CITY GOVERNMENT.

ORGANIZATION OF CITY GOVERNMENT.

Tuesday, January 4, 1916.

The members of the city government for the municipal year of 1915, having met for organization, agreeably to the provisions of the city charter, the convention was called to order by Mayor Herbert E. Fay, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, after which he announced that Orville E. Cain, having been officially notified of his election to the office of mayor for the current municipal term, was present for the purpose of taking the oath of office. The oath of office by law prescribed was administered to the mayor-elect, Orville E. Cain, by Hon. Herbert E. Fay, who then introduced him to the aldermen and councilmen and to the citizens who were present.

After roll-call by the clerk, His Honor Mayor Cain administered the oath of office to the following named members of the boards of aldermen and councilmen, to wit:

His Honor Mayor Cain then administered the oath of office to Police Commissioner Frank H. Blanchard, for a term of six years next ensuing.

Prayer was then offered by Rev. H. Sumner Mitchell. After the prayer Mayor Cain delivered his inaugural address.

After the prayer and inaugural address Frank H. Whitcomb was elected clerk and Albert W. Green city messenger, and the councils then adjourned until 7.30 o'clock.

At 7.30 o'clock in the evening the common council organized by the choice of Richard M. Faulkner as president and Herbert O. Wardwell clerk.

On January 20, Clerk Wardwell having declined to accept the office, Harry E. Gale was chosen clerk of the common council and was duly sworn on January 31, 1916.

THE MAYOR'S ADDRESS.

Gentlemen of the City Councils :

At this season of holiday festivities, when the glad tidings of the coming of the Prince of Peace has spread into the millions of homes of neutrals, we find the greater part of the so-called civilized world involved in bloody warfare. Never in the history of mankind has so stupendous a struggle been staged. The death-dealing engines of strife have been multiplied in number and effectiveness. Instruments of horror previously un-conceived have been produced. The friends of yesterday among the nations of Europe now hold each other by the throat. And yet the end is not in sight. Only in this land of ours, in whose traditions we glory, is there any sense of security from danger. Yet how soon may this condition be changed by some unforeseen and unheralded circumstances. It behooves us to look well to the future and, while felicitating ourselves on our freedom from the evils of war, each to so conduct himself as to be prepared for any untoward events which may plunge us into the turmoil of the world-wide struggle. Great as are our opportunities, greater still are our responsibilities as a nation. God grant that we may be spared but, if our moral obligations require, may He so direct our energies that we will meet the situation with a nation united in the purpose to do the right as He gives us to see it.

And so we come, gentlemen, as an integral part of the greatest republic of modern times, to take upon ourselves the duties with which the franchises of the voters of the city have invested us. Each of us has cast upon himself a part in conducting the business affairs of the municipality in such a way as will not only reflect credit upon himself but, most important of all, will work for the public benefit.

The people as a great business corporation have elected us members of the board of directors of the city. This carries with it responsibilities which, I am sure, no one of us is inclined to shirk.

Do you realize, gentlemen, that in the management of the affairs of the city we have the expenditure annually of more than a quarter of a million of dollars? This calls for the exercise of prudence and care. It demands that each shall give of the best that is in him, not hesitating to sacrifice his personal interests and his personal feelings should occasion require. In the expenditure of this large sum we must act with judgment and discretion.

Many are the demands upon the public purse—most of them of a worthy and deserving character. Public policy requires that these demands be met so far as a reasonable safeguarding of the treasury will permit. Some of them we must reject, because there is a limit beyond which we should not ask the people to go through the medium of taxation.

The rate of taxation has been gradually raised during the past few years. At the same time the valuation has increased in about the same proportion. In 1905 the rate of taxation was \$15.50 per thousand, the valuation \$7,020,671 and the amount raised by taxation \$108,820.40. In 1915 the rate was \$18 per

thousand, the valuation \$10,017,694 and the amount raised by taxation \$185,922.49. During this time the number of polls increased only three hundred. It demonstrates that the city has been more prodigal in its expenditures than formerly.

An analysis of the situation discloses that the floating debt has increased during the past few years. Laying aside the question of responsibility for the situation, this condition confronts us. Let us meet it and make suitable provision for it. It would seem that, without being niggardly, all proper demands can be cared for and a reduction made in the cost of being governed.

Committees are appointed to have more immediate charge of various departments. It has been my observation that frequently members of the city government are disposed to regard the work of other committees than those upon which they are as no concern of theirs and to laugh at the perplexities and mistakes of such others. Without the spirit of co-operation in this administration we can do nothing. The city's business is your business, gentlemen, and you will best render to it proper service if you will make the work of each committee your own.

In regard to the fire department, I can but reiterate the praises which have been bestowed upon this efficient organization. It is of most vital importance to the welfare of the community, safeguarding as it does the lives and property of our people. If it can be accomplished without impairment of the necessities of the city, I recommend the purchase of a combination motor fire truck. A study of the situation has convinced me that the maintenance cost of such a truck will not so increase the expenses of the department that it is not more than compensated by increased efficiency. In this, as in all other

extraordinary expenditures, I would suggest that no steps be taken until the year is sufficiently advanced that we may be certain that all ordinary demands may be cared for and still leave us with sufficient funds to improve the service.

By far the largest expenditure for which provision will have to be made is for highways. No other service comes nearer to the people. Nothing in our charge is of greater moment, for the highest and lowest, the richest and the poorest, are substantially equal beneficiaries of money properly spent in this behalf. Each may not use them in the same manner and to the same extent but, directly or indirectly, we share in more nearly equal proportions from them than from any other source.

Modern conditions have increased such expenditures in greater degree than for other of the purposes for which public money is spent. The question is frequently asked, "Do we get an adequate return?" This is a question difficult of answer but it is our duty to see that it is done. I am sure that in its solution we will have the hearty co-operation of those having official connection with the matter.

There is one phase of the matter, upon which I briefly wish to dwell. High powered motor vehicles are used more and more for hauling freight. At times when the roads are soft, great damage is done them—more, it would seem, than is commensurate with the benefit derived from their use. I would suggest that you carefully consider this matter to determine if some suitable regulation of it may be had—by legislation if necessary.

In the water department the same efficiency is maintained as heretofore. So far as I can see, there are at present few demands to be met for new extension of water mains, sewers

or drains. There are certain conditions which, at some time in the near future, must be remedied. Whether these can be done this year, I leave for later consideration.

By action of the legislature, assistance may be given to persons in quarantine entirely without regard to the ability of such persons to support themselves. It is difficult to justify the action of a person well able to care for his family in having quarantine expense made a charge upon the public. Notwithstanding the absence of any epidemic, the quarantine expense during the past year was \$1159.69. How great it would be were an epidemic to visit us, we can only conjecture. I direct attention to this as one of the many ways in which expenditures grow.

It would appear that the statute of 1899 has been construed to be compulsory rather than permissive. It was not the intention of the legislature that it should so operate. The purpose of the act was to enable aid to be given to persons of limited means in quarantine without having the charge made to the pauper account.

By action of the last legislature provision was made for the execution of planting plots of land of municipalities by the state forester without expense to them and for the reforestation of any lands belonging to them and for the forestry commission, which may furnish the trees free of charge from the state nursery, provided only that the municipalities shall pay the cost of planting the trees.

Some years ago the lands of the cities were examined by the state forester and I recommend that advantage be taken of the law above referred to if it should develop that it is wise to cut the timber from any portion of the city's land.

The management of police affairs has been placed in hands other than ours by the legislature. The matter of the appropriation of money for this purpose, however, is still in the city councils. The department is limited to the provisions which we make for it. While the expenses of the police department have increased in recent years the demands made on it have likewise increased. The appropriation for this purpose should be sufficient to reasonably safeguard the public. I would suggest a careful analysis of the expenditures of the department in your consideration of the matter.

Under the new contract which was made during the past year the expense of street lighting will be increased. It will be necessary to appropriate for this purpose quite a little more than was required during the preceding year. Extensions of this service should only be made where it is clearly apparent that the public welfare demands it.

There are many other matters of public moment which will require your consideration. It is not necessary for me to direct your attention to them at this time. As occasion requires they will be taken up.

You have before you the report of the last city government. I wish particularly to direct your attention to the recommendations of the finance committee on pages 216 and 217.

Consider all these matters carefully but let your motto be to "Make haste slowly." I suggest above all that we live within the income for which we make provision and as nearly as possible conduct the city's affairs as if they were those of a private corporation for whose success we are accountable. Let efficiency be your watchword. Impress it upon every official and employe of the city by your earnest insistence.

Finally, the advice and assistance of all our citizens is most cordially urged. It may well be that all their suggestions will not be adopted. Candid consideration of them is promised. Therefore, gentlemen, welcome criticism may help us solve our problems. Therefore, gentlemen, welcome criticism and advice but do not be drawn into controversy. We can but do our best and let the results attained speak for us.

CITY OF KEENE.

In the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and fifteen.

A JOINT RESOLUTION relating to Quarantine Expenses.

Resolved by the City Councils of the city of Keene, as follows:

That the sum of five hundred dollars be and is hereby appropriated from any money in the treasury, for expenses of quarantine, under the direction of the board of health.

Passed December 2, 1915.

The undersigned desires to give to the city, in trust however, the sum of one hundred dollars, the income only to be used in the care of the Reuben H. Newcomb Lot, Section No. 5, Lot E in Woodland Cemetery.

I am ready to pay over said sum whenever your bodies shall vote to accept the same for the purpose named.

ITEMS OF INTEREST.

The Keene Water Works were established and have been extended from time to time by authority of a charter from the legislature of New Hampshire, granted July 3, 1861, and amendments thereto dated June 24, 1868.

The first contract was made with the Patent Water and Gas Pipe Co. of New Jersey, Sept. 3, 1868.

Water was let into the system November, 1869.

1872.

Beech Hill reservoir was built and connected with the system.

1882.

The Waring system of sewers was adopted and turned over to the city in 1883.

1886.

The Roxbury supply was brought into the city via Beech Hill.

1890.

The first meters were installed.

1891.

Ten and one-half miles of cement lined pipe were replaced with cast iron. There remains in service (1916) 7,047 feet in Court St., 400 in Roxbury St., and 186 in West St.

1902.

Additional water from Roxbury was brought into the city via South Keene.

1908.

The Board of Water Commissioners was abolished by the city councils.

1910.

The dam at Echo lake was rebuilt, raising the water in the lake six feet.

1914.

The meter system was adopted and all services ordered metered.

INCINERATING PLANT AND GARBAGE DESTRUCTOR.

To his Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

The joint standing committee on lands and buildings, to whom was intrusted the duty of locating and building an incinerator, for the destruction of garbage, beg leave to submit the following report:

Early in the year the unsatisfactory condition of the public dumping grounds at the North end was brought to the attention of the city councils.

Unable to find a suitable new location for a dump, without creating in other parts of the city the same unwholesome and unsatisfactory conditions, the committee were instructed to investigate the merits of the system installed by the city of Dover, N. H.

This system had been highly recommended by the State Board of Health in its annual report.

It was found that Dover possessed an economical and effective method of garbage disposal.

As a result of this investigation, the committee recommended that a garbage destructor similar to the one in use in Dover be constructed for the city of Keene in the city pasture.

The committee were authorized to go ahead with the matter and \$4,200.00 was appropriated toward the work.

The destructor furnace itself is made up of a series of combustion chambers, which are so arranged, in connection with a sixty foot round brick chimney, lined for its whole length, with fire brick, that combustion takes place very quickly without odor and very little smoke.

It is housed in a wooden frame corrugated iron building with cement foundations and floors. There are two levels to the floors of the building. The upper one is for the use of garbage vehicles which drive in the front door, deposit their refuse upon the cement dumping floor and then drive out the rear door. The attendant then feeds it to the furnace direct through a hole in the floor.

The furnace itself rests upon the lower level and is reached either by the stairway inside the building or through the lower door.

The destructor is designed under normal conditions to consume the average waste of a city without the purchase of fuel, the only condition being that the non-combustible mater-

ials like coal ashes be separated from the combustible. Under this last head may come tin cans, glass bottles, broken crockery, etc., and while they are not entirely consumed the glass and crockery melt into a clinker, and are removed in that form. If the fire is hot enough, the tin cans will also melt, but if through shortage of combustible waste they do not happen to melt, they are sterilized by the intense heat and rendered unfit to hold water or become the breeding places of mosquitoes or flies. Dead animals up to 200 pounds weight can be disposed of neatly and without odor.

Suitable regulations have been enacted by the Councils to govern the disposal of waste.

The committee wishes to express its thanks to the State Board of Health, to the Mayor and Health Officer of the city of Dover, to the Highway and Water Departments of the city of Keene, and to all others who by their interest and endeavor have helped to contribute to the successful establishment of the plant.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE INCINERATING PLANT AND GARBAGE DESTRUCTOR.

Be it ordained by the City Councils of the City of Keene, as follows:

The management of the incinerating plant for the destruction of rubbish, garbage and other waste, shall be under the direction of the Joint Standing Committee on Lands and Buildings.



INCINERATING PLANT AND GARBAGE DESTROYER

BUILT 1916

All material brought to the incinerating plant for disposal shall be classified as follows:

A—Dead animals weighing 200 lbs., or less.

B—Ashes and like material.

C—Rubbish and garbage.

Dead animals, weighing 200 lbs., or less, can be easily cared for and will be accepted for destruction.

Ashes and like material that would smother the fire shall be kept separate from rubbish and garbage.

A place will be provided for their disposal at the plant.

Rubbish and garbage will include all waste material not covered by the first two classifications. Tin cans, glass bottles, broken crockery, etc., will pass as rubbish and can be destroyed in the incinerator.

Swill, offal, fish heads and other putrid, decaying and offensive matter, brought in receptacles other than metal, must be destroyed with the container.

3. No waste shall be brought to the plant before eight o'clock a. m. or after 4.30 p. m., without special arrangement with the attendant.

4. No person shall dump or cause to be dumped, any rubbish, garbage or other material on or about the premises of the incinerating plant, except under the supervision and direction of the attendant.

5. Any violation of the above ordinance shall be subject to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

The grant, free of charge, of these expenses is virtually an appropriation of money to individuals, a grant, as many claim, not within the powers conferred by the legislature on the city councils.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

During the year ending Dec. 1, 1916, there were reported, quarantined and fumigated, 258 cases of communicable diseases divided as follows:

The small number of whooping cough cases reported still show a lack of attention to the law on the part of physicians, parents and guardians in failing to report many cases of the same. The recovery of every patient from diphtheria shows what is being accomplished by the use of antitoxine and the prompt calling of medical attendance.

The cases of scarlet fever have all been of a mild type and no deaths have resulted from that during the year. The lack of a contagious ward or building to which single cases could be removed and treated has necessitated the extension of more assistance to people in quarantine than ever before called for in the history of the city.

Prompt action in the isolation of whole families for the benefit of the public health some times requires extraordinary

expenses which must be paid by the public purse. In all such cases this board has endeavored to act with its best judgment for the good of the public and the affected.

Regarding accommodations for the future conduct of this department we can only repeat the ones made last year and also embodied in a letter to His Honor the Mayor during this year, endorsed not only by this board but also by a large number of representative citizens especially interested in the good health of the city.

The establishment of a public incinerator and the abolishing of public dumps are steps in the right direction and should be followed by a consummation of the other suggestions at an early date. The customary inspection of all barns and dairies have been made by the food inspector and licenses to sell milk have been issued to all applicants receiving his approval.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF KEENE PUBLIC LIBRARY.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

The trustees of the Keene Public library present the following report:

The affairs of the Keene Public library have run very smoothly the past year and there is nothing of unusual importance to call to your attention. The librarian, Miss Saxton, and her assistants have been untiring in their efforts to extend the library privileges to the community and have done a great deal to help the students especially. Many pictures have been collected, mounted and catalogued for students' use and are in frequent demand. It has become necessary to provide a suitable filing cabinet for them and arrangements are being made to procure one. Miss McGregor was taken ill in the summer and the trustees were very fortunate in securing Miss Christine Lessler of Greenfield to take her place. Owing to the prevalence of scarlet fever and infantile paralysis this year there has been a slight decrease in the circulation of books, but the increase for the past two years has been so great it need not cause much concern. The vacation reading club for the children has been continued under different arrangements and a gratifying number have competed.

The trustees were very glad to arrange for Miss Saxton to attend the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association, of which she is the president, held at Berlin, and a joint meeting of the Massachusetts Library Clubs and the New

Hampshire Library Association, held at Greenfield this year. Such privileges enable Miss Saxton to keep in touch with up-to-date methods and improvements in library work and she can thereby do much to benefit the library and interest its patrons. The expenses were defrayed from the interest of the Thayer fund.

Library Hall has been used more than usual; several meetings of the Keene Equal Suffrage League have been held there, as well as annual meetings of some of the Women's Clubs. The Women's Auxiliary of the Farmers' Association has met there twice. Miss Saxton arranged a "neighborhood meeting" for the librarians of nearby towns and several attended. Miss Saxton gave them a little talk on library methods and explained the work of book repairing, etc., having on exhibition an interesting collection of materials and tools for this work. The trustees entertained them with an informal afternoon tea at the home of one of the members of the board.

Among the repairs, necessary for the up-keep of the library building, this year, the walls of the new stack room will need refinishing and some improvement made in the ventilating shaft.

Further details of the library work will be found in the librarian's report hereby appended.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN.

To the Board of Trustees of the Keene Public Library :

The report of the librarian showing the work of the library for the year 1915-1916 is herewith presented.

REGISTRATION.

The new borrowers registered during the year number 594: of whom 191 are juvenile borrowers and 37 have re-registered after an interval of five years or more. We have abundant evidence of the popularity of the public library throughout the country in the coming to us of new residents who make one of the first acts of establishing themselves in the city that of becoming borrowers of the library as they were in their old homes.

CIRCULATION.

The circulation has decreased somewhat the past year. The preceding year was one of unusual growth and we still have a gain over the year 1913-14 of 5,987. The probable explanation for a large part of this decrease is the prevalence of contagious diseases in the late winter and spring and again through the fall, when not alone children were kept from public places but even adults were taking precautions against any possible spread of disease.

WORK WITH SCHOOLS.

Library conferences with the Normal school students are being held this fall and winter for the first time. The system

of classification, the catalog, the arrangement of the books on the shelves and the especial use of various reference books are explained. The work with the High School has been carried on as usual; the books for home reading and for reference in history, geography and English being placed on shelves available to the students; help is also given in the use of the library. From the school collection 227 books have been loaned to the graded schools and the circulation from the schools is 529.

PICTURE COLLECTIONS.

The picture collection has been growing rapidly and the library has now a very good working collection from which to loan to schools and individuals. The best method of housing these pictures is now being considered by the Administration committee. There have been frequent exhibits of pictures from the Renouf gift. The circulation of pictures is 366.

GIFTS.

The library has received a large number of books as a bequest from Miss Mary D. Frost and, as usual, gifts of magazine subscriptions and books from societies and individuals.

BINDING.

It has seemed wise to give special attention this year to the physical condition of the books. Three hundred and eighty-six volumes have been rebound, a large number of replacements ordered to take the places of worn and soiled copies, 266 volumes discarded, 29 volumes taken by board of health from homes where there have been contagious diseases. The old edition of the Century Dictionary (10 vol.) has been given to the High School library.

READING ROOMS.

The reading rooms are appreciated by a large number but many more doubtless would find pleasure in the reading the

city provides if they realized what is to be found here. The library subscribes for and receives by gift 65 magazines and 9 newspapers. The list includes the best of the popular magazines, three periodicals for boys and girls, scientific, art, music, automobile, educational, and home magazines and book reviews. The number of Sunday readers is the largest we have yet had 321 in the 36 Sundays the rooms were open.

PUBLICITY.

For the coming year the special need is to supply the demand for popular fiction more promptly by the purchase of more duplicate copies and through various advertising means to make the public better acquainted with the resources of the library.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF CEMETERIES.

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

I present herewith my report for the year ending Nov. 30, 1916.

There has been no extraordinary work or repairs attempted in this department the present season, with the exception of the replacing of a stone culvert in the N. E. division of Woodland, that was a frequent cause of labor and expense, with one of metal, twenty-two feet long and twenty-four inches in diameter, that is giving good results. The season nevertheless has been a very busy one. The unusually rapid growth of grass, (and of course weeds), with the constantly increasing territory receiving special care, called for the faithful and unremitting work of the entire force. There have been one hundred and eighteen burials during the year, nine of which were in the public ground. There have also been three removals. Nineteen burial lots have been sold, three of which were single graves.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT AND SUPERINTENDENT OF FIRE ALARM TELEGRAPH.

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

As required by the city ordinance governing the fire department, I herewith submit my report for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1916.

You will note from the following statement of fires and losses that the department has responded to 13 bell alarms and 83 still alarms, including brush fire calls. We have also responded to one call from Marlow. This is a decrease of one bell and 13 still alarms from the calls of last year.

You will note from these figures that there was no loss above the insurance that was paid, which is an unusual circumstance.

There has been very little equipment purchased for the department the past year, other than the general supplies re-

quired to keep the department up to its usual standard of efficiency, thus enabling us to keep our expenses within the appropriation for 1916. All of the property including furniture, etc., in and about the fire station formerly belonging to the several companies, has been purchased by the city, making it the direct owner which seems a judicious change.

Apparatus and force: The apparatus and force of the department under a chief and three assistant engineers, located on Vernon street, is as follows: The Keene Steam Fire Engine and Hose Company, J. H. Simpson, Captain, 25 men, has steamer No. 1, Button Steamer No. 2, one combination chemical and hose wagon, one relief hose wagon; Washington Hook and Ladder Company, G. C. Symonds, Captain, 20 men, has one service truck and one relief truck; Deluge Hose Company, E. H. Applin, Captain, 20 men, has one combination chemical and hose wagon.

We now have on hand about 6,500 feet of No. 1 hose, 1,400 feet of No. 2 hose, 300 feet of chemical hose, and 1,500 feet of linen hose at South Keene, six 6-gallon and four 3-gallon extinguishers, one cellar pipe, one 3-way Eastman Deluge set, uniforms, rubber coats, hats and boots for the department, four sets of swing harnesses, two extra Barry collars, two sleds and three sets Hobb's runners.

There were 500 feet of hose, being unfit for fire service, turned over to the water works department. Our entire supply of rubber-lined hose consisting of 8,450 feet has been tested out with the Nims hydraulic tester purchased by the city, and found that 1,700 feet would not stand a pressure of 200 pounds. This hose has been laid aside for emergency use.

Recommendations: The board of engineers at the present time do not think that the city is giving the suburban districts of Keene the fire protection that they have the right to demand. In our judgment the only remedy for this is the purchasing of a triple combination motor driven fire truck. We therefore strongly recommend that the city purchase at its earliest convenience such a piece of apparatus. Through the courtesy of

Acting Mayor Eames not long since, I had the pleasure of visiting with him the convention of the International Association of Chief Engineers held in Providence, R. I., where we saw many kinds of motor driven apparatus. It was the unanimous opinion of the engineers present that the triple combination motor driven truck was the most desirable and efficient piece of apparatus for a city to own that had a limited supply of motor driven apparatus. I would also recommend that the city purchase 1,000 feet of 2½ in. rubber-lined hose and a rescue life net. In case of serious fire in high buildings a life net might be indispensable in saving life. I would also recommend that the old flush hydrants be replaced by post hydrants. The flush hydrants are an annual expense to the department, it being necessary to re-box and pack with hay each winter.

The fire alarm telegraph system in care of Mr. E. B. Riley, the fire alarm electrician, continues to give excellent satisfaction. The batteries which should have lasted two years longer are to be renewed, the material being already ordered for the same, on account of the injury caused by the fire at the station two years ago. I would recommend that Mr. Riley's salary be increased two dollars per week, making it \$17 per week.

I would further report that harmony and good will prevail among the officers and men of the several companies and the members of the board of engineers with whom I am associated. I also wish to extend my appreciation of the valuable aid rendered us by the committee on fire department, superintendent of streets, superintendent of water works, and the citizens during the past year, and to them and the city clerk and city councils I extend my thanks.

The following signals were adopted by the board of engineers, January, 1907, and are as follows:

1. The superintendent has the right to strike one blow upon the bells at any time, to test the circuit; also to ring in one round from any box, preceded by a single blow, exactly five minutes after the noon stroke, on Saturdays, for the purpose of testing the boxes.

2. In case of a serious fire the engineers may cause a second alarm to be sounded from the nearest box. A second alarm is given by striking ten blows, followed by the box number.

3. As Box 9, which is located on city hall, is still likely to be used for general alarm, and to be pulled for a fire which is not in or near the Square, the engineers will ring in a second alarm or four full rounds from this box, if there is fire of any magnitude near the square.

4. The old alarm on city hall will only be rung between 9 p. m. and 6 a. m., except in case of serious fire.

5. Arrangements have been made with the Beaver Mills Company and alarms of fire will be given on their whistle the same as by the bells.

REPORT OF THE CITY PLAYGROUND COMMITTEE.

The City Playground Committee will open its report by submitting the report of its supervisor, Mr. Albert Nies. The report follows:

A new playground was opened on Marlboro street this year in place of the High School Playground. This was used three nights a week from seven until nine, with an average attendance of 80.

The Howard Street grounds was open forty evenings during the season with an average attendance of 150. The average daily attendance of the children at Howard street was 150, at Marlboro street 62. The total attendance of the sessions was 9,504.

There was a falling off in attendance of smaller children, due to the fear of infantile paralysis. There was an increase in the attendance of older folks and working boys and girls at the evening sessions.

A Playground League of baseball was organized among the older boys consisting of three teams with the Braves the winners. A league of Volley Ball was organized among the girls and the Fearnots won the most games of the three teams. The Marlboro Midgets and Howard Street Midgets played a series of baseball games in which the Howard street team was victorious.

The Sunset League this year consisted of eight teams and they played a series of fifty-six games at the Howard Street Playgrounds.

The weekly swimming lessons were given as in former years at the "Wade-Across" with an average attendance of 80. Miss Elizabeth Piper and Mr. Maynard Kibbee assisted Mr. and Mrs. Nies in instructing the children at various times during the season.

One week-end camp for boys was held at Harrisville Lake with an attendance of 13. A similar camp for the girls was held at the same place with an attendance of eleven.

Stories proved as popular as ever this year and Mrs. Nies conducted a story telling period every day at each playground, and the special story telling periods were featured. The story tellers for this year were Miss Mary L. Saxton, Miss Rita Briggs, Miss Eleanor Prentiss and Mrs. A. B. Nies. About 800 attended the special story hours.

Mr. Campbell of the Majestic Theatre entertained 300 of the children at a special moving picture performance. Mr. Junkins of Hill's candy store presented the children of both playgrounds with ice cream cones at one of their special story telling periods.

The season closed with the most successful athletic meet and play festival yet held. The folk dances were held on the lawn in the rear of the Dinsmoor house and the athletic events on the field in the rear of the High school. About 400 children participated and there were events for both boys and girls

with prizes for all. A goodly number of "grown-ups" were present to watch the children in their games, dances and races.

The playgrounds this year were in charge of Mr. A. B. Nies, supervisor; Mrs. A. B. Nies, director; Mr. Maynard Kibbée, director.

REPORT OF CITY SOLICITOR.

To His Honor the Mayor and Gentlemen of the City Councils:

During the past year the usual criminal matters in the municipal police court have received attention.

The former owner of the James H. Spencer property, so-called, on Dunbar street, of which the city received possession two years ago under its tax deed, has paid to the city through your solicitor, to reimburse the city for back taxes and all expenses incurred, the sum of three hundred twenty-five dollars (\$325).

The petition of the Boston & Maine Railroad for abatement of the taxes assessed against the stock in trade of the railroad at the railroad shops has been again continued. A similar case brought by the railroad against the city of Concord has been decided adverse to the city.

The petitions of Charles A. Jones and Pike & Whipple against the city for abatement of taxes has been heard and decision rendered by the superior court.

A considerable abatement was ordered in both cases.

The suit brought against the city by Mary Leslie, admx., for damages of \$7,000, for the death of a child by drowning in Beaver Brook, and for which liability on the part of the city is claimed, was heard in the April term of the Superior Court, and a non-suit was granted the city.

The plaintiff is taking the matter to the Supreme Court on exceptions to the non-suit.

The suits against the city in behalf of Lucinda Butters and

others, claiming damages aggregating \$1,780, because of an accident in which an automobile truck went off the Chesterfield road into a brook, have been dismissed.

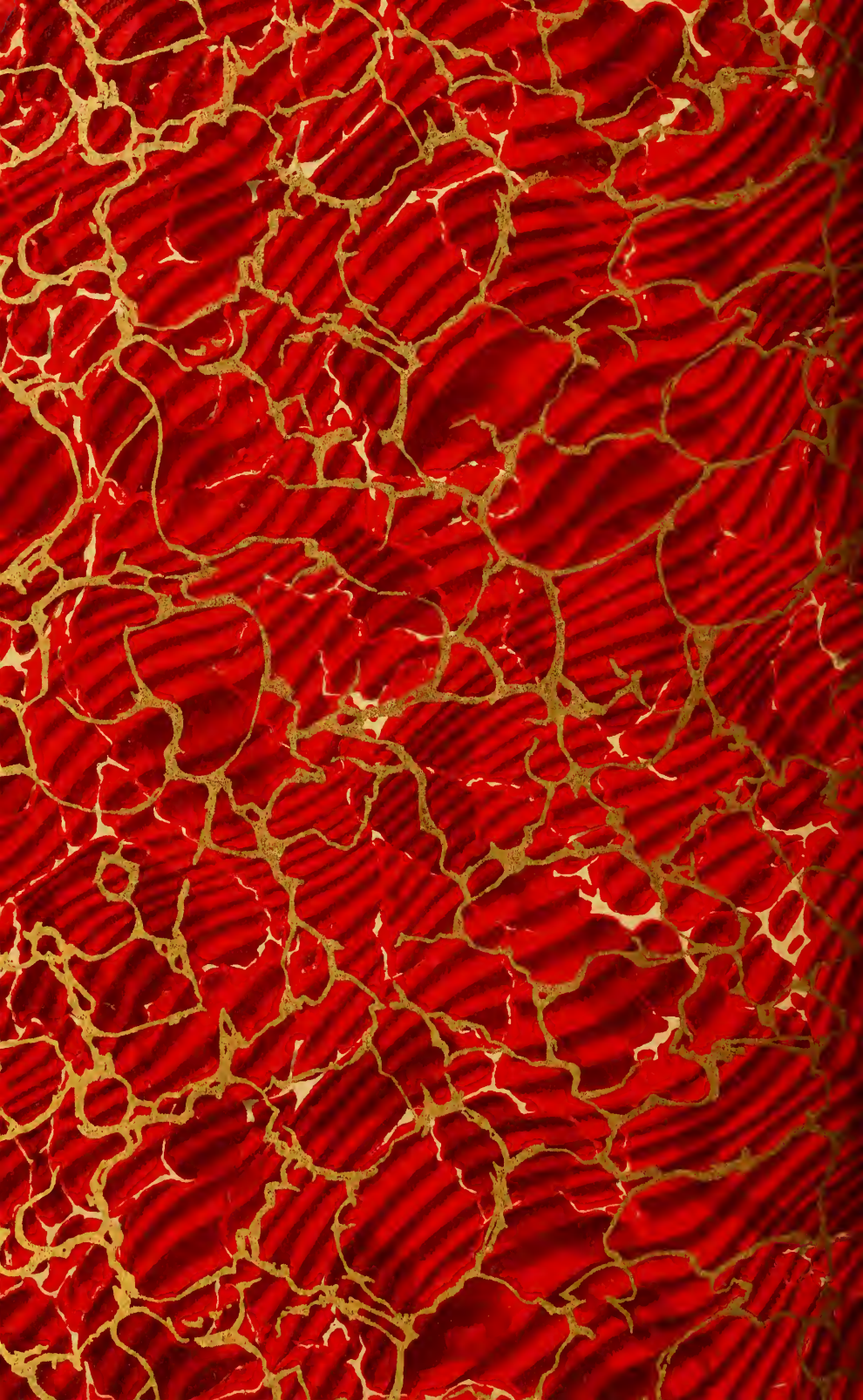

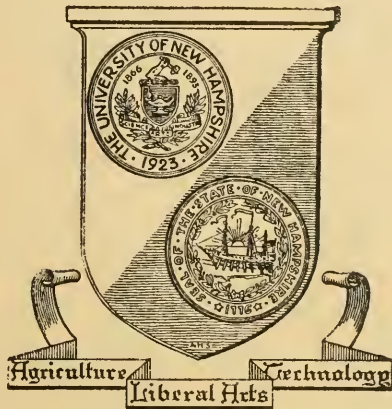
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
