

ORGANIZATION OF CITY GOVERNMENT.

Tuesday, March 28, 1916.

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, members-elect of the city council for the municipal year of 1916 and the members from the previous council met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

The oath of office was administered to the mayor-elect, Hon. George P. Munsey, by the City Solicitor, Fletcher Hale.

The mayor administered the oath of office to the following councilmen-elect, viz:

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

OF HON, GEORGE P. MUNSEY, MARCH 28, 1916.

Gentlemen of the Council:

As we pause in the busy hours and gather here to formaly inaugurate the twenty-fourth Laconia City Council, we realize that while it seems but yesterday, a full year has passed since we met in this room for the purpose of organizing the City Government of 1915. It has been a year in which we have endeavored to exercise patience and fidelity, a year full of responsibilities yet crowded with hope and courage. At the beginning of the year we took occasion to call your attention to some of the things which seemed most desirable in the way of improvements. We have not been able to do all that we had hoped to do, and on the other hand many things were done that we had not planned, some of actual necessity, and others as the better part of wisdom, each individual case being dealt with as its merits seemed to demand.

As a tribute to the faithfulness of the last Council I would say that during the past year the entire Council has worked together as one man, having in mind only the city's best good. We have labored earnestly and conscientiously to perform our every duty with fairness, justice and economy. How well we have succeeded in our efforts it is perhaps not for us to say, it is sufficient to know that every man who would consent to a re-election is returned to the new Council, and it remains the same as last year with one exception.

I shall not take your time to go into many details, for my ideas regarding the management of city affairs are too well known to need commenting on at this time. I will only say that I have seen no reason to change my views as set forth in my address of one year ago. Those principles, I believe, are in line of reasonable conservative management and will be applied, with your assistance. during 1916 as far as may seem practical. During the past year many things were accomplished in the line of real progress. By permanent improvements some of our principal streets have shown a wonderful change for the better, the most notable along this line being the completion of work in repaying Main street, the extension of the block paving on Water street, and the extensive changes on Union avenue from Main street to the Pitman mill. We record these improvements upon Union avenue with much satisfaction for the lines of this street have been in dispute for many years and such improved condition as has taken place is the result of seccring from all the abutting owners, with one exception, deeds establishing the southerly line of said street, and it is worthy of note that Hon. W. L. Melcher very graciously deeded to the City a strip of land the entire length of his property for sidewalk purposes, thus eliminating any question of boundary at this point. The result has been very pleasing, and with the laying of nearly two thousand yards of macadam pavement, with its new sidewalks, curbing and other improvements, the street is now more in keeping with the large amount of traffic to which it is exposed. It is a splendid change and appreciated by all, more especially by the many who have occasion to use it daily.

If more of our citizens would manifest a desire to be fair with the city on questions of public improvements, many things might be accomplished which are not now undertaken.

More than six thousand feet of surface drain and sewers were laid during the past year, many sidewalks were built and our streets required much attention and expense on account of the excessive rains during the summer season, more than \$2000 being laid out on one short street in Ward 6, covering damage by excessive rains. Our Street Commissioner reports that we have some 62,000 square yards of macadam pavement maintained during 1915 at 2 6-10 cents per square yard, and is in excellent condition. I believe such roads are a good investment and should be extended as fast as possible.

As is the condition every year, we will find worthy needs upon every hand, and many just appeals from every section. These must be taken up with the greatest care, laying aside all selfishness and personal prejudice, and give first consideration to such improvements as will become of the greatest good to the greatest number.

We will be called upon this year to rebuild one bridge at least, as the Street Commissioner condemns the Academy Street bridge as unfit for further use, and if we study his report it becomes very evident that inside of ten years the City of Laconia must pay out more than \$50,000 on new bridges. Seven, at least, will require attention during that time, and aside from these, some early action must be taken in regard to the disposition of Gold Street bridge in Ward Six.

LEGAL.

The legal matters affecting the city during the year have been in the hands of Solicitor Hale, a man of efficiency and ability. Aside from the usual duties of a City Solicitor, Mr. Hale has, with the assistance of C. B. Hibbard, a former solicitor, rewritten and rearranged the the entire list of City Ordinances, and it is proposed that these, together with the City Charter, with amendments, and other matter of a similar nature, be bound in book form and fully indexed; making a valuable and convenient book for future use.

The case between the city and Mrs. Wells, to determine the southerly line of Union Avenue next her property, will probably be tried out in the near future, and there are two or three other suits in which the City is more or less interested. This department is in excellent shape, and for further particulars I would refer you to the Solicitor's report.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Our fire department has had a good year, and done its usual excellent service, and the proposed change in the ordinance, making the Chief and Assistants removable only for cause, I believe to be a move in the direction of good service. The recent recommendation of the Chief concerning a chemical truck, should receive our careful consideration. The possibilities of such a piece of apparatus are great, and it may seem wise to make some move in this direction.

STREET LIGHTING.

A new contract was signed during the past year between the City and the Laconia Electric Lighting Co., a copy of which can be found in the City Report. This makes a complete change in our system of street lighting, there being at present five hundred and forty 60 and 40 C. P. lights well distributed over the entire city. A great many sections are now receiving the benefit of lights, which could not be done while lighting with the much less number and more expensive are lights under the old system. The change appears to meet with approval, and I believe it to be a wise move.

It would be useless to attempt to enumerate each piece of work which to us might seem wise to do, and we will not do so at this time. I do believe, however, that we should finish the laying out of Union Avenue from the grist mill to High Street, beyond which the lines are well defined, and the street full width. In the space mentioned, buildings have been allowed to encroach upon the street, but with the co-operation of the abutting owners, the adjustment here ought not to be a difficult task.

The drain from Depot Square passing under or near the St. Jean Building on Main Street, should be put in proper

shape, and if the Union Avenue layout is completed, proper drains should also here be installed. Permanent improvements should be commenced on Pleasant Street, and every street, almost, will have some claim to present, and we must view the work to be done with an eye to right, justice and necessity.

There are many needed improvements already in sight, an increase in the school money has already been voted, and with increases that will be necessary in some of the regular departments, it becomes quite possible that an increase in the tax rate may be necessary. I am also of the opinion that Laconia should consider taking steps to adopt some form of sewer tax, by which a large portion, if not all the money needed for extension and maintenance of the present system would be provided.

Laconia has more than 1500 sewer connections, and was there an annual rental of say \$4 on each connection, it would mean more than \$6000 per year. This tax would be paid by *those only* who receive the benefit of such improvements, and I believe would be a step toward equalizing the burden of taxation.

I believe immediate action should be taken towards securing for Laconia, a reliable history. Many of our people who could now give valuable assistance, will not be here in a few years more, and the matter should not be longer delayed. I hope very soon to appoint a committee of consultation in regard to this matter. At the present time Laconia is prosperous, her outlook is bright, we must keep her to the front, and remember she is what we make her. Let us be economical, but not niggardly. Let all departments work in harmony with each other with the City's welfare the one object in view, and I would repeat what was said one year ago, 'let no department exceed its appropriation.'

Let us remember we are but servants of the City, and as such must render an account of the manner in which we perform the duties of our office.

Gentlemen, we will proceed to business.

MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS

FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS AGAINST THE CITY.

All bills against the city must be approved by the persons authorizing the charge; and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the committee on accounts and claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the city clerk not later than Thursday at 12 o'clock m., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the city treasurer.

Meetings of the committee on accounts and claims are held on the Friday preceding the last Monday of each month at 7.30 o'clock P. M., at the city clerk's office.

RESOLUTIONS.

A RESOLUTION appropriating the sum of one hundred sixty-three dollars and twenty-one cents, to reimburse the Thomas L. Leavitt Park Fund for taxes wrongfully assessed against it for the years 1907 and 1908.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

That the sum of one hundred and sixty-three dollars and twenty-one cents be and the same hereby is appropriated to reimburse the Thomas L. Leavitt Park Fund for taxes wrongfully assessed against it for the years 1907 and 1908, and the Mayor is hereby authorized to draw his warrant for the same.

A RESOLUTION abating certain taxes assessed against the O. W. Goss estate, and charging off from the city books tax sales thereon.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Laeonia, as follows:

That the taxes, interest and costs assessed against the O. W. Goss estate on property which has been sold and the proceeds thereof applied to public library purposes, as follows: Taxes for the years 1907-1913, both inclusive, amounting in all to the sum of five hundred and seventy-six dollars and eighteen cents, be and hereby are abated, excepting the sum of five dollars and twenty cents for registration fees; and that said property be charged off

from the list of property purchased by the city at tax sales for said years, and that the Mayor be and hereby is authorized to execute releases which may be necessary to clear the title to said property of any tax liens which the city may hold against it.

That the Mayor, the City Clerk and the City Solicitor are hereby authorized to have printed and published as many copies of the revision of the city ordinances as to them may seem proper, the volume to include the city charter and amendments, legislation concerning the town and city of Laconia from 1855 to 1915, orders of the Board of Public Works, rules of order of the City Council, a list of city officials from 1893 to 1916, a careful and thorough index of the whole, and such other memoranda or notes as they may deem expedient; and they are hereby authorized

to employ such clerical assistance as may be necessary to make said compilation and publication.

ORDINANCES.

An Ordinance relating to the licensing of motor busses and regulating the operation thereof in the City of Laconia.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia as follows:

Section 1. On and after the passage of this ordinance, no person, firm, association of persons or corporation shall be permitted to conduct and carry on the business of transporting passengers for hire by means of any motor vehicle not running on tracks or rails, and operated for the purpose of affording a means of street transportation similar to that ordinarily afforded by street railways, by accepting and discharging passengers along the route or at the ends of the route traversed by such vehicle, without first obtaining from the City Council of said City a special annual license for each vehicle to be employed by such person, firm, association of persons or corporation in such business, and unless such license for such vehicle is in force. Such vehicle so employed in said business is termed a motor bus or jitney, and is not deemed a hackney carriage, but is a vehicle subject to all street traffic regulations so far as applicable and consistent therewith.

SECT. 2. Any person, firm, association of persons or corporation desiring a license to operate a motor bus or jitney in said City shall petition said City Council, giving their name, place of residence, post office address, and a brief description of the vehicle to be licensed, including the make and type, maker's number, number of cylinders, horse power, and color of the vehicle, together with the

State license number for said vehicle, and the seating capacity.

SECT. 3. Every person, firm, association of persons or corporation shall pay for said license, if the same be granted, for the use of the City, the sum of twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for each motor bus or jitney for which a license is desired, and one (\$1.00) dollar per seat of the seating capacity thereof, exclusive of the driver's seat, which shall also be stated in the license issued and the record thereof. Said license shall expire on the thirty-first day of December of the year in which issued and shall not be transferable, and shall be forfeited upon the conviction of any improper or unlawful conduct by the licensee or his servant in the management of said motor bus or busses, or of any violation of the provisions of this ordinance.

Said City shall issue to the licensee a metal plate bearing the words Licensed Motor Bus No. —, Laconia, 19—, setting forth the serial number of the license and the year in which the license runs. Said plate shall be attached to and kept on the dash of the bus or jitney at all times during the license term when the motor bus or jitney is in use in any street or public place in said city.

SECT. 4. Any person holding a chauffeur's license under the laws of the State of New Hampshire may operate any such vehicle as shall have been licensed within said City.

SECT. 5. The driver or person in charge of any such vehicle shall not permit the same to stand or to wait for passengers in any street, square or public place or part thereof, except on such portions thereof and during such hours as may be prescribed therefor by the Board of Public Works of said City; and said Board from time to time may fix such locations therefor and shall fix some location or locations in some street or streets, public place or places, or part or parts thereof, in the central sections of the City, in which the general street travel will not be materially interfered with, where such busses or jitneys may stop to

take on passengers, and said Board, at any time when it finds such location materially interfering with the public travel may cancel such location and substitute another location therefor. No such driver or person on any day shall stop any such vehicle for a longer period than ten minutes at a time in any street or public place or part thereof except when stopping to observe street traffic regulations or when required to do so by reason of street traffic congestion.

No driver or person in charge of such vehicle shall stop the same within twenty-five (25) feet of any place designated by a white post or in any other manner as a stopping place for receiving and discharging passengers by the street railway.

No driver or person in charge of any such vehicle shall solicit passengers by outcry or operate any noise or other device for the purpose of soliciting passengers.

No greater number of passengers shall be carried at any one time in any such vehicle, and no person driving or in charge of any such vehicle shall take on or suffer or permit any more persons to ride or be carried therein at any one time than their license provides, excepting, however, that in addition thereto children under seven years of age may be carried therein in arms or seated on the laps of parents or adult person accompanying them.

No person driving or in charge of any such vehicle shall smoke tobacco or other mixture while any passenger is being carried therein or while engaged in the service of operating or having charge of any such bus or jitney in any street or public place, nor shall any passenger be accepted or carried who is in an intoxicated condition.

Every person driving or in charge of such vehicle shall deliver every article left therein by any passenger to the City Marshal not later than twenty-four (24) hours after finding the same, and shall receive a receipt therefor from said City Marshal, and the City Marshal shall provide for returning the same to the owner upon proper identifica-

tion and proof of ownership. All such articles delivered to said City Marshal and not claimed within ninety (90) days from such delivery shall be returned to the finders thereof.

SECT. 6. No person, firm, association of persons or corporation shall be permitted to conduct and carry on the business of transporting passengers in vehicles not operated on rails, or be permitted to use and employ in the conduct and carrying on of such business, any such vehicle, until he shall have first filed with the City Clerk of the said City of Laconia an indemnity bond in the sum of five thousand (5,000) dollars for each and every such vehicle so used and employed; the said indemnity bond or bonds to be executed by a surety company or companies duly authorized to do business in the State of New Hampshire, payable to the City of Laconia, and shall contain a stipulation that in the event any person or persons who may sustain damages to his or their person or property as the result of the fault of the person, firm, association of persons or corporation conducting such business, or of his or their agents, servants or employees, he or they shall have his or their right of action on said indemnity bond as fully and to the same extent as if said bond was made and executed directly in favor of the claimant for such damages. The said indemnity bond shall be submitted to and shall first be approved by the Committee on Finance of said City. The amount of said bond (to-wit, five thousand (\$5,000) dollars for each vehicle operated) shall always be maintained at that figure, and shall not be void upon first recovery, but shall be actional against from time to time until the full amount thereof is exhausted, and in the event that the amount thereof shall have been reduced by payment for damages under the terms of said bond and these provisions, the person, firm, association of persons or corporation conducting the business as carriers of passengers aforesaid shall furnish an additional bond for the amount so paid so that at all times a bond or bonds of indemnity

for the entire sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars shall be carried on each and every vehicle used, employed and operated in the business aforesaid.

SECT. 7. No bond shall be required under the provisions of this ordinance if the person, firm, association of persons or corporation to whom such license is to be issued files with the City Clerk an insurance policy in some company approved by the Finance Committee of said City, in an amount of not less than the sums above specified, against loss or damage by reason of the bodily injuries or death by accident or property damage of any person for which the person, firm, association of persons or corporation so insured may be responsible; and in the event of the expiration of such insurance a new policy shall immediately be filed with said City Clerk, or the failure to file such new policy shall operate as a revocation of said license unless a bond is filed as provided in Section 6 of this ordinance.

SECT. 8. The violation of any provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars.

SECT. 9. It shall be the duty of the City Marshal to see that the provisions of this ordinance are enforced.

SECT. 10. So much of an ordinance passed July 28, 1902, entitled "An ordinance for the licensing of cabmen, hack drivers and any and all persons carrying passengers for hire in said City," as is in conflict with this ordinance is hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

An Ordinance in amendment of Sections 1, 2, and 3 of Chapter 24 of the revised ordinance passed and approved March 27th, 1916.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

Strike out all of Sections 1, 2, and 3 of said Chapter 24, entitled Building Limits and Regulations, and in lieu thereof enact the following:

CHAPTER 24. BUILDING LIMITS AND REGULATIONS.

SECTION 1. Fire Limits. The fire limits of the city of Laconia shall be that portion of the city included within the following limits; to wit:

(1.) Beginning on the westerly side of Union avenue, at the northwesterly corner of Arch street; thence southeasterly by the northwesterly side of said Union avenue, to a point opposite the westerly side of a driveway leading to the stable of H. C. Wells; thence southerly and parallel with the easterly side line of Main street to the southerly side of a driveway leading to Philbrook Bros.' stable to a stone bound; thence in a straight line southwesterly to a stone bound set in the ground on the southerly line of land belonging to the County of Belknap, and on the westerly side of a driveway held in common by said county and A. W. Abbott; thence northerly, in a straight line, to the watering trough at the intersection of Court and Academy streets: thence northwesterly, in a straight line, to the intersection of the south line of Water street with the center line of the Laconia Car Company Works' sidetrack across said street; thence northerly along the center line of said sidetrack to the main track of the Boston and Maine Railroad; thence northerly along said main track to a point opposite the northeasterly corner of land owned by the City of Laconia, formerly the John C. Moulton property; thence southerly along the easterly line of said property to Church street; thence southerly to the southeasterly corner of Church and Beacon streets; thence southerly along the easterly side of said Beacon street to a point opposite the center line of Hanover street; thence easterly in a straight line to the intersection of the westerly side line of Arch street with the south shore of the Winnipiseogee river; thence southerly, along the said westerly line of Arch street, to the point begun at.

(2) Also beginning at the shore of Lake Opechee at its intersection with the center line of Rowen street; thence easterly along the center line of Rowen street and across private land to the center line of Union avenue; thence northerly, along the center line of Union avenue, to its intersection with the center line of Laurel street; thence easterly, along the center line of Laurel street to its intersection with the center line of Mechanic street; thence northerly along the center line of Mechanic street to its intersection with the center line of Clinton street: thence easterly two hundred feet along the center line of Clinton street; thence northerly, parallel to the center line of Mechanic street and two hundred feet distant therefrom, to the center line of Manchester street; thence westerly along the center line of Manchester street to the center line of Mechanic street; thence northerly along the center line of Mechanic street to its intersection with the center line of Harrison street: thence westerly along the center line of Harrison street to the center line of Union avenue; thence northerly on the center line of Union avenue to its intersection with the center line of Gold street produced; thence along said center line produced and the center line of Gold street to the intersection of the center lines of Elm street and Franklin street: thence westerly along the center line of Franklin street to its intersection with the center line of Bayside court; thence southerly across private land and across Lake Opechee to the point begun at.

SECT. 2. No person, firm, or corporation shall erect, enlarge, elevate, alter, or otherwise change any building

or part of a building within the fire limits, as the said limits now are or may hereafter be established, or set up or cause to be set up any steam boiler or engine within said limits, without the consent of the City Council, granted after hearing all parties interested upon a petition duly filed by the owner or interested party. Said petition shall set forth the location of such building or the location of any steam boiler or engine to be set up, together with the names of the owners and occupants of the adjoining land. Notice of the hearing shall be given to owners and occupants of land adjoining the premises in question and to all others interested in like manner as of hearing on petitions for laying out highways, except that seven days' notice shall be sufficient, if so ordered. Excepting, however, that in case of a minor enlargement, elevation, alteration, or other change in any building within said fire limits, if it shall become of immediate necessity to the petitioner, in the event of there being no regular session of the City Council in which a petition can be presented. within one week of the time that said petitioner finds it necessary to enlarge, elevate, alter, or otherwise change any building or part of a building, then the Mayor, the Chief of the Fire Department, and the chairman of the Committee on Land and Buildings, upon a proper petition as aforesaid, shall be and are hereby empowered to grant a written permission allowing the owner or the petitioner to make minor enlargements, elevation, alteration, or minor change of any building or part of a building within said fire limits as set forth in said petition, under and upon such restrictions and regulations as may be imposed in said written permission.

SECT. 3. Any person violating the provisions of this chapter shall be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars.

Passed and approved September 9, 1916.

An Ordinance adopting the provisions of Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Laws of 1901, providing for the appointment of public weighers of coal and other merchandise, and defining their powers and duties, as amended by Section 1, of Chapter 18, of the New Hampshire Laws of 1907.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 33 of the New Hampshire Laws of 1901, providing for the appointment of public weighers of coal and other merchandise and defining their powers and duties, as amended by Section 1, of Chapter 18, of the New Hampshire Laws of 1907, is hereby adopted.


- SECT. 2. Under Section 1, of Chapter 180, New Hampshire Laws of 1907, the City of Laconia exempts itself from the provisions of Section 3 of said Chapter 33, of the Laws of 1901, except that if the buyer or seller shall so require, such coal or other merchandise shall thereupon be weighed at the expense of the seller by a public weigher, who is neither the buyer nor seller nor a servant or agent of the buyer or seller, nor in any way interested in the sale thereof.
- SECT. 3. The fees of public weighers appointed by the City Council under said act and under this ordinance shall be ten cents for each weighing and the certificate and record thereof required under the provisions of said Chapter 33 of the Laws of 1901.
- SECT. 4. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS.

LACONIA, N. H., Feb. 14, 1917.

To the Honorable Mayor and Council:

We recommend for the coming year appropriations as follows:

In making the above recommendations, we have only called your attention to those things, which we consider an absolute necessity.

Owing to the rise in cost of all material, and advance in wages, we are obliged to recommend larger sums for the different departments than heretofore.

We consider it very important that the work on Union avenue should be continued, and if possible completed this season.

The report of the street commission and engineer covers very fully all matters pertaining to this department.

The recommendations and the suggestions made by him have the approval of the board.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF STREETS.

To the Board of Public Works:

GENTLEMEN:—I present the following as the annual report of the Street Department for the year ending Feb. 15, 1917.

BITUMINOUS MACADAM.

Tarvia macadam pavement was laid as follows: Pleasant street, 8,423 sq. yds.; Union avenue, 1,219 sq. yds.; State road near The Weirs, 6,272 sq. yds.; a total of 15,914 sq. yds. The cost of the above work was: Pleasant street, \$7,224.44, or \$0.86 per sq. yd.; Union avenue, \$1,349.15, or \$1.11 per sq. yd., and State road \$8,778.32, or \$1.40 per sq. yd.

The total area of tarvia macadam laid since 1908, inclusive, is 70,249 sq. yds. on city streets, and 7,572 sq. yds. on State roads.

The maintenance cost for the year 1916 on the 60,607 sq. yds. previously laid on city streets was \$1,311.98 or \$0.0216 per sq. yd.

The pavement is giving excellent service at a very moderate cost.

BRIDGES.

Two reinforced concrete bridges, one on Academy street and one on Garfield street, were built.

The Fair street bridge was re-planked and given a coat of Tarvia B.

The Messer street bridge was given a second layer of plank and a coat of Tarvia B.

Minor repairs were made to several other bridges, as occasion demanded.

It was found to be too expensive to pave the deck of The Weirs bridge with wood blocks, but the floor must be renewed early this coming spring with some suitable material.

The Main street bridge was rebuilt in 1901 at a cost of about \$3,000. It is now about sixteen years old and is badly decayed in some parts. The tar concrete pavement over the deck is all that holds in some places where the plank is badly rotted. There is no assurance but that some vehicle will break through at any time.

The bridge should be replaced with a reinforced concrete structure.

That portion of Gold street which crosses the river was discontinued during 1916 by the City Council, and the old bridge has remained closed to traffic but not removed, as an appeal has been taken against the action of the Council by a few citizens.

The bridge over the Perley canal at Beacon street will need extensive repairs.

The following surface water drains were built during the year: Academy St., 535 feet; Elm St., 1,082 feet; Maple St. (Weirs), 611 feet; Main to Depot Sts., 132 feet; North Main St., 93 feet; Mechanic St. North, 346 feet; Mechanic St. South, 843 feet. Total, 3,642 feet.

There are now in use 14.3 miles of pipes and culverts for surface water alone.

I have been unable to get an appropriation for changing the outlet to the Messer St. drain at Adams dump and the conditions there are constantly growing worse. This matter should not be neglected any longer.

The trouble from tree roots growing into surface water drains is getting to be a very serious matter and this department is being put to constantly increasing trouble and expense to keep certain drains in working order. The Carolina Poplars, which are being set promiscuously by house owners, are causing the most trouble and something must be done to regulate this practice if the usefulness of our surface water drains is to be maintained.

The following is a list of drains most urgently needed: Union Ave. from Pitman's mill to High St., to Avery St., on High St. from Highland St. to Beaman St., on Jolliet, Baldwin, Lovell and Merrimac Sts., together with the Gilbert brook repairs.

The drainage system on that portion of Union Ave. from Summer St. to High St. is inadequate and should be enlarged and extended to care for the drainage of Spring St. and the Hospital grounds. I have attempted to obtain a right of way through private land, for a suitable outlet for this drainage system, but I have been unsuccessful.

GENERAL REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE OF ROADS.

An attempt has been made to resurface some of the more heavily traveled outlying roads with such material as is available and as far as our finances would allow. Four districts were laid out and a patrolman employed in each district. The patrolman to equip himself with a good horse, and a tip cart. He is furnished road drags and other tools by the city and is expected to drag the roads in his district when conditions warrant and to make repairs and improvements where needed.

The result have been very satisfactory as the roads have been kept in much better condition but the expenditure has been more for outside roads and if this method is to be continued it will be necessary to make a larger appropriation for road maintenance.

PLEASANT ST. AND UNION AVE. IMPROVEMENTS.

Pleasant St. from the railroad to beyond Tremont St. a distance of 2,602 feet was rebuilt and paved with bituminous macadam. The street was regraded, and drains and catch basins rebuilt. Granite curbing was set the entire length. The sidewalks, where necessary, were rebuilt and resurfaced and a lawn graded between curbs and sidewalks.

The total cost to the city of this work was \$12,156.87.

Union Ave. from Casino Sq. southerly was improved as far as the lack of help would permit.

The street was regraded and drains and catch basins put in order. Granite curbing was set and a bituminous macadam laid to a point twenty-five feet south of Summer St.

This work should be continued and completed as soon as possible so as to make this improvement continuous to the junction of Union Ave. and Main St.

REGULATING STRETTS AND GRADING SIDEWALBS.

The grading of Academy St. and a parking area on the east side was completed.

The grading of Lafayette St. was continued to the amount of the appropriation given.

North Main St. between Oak and Tremont was brought

practically to the established grade with material removed from Pleasant St.

The high retaining wall on Sleeper St., which has been in a dangerous condition for some time, was rebuilt in a substantial manner and surmounted with an iron railing.

Sidewalks were built on Baldwin St. 181 feet, Cook's Ct. 349 feet, Doe Ave. 780 feet, Fairview St. 400 feet, Lincoln St. 1,600 feet, Dewey St. 375 feet, Hoyt Ct. 140 feet. Total, 3,823 feet.

COLLECTION OF ASHES AND WASTE.

There has been collected 2,793 loads of ashes and waste and they have been disposed of at a cost of \$0.93 per load.

The department should be provided with a motor truck to handle this work as a considerable saving would be assured from the start.

STATE ROAD MAINTENANCE AND CONSTRUCTION.

The usual work of maintenance, such as patching, oiling and dragging of state roads, was carefully attended to throughout the year and in addition a section of bituminous macadam 3,531 feet long was laid south of The Weirs village.

The extreme amount of rainfall during the progress of this work accounted for the high cost of this piece of work. It was found necessary to subgrade this section of road with gravel, hauled nearly three miles, as the clay subsoil was not suitable for a bituminous road surface.

We were able to lay out only a small portion of the money appropriated for construction on account of the scarcity of labor. What work was done consisted of grading and blowing out ledges near the Laconia-Meredith line.

The balance of this appropriation is available for work this coming season.

GENERAL.

There was laid 9,642 sq yards of bituminous macadam on city streets which is a step in the right direction.

It is to be hoped that money will be provided to lay as much in 1917, as there are many streets that still remain unimproved and that are badly in need of a hard surface.

The labor conditions for the year 1916 were very bad, and it was impossible to finish all the work laid out, although every effort was exerted to do so. This situation, obtaining during the past season, is likely to be the same for the coming season and emphasizes the necessity of the city's buying more machinery to take the place of hand labor where possible. There are many machines which it would be for the department's interest to own, but your Board has been unable to buy them as no funds have been given them for such a purpose.

The widening and regulaing of Church St. from Main St. to the Bridge is a matter which requires attention and previous planning. The reconstruction of this street will require that it be closed to travel for a long time, and as it now carries a heavy through automobile traffic as well as the local traffic, it would seem to me that Union Ave. should be completed before this work is undertaken, so as to provide a suitable route for this traffic. If Union Ave. is left in its present condition, and Church St. is torn up, the conditions would be almost intolerable.

The amount expended for the year ending Feb. 15, 1917, is \$60,514.51, and I have itemized it under the following headings:

GENTLEMEN.

This department attended to all the work that it was called upon to do or that was provided for by the appropriation given.

Also much of the work done for construction jobs was charged to the appropriations for such jobs.

There should be an appropriation made to start work on Assessors plans for the city as they are now very much needed.

The lines of Union avenue from Pitman Mfg. Co. to High street have not yet been adjusted. No work can be done on this portion of the street until a proper adjustment is made.

The land along the northerly side of Church street from Main street to the river has not yet been taken to allow for the reconstruction of this street.

The town-city line between Laconia and Gilrord, from Lake Winnipesaukee southerly, was surveyed and a plan made.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SEWERS.

To the Board of Public Works:

GENTLEMEN.

Construction—The following sanitary sewers were built the past year: Belknap street, 347.5 feet; cost \$229.11; Hoyt court, 159.5 feet; cost \$141.90. Opechee street, 288 feet; cost \$425.82. Union avenue extension and Clark avenue, 534 feet; cost \$565.78. Total length, 1,329 feet.

The Clark avenue sewer was paid for by the Laconia. Realty Company, who will be reimbursed by the city when Clark avenue is accepted as a highway.

The following sewers are needed: Stark street and St. Catherine street, Butler street, Walker street, and Woodland street, Highland street, Harlan street, Edwards street.

Maintenance—The usual flushing and inspection was given the sanitary sewers and the roots were removed where encountered. The trouble from tree roots is constantly increasing as well as the expense of removal.

The appropriation for sewer maintenance was \$1,250.00 this year, but this amount was not enough to cover the work required. At least \$1,600.00 must be appropriated for the year 1917, to do what is absolutely required.

Forty-nine permits were issued to connect buildings with the public sewer.

PLUMBING.

The Board of Examiners of Plumbers gave one examination to an applicant for a journeyman plumber's license the past year. The applicant failed to pass and was refused a license.

149 permits to do plumbing were issued.

REPORT OF PARK COMMISSIONERS.

To his Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Laconia;

GENTLEMEN:

Agreeable to the ordinance creating the Board of Park Commissioners, we have the honor to submit the first annual report of the commission as now constituted.

We trust that you have been pleased that you adopted the recommendation made by the Board last year, which increased the number of members to five and defined their duties by a new ordinance.

The Board has endeavored to make the parks of the city of as much use as possible to all residents of the city and adjoining towns. To this end the Laconia gun club were given a permit to use their grounds for another year, and the Belknap County Pomona Grange again held their annual fair on the grounds at Opechee Park; while the weather conditions were unfavorable, a large number of people were present and the fair was pronounced a success by the promoters.

It is hoped by the Commission that this year a plan of Opechee Park will be made, and that whatever money is expended in the future will be along the lines thus laid down.

While the money for Leavitt Park is provided for, no appropriation is made for the other parks of the city, and it is the opinion of the commission that a small appropriation should be made so that the bills for minor improvements and repairs could be met from our own funds.

During the season, a bubble fountain has been placed in Opechee Park, which was paid for by the Parent-Teacher association, and with the approval of the Mayor two substantial buildings have been constructed for toilet purposes, a part of which can be used for bath houses, and are a much needed improvement, both as regards looks and convenience.

A detailed statement showing how the appropriation of \$400, made for the Parent-Teacher association, was expended, has been filed with the City Clerk by Mr. Harry F. Wiley, treasurer, and Miss J. Hazel Duke, and the report covering the appropriation will be found in their reports to the Parent-Teacher association.

In closing, the Commission wish to make the following recommendations which we trust your successors may consider when they make the appropriations for 1917, viz.:

That the Commission be authorized to procure a working plan of Opechee park.

That the appropriation for playground purposes be made \$500 for the present season.

That an appropriation be made to paint or stain the grand stand at Opechee Park, which would not only make it look more respectable, but as it is now in fairly good repair would have a tendency to prolong the period of its usefulness.

And that a more substantial rail be placed around the triangular park, at the corner of Main and Province streets.

The work at Leavitt Park the past year has been a continuation of that of previous years, *i. e.*, the filling and grading of the south end of the Park.

The work has been retarded somewhat this year, on account of the excess of rain and the scarcity of labor; yet a substantial gain has been made, and it is hoped that under favorable conditions, the close of 1917 will see this portion of the park practically completed, according to plans accepted by the City Council in 1912.

The dumping of rubbish had increased to such an extent, that it became necessary the last of the season to erect signs forbidding the same.

Trees which were set out a number of years ago, have been cared for, and most of those, together with the row of Lombardy poplars on the southern boundary line, are growing satisfactorily.

The tennis court in the south-west corner was completed in September and was in great demand, considering the lateness of the year. Until the improvements on the park reach a more advanced stage, this court will be maintained for the use of the young people who are over playground age. It will be placed in good condition and provided with back stops early in the spring.

Permission was granted the Parent-Teacher association, in June, to use a portion of the grounds for the children, as a playground.

This necessitated the co-operation of the Commission, and the manager of the park work, J. E. Phelps, devoted considerable time in preparing the ground for the equipment and in placing the same.

In the opening of this playground, Leavitt Park, which hitherto has been a name only, has become tangible; a very real thing to the crowd of children who found happiness within its borders; and as the years go by, it is destined to become a more important factor in the life of the city and in the development of its young people, than its generous donor could have foreseen.

Under the new system of electing members of the Park Commission, it is possible to plan the work for the coming year, with a reasonable assurance that it will be carried along without break or essential change.

Accordingly, arrangements have been made to commence work in the spring as early as the weather will permit. A detailed account of the expenditures at Leavitt Park follows:

PLAYGROUND REPORT.

To the Park Commission:

The Laconia Parent-Teacher association herewith submits the third annual report of Opechee playground for the season of 1916.

We are glad to say that the work has been continued under the efficient oversight of Mrs. A. H. Harriman, who kindly consented to act as chairman of the Playground committee, and to her is due largely not only the starting of the movement but also the success.

A second playground has been opened in Leavitt Park, Lakeport, which is a move in the right direction. Mrs. Hollis Perkins has been untiring in her efforts, not only planning with the help of parents and interested friends of Ward six to meet the demand for equipment, but also in looking after the interests of the playground for the season. Miss Alice Jones had charge of the work of this playground.

Mr. Frederick J. Weismiller, who was director of Opechee playground the previous summer, returned this year to take charge. He was assisted by Miss Minnie Shattuck the first part of the season and by Miss Hazel Duke for the remaining weeks.

The same lines of work and play were continued and the popularity of the playground seems to be established. A larger number of parents are becoming interested, more frequent visits are made, which helps foster the correct spirit and adds to the interest of the boys and girls.

Conditions were more favorable for the success of the gardens this year, and very good results were obtained.

Mr. Edwin W. Whitmarsh had charge of this work, and our county agent, Mr. Pike, helped in awarding the prizes,—one first prize, a gold badge; two second prizes, silver badges, and the third prize, a bronze badge. The grading was based upon a possible twenty points. Some of the children received eighteen points, many fourteen or fifteen, and none fell below ten. This seems to be an excellent showing. The children were pleased with the badges which were called for as soon as possible after the notice of success was received.

The work of the girls was most commendable and showed marked improvement as well as painstaking oversight on the part of the instructors. There were several divisions,—plain sewing, embroidery, bags, baskets, picture frames, napkin rings, and for each division there were first and second prizes for children under nine years of age, and also first and second prizes for those children nine years and over. This seemed to be a fair arrangement and the ribbons which were presented by Mayor Munsey at the Field meet were duly appreciated by the winners.

Mr. Weismiller wished to close his work before the end of the season, in order to accept a permanent position, and we were fortunate in obtaining the services of Mr. Walter L. Boyson, who assisted Mr. Whitmarsh in arranging the Field Day exhibition, August 25, which was a splendid success. The weather was fine, the crowd of interested spectators all that could be desired and the program was carried out with order and enthusiasm which reflected much credit not only upon those in charge but upon the participants as well.

We are most grateful to our Mayor and Council, for the placing of two toilets, the installing of electric lights, and the appropriation of four hundred dollars, which made possible the necessary supervision.

In addition to the city appropriation, there was expended \$319.86 which was received by the Parent-Teacher

association from various sources, among them being the field meet of 1915, \$67.96; food sale at Laconia Tavern, \$92.00; food sale at Lakeport, \$113.85; Kennedy and La-Pierre, moving picture entertainment, \$17.30; check from T. J. McIntyre, \$5.00; the dues in the association and miscellaneous items making up the balance. The association added a bubble fountain to the equipment and finished and placed a flag pole, the tree for which was given by Miss Sarah Ellen Jewett. An American eagle, the gift of Mrs. Russell H. Carter, a lorns the top and our beloved flag now occupies its proper place in Opechee Park.

The central ideal in America is that we are a self-governed people. We are governed by laws made by our own people and we appoint officials to enforce the laws. But the best and most patriotic citizenship comes not as a result of compelling obedience to and respect for laws, but as a result of the practice of right ethical relation with each other, no matter what races, nationalities or classes are involved. This is the spirit of the playground as expressed in the plan of play and games which teach self-control and self-government. We hope in the near future the way will open to provide recreation centers throughout the entire year. With the new High school building in prospect, conditions seem to be favorable and we trust as the way broadens the means of support will be forthcoming.

OFFICIAL REPORT OPECHEE PLAYGROUND.

SEASON 1916.

To the Parent-Teacher Association, Laconia, N. H.:

The third season of the playground was officially opened June 20, with an unusually large attendance.

The supervisors found it much easier to conduct the work this season on account of the added equipment. Three new swings were added which proved a great source of enjoyment. Several settees, hammocks and other articles, contributed by interested friends, were greatly appreciated. The rolling settee, given by Mr. Frank Lougee, was especially popular. A soccer ball outfit was also added and early in the season the fundamentals of the game were taught.

A flag raising was planned to take place July 4. Owing to weather conditions, the exercises had to be given up. Throughout the entire season the flag was displayed on the grounds every pleasant day.

A second tennis court was completed this year and tennis proved to be a most popular sport. Several tournaments were held and weekly reports were published in the local papers.

Swimming claimed more enthusisasts than the previous season. Five afternoons each week were devoted to instructing the boys and girls in this art.

One afternoon each week was given over to the "Story Hour Club" which was conducted by Miss Abby Jewett. This was much enjoyed by the children and was always well attended.

The hikes to Mt. Belknap were eagerly looked forward

to by the boys. A large number took advantage of these trips which were both interesting and instructive. Camping methods and nature study were taught.

Through the kindness of Mrs. Edmund Little a most successful and much enjoyed Victrola concert was given on the afternoon of Aug. 15. Another concert was planned for but had to be given up on account of rain. It is hoped that next season, it will be possible to have a Victrola at the grounds the whole time. This would greatly aid in teaching folk dancing and many more concerts could be given.

The work for the girls was under the direction of Miss Minnie Shattuck during the first half of the season and Miss J. Hazel Duke had charge of the last half. The work included sewing, both plain and fancy, embroidery, and raffia work. The games for the younger children were also under the direction of these instructors. Volley balk proved a popular pastime with the older girls.

Fully 175 children and parents availed themselves of the privilege of attending the playground picnic held Aug. 4 at Lake Shore Park. The afternoon was given over to swimming, bowling, games and dancing.

The attendance this year was most gratifying and showed a decided increase over that of the previous seasons. The average daily attendance of the girls was seventy. This was determined by actual count. The daily attendance of the boys was estimated at one hundred fifty-five, making the total daily attendance two hundred twenty-five. A visitors' book was kept which shows a record of 283 registered visitors. Many mothers took advantage of the opportunities of the playground and spent many delightful afternoons in the grove.

The third annual field day and exhibition was held Aug. 25 and on that afternoon all roads led to Opechee Park. There were bicycle races, dashes, jumping contests and swimming races for the boys. These were in charge of Mr. Walter Boyson and Mr. Edwin Whitmarsh, as Mr.

Frederick Weismiller, the supervisor, was obliged to leave earlier in the season to begin work at the Providence Y. M. C. A. The girls gave a pleasing exhibition of the folk dances they had learned during the summer. One of the centers of attraction for the afternoon was the table containing the work done by the girls. At the close of the exhibition, Mayor Munsey awarded the prizes.

In the evening a delightful lawn party was given under the auspices of the older girls of the playground. Aprons, candy, cake, ice cream, soft drinks, and flowers were for sale. The fortune teller did a thriving business and the folk dancing on the tennis courts was a pleasing feature of the evening's entertainment. We extend thanks to the members of Holt's band for furnishing music during the evening, and also to the Mayor and City Council for the splendid lighting facilities which were provided and to Mr. F. T. Brockington for having the lights installed in time for the evening party. The sum of \$45.03 was realized, and this was presented to the Parent-Teacher Association for the playground expenses.

An exhibition of the girls' work was shown at the Belknap County Pomona Grange Fair. Many prizes were awarded to the playground girls.

Although the playground has closed another successful season, there are still many things needed. We recommend a few of the most important ones—a Victrola, back stops for the tennis courts, baby swings, and bath houses for the boys and girls.

LEAVITT PARK PLAYGROUND REPORT.

To the Parent-Teacher Association, Laconia, N. H.

I have the honor to present herewith my first report of Leavitt Park playground.

It seemed to the Parent-Teacher Association that Leavitt Park had been cleared enough of rocks and bushes so that a part of it might be devoted to a playground. The question was put to the school children, and it was a unanimous vote that we should have a playground and that they would help support it. Two food sales were given by the children of the Washington street school and two by those of the Mechanic street school, Ex-Governor Quinby very kindly giving us the use of his store for the purpose. With kind help of the teachers and the very efficient committees, the four food sales netted \$113.85; Mr. Kennedy and Mr. LaPierre gave us a moving picture show and we netted \$17.30, making a total of \$131.15.

We purchased from C. N. Spaulding, a giant stride, slide, aluminum flying rings, steel trapeze, steel ladder, steelcl imbing pole, and steel horizontal bar. All of this apparatus was set in cement. There is a balance on hand of about \$17.00. The Village Improvement society gave two large croquet sets; Mr. C. F. Locke, cement; Mr. O. T. Muzzey, rope for swings; Mrs. L. V. Thompson, iron fixtures for swings and teeter; Boulia-Gorrell Lumber Co., Chase's sawmill and Cook's Lumber Co., lumber; Lougee-Robinson Co., hammock, sand for sand box.

The playground was opened June 26 and closed August 29, being open eight weeks, with Miss Alice Jones as director for the afternoon. She proved very efficient in her work. There was an average attendance of fifty

children, besides the "grown-ups" who visited daily. August 29, we held a lawn party, afternoon and evening, and netted \$11.21. We have the promise of a flag and flag-pole for next spring and two tennis courts will also be ready.

There is an urgent need for electric lights to be placed in the park. It would soon become a resting place for the "grown ups," and the young men and women who work all day could enjoy the tennis and croquet courts, making it a community park. We also desire an all day director for ten weeks of the summer vacation and police inspection in the evening.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN.

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Laconia Public Library:

GENTLEMEN: -

I have the honor to present to you my fourteenth annual report. The statistics of my report are for the calendar year 1916, while the Treasurer's report is for the fiscal year ending 15 February 1917.

Eight years ago, I recommended that another story of stacks be provided that year. At that time it was possible to erect the new stacks with little disturbance to the routine work of the library. A little later, you decided to send books to the Ossian Wilbur Goss Reading Rooms and to maintain a branch library there to accommodate the residents of ward 6. Since then, 1321 books have been placed in the branch, 721 books have been discarded or lost, four large revolving bookcases have provided for about 1500 volumes, and about two thousand books have been stored in the basement. The stacks are now so crowded that more books must be sent to the basement whenever new books are purchased. Two wooden bookcases must be provided each year for the books that must be shelved in the basement. The loan desk attendant cannot get these books. To make them available for circulation, there must be someone, beside the desk attendant, in the library at all times. During four hours of each day, the librarian is the only person who can get the books and periodicals stored in the basement. His own work is greatly hindered by these calls. If another story of stacks were installed, the desk attendant would be able to serve the patrons much more promptly than at present and the calls upon the

librarian would be infrequent. For a few years, the books on the second floor of stacks would be actually nearer the loan desk than a third of the books on the main floor. I do not mean to imply that the books would be easier to get, because a considerable distance on a level is less fatiguing than climbing even a short flight of stairs. However the steps would not be more than a fourth of the number required to obtain books shelved in the basement. The saving in expense for bookcases in the basement would amount to \$70 a year.

Unless the additional story can be installed during the summer vacation, when the circulation and reference work is lightest, an extra assistant should be provided for the next school year to do the reference work and to bring the books from the basement as they are required. Owing to the crowded condition of the stacks, several thousand volumes must be withdrawn from circulation while the new stacks are being erected. The stacks now in use must be emptied before the new stacks can be connected with them. The books can not be shelved elsewhere, but must be piled up where they will not be available for circulation. is a strong reason why the work should be done in the summer months when the books will be less needed. the work is to be done next summer, the order must be given very soon as several months will be required to build the stacks.

Last spring, Miss Phillips, who had been a member of the staff twelve years, married and resigned. As no one was immediately available to take her place, she continued her service until August. Miss Hazel J. Clark, who had assisted at the loan desk from time to time, was appointed a regular assistant. As all the work that she was expected to do was new to her, it was necessary for the librarian to spend much time instructing her and supervising her work. His own routine work was necessarily restricted, so he could not order and prepare for circulation promptly the books provided for by the city appropriation. Very few

books were bought from February to September, and those bought in the fall could not be quickly put into circulation. Largely because of the lack of new and popular books, the circulation of fiction fell off 2408 issues or nearly 9%.

The special book funds now provide a more nearly adequate supply of books other than fiction. For the reasons stated above, these books could not be prepared as promptly as would have been the case if the librarian could have given more time to them. However, the circulation of non-fiction books showed an actual gain of 322 loans or 5%. For the first time, the circulation of fiction was less than 80% of the total at the main library. The gain in sociology was 39%, in poetry 27%, in biography 17%, in history 51%.

The reference work for the high school has gained rapidly in recent years. The number of books, pamphlets and periodicals issued for use in the building was 2414, a gain of 18%. This number does not include the large use of books in the study room and of periodicals on file in the reading room. It is not practicable to keep a record of readers at the main library during the year, but a careful count is made during the week following Thanksgiving day of each year. In 1916, 990 readers were counted, a gain of 43% as compared with 1915. Four hundred and ninety one new borrowers registered, a gain of 9%. The number of cards used to draw books was 2719, a gain of nearly 2%.

There has been a gratifying increase in the public interest in a history of the city during the year. The librarian was continued as a member of the committee of the Board of trade. An effort has been made to secure for the library material for such a history. A number of citizens have consented to prepare historical articles on special topics. A history of Gilford academy has been written by Miss Sarah L. Merrill and this is to be published in the Laconia Democrat. A chapter of the early religious history of Meredith Bridge, by Rev. George L. Thompson, was published in the News and critic. Everyone having special

information or interest in some topic of local history is urged to write an article for publication in the local papers. If anyone has conclusive evidence of an error of fact in any such article, it should be brought forward, not in the spirit of criticism or controversy, but as a help in arriving at the truth so that the writer of the final history may have all the evidence before him. It is certain that some will have facts and evidence that the writers did not have and could not be expected to know. If Laconia is to have a history that will be a credit to the city, it must result from hearty and sympathetic cooperation by those who know the facts or have the evidence. If each one will do what he can, the result will be a reliable and interesting history.

Mr. George D. Merrill found in a wall of the house standing on the lot where the new bank building at Lakeport is being erected a "Guide to the White Mountains and lakes of New Hampshire" that was published in 1850. Mention is made in this of the Lady of the Lake that was then a new boat. Mr. Merrill gave this for our historical collection. Mrs. Edmund C. Varney gave two old papers that were published in 1851. Mr. Carl F. Blaisdell contributed an old plan of Meredith from a survey made in 1770. Miss Julia S. Busiel gave a humorous poem, "The Meredith Bridge fellows" and a souvenir program of "At the end of the rainbow". Mr. George Crosby brought in a receipt for board at the United States hotel in Philadelphia, dated May 10, 1840, that was given to Mr. John J. Morrill. He also gave a ribbon badge that was used as a season ticket for an annual fair at Meredith Bridge, September 26 & 27, 1860. As Laconia was incorporated five vears earlier, it is interesting to find that the village was still known by its earlier name. Mr. James B. Fernald gave two old books and a trade sticker from a copy of Harper's magazine for April, 1854. He also gave a report of the fire precinct for 1879 and a report of the commission to provide for the protection and preservation of Endicott Rock.

Col. Haynes gave a copy of each of two books that he printed in very limited editions from type set in his own home. "The Winnipesaukee classics" reproduces some of the choice humor published in the Lake Village Times years ago, "A minor war history" gives vivid descriptions of the experiences of a soldier in the civil war written to one whose portrait, as published in the book, accounts for his inspiration. Mr. Lucian A. Ladd gave us a plan of a part of Meredith Bridge, dated December, 1860, another evidence of the survival of the old name. Mrs. Edmund Little presented some old town reports of Gilford and catalogues of Gilford academy for 1851, 1852 and 1854. Mr. Edward L. Lydiard gave us a photograph of Mr. Joseph Nichols, who is well known to all our people. Mrs. Charles Morrison gave us 22 volumes, consisting of "Memoirs of the courts of Europe" and "Celebrated crimes." Hon. Charles L. Pulsifer gave a history of the Baptist church at Lakeport, by Henry A. Rublee. Mr. John Parker Smith gave two photographs of the "Old corner store' taken at different periods. Miss Mary Alice Vaughan gave four year books of the Laconia woman's club that we lacked.

If everyone who has old records or historical data would see to it that they are deposited at the library or made available to those who are writing chapters of local history, much more rapid progress could be made and many errors of fact might be avoided. The librarian has learned that a large collection of old town reports was destroyed recently that would have helped to complete the set at the City clerk's office or at the library. It is hoped that anyone who reads this report will try to put the librarian or some member of the history committee on the track of any old reports or catalogues within his knowledge.

LAKEPORT BRANCH.

Fewer books were circulated at the branch in 1916 than in any year since 1911. The loss was wholly in fiction. Eleven more classed books were loaned than in 1915, but the circulation of fiction fell off 744 volumes. Eight thousand, six hundred and twenty-four books were

charged out at the branch. This was 21.15% of the total circulation. Five hundred and thirty-three cards were msed here, which is 19.6% of the whole number used. There was a gain of 141 in the number of readers counted.

When Miss Carrie M. Jones left the city to take a course of study at Simmons college, Mr. Jones was the only person familiar with the details of the work at the branch. In case of accident or illness, there was no one available to take his place. Therefore Miss Effie E. Paine was employed for two hours a day that she might learn the routine and be available in time of need.

The Laconia press association furnished two bound volumes of the Laconia Democrat for 1915 for the main library. By permission, one copy was deposited at the branch to lessen the risk of loss by fire and to make it more accessible to the residents of this ward.

Hon. Martin A. Haynes presented one of the fifty copies that he published of "The Winnipesaukee classics", reprinted from his file of The Lake Village Times. He also gave the reading rooms one of the sixty copies of "A minor war history", compiled from his letters from the front in civil war times to the young lady who became his wife. These are too valuable for general circulation, but patrons who can spend a few hours at the rooms should call for them and read them there. The first is guaranteed to drive dull care away and the second vividly portrays army life as the soldier saw it.

Miss Haynes gave fifteen popular books of fiction and Mrs. Henry B. Quinby gave five popular books that were appreciated by the patrons. A friend, who prefers to remain anonymous, gave six books. Master Leon Vallier gave a work of fiction. Mr. John R. Brown gave four periodicals. A pamphlet was received from the Chambre de commerce de Paris and one from the Railway executives' advisory committee. The Village improvement society provided a Scotch elm tree and three English ivies for the grounds. To all those mentioned above, grateful acknowledgment is made for benefits received.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

I have the honor of submitting for your consideration the annual report of the condition and operation of the fire department for the year ending Feb. 15th, 1917.

During the past year the department responded to one hundred and nine still alarms called by telephone and twenty-nine box alarms pulled in from various boxes. Also aid was sent to Gilmanton Corner and very efficient work was accomplished by our boys in saving a large building in that town.

During the past year the purchase of a first-class piece of motor apparatus, which will be delivered in a short time, is a move in the right direction and insures a quick response to outlying buildings around our city in case of fire.

Several cities the size of Laconia are reducing the number of call men and are paying regular firemen in the station house at all times, which gives more efficient service and a quicker response to fires. This should be considered by our City Council during the coming year.

I would recommend that a new heating plant be installed in the central fire station, also a new floor be laid at the Lakeport station. I would also recommend that the present horse-drawn chemical wagons and hook and ladder truck be rebuilt with motors, which I think will be a saving to the city for maintenance of horses.

The fire department at the present time is short of fire hose. We should have five hundred feet for Lakeport station and five hundred feet at the Central fire station.

CITY SOLICITOR'S REPORT.

LACONIA, N. H., February 1, 1917.

To the City Council of Laconia:

In accordance with the custom and duties appertaining to the office of City Solicitor, I herewith submit to you my report.

In assuming the duties of City Solicitor, I found upon the record of the Superior Court a large number of cases, as follows:

The case of Attorney General v. Lyman B. W. Avery is the case that will be best known under the term of the "Union Avenue case", and which was all disposed of as

reported by my predecessor, City Solicitor Hale, in his report of February 15th, 1916, with the exception of the controversy between Mrs. Georgia B. Wells and the city, and relating to the line between her property and said street. I trust and hope before this report has been placed in your hands that this matter will have reached a trial and a proper adjudication. I have been assured by the Presiding Justice of the Belknap County Superior Court that he expected and intends to hear the evidence in this matter in the near future.

The deed of Miss Wentworth to the city, referred to inthe former City Solicitor's report before referred to, has been received and recorded.

The next suit is that of Claribel Clark, who brings a bill in equity and also a suit at law, the suit in equity being to prevent the city from alleged diversion of water on to the property of the complainant, and the suit at law to recover damages growing out of what the plaintiff claims is the wrongful diversion of water on to her real estate from Union avenue. Both these suits still remain on the Docket, but with the understanding that they are to be disposed of at the March term of Court.

There was another suit upon the Docket, that of the Independent Ice Co. v. Laconia, which was an appeal from the assessment of taxes. This matter has been adjusted by the Company and the appeal withdrawn.

The next is that of Wesley B. Stevens v. Charles A. French, and is a petition of the plaintiff asking that Mr. French be ordered to issue to him a plumber's license. There is no question really that involves the city, it being purely one of technical law which will, as stated by Mr. Hale, in his report, probably have to be determined by the Supreme Court.

The matters of Simon A. Beard, on the Civil Docket, and Idella M. Locke on the Sessions Docket, have not been as yet fully disposed of. The question of law was decided in favor of the city, as reported by Mr. Hale in

his report of 1916, but that decision left a further question of damage during the last six years previous to the bringing of the suit. The plaintiff claims there is such a damage; this being a question of fact it has been referred to the County Commissioners, but owing to the sickness of the attorney for the plaintiff has not been tried. I expect that it will be heard and disposed of as quick as the plaintiff's attorney can attend to it, which I trust and hope will be before the March term of court.

The suit of Sidney F. Judd, Admr. ν . the City of Laconia for the alleged diversion of water on School street is still on the docket. I know of no reason why it should not be tried at the incoming March term of court, and the same may be said of the suit of Josephine Herbert ν . Laconia. This is a suit for damage against the city growing out of a sewer connection. The city claims no liability. The matter should and probably will reach a trial at the next term of court.

In the matter of Tilton and Belmont v. Laconia and Sanbornton, which is a petition to compel the said city and town to contribute towards the expense of the new bridge at Winnisquam, the case is still in the Supreme Court but has been briefed, argument has been had thereon and a decision will probably be reached at the March term. The case was transferred during the term of my predecessor, and the points of law were well defined and set forth. The only question really involved is whether the present state highway law supplants on the state highways the old law relating to contribution of towns to an adjoining town, which has been unduly burdened by the contribution or repair of highways.

The matter of Edwin P. Thompson is an appeal from the lay out of Cook's Court, so called, and also from the award of damages. This matter has been referred to the County Commissioners, and should and will probably beheard before the next term of court.

On the 31st day of July the City Council on petition,

voted to discontinue the Gold street bridge in Ward Six. There being no record that this highway was laid out by the town a petition has been brought in the Superior Court asking the court, in accordance with the law, to approve the discontinuance as voted by the City Council. William G. Cram et als have brought a petition to prevent the discontinuance of the bridge, and seeking damage if it is discontinued. Orders of notice have issued, and this matter will be in order for trial at the March term of court.

The City Council, in accordance with the suggestion of former City Solicitor Hale have instructed the City Clerk and City Solicitor to have published the revisions of the city ordinances, the city charter and amendments thereto, together with the acts of the Legislature relating to the town and city of Laconia from 1855 to 1915, the orders of the Board of Public Works, rules of order of the City Council, and a list of the city officials from 1893 to 1916, with such other memoranda or notes, as they may deem expedient; the same to be printed in book form with a carefully prepared index.

The present City Solicitor had no information relating to the above order until recent date, but investigation shows that the preceding Solicitor has done much work along the lines of the Resolution, which he has courteously turned over to me. It will be my earnest endeavor to complete the instructions given by the City Council, and if possible have such portion of the duties as fall to me properly prepared and ready for the printer as soon as the rest of the material is ready.

Two new Ordinances have been passed by the City Council, to wit, that relating to buildings, and the control, government and licensing of public jitneys.

Wherever my duties have called for the cooperation of the City Marshal, the Overseer of the Poor, or other officers, I have found them courteous and efficient, and ready at all times to aid me in the performance of my duties.

As in the past, the City Solicitor has been called many

times to confer with the City Marshal relating to criminal complaints, and at such times as the City Marshal has requested, has assisted in trials in the Municipal Court.

No suits have been brought against the city during the past year. A claim for damages was made by a party whose automobile ran off from one of the abuttments to the bridge at The Weirs. After extended correspondence the matter was disposed of without suit or without damage being paid.

There are one or two matters between the city and county relating to the support of the poor that are held in abeyance awaiting the decision of the Supreme Court between another City and County, which I expect will settle the points at issue between this city and Belknap county.

I cannot close this report without acknowledging the kindness, courtesy and assistance of the former City Solicitor, my immediate predecessor, Fletcher Hale, Esquire, and also C. B. Hibbard, Esquire, his predecessor, who on account of my recent illness so kindly and ably prepared the brief in the Winnisquam bridge controversy.

TRUST FUNDS.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES.

To the Auditor of the City of Laconia:

Although the Act of the Legislature requiring cities and towns to elect a board of three trustees to administer trust funds received "by deed, gift, or devise for the following uses: For schools and other educational purposes; for the building of roads, bridges and sidewalks, and the care of the same; for supplying any place with water, street lights, building sewers; for the building and support of hospitals; for the support and aid of the poor; for the building and support of public buildings, except churches; for the care of cemeteries and the lots therein; for libraries and the care of the same, reading rooms, parks, and shade and ornamental trees among highways and other public places," became effective April 21, 1915, such board of trustees for the City of Laconia was not elected, complete, by the City Council until June 28, 1916.

Therefore, owing to the comparatively brief time since the election of the board, together with the initial work necessary in the organization of the trustees and investigation necessary on their part in order to familiarize themselves with their duties, the trustees have, during the past year, been able to accomplish but a very small part of the work which they feel obligated to do.

The board of trustees has organized, has obtained proper books for the keeping of the record required, and a special form of a check, or order, for disbursements. The trustees have taken over the trust funds held by the city and providing for the perpetual care of various cemetery

lots; and have drawn orders to the various cemetery associations presenting bills for the care of such lots during the past year in accordance with the amount of available income in counection with each fund. In some instances the bills presented exceeded the income from the trust fund, and in these cases the trustees could only pay that portion of the bill represented by the available income.

In assuming their duties the trustees found that only in a very few instances where the city had received trust funds under and by virtue of, a clause in the will of the donor, was there a copy of the clause creating the trust in the City Clerk's office. To the trustees it seemed very desirable that in each case of this kind there should be in the records of the city a copy of the clause creating the trust, that the full and complete terms by which the administration of the trust must be governed might be always available to the examination of the officers representing this city in handling the fund. In this connection, therefore, the trustees have performed considerable work in the Belknap County Probate Records, taking a copy of the clause in every will wherein a trust of this nature has been created, and are planning to have the same recorded in connection with the records of their office.

The trustees understand that there are burial lots, especially in some of the outlying cemeteries, in connection with which the city has been holding trust funds providing for the care of said lots, which lots are now in a sadly neglected condition, none of the accumulated income having been applied for the purpose of their improvement.

The trustees have formulated plans to visit in each cemetery in the city, every lot in connection with which a trust has been received by the city to provide for its care, to get in touch with the present condition of these lots and to arrange that the available income in each case is used to the best advantage in carrying out the intention of the donor of the trust. This work has necessarily had to go over until the coming spring and summer.

Inspection of milk has been regularly done through the year. While no cases of adulteration or disease has been found, or below average in quality, milk generally is too dirty. Three years ago, the State Board of Health at Concord established a plan to better milk throughout the The requirements were: Cleaner barn, cleaner cows; system of sterilization of all utensils used; tuberculosis test of cows every six months; milk kept at regulated temperature summer and winter; the whole plant and milk inspected by an expert personally sent out from Concord. In return for this extra labor and expense, the price would have to be a trifle higher. The state allows the producer of such milk to use the state caps on milk bottles having the name, Inspected Milk. It was hoped that the demand would be so great that all milk farms would eventually have to adopt this plan for cleaner milk.

Thus far, there is only one milk farm delivering inspected milk."

The City isolation hospital has been in use three times this winter. Two suspected cases of smallpox, held for observation; one case of scarlet fever.

Although this board has not spent its appropriation this year, generally \$500.00 would be a fair estimate.


We herewith submit our report as Overseers of the Poor for the year ending Feb. 15, 1917.


All reasonable requests for aid have been promptly attended to, and in our opinion the expenses of this department for the next year can be taken care of with the same appropriation as the year 1916.
