THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hinsdale qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, on Tuesday the 14th day of March, 1944 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To see if the town will vote to accept and adopt the report of the Selectmen, Auditors and other town officers.
- Article 3. To choose a member of the Board of Selectmen for the ensuing three years.
- Article 4. To choose a member of the board of Library Trustees for the ensuing three years.
- Article 5. To choose five members of the Budget Committee for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To choose seven members of the playground committee for the ensuing year.
- Article 7. To choose a member of the Water and Sewer Commission for the ensuing three years.
- Article 8. To choose all other necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.
- Article 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of ordinary town charges, for support of the poor, the maintenance of the fire department, for lighting the streets and for all other necessary expenses arising within the town.

- Article 10. To see what action the town will take in regard to refunding \$71.92 the cost of Civilian Defense the past year.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$193.80 to which the State will contribute \$775.19 to be expended on Class 5 roads.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow on the credit of the town a sufficient sum of money to provide for additional fire protection, police protection, health protection, road repairs and so forth due to the war emergency or act in any manner thereon.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for a culvert in the Barber District in the south part of the town.
- Article 14. To see if the town will put in a culvert pipe between the house and barn at Cecil Morse's to take care of town water in the spring of the year.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars the Mountain Road in the north part of the town, near the Connecticut River, beginning at the south boundary of land owned by the State of New Hampshire and extended northerly to the Hinsdale-Chesterfield town line, or act in any manner thereon.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote to close, subject to gates and bars the old Northfield Road beginning at the entrance to the residence of W. S. Howe on Tower Hill and extending southerly to the Hinsdale-Winchester town line, or act in any manner thereon.
- Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$336.00 (1-100th of 1% of the valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote the sum of \$2,000.00 for the erection of a suitable memorial and armistice celebration for the Veterans of World War 2.

Article 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The annual physical examination of school children was completed in late fall by Dr. Edmond Lachaine, school physician, assisted by the school nurse.

The Audiometer was used last February to test the hearing of all school children from Grades 3-12 inclusive. It is now to be used yearly as part of the physical examination.

A pre-school Diphtheria Immunization Clinic was held in the Community Room July 20th. Dr. Edmond Lachaine and Dr. H. L. Brown gave this toxoid to sixty-eight children between the age of 6 months to 6 years. This clinic was sponsored by the State Department of Health and was supervised by Mrs. Lucille Marshall, State Department of Health Nurse.

A school dental clinic was conducted during November and December by Dr. J. H. Grimes. One hundred and fifteen children and sixteen adults were cared for during this clinic.

Miss Ethel Holmes, Nursing Consultant, American Red Cross, visited this service May 7th.

May I take this opportunity to thank the members of the Local Red Cross and the Nursing Activities Committee, the physicians and the community as a whole for their cooperation and assistance.

More children's books have been purchased because of this increased demand and these books will be valuable for many years to come; which is not true of adult books especially reference and non-fiction.

There is a great call for light fiction and new detective stories which is supplied in part from funds received in the rental collection.

With very few young men using the library there has been little demand for western and adventure stories.

Most library meetings have been given up for the duration but two trips have been made by the librarian and her assistant to purchase books and they each attended two sessions of the Boston Herald Book Fair.

Through the summer months we have continued with the inventory and the shelf list has been corrected for those volumes housed upstairs.

As soon as it can possibly be obtained, the library will need a new floor covering.

REPORT OF HINSDALE PLAYGROUND COMMITTEE

The playground opened up this year by the school using the grounds and field house for their May Day program. The High School also used the baseball diamond to practice and play on; and the band used the field to practice marching on.

After school closed the playground was operated from 9 a. m. to 4.30 p. m. five days a week under the supervision of Mrs. Doris Beaudreault Smith. A program was furnished indoors, where arts and crafts were taught, as well as outdoors for all age groups. The average daily attendance was 51 during the supervised summer season. More children came to the playground this season than in years past. The children were escorted daily from the High School to the playground by the Girl Scouts.

The soft-ball diamond was used only by the children. The adult teams were so busy working this past season that they did not have time to play soft-ball. Our town baseball team didn't organize this season due to being unable to travel to opponent teams' home grounds, and vice versa; therefore the baseball diamond was not used. However, it was kept in shape so it will be fit to use another season.

A few used the archery range trying out their "Robin Hood Skill". Several adults used the shuffle board as well as the children. There was more enthusiasm shown this season with this particular game.

The girls used the basketball court, volley ball court, croquet court and Badminton court. The horseshoe courts were used a great deal by the O. P. observers, they being nearby enabled them to play as well as spot and report planes that flew over. The younger children kept the swings, teeters, slippery slides, horizontal bars, trapeze ring and climbing ladder in use from morn until night. The tiny children would use the sand boxes which were sheltered by the open shed on the field house. After school started the playground loaned some of its equipment to the Grade and Plain schools so that they could enjoy it during the Indian summer.

The field house and out-door fireplace were used by several organizations throughout the summer season. Several picnic parties were held around the open fireplace.

The annual Labor Day field party was held although there was a gas shortage. The weather man was favorable with his weather for the day which made it ideal for a well attended Old Home Day. A few more exhibits and amusements were added this year to the town's annual Old Home Day. The net proceeds for the day were \$502.00 which will be used about the playground.

During the summer months Mr. Clifford Hall was employed as caretaker, keeping the grounds intact. Doris Worden served as a volunteer assistant supervisor throughout the summer season.

Due to the shortage of a supervisor and labor, an artificial skating rink was not attempted this past winter. The children had the use of Streeter's pond for skating when ice conditions were naturally favorable. We wish to express our thanks to Mrs. B. I. Streeter who graciously loaned the use of her pond for skating this past winter.

The Playground committee is planning to plant shade trees about the grounds so that in years to come natural beauty will be added to our playground. Also, additional playground equipment will be added from time to time.

We wish to thank all the townspeople and organizations that have helped during the past year to make our playground a success and do hope their sincere interest will be given to the playground in years to come to give our young citizens-to-be a place to play and develop their bodies physically so they may have the advantages that other towns have to offer.

COUNCIL ON POSTWAR PLANNING AND REHABILITATION

State House, Concord, New Hampshire

Arthur E. Moreau Robert O. Blood Thorsten V. Kalijarvi Chairman Governor Secretary Februray 7, 1944.

Although it is primarily the task of industry and business to provide useful work for members of the armed

forces when the war is over, state and local governments may be called upon to furnish worth-while public works if private employment alone is unable to provide enough jobs.

The Public Works Committee of the State Postwar Planning Council has been created to assist municipalities in New Hampshire to plan for such public works. To this end, this Committee wishes respectfully to urge the towns of the State to prepare a list of projects that could be drawn upon as an unemployment program, provided that such a need becomes evident in the post-war years.

That there should be jobs available for each and every one of our men and women as they are mustered out of the armed forces, is agreed to by all.

If private industry is not able to furnish all the opportunities needed then Public Works must be provided. These should be worth-while projects, carefully thought out and adequately planned.

The State Highway Representative has accepted the responsibility of being the field agent for this Committee and he is prepared to discuss any Public Works project, beginning with roads and including such other possible projects as swimming pools, sidewalks, parks and playgrounds, waterworks, sewers and sewage disposal plants, town forests, public buildings, etc.

A Public Works program requires time for public opinion to form and for the preparation of adequate plans and now is none too early to begin. Might I also suggest, if you have definite projects in mind, the possibility of using Chapter 160 of the Sessions Laws of 1943, which allows your town to lay aside sums from this year's appropriation for specific postwar projects.

Let us not again earn the criticism of "too little and too late" in this most important preparation for the days that are to come.

MUSIC SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of Hinsdale:

I am pleased to submit my first annual report.

Music activities of the year started off, as usual, with the band leading the Labor Day parade. The first out-oftown performance came when the band was invited to play for the Agricultural Department Fair in Winchester, marching through the streets and giving a concert on the fair grounds. On October 30, the band led the Hallowe'en parade at Brattleboro. On Armistice Day, the band played for the exercises at Jackwood Park in Hinsdale.

The annual Christmas concert was held on December 10. A Christmas pageant, "Why the Chimes Rang," was given by members of the Bridge Street School, the Choir, and the Glee Club. The band also gave a concert.

Major events scheduled for the remainder of the year include an operetta, "Chonita," a gypsy romance, to be given on April 13, and now in preparation; the annual Spring Concert, coming May 19, to include several solos with band and light opera selections by the band, choir, and Glee Club; and, on Memorial Day, a pageant by the first five grades, service songs by the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades, and selections by the band. The band will also play for the senior fair on February 11. The choir and band will perform, as usual, for the commencement exercises. All programs are in progress.

The music appreciation class plans to take a trip to Boston in April to see an opera. Several of our music organization members will probably become members of the band, string orchestra or chorus of the All State Music Festival to be held in May. It is hoped that some Hinsdale pupils will be able to go to the National Music Camp at Interlochen, Michigan, this summer.

In the first eight grades, the fundamentals of music and singing are taught. Tonette classes have been introduced into the sixth, seventh and eighth grades.

Instruction in band instruments is given to any interested pupil in the high school. Quite a few pupils have taken advantage of this opportunity, several of them having bought their instruments. Seven of these beginners have now advanced sufficiently to play in the band.

A Glee Club of seventh and eighth graders has been organized, which now meets two one-hour periods a week, besides their general music class. Since the success of the Christmas concert developed so much interest among the high school boys, the girls' choir was made into a mixed choir and has now doubled in number.

The band repertoire has been rejuvenated by quite a few marches, several solos with band, and a book of semi-classical numbers, which will be presented at future concerts this year. There has also been some new vocal music purchased.

The record library has been increased from 12 single records and 5 albums to 32 single records and 13 albums to build up the opportunities for closer acquaintance with the masters by the Music Appreciation class. New music folders for choir and band music in use at the time have been purchased, as have storage boxes for filing the music library more systematically. Two new instruments have been bought by the music department this year—a clarinet and a glockenspiel, also a glockenspiel harness. Three snare drum stands were made by the Mechanic Arts Department.

A sound-proof music room has been built by the Mechanic Arts Department from part of the Home Economics laboratory. As soon as the redecorating of the room by the Home Economics Department is finished, townspeople will be cordially invited to inspect this improvement.

I particularly wish to extend to the townspeople and parents an invitation to visit the music classes and band rehearsals.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the pupils and parents, to the teachers, headmaster, superintendent and School Board for their enthusiastic cooperation and support. Their interest has been unusual and truly gratifying.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER OF THE HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It is an honor to submit my third annual report.

Faculty Changes:

The changes in the staff of teachers at the high school building were much smaller in number than those of a year ago. Whereas there were six changes recorded in my last report, there are but three this year. Mr. Carl Richmond was inducted into the army last spring. His place was temporarily filled by Mr. Gordon Thomas of Brattleboro High School who very graciously helped us until the end of the last school yaer. The opening of schools last September saw Miss Carolyn Gove of Laconia, New Hampshire, take over the duties of Music Supervisor.

Miss Lucille Smith resigned and accepted a position in Farmington, New Hampshire. Her position has been filled by Miss Pauleta Hinchey of Fairhaven, Vermont. Miss Hinchey is teaching two classes of Latin in addition to the commercial subjects.

Mrs. Gladys Lees is now teaching in the Bridge Street School. She was succeeded by Miss Mary Coll who is the new sixth grade teacher.

Schools at War Program:

The scrap drive of a year ago could hardly be duplicated. Without fear of contradiction, I would say that Hinsdale High School did as well as any school of comparable size and enrollment.

This year has witnessed no such gathering of materials. At present, however, we are starting the collection of waste paper so vitally needed at this time. Mr. Lerandeau has a baler in the school shop which is used to compress the paper into suitable bundles.

As part of the Junior Red Cross program, the Mechanic Arts Department is making the following for our boys in service:

- 1. 300 menu holders.
- 2. 36 leather cribbage boards.
- 3. 72 writing pads.

In connection with the same program, our Home Economic classes have completed 14 duffle bags. In the fall they also canned $311\frac{1}{2}$ quarts of vegetables and fruits, thereby contributing to the war effort.

There were 31 boys and 5 girls who devoted some school time and Saturdays and Sundays in helping to harvest the 1943 crops. In all, 621 days work was contributed by these pupils in a time of critical labor shortage.

War stamps and bonds are purchased regularly each week by our pupils. To date, the purchases are as follows:

By referring to my last report, the reader will note that purchases thus far this year have more than doubled those of a year ago. Through January 21, 1943, the total amount was \$878.15.

Mechanic Arts Department:

The work of this department has been featured by projects of practical construction. A drafting room was created by erecting a partition in one corner of the shop. This partition is partly glass which enables Mr. Lerandeau to have supervision at all times.

The school has long felt the need of a music room. In the past, music classes were held in any part of the building which might be available at any particular time. Instrument lessons were often given in close proximity to rooms where other classes were in session, thereby creating a disturbing influence. Recognizing these disadvantages, the Mechanic Arts Department resolved to remedy the situation. The result is a beautiful music room which was formerly a corner of the Home Economics room. The new room is completely sound proofed and a splendid addition to the school plant. Too much credit cannot be given to Mr. Lerandeau and his boys for this outstanding project. Interested citizens should really see this piece of work to fully appreciate it.

There has been considerable seepage of surface water into the school shop. In order to circumvent this condition, the shop boys have faced the west and east walls of the school with a cement wall one foot thick and twelve feet deep in the ground. A decided improvement was the immediate result.

Home Economics Department:

Not to be outdone by the boys, the girls, under the direction of Miss Pitraszkiewicz, have done their share in improving the school building. When the new music room is not being used for music, the Home Economics girls use it as a dining room. They were vitally interested, therefore, in its construction. They take pride in keeping the newly sanded floor clean and carefully waxed. They selected the color scheme for its walls and did the actual painting. In fact, having started, they continued by painting the walls of the entire Home Economics room. This room is much more attractive and considerably brighter as a result. The tables in this department have been refinished by the girls. Miss Pitraszkiewicz and her girls have reason to be proud of their work.

High School Band:

It goes without saying that the citizens of Hinsdale are extremely interested in the school band. Without any false sense of modesty, we can hardly be restrained from feeling that our band is the equal of that of any school our size, yes, of any school considerably larger. That this is being felt by some of our neighbors is attested by the fact that the band is being asked to play out of town more and more.

The band played at the Memorial Day exercises in Winchester last year and much favorable comment was received from that quarter. Its performances at our own exercises are well known.

It played in the Alumni parade in Brattleboro last June. This fall, it played at a Fair of the Wińchester High School and in the Hallowe'en parade in Brattleboro. It has appeared in Keene. Locally, it has performed at the Memorial Day exercises, the Armistice Day program, and the Labor Day activities at the playground. It participates also in our musical concerts and at graduation exercises.

In my opinion, no finer type of extra-curricular activity exists and the citizens of Hinsdale are to be congratulated upon their loyal support of this splendid organization.

Extra Curricular Activities:

In October, the Junior Class sponsored a Hallowe'en dance in the Town Hall. This dance was well attended. In December, the music organizations put on a Christmas concert. The girls' choir, the glee club, and the band gave a most creditable performance. In January, the Sophomore Class sponsored a dance. This was featured by a crystal ball constructed cleverly by the Mechanic Arts Department. The Senior Fair will be held in February. Miss Green is dramatic coach again this year. During the rest of the year, the Juniors plan to have another dance, Miss Gove plans to stage an operetta and a spring concert, and, of course, the traditional commencement activities will be held in June.

Miscellaneous:

Instruction in the school continues to be of high grade. The teachers are to be commended for their conscientious work.

We are striving to have our attendance and punctuality records as near perfection as possible. In this respect, we earnestly solicit the whole-hearted cooperation of every parent and guardian.

Miss Frances Sikoski, the school nurse, again assumed direction of the dental clinic where remedial work was done for 43 pupils.

Parents and interested citizens are cordially invited to visit the school at all times. The faculty will be pleased to discuss mutual problems with parents and guardians.

In conclusion, may I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the pupils and parents, to the faculty,

to the superintendent and to the Hinsdale School Board for their loyalty and cooperation.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Hinsdale:

I have the honor to submit my sixth annual report.

Teachers: Numerous changes have taken place among the teachers during the past year. Mr. Carl E. Richmond, Supervisor of Music, left in April to enter army service. No replacement was found for this position until this fall when the School Board elected Miss Carolyn Gove, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire.

During the summer, resignations were received from Miss Lucille Smith, commercial teacher at the high school, Mrs. Margaret Saari and Mrs. Maud Sargeant of the Bridge Street School. To fill the two vacancies in this school, the School Board transferred Mrs. Ismay Campbell from the Plains School and Mrs. Gladys Lees who was teaching part time in the sixth grade during the previous year. Miss Mary Coll was elected to teach the sixth grade at the High School. The School Board granted a leave of absence to Miss Margaret Coll and Mrs. Sargeant was recalled from her retirement to take over the work of the second grade. The School Board elected Miss Pauleta Hinchey, a graduate of Mt. Holyoke, to teach the commercial subjects as well as Latin.

Great difficulty was experienced in securing a teacher for the Plains School, a one-room school, where a teacher is required to teach six grades. Mrs. Ruby Alderman of Brattleboro volunteered her services for two weeks and, at the end of that time, Mrs. Marion Powers of Hinsdale was elected to teach the school for the rest of the year.

Beginning in September, the Rinehart Functional System of Penmanship was introduced into the schools of

Winchester and Hinsdale with the purpose of improving the quality of the handwriting of the school children. Supervision is given to all pupils from the first grade up through the high school by Mr. William Rinehart and Miss Claire Andrews. Much interest has been shown by teachers and pupils. The results being secured are very gratifying.

Transportation: A large amount of time during the past year has been spent in surveying transportation routes, making maps and tabulating data in connection with school buses in order to conform to the rules and regulations set up by the Office of Defense Transportation. Four conferences have been attended by the Superintendent in Concord, Keene and Greenfield, Massachusetts, in order to obtain detailed instructions concerning general orders issued by this government agency. Every school bus in the nation is required to have a certificate of War Necessity fixing the maximum number of miles of operation and authorizing the necessary fuel, parts, tires and tubes. The most important problem was to eliminate unnecessary mileage and bus stops as defined by the Office of Defense Transportation.

A thorough reviewing of all the Hinsdale routes was made by Mr. Andrew Soellner of the Boston office in August. Approval was given to all the bus routes in operation contingent on making the necessary reduction in mileage and stops. As a result of this conference, the number of bus stops was reduced to about 50 percent.

Furthermore, the Office of Defense Transportation ruled that Griffin's large bus should be replaced by a passenger car on the Brattleboro Road. Consequently, children living within eight-tenths of a mile on the Brattleboro Road have to walk to the bus station. Exception to this rule was granted only to a child who presented a doctor's certificate that transportation was absolutely necessary.

At the same time, Hudson's large bus was ruled off the Northfield route and the passenger car substituted. Accordingly, these two conveyors were allotted only enough gas for the larger buses to carry them through the year on these restricted routes.

Several of the parents on the Brattleboro Road and vicinity presented a petition for the restoration of the large school bus service during the winter months but this petition was denied by the Concord authorities.

As school buses represent over 50 percent of the nation's passenger buses, it is necessary that each district should do its best to conserve them as replacements can be secured only in the most urgent cases. Hinsdale, I believe, is doing its share in this phase of the conservation program.

Absenteeism. Exactly twenty years ago in one of his annual reports, Superintendent Samuel S. Brooks urged the more regular attendance of children at school, stressing the fact that children should not be sent to school when they are really ill or when they have to walk a long distance during inclement weather. He further stated that they should never be kept out or permitted to stay out for any other reason. He observed that they cannot do the work of their grade and be absent from school a good part of the time and that their chance of promotion was decidedly lessened by losing two or three weeks of school during the year.

It is necessary now, as it was in 1924, to give the same warning to the parents and urge them to endeavor to keep their children in school.

The year ending June, 1943, had only 336 school sessions. This is the shortest school year on record, at least since 1920. Lost time was caused by oil shortages, bad weather, and a two-day rationing program. The average percent of attendance for all the schools was 93.2 and the total number of tardinesses was 436.

The percent of attendance in the Hinsdale High School for the year ending June, 1942, was 91.9, one of the lowest in the state. For the year ending June, 1943, the average percent of attendance had reached 94. This year, it is hoped that it will be still higher. The percent of pupils absent for three weeks or more in the year 1941-42 was 42 and for last year this percent was 21.

The school authorities have made an earnest effort to improve the attendance record in the high school. In the first place, the problem of absenteeism has been attacked negatively. Written warnings have been sent out; the service of our school nurse and truant officer have been freely called upon for home visits, and several parents have been summoned for conferences with the School Board.

In the second place, positive measures have been taken by guidance through home-room teachers, individual conferences with pupils by the Headmaster and by a sincere attempt to interest pupils in their school work in order to induce them to attend school more regularly. Furthermore, a program of make-up work has been arranged by the teachers so that pupils who have been absent from school may have an opportunity to receive individual help on work which they have missed.

School Budget: At its annual school meeting held on March 9, 1942, the School District voted a special appropriation of \$650.00 for the purpose of installing a coal stoker at the high school building. Before final plans had been made to carry out this project, the School Board was advised that the installation was inexpedient at that time. Consequently, the amount appropriated for this special purpose has not been spent. Therefore, article eight has been inserted in this year's warrant to see if the District will rescind the previous vote and transfer this special amount to the general funds.

Your attention is called to the excellent reports of Headmaster Lees and of Miss Carolyn Gove, Supervisor of Music.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to the teachers and pupils, to the School Board, and to the parents and patrons of our schools for their cooperation.
