Water Commissioners' Report

The total rentals for the fiscal year ending July 1, 1928, in the amount of \$854.61, have been committed to Chester F. Dutton for collection.

This year is no exception as far as additional equipment is concerned as there have been new fixtures installed for Mrs. Hannah M. Kimball, Mrs. Jerusha Page and Mrs. Hattie M. Shaw.

Material on hand for repairs in the amount of \$74.98.

The cleaning out of our reservoir has always been a rather serious proposition as the outlet pipe is too small to properly take care of the water.

The Committee has been looking into the matter with the view of remedying this condition and can now report the following:

In place of the present small outlet a 12-inch pipe and gate can be installed at an approximate total cost of three hundred dollars.

This will enable us to clean the reservoir very quickly at any time and at a very greatly reduced cost.

Your Committee is unanimously in favor of having this work done the coming season.

Report of Electric Lighting Committee

The lighting system has been extended to the Gagne, Cashion and Morton houses at a cost of \$923.20, including services and an additional street light. The cost of building this year was about the same per mile as last year. We bought heavier and longer poles than formerly and were able to get a larger amount for joint ownership from The New England Tel. & Tel. Co. The Public Service Co. of N. H. have paid the town \$1,922.14 which is the approximate gross income of the line for the year.

The Public Service Co. of N. H. wish to know the town's price for its interest in the lighting system. We, the committee, are heartily in favor of selling at the proper price at this time and before the time arrives for heavy repairs and renewals.

We herewith submit an account of the cost of extensions

and repairs in detail.

We have examined the accounts of the Treasurer of the Town Common Fund, Water Commissioners, Electric Light Committee Town Treasurer, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, Selectmen, Tax Collector, Road Agent, Overseer of the Poor and Publicity Committee and find them correctly cast and duly vouched. We have examined the accounts of the Town Clerk and find an overpayment to the Town Treasurer of \$25.44 on automobile taxes. We find a balance in the hands of the Town Treasurer of \$3,745.41; balance in the hands of the Treasurer of the Common Fund of \$7.20; and balance in the hands of the Treasurer of the Town Library of \$186.43.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hancock:

The expenditures for public school elementary education in Hancock are becoming stabilized. State aid is adequately caring for the needs of the town over and above the one half of one per cent tax. Full cost accounting methods are adopted by the School Board with certain major changes in the viewpoint toward equalization funds. The results are financially very gratifying. The adoption of clerical service in the central office has paid for itself in actual financial return, and left a sufficient amount of money available to care for all needs of the district.

It is recommended that monthly accounting of loan fund cash (state aid) be reported to the Board. The excellent liaison between the School Board and the Educational Association now in process will lead to more educational advantages at less actual

cost. -

The fact that re-valuation of Hancock has measurably increased the one half of one per cent tax should be taken into account for the year 1929-1930 by careful planning of expenditures for more than one year ahead. Distribution of necessary costs can be planned so as to care for, in large degree, the certainty that (if the present valuation should be the legally fixed basis for state aid) there will be less state aid available in that year, and in the year after.

Too often, the money expended is watched with greater degree than is the way in which it is expended. Too often, the sums expended are watched with greater emphasis than is the return

which the money gives to the children's education.

Along this path lies the danger that what seems to be small cost is actually exceedingly expensive. Full pupil accounting should be adopted by the Board, and the ratings of teachers and the standards of achievement which the children have attained

should be noted in detail at least twice each year.

The group of children in Hancock is of unusually high type and deserves the assurance that it is receiving a dollar's worth of education for each dollar of tax-money expended. Complete statistics should always be available, and since the duty of Trustees of Public Funds is to assure as large a return as possible from investments, as well as to add and subtract items of income and expenditure, the Board is acting wisely to provide itself with complete basis for judgment as to the values received from the school tax.

Centralization of the schools is working well financially as well as educationally. The buildings are in good repair. The

teaching staff is loyal and conscientious. It deserves the ap-

preciation of the public, and receives it, we believe.

62 children were enrolled in the elementary grades during the past year. Attendance was maintained at the high level of 95%. Six pupils had perfect records of attendance. Only 26 cases of tardiness occurred during the year.

The children are in need of many more books. Co-operation between the library and the school district can assist greatly, provided that the library has funds available. There is no question concerning its willingness to be of great service.
