TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Cogswell High School Auditorium in said Henniker on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at eight of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

Town meeting will be recessed for School meeting.

Polls open at 9:00 a. m. and close at 8:00 p. m.

The articles in the Warrant will be taken up at 8:00 p. m.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, and other Committees.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, repair or purchase of machinery.

- 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Public Health, and raise money for the same.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Tucker Free Library.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining hydrant service for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to prevent the spread of white pine blister.

- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction of Class V Roads.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Merrimack Valley Region Association.
- 15. To see what action the Town will take relative to maintaining a Town Dump, raise money for same or take other action relative thereto.
- 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$693.00 for the support of Concord Hospital.
- 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for legal services.
- 19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Planning Board.
- 20. Section 1. To see what action the Town will vote to take with respect to repealing the action of the 1946 Town Meeting under Article 14 establishing the so-called Emergency Fund.

- 20. Section 2. To see if the Town will vote to repeal the action taken under Article 20, 1959 Town Meeting providing for certain expenditures from the so-called Emergency Fund.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to establish a new fund in place of the old so-called Emergency Fund, and to continue payments to this new fund of 40% of the annual income of the Straw Fund, monies from said new Fund to be expended as voted at any regular or special Town Meeting.
- 22. Section 1. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00); and to appropriate and spend Eleven Thousand Dollars (\$11,000.00) from the fund established under Article 21 to purchase new equipment for the Town Highway Department.
- 22. Section 2. That the Selectmen are further authorized to sell by sealed bids the 1945 Ford $1\frac{1}{2}$ ton truck.
- 23. To see if the Town will adopt the Zoning Ordinance recommended by the Planning Board.

PROPOSED ZONING ORDINANCE

Town of Henniker, New Hampshire

Preamble

The purpose of this ordinance is to protect the health, safety, convenience, and general welfare of the town of Henniker, New Hampshire and is hereby enacted by said town, pursuant to the authority conferred by Sections 60-89 of Chapter 31, Sections 2, 18, 30, and 36 of Chapter 36 and Sections 1-5 of Chapter 15 and Chapter 31 of New Hampshire revised Statutes Annotated 1955.

Article I

Establishment of Zoning Districts

Article II

General Provisions

- A. The ruins of a building or structure partly or completely destroyed by fire or other cause shall be removed or restored within a period of two years of the date when such damage had occurred.
- B. No outdoor advertising sign or structure shall be permitted in any district unless it pertains to the sale, lease, or use of property in the town of Henniker. Each such sign or structure shall not be more than 25 square feet, outside dimensions. Plans of such a sign or structure must be approved by the Board of Selectmen before it is erected.

C. Borrow Pits: Upon the abandonment of the operation of any borrow pit or quarry, the owner shall have all banks graded to a stabilized slope sufficient enough to prevent against erosion, and shall fill in or provide drainage for any pit below the average water table or any pit where surface water will collect and remain during normal climatic conditions.

Article III

Residential District

Uses, Area, and Height Regulations

- A. The following uses shall be permitted in the Residential District:
 - 1) Single and multi-family dwellings;
 - 2) Tourist homes and rooming houses;
 - 3) The office of a doctor, engineer, architect, lawyer, real estate or insurance agent, or other recognized profession, or such customary home occupations as hairdressing, antique shops, dressmaking, manufacture of food products, provided that not more than four persons in addition to the owner or tenant shall be employed;
 - 4) Farm and garden activities when incidental to the permitted residential uses, provided such farm and garden activities are not injurious, obnoxious or offensive to the neighborhood;
 - 5) Churches and religious institutions, and parks and playgrounds.
 - 6) Buildings used exclusively by the federal, state, county or local municipal government for public purposes, but not including any workshops or warehouses.
- B. Residential District Area Regulations:
 - 1) Side and Rear Yard. No building shall be located nearer than 15 feet of any side or rear lot line;

- 2) Front Yard. No building shall be located nearer than 25 feet of the edge of the Right-of-Way. When the existing buildings on either side are closer than 25 feet of the Right-of-Way, no building need be set back more than the average of the setbacks of the adjacent buildings;
- 3) Frontage. Every lot shall have a minimum frontage of 80 feet;
- 4) Minimum Land Area. No lot shall contain an area of less than 10,000 square feet.
- C. Residential District Height Regulations: No building shall exceed a height of 30 feet.

Article IV

Agricultural District

Uses and Area Regulations

- A. The following uses shall be permitted in the Agricultural District:
 - 1) Any use permitted in the Residential District;
 - 2) Farms and residences;
 - 3) The sale of Farm products and home produce;
 - 4) General farming, including horticultural, dairying, livestock and poultry raising, and other agricultural enterprises or uses;
 - 5) Schools public and private.
- B. Agricultural District Area Regulations:
 - 1) Side and Rear Yard. No building shall be located nearer than 25 feet of any side or rear lot line;
 - 2) Front Yard. No building shall be located nearer than 25 feet from the edge of the right-of-way;
 - 3) Frontage. Every lot shall have a minimum frontage of 150 feet;
 - 4) Minimum Land Area. No lot shall contain an area of less than 30,000 square feet.

Article V

Commercial District "A"

Uses, Area, and Height Regulations

- A. The following uses are permitted in Commercial District "A":
 - 1) Any use permitted in Agricultural District;
 - 2) Retail businesses;
 - Lodging houses, apartment houses, hotels, motels, inns, tourist courts, cabins, including such retail businesses within these permitted buildings as are conducted for the convenience of the residents or guests;
 - 4) Theaters, halls, clubs, greenhouses, florist shops, undertaking establishments, business or professional offices, shops, restaurants, or any other retail establishment;
- B. Commercial District "A" Area Regulations:
 - 1) Side Yard. No building shall be located nearer than 7.5 feet of any side lot line;
 - 2) Front Yard. No building shall be located nearer than 15 feet of the edge of the right-of-way. When existing buildings on either side are closer than 15 feet of the Right-of-way, no building need be set back more than the average of the setbacks of the adjacent buildings.
- C. Commercial District "A" Height Regulations: No building shall exceed a height of 30 feet.

Article VI

Commercial District "B"

Uses, Area, and Height Regulations

- A. The following uses are permitted in Commercial District "B":
 - 1) Any use permitted in Commercial District "A";

- Wherever vacant area is available in conjunction with uses permitted under this Article, off-street parking accommodations shall be provided for customer use.
- B. Commercial District "B" Area Regulations:
 - 1) Side Yard. No building shall be located nearer than 15 feet of any side lot line;
 - 2) Front Yard. No building shall be located nearer than 25 feet of the edge of the Right-of-way. When existing buildings on either side are closer than 25 feet of the edge of the Right-of-way, no building need be set back more than the average of the setbacks of the adjacent buildings.
- C. Commercial District "B" Height Regulations: No building shall exceed a height of 30 feet.

Article VII

Special Exceptions

- A. No building or premises shall be erected, altered, or used for any of the following specific uses, unless the Board of Adjustment shall rule that such a use under such conditions and in such a building as it may prescribe will conform to all the requirements of this Article and will not be detrimental or injurious to the neighborhood;
 - 1) Junk Yards are permitted in the Agricultural District only; no junk yard is to be located nearer than 200 feet of the edge of any public highway Right-of-way and not less than 100 feet from any property line. If they conform to the aforementioned standards and are still within view of a public highway, place of business or private residence, they must be enclosed by a continuous solid board fence not less than 8 feet in height. Plans of such a fence must be approved by the Board of Selectmen before it is erected.

- 2) Single Trailers and Mobile Homes only single trailers and mobile homes which are used for residential purposes are permitted in the Residential District and Agricultural District provided they conform to all the Area Regulations of the permanent dwellings of the District in which they are located. However, any property owner or lessee may accommodate one trailer or mobile home of a non-paying guest for a period not exceeding ninety (90) days in any one year.
- 3) Trailer Parks and Mobile Home Parks are permitted in the Agricultural District only, and provided they conform to all the following requirements:
- (a) No trailer park or mobile home park may be located nearer than 200 feet of any public highway Right-of-way and not less than 100 feet from any property line;
- (b) Each trailer or mobile home space shall contain a minimum area of 4,000 square feet, shall be a distance of at least 30 feet from any other trailer or mobile home, and shall front on an access road 30 feet in width if off-street parking is provided, otherwise such access road shall have a minimum width of 40 feet.
- (c) Each access road shall connect with a street or highway, and shall have a minimum travel-way width of 20 feet. No dead-end access road shall be permitted unless a turnaround of adequate dimensions to accommodate vehicular traffic is provided;
- (d) In all trailer parks and mobile home parks, the travel-way of all access roads shall be well drained, hard-surfaced or paved, lighted at night, and maintained in good condition;

- (e) All trailers and mobile homes shall conform to any other State Regulations that are being enforced.
- 4) Industry is permitted in the Agricultural District and the Commercial District provided that it can meet the following requirements:
- (a) No industry may be located nearer than 40 feet from the edge of any public highway Right-of-way and not less than 30 feet from each side and rear property line;
- (b) Each industry shall provide adequate parking facilities for freight and delivery trucks and employee parking;
- (c) Each industry shall provide its own utilities, i. e. water and sewerage facilities, so as not to be an additional burden to existing town facilities;
- (d) Prove at a public hearing that it can meet the aforementioned requirements and will not offend for any reason that is or will be obnoxious or injurious to the town of Henniker by the production or emmission of odor, dust, smoke, refuse matter, fumes, noise, vibrations, or similar conditions that are dangerous to health, safety, morals and general welfare of the community.

Article VIII

Non-Conforming Uses

- A. Any non-conforming use of land or building may continue in its present use and location, except that any non-conforming use of land or building may not be:
 - (1) Changed to another non-conforming use;
 - (2) Extended or enlarged;
 - (3) Restored after damage by fire or other cause to an extent of more than 75 percent of its fair market value.

Article IX

Enforcement

- A. This ordinance shall be enforced by the Board of Selectmen of the town of Henniker;
- B. After the passage of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful to erect any structure or building, or alter the bulk of any building or relocate any building except an accessory building, without first obtaining a building permit from the Board of Selectmen;
- C. No permit shall be required for remodeling where the purpose for which the building is to be used is not changed;
- D. Whenever in the opinion of the Board of Selectmen any provision of this ordinance is being violated, they shall take whatever steps are legal and proper to cause the immediate abatement of such violation.

Article X

Penalty

A. Upon conviction thereof, every person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars (\$10) for each day such violation may exist.

Article XI

Amendments

A. This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting when such amendment has received preliminary public hearings and a final public hearing by the legislative body, which hearing has been advertised and given a legal fifteen day notice; or when such amendment has received preliminary public hearings and has been published in its entirety in the warrant calling for the meeting.

Article XII

Board of Adjustment

Within thirty (30) days after the adoption of this ordinance and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Board of Adjustment of five members whose duties shall conform to the provisions of Chapter 31 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. When the Board is first organized, one member shall be appointed to serve for one year, one for two years, one for three years, one for four years, and one for five years, and thereafter the appointing authority shall annually appoint one member for a term of five years. In addition to the general powers granted to the said Board of Adjustment by said Chapter 31 Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, it may, in harmony with and subject to the provisions of this ordinance:

A. Waive the Residential and Agricultural frontage requirements where there are unusual conditions of street curvature, topography, sub-surface conditions, or prevailing lot sizes. In such cases however, the average width of the lot shall be equal to or larger than the frontage requirements of the District in which the lot is located.

Article XIII

Saving Clause

The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not effect the validity of any other provision.

Article XIV

Effective Date

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

Article XV

Definitions

- A. Borrow Pit Any place or premises where dirt, soil, sand, gravel, or other material is removed by excavation or otherwise, below the grade of surrounding land for any purpose than that necessary and incidental to grading or to building construction or operation on the premises.
- B. Junk Yard An open area where waste or scrap materials are bought, sold, exchanged, stored, baled, packed, disassembled, or handled, but not limited to scrap iron and other metals, paper, rags, rubber tires, and bottles. A junk yard includes an auto-wrecking yard, but does not include uses established entirely within closed buildings.
- C. Non-Conforming Use any use of land, buildings, or structures which does not comply with all the regulations of this ordinance.
- D. Right-of-way means and includes all town, state, and federal highways and the land on either side of same as covered by statutes to determine the widths of the rights-of-way.
- E. Lot shall be construed to mean that parcel of land on which a principal building and its accessories are placed, together with the required open space.
- F. Frontage the length of the lot bordering on the public right-of-way.
- G. Building Height for the purpose of this ordinance, the height of a building shall be measured from the top of the foundation wall to the highest portion of the roof.
- H. Accessory Building a detached building located on the same lot as the main building, and the use of which is customarily incident to the principal use of the land or to the main building.

- 24. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase the Abbie Morse homestead, so called, located at West Henniker, and raise and appropriate a sum of money not exceeding ten thousand dollars, (\$10,000.00), for purchase and repair of the same as the Amy Cheney Beach Memorial Museum, or take any other action in regard to the matter.
- 25. "To see if the Town will vote to approve the relocation, rearrangement, abandonment and/or alteration of Town roads located within the Hopkinton-Everett Dam and Reservoir Project, and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the United States of America for such purpose, and further to authorize the Selectmen to grant flowage easements over certain of said roads and to discontinue certain other roads at the appropriate time and take any other action so that construction and operation of said project will not be delayed".
- 26. "To see if the Town will approve the relocation, rearrangement and/or alteration of a portion of the Town's water supply system that is located within the reservoir area of the Hopkinton-Everett Dam and Reservoir Project and to authorize the Selectmen and/or the Water Commissioners to enter into an agreement with the United States of America for such purpose, and further to authorise said Selectmen and/or Water Commissioners to acquire the additional real estate interests needed to accomplish such work."
- 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair and painting of the steel bridge at West Henniker, or take any other action relative thereto.

- 28. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.
- 29. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a public parking lot, or take any action relative thereto.
- 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and/or appropriate for the building of an addition to the Fire House, or take any action relative thereto.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Park Board to act in accordance with Chapter 31, Sections 44 through 52, Revised Statutes Annotated, raise and/or appropriate money therefor in accordance with Section 45 of above named Chapter, or take any other action relating thereto.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day, raise and appropriate a sum of money for support of same; instruct the Selectmen to appoint a committee or take any other action relating thereto.
- 33. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

- 1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
 - 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.

- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles use your ash tray.
- 5. Don't burn at home Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

REPORT OF THE TOWN PLANNING BOARD

As directed, the Planning Board has prepared a zoning ordinance and recommends it be adopted as soon as possible.

As directed, the Planning Board has prepared a plan for parking behind the library and recommends that it be adopted.

A land use study has been made and a land use plan created which supplements the zoning study.

Flood Control and New Highways are creating almost insoluble problems for the community. Every effort is being made to contribute to the solution of these problems.

Work will continue along these lines next year.

Work will also continue next year on a base map and it is hoped that many existing community facitities can be plotted. This will facilitate future studies of water, sewer, and street development problems.

Some thirty meetings and three public hearings have been held this year, all of which were well attended. It is expected that the tempo of work will continue at about the same pace next year.

When we started school on September 9, 1959 there were three new teachers on the High School staff, Mr. David Whitelaw was the new Social Studies teacher replacing Mr. Dean DesRoches;; Mr. William Simpson was the new English teacher replacing Mr. Clifford Richer; and Mrs. Grace Cody was the new Home Making teacher replacing Mrs. Amy Simpson.

In November Mr. Simpson asked to be released from his contract so Miss Sandra Greenleaf, who had proved to be a very competent practice teacher, was selected to fill the vacancy. In December Mr. Baker asked to be released from his contract to accept a position in Rhode Island as a Guidance Director. Mrs. Woollett has been appointed as Acting Principal and Mrs. Carolyn Lewis and Mrs. Marion Chase were employed as part time teachers to take Mr. Baker's classes and part of Mrs. Woollett's.

Mrs. Roberta McNamara is the assistant teacher helping the first and second grade teachers. The majorpart of her time has been spent on the improvement of reading in the two mentioned grades.

From the previous paragraphs it is easily noticed that we have had many changes in the High School teaching staff this year, and if changes such as these occur too frequently the program of studies will suffer. We now have a good solid staff of teachers and it is hoped that our turnover in teachers will be held to minimum another year. Good working conditions and satisfactory salary adjustments are the two most important ways of retaining teachers. We cannot hope to compete with other states, but we must compete with other towns in the state for teachers.

One fact that I have said before in my reports, but it is important, is that the schools are dependent on a property tax. Over 90% of our 1959 - 1960 budget was raised by property taxes and we are fortunate to get money from Trust Funds and tuition. We don't get a solitary penny from the state and yet education is a state function. The state has shifted its financial responsibility to the local community, which has to raise its money on a tax which is fifty years out of date. This forces retired people, farmers and low salaried people who own their own homes to pay a higher tax than they should. There will be no change in that policy until enough people in the state demand a change be made by the legislature.

I can see no great increases in the enrollment of the elementary school over our present enrollment. However the elementary classes that had twenty five and thirty pupil enrollments are now in the high school building. If

all the classrooms we have were of the proper size we would have satisfactory housing conditions. Unfortunately our classrooms range from small to tiny. A partition in the study hall room has been one proposed immediate solution, but a complete study of space should be made with a long range program in view. Building costs are high and no building program should be undertaken without a great deal of careful study.

ACTING PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of schools, members of the school board, and citizens of Henniker, as acting principal I submit the following report:

One hundred twenty-seven pupils are presently enrolled in the junior and senior high school. There are 71 in grades 9 - 12, 10 fewer than were enrolled in 1958; however, there are 56 enrolled in grades 7 and 8, an increase of 12 over the enrollment of the previous year. We can anticipate a total enrollment of 146 in the fall of 1960, which will be an estimated increase of 19 pupils in grades 7 - 12.

Overcrowded classrooms and lack of adequate space for the business department and the library are conditions which require immediate attention. Provision for enlarged junior high rooms is especially important.

Two minor changes have been made in the curriculum. Shorthand I was introduced to the business program, which now includes Typing I, Typing II, junior business and bookkeeping in addition to the Shorthand I. We plan to complete offerings in the commercial program next year by adding a course in Office Practice. This program, under the direction of Miss Jean Babson, has greatly strengthened our curriculum and is proving both practical and popular.

Latin I and II have been dropped, and now the language offerings are limited to two years of French.

In the extra-curricular area we have added a news-

paper club, which publishes a quarterly. We now have one weekly homeroom period, which gives the homeroom an opportunity to plan class activities and to have conferences with the homeroom teacher. Our third innovation is regularly scheduled assembly programs in which students, teachers and invited guests participate.

Several changes in staff personnel have been effected. New teachers include Mrs. Grace Cody, home economics and biology instructor; Miss Sandra Greenleaf, social studies and English; Mr. David Whitelaw, social studies and junior high math; and Mrs. Virginia Garlow, music.

After the resignation in December of Mr. Dwight Baker, principal, Mrs. Evelyn Woollett was appointed acting principal. We were fortunate to secure the services of two experienced parttime teachers, Mrs. Marion Chase, junior high and English, and Mrs. Carolyn Lewis, French.

Mr. Raymond Demars, mechanic arts, science, and coaching instructor; Miss Jean Babson, business, Mr. Eugene Lord, math and science, and Mr. Hugh Connor, physical education, complete our staff.

The importance of a fairly constant and dedicated staff cannot be overrated, particularly in the small school. The effort made by the school board and superintendent to secure such a staff is appreciated.

The graduates of Henniker High continue to set commendable records. Of the class of 1959 three are attending the University of New Hampshire, one is at Keene Teachers College, one at Concord Commercial College, two are in the armed forces, one is studying cosmethology, and the other six are employed. Two of the latter plan to attend post secondary schools in the fall of 1960.

Not only are we proud of our graduates, but we are also proud of our student body. By and large they are a fine group of young people. We shall strive to instill in them a respect for learning, sound work habits, and self-discipline. We shall continue to challenge each to work to his capacity inasmuch as we are able. To provide adequate physical facilities, a sound curriculum, and a qualified staff — these are the responsibilities of us all.

I extend my sincere appreciation for the fine oc-operation I have received from students, parents and staff. One can only conclude that such co-operation is an expression of genuine interest in furthering good public education in the Henniker Schools.
