the dump committee and raise and appropriate money to improve the dump as recommended.

10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt each of the following as by-laws carrying thhe penalty of a fine for each violation:

- 1. Use of the dump shall be restricted to residents of Hampton Falls
- 2. Persons using dump shall be required to throw all refuse over shelf.
- 3. Persons unable to insinerate papers at home shall be required to package and tie all paper before leaving any at the dump, to prevent blowing of the same.
- 4. Persons leaving any other combustible matter at the dump shall be required to place it in a designated section to facilitate burning it.
- 5. All brush shall be hauled to center of the old gravel pit and there piled solidly in a designated spot.
- 6. Persons leaving more than one cubic yard of brush shall be required to report it to the Selectmen and may be required to burn the same under the directions of the Selectmen.
- 7. Leaving the bodies of cattle or of other creatures at the dump shall be specifically prohibited.

11. To see if the Town will appoint a zoning commission of five members to be created and to function under the laws of the State of New Hampshire. Nineteen (19) signers. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.) to repair the water hold at Kenney Brook.

13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Town Officer's salaries and the compensation of Highway work and other employers.

14. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission for an audit of the accounts of the Town of Hampton Falls every third year beginning with this year 1947 and raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty-five Dollars (\$125.) for the current year. Seventeen (17) signers.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SNOW REMOVAL EQUIPMENT

Your committee met on the dates indicated below for the purpose of discussing snow removal requirements for the town:

12 September 1946 — Seven (7) members present. Robert G. Perfect elected chairman of committee. After due consideration a vote of four (4) to three (3) was made and carried that equipment available to the town was adequate and sufficient for the present. Meeting was adjourned with object of meeting again at a later date by a call of the chairman. This later meeting to be called prior to our annual Town Meeting in 1947.

3 February 1947 — Seven (7) members present. By unanimous vote this date it was recommended that no additional snow removal equipment is necessary at this time.

#### **SPECIAL REPORT - TOWN DUMP**

After studing matters for a year, the dump committee wishes to report that considerable progress has been made in handling the town dump, but believes that there is still more to be achieved.

In 1946, the rat menace was controlled by a careful poisoning program, the dump was partly fenced and shaped up so that "shelf-dumping" could be started, and it was burned over frequently.

The committee recommends further fencing of the dump, partial screening with native evergreens at low cost, and further shaping to permit "shelf-dumping" far back where refuse will be concealed and papers will not blow down the road, and suggests that as the shelf is extended outward, the refuse be kept covered with dirt to maintain a usable shelf at all times, and that the snow plow keep entry open in winter. The committee further recommends the adoption of proper regulations and placing of signs to require people using the dump to throw all refuse over the shelf and package and segregate all paper to avoid blowing and facilitate burning; the use of home incinerators for burning papers and rags is urged.

Your committee believes that use of the dump should continue to be limited to residents of Hampton Falls, and suggests that a copy of dump regulations be mailed to all, with their tax bills. The foregoing would complete the program begun in 1946 and should cost no more than last year, and would result in lower costs in future years.

One corner of the room has been set aside for the children and furnished with small tables and benches, all donated.

The committee wishes to express its appreciation to the many volunteers who have so generously given their time for work, and money contributions to aid in restoring the library.

# SCHOOL REPORT

## SCHOOL WARRANT

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Hampton Falls qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said district on the 11th day of March, 1947, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report. 9. To see if the district will authorize the appointment of a committee to act with the Hampton Falls School Board for the construction and equipping of a new school building in Hampton Falls.

10. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to make application to the Federal Works Agency for funds under title V of the War Reconversion and Mobilization Act for the preparation of plans and specifications for a new school and to execute and deliver in the name of and on behalf of the school district, any and all contracts, agreements necessary for the purpose of obtaining a loan or grant from the Federal Works Agency or any other agency of the United States.

11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board, acting in conjunction with the building committee, to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary, proper and advisable in connection with the construction and equipping of a school building.

12. To see if the district will authorize the School Board, acting in conjunction with the Building Committee, to engage a qualified architect for the purpose of securing plans and specifications for the construction of a school.

13. To vote to build a new school building in Hampton Falls.

14. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$61,000 or any part thereof for the construction and equipping of a new school and in order to furnish such funds to authorize the school board to issue notes or bonds upon the credit of the district in accordance with Chapter 72 New Hampshire revised laws (Municipal Bond Act) and any special acts governing the issuing of bonds or notes by the School District of Hampton Falls.

15. To see if the district will vote to petition the State Tax Commission for an audit of the accounts of the School District of the Town of Hampton Falls every third year beginning with this year, 1947 and raise and appropriate the sum of ten dollars (\$10.00) for the current year.

16. To see if the district will vote to elect its school officers by Australian ballot with the use of a check list, this ruling to be effective for all future meetings beginning with the regular meeting in March, 1948.

To the School Board of Hampton Falls:

I herewith submit my seventeenth report as superintendent of your schools.

The Hampton Falls schools began the current year Monday, September 16, 1946, with an initial enrollment of forty-four divided evenly between the two rooms. This is an increase of three in comparison with September, 1945. Sixteen pupils were registered in the Hampton Junior High School and twenty-three in the Hampton Senior High. Three are enrolled in the Exeter schools.

The school opened with two teachers new to the district, since both our teachers of last year, Miss Higgins and Miss Berry accepted other positions, the former to teach in Maine and the latter in another district in New Hampshire. Mrs.. Florence Batchelder in the primary grades is a teacher of experience in the schools of New Hampshire. Mrs. Pauline Ainsworth comes to us after successful experience in the Amesbury school district. Both are earnest in their work for the welfare of our children.

The scholarship efficiency of our school is rated by tests duly standardized. By these tests we are enabled to evaluate the work of the pupils. Since the same tests are given in the Hampton schools to which most of our pupils go, parallel preparation is acquired. The work of our children in higher grades proves the value of this policy.

Hampton Falls offers three auxiliary services to its children. Our music supervisor, Mrs. Leona Foster is teaching our pupils to love music. This is a valued benefit which will enrich the childrens' lives after their school days. Her work is commended by all. Art is an aid to opening a new avenue of interest for our pupils. The purpose of this work is to train pupils to observe and enjoy the beauty in the common things of life. The power of observation is fundamental to education, during school life and after as adults. Miss Martin is again in charge of this activity.

The importance of good physical health is recognized by all schools. Our teachers are constantly working, by careful supervision in the class room and by lessons in health habits, to instill into the children an intelligent interest in physical well being. Mrs. Dorothy Lindsey, the school nurse, is a valued aid to us all. Each individual pupil is a special responsibility to her. She now is employed by six districts in this supervisory union.

With the burning of the school house our children were moved to Hampton. The three lower grades with their present teacher were housed in the Centre School library. The teacher and pupils of the three upper grades were allotted a regular class room in the Hampton Academy building. It has taken some time to reequip the school. All supplies bought are such as can be used in any new building the district may decide to erect. By borrowing equipment and supplies temporarily from other school districts in the Union, little time was lost to the pupils. We are now operating on our own text books and supplies. Thus, aside from the housing itself, our pupils are in Hampton Falls schools.

The school district faces several possibilities in the building of a new school. It may construct a two room building, with or without an auditorium. This will make possible the continuation of the present arrangement with Hampton and Exeter whereby our seventh and eighth grades attend their schools. An auditorium is always a worthy addition to any school, not only as a community center but as a facility for health and physical education and social training for our pupils. A second possibility is a three room building, with facilities for Home Economics and Manual Training. By this plan, our seventh and eighth grades would remain in the district and our children would have work paralleling that of Exeter or Hampton, in so far as a school of small enrollment would allow. It might be interesting to note the probable enrollment of grades seven and eight in future years as far as can be told from present registation. The current year number in Hampton Junior High School is 16. In 1947 and 1948 this number will be 15 if no additional pupils move into town and none leave. The next year 17 will be enrolled, followed by 13, 8 and 17.

The citizens committee has received preliminary information for presentation to the people. It has obtained this information in consultation with various architects and the State Board of Education. It has also visited schools that provide services similar to those which Hampton Falls might desire. Its report should furnish the data to aid the people of the district in determining the course by which their children may receive the best in education for the modern world.

The School Boards' budget for the current year is not a normal picture. Because of the fire a complete supply of text books had to be ordered. Since the average life of a text is four or five years the large cost for replacements must be faced in our budget. We are compelled to purchase supplies for the last half of the current year as well as the usual supplies for next year. The same condition is true in regard to maps, globes, reference and library books. These appear under "Other Expenses of Instruction." Teachers' salaries must be increased and also tuition costs.

In the midst of unforeseeable difficulties, you as a board have consistently pointed your efforts toward the welfare of the pupil. The year has been a strenuous one and required much time and effort. At the present time I can see no reason why the year should not be a successful one for your pupils.
