STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building on the 9th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, one trustee of Trust Funds, and two Road Agents.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting,—"Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town."

ARTICLE 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges for Tarring Cottage Street, for Town Building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for National Holidays, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the Health Department, for Vital Statistics, for the Community House, for Advertising purposes, for miscellaneous expenses, for Street Lighting, for Band Concerts, for Cemeteries, for Town Poor, for Old Age Assistance, for damage and legal expenses, for Protection of the premises on

the Ammonoosuc River from flood and other water damage, for White Pine Blister control, for the Community Nurse, for the Park Commissioners, for payment of the Town Debt and Interest, and all other Town expenses.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to use Fluorine in the Town Water Supply.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road known as the River Road, between State Highway Route No. 18 and State Highway Route No. 135.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the road, known as the River Road leading from State Highway Route No. 135 to the Town of Dalton, which lies between the property line of the Connecticut River Power Company (said point being marked by a concrete monument set in the side of said road) and the Littleton-Dalton town line.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the road, known as the Partridge Lake Road, which lies between State Highway Route No. 18 as presently established and the State highway lay-out of relocation of said Route No. 18 as shown on plans of TLR Project 14197 N. H., No. P-2404.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue Beaver Pond Road between Sand Road, so-called, and a point in said Beaver Pond Road near the former Henry Lewis farm; said point being marked by a monument set at the side of said road.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the road known as Sand Road between its junction with Beaver Pond Road (being the point to which said Sand Road was discontinued on July 7, 1953) and a point in said Sand Road six hun-

dred (600) feet southwesterly from station 158 of the State Highway lay-out of relocation of Route No. 18 as shown on plans of TLR project 14197 N. H., No. P-2404.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the road, connecting Slate Ledge Road and Sand Road and passing the Williams property, which lies between its junction with Sand Road and the property line of the Connecticut River Power Company, said latter point being marked by a concrete monument set in the side of the road.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1954, and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 12. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committee on rebuilding Union St., and West Main St., and Zoning Committee or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town a sum not to exceed Eighty-Five thousand dollars (\$85,000.00) for the construction of a new road beginning at the Lisbon Road intersection and ending at Auburn St., the loan to be repaid over a period of ten (10) years with State B. Funds contributing \$29,475.21; and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 14. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library and Municipal Court. The accounts of the Water and Light Department and the Village District were also audited and separate reports are being made for each of these divisions.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets — Dec. 31, 1952 — Dec. 31, 1953: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1952 and December 31, 1953, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$14,022.32 in 1953.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the

Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net revenue surplus of \$10,765.27, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,229.70, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$7,535.57.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)
A summary of receipts and expenditures for the

fiscal year ended December 31, 1953, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1953, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Parking Meter Account: (Exhibit H)

A summary statement of the Parking Meter account is presented in Exhibit H.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit N)

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1953, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit N.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

General Comments

Current Surplus:

The current surplus decreased from \$20,525.80 to \$19,238.12, during 1953, as shown by the following statement:

Town Treasurer's Surety Bond:

It is again recommended that the surety bond of the Town Treasurer be increased from \$10,000.00 to \$15,000.00, in order that the amount of the bond may be more proportionate to the amount of funds for which this official is responsible.

Conclusion:

The accounts of all town officials which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to prescribed methods.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual Town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Littleton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

Report of the Selectmen of the Town of Littleton, N. H., in regard to the participation of Federal and State Aid in the rebuilding of Union and West Main Streets.

We find that the rebuilding of Union Street is a big and expensive job, one that we would not advise attempting until the Town can get both State and Federal Aid. We have been promised that these aids will be granted at a future date, which will mean that at that time the cost to Littleton will be 25% of the project cost.

We feel that West Main St., should be rebuilt at this time. The State is spending nearly a million dollars starting at Auburn St., and including the road around the new Littleton Development. This leaves West Main St., a bottleneck between the good roads. By doing this job at this time we would also have the advantage of tying in with the State, and have our portion of the road included in an over-all bid.

We feel that the money can be borrowed at .02-3/4 per cent interest, and that the project should be undertaken at this time.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT 1953

The town was saddened in August by the death of Mrs. Nellie D. Fisher who for thirty years was a faithful member of the library staff. Mrs. Rollins W. Moore was appointed assistant librarian on September 1.

The number of books borrowed from the library in 1953 was over 3000 more than in 1952, or an average of about 100 books a day, an indication that we are giving more service to Littleton people. Figures show that the increases occurred in the loan of adult nonfiction and all classes of juvenile books. There was also an increased registration of new borrowers, a trend that should indicate a busy year to come.

We were able to add substantially to the juvenile collection. Progress was made in filling gaps in the adult collection in the fields of nature study, practical arts, literature, including poetry and drama, and the standard reference books. It is perhaps not too optimistic to say that the library collection as a whole is better rounded than it has been for some years. The fact that we found it necessary to borrow over 200 books from the N. H. State Library at Concord shows, however, that there are still a good many books that it would be our advantage to add to our own shelves as soon as it is possible to do so.

Work with the children of Littleton continues to be extensive. Classroom collections are loaned to all grades at the Littleton Elementary School and outside reading is provided for St. Rose of Lima School. High school students' use of the library is moderately heavy and it is very evident that more material is needed for them especially in the fields of science and literature. Instruction in the use of the library was given to a large class of English students.

Continuing the memorial book plan, Mrs. H. G. Polson gave two books, one in memory of Cassius W. Ludgate and one in memory of Mrs. L. D. Nihan. The McCaffrey family presented three books in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Timothy McCaffrey and the employees of the Post Office gave one in memory of Leslie J. Dow.

A large number of books and a check given by Mr. and Mrs. Lowell R. Burch were most welcome. We thank them and all the other people who made generous gifts of books and money.

A permanent iron railing was installed along the front walk this year, a much needed improvement. The purchase of an inexpensive duplicating machine will make it possible for reserve and overdue notices, booklists and other material to be prepared at the library at a saving of time and expense.

Mr. Walter R. Cleasby retired in July after many years as our dependable janitor.

We wish to thank the Board of Trustees and the friends of the library for their interest and help during the past year.

Report of the Board of Education

To the Citizens of Littleton:

The school board of the Littleton School District presents herewith its annual report. Included in this report you will find the audit of finances for the year 1952-1953 by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission; budgets and estimated receipts for this year and next year; and written reports of the superintendent of schools and the principal of the high school.

The detailed budget of the school district calls for increases this year in the items which involve teachers' salaries, retirement and special fund activities. These increases are offset by the elimination of any requests for monies for additions and improvements to properties, consequently the total budget request is slightly less than that of last year.

The school board recommends an appropriation of \$185,685.98 this year as compared with \$186,497.65 last year. This appropriation will call for an assessment to be raised by taxes of \$182,735.98, which is less than last year by approximately \$200.00.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my annual report relative to your schools.

The following changes have taken place in the faculty since my last report.

Mr. Elliott A. Moreau of Turners Falls, Massachusetts, a graduate of Becker Junior College and American International College, was elected to teach Business Education replacing Miss Joyce Eastman who resigned to accept a teaching position in Leominster, Mass.

Mr. Wilfred T. Muse, a graduate of Suffolk University, was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mrs. Charlotte Sargent.

Mrs. Dorothy W. Judge, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, with teaching experience in Newport, Vermont, Danbury, Connecticut and Kingston, Rhode Island was elected to replace Miss Aylmer Crafts who resigned to get married.

Mr. Chester Leone, a graduate of Bates College, with Master's degree from Brown University, and with two years' experience in Presque Isle, Maine, was elected to replace Miss Mabel Harris who resigned for health reasons.

Mr. Loring Rowell, a graduate of Springfield College, was elected to replace Mr. John McNamara who resigned to accept a teaching position elsewhere.

Miss Barbara Jean Blakley, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with four years' experience in Bethlehem was elected to replace Miss Natalie Clough who resigned to accept a position in Concord, N. H. Miss Carlene Allison, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was elected as an additional teacher when the position of full time principalship was created.

Mrs. MaeBelle O. Sylvestre, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with teaching experience in Franconia, Lincoln and Landaff, was elected to replace Miss Evangeline Bill who resigned to accept a position in an American school in Greece.

Mrs. Ruth S. Colby, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, with previous experience in primary grades in Littleton, was elected to replace Miss Carolyn Brown who resigned to accept a kindergarten teaching position in Concord, N. H.

Major work on buildings and grounds includes the following: Surfacing the play area at the elementary school, installation of a drainage ditch on the elementary school grounds, installation of an incinerator in the elementary school to burn waste paper, high school and Kilburn school chimneys repaired and the preparation and seeding of the elementary school grounds.

Minor repairs to building include the following in the high school: Painting boys' shower room, repairing and painting the lower section of wall in Room 6, painting side walls in Room 2, painting walls and ceiling in Room 7, painting ceiling and walls in chemistry laboratory, painting inside wall in Room 9, gymnasium floor was sealed, desk tops in Room 3 were sanded and refinished, the clock tower was screened to keep out rain and snow, the roof was repaired and twenty new window shades were provided. Every effort is being made to keep all property in good repair.

At the time of writing this report an extension course in Youth Guidance is being organized and approximately thirteen teachers in the district will participate. Mr. John Radasch, director of guidance services for the State Board of Education, will be the instructor.

The report of the school doctors for the school year 1952-1953 shows that 358 pupils were examined, 67 received toxoid immunizations, 3 were vaccinated, 328 received tuberculosis tests, 9 were given chest x-ray and 317 were given laboratory tests. The following defects were found and all received treatment or were seen by the family physician: Tonsils and adenoids 8, glands 2, heart 3, abdomen 1 and orthopedic 12.

The report of the school nurse shows that 978 pupils were examined for vision, height, and weight, and 652 were given hearing tests. The following defects were found and reported to parents: Vision 57, hearing 23, skin 2, posture 5, speech 3, teeth 301, tonsils 19, and asthma 7. The number seen or treated by family physician: Vision 38, hearing 20, skin 2, posture 5, speech 3, teeth 354, tonsils 8 and asthma 7. Weekly dental clinics were held at which 55 children were treated, two orthopedic clinics were held at which 12 were treated, two tuberculosis clinics were held and monthly vision clinics were held at which 14 were treated. The health of your children is a major concern of the school at all times.

The school lunch program at the elementary school is still operating in a very satisfactory manner. During the school year 1952-1953 which was the first full year of operation, 32,242 lunches were served to children. Of this number 2,111 were served free or at a reduced rate to children of needy families. Noon lunch was served on 167 school days with an average of 193 pupil lunches each day. The Littleton Parent Teachers Association contributed generously to this program last year with a donation of nearly \$250.00 for lunches for needy children.

We were most unfortunate this year to lose the services of Vernon G. West as custodian of the Littleton High School. Mr. West served the Littleton School District faithfully for a period of thirty-three years. As a result of his untiring efforts the properties under his care were kept in excellent condition. We extend our best wishes to him and hope that he will now find time during his retirement to do some of those things that he enjoys doing but because of the confinement and pressure of his work he could not enjoy to the fullest.

Your superintendent is greatly concerned over the rapid rise in enrollment in the elementary school. In September of this year the enrollment in the first six grades was 350. On February 1 of this year the enrollment is 367. If we are to expect more families to move into Littleton in the next few months because of the several construction projects to be carried on in the town, the present facilities will be inadequate. One solution to the problem would be to open the Kilburn building for one or more classes. If such were the case it would be necessary to provide funds for one or more teachers and additional funds for fuel and janitor service. An alternative is to discontinue the operation of the kindergarten for several years. Should the increase in population continue after the construction projects are completed. I foresee the possibility of adding the two classrooms to the present elementary school that were eliminated from the original plans.

The teacher situation, that many of the educators thought might be normal by this time, becomes more acute each year. More qualified teachers are leaving the profession than are entering it each year. The problem of obtaining and holding good teachers is the most serious problem of the school administrator. Every effort is being made to keep your schools well staffed at all times.

In behalf of the school district, I wish to take this opportunity to thank the park commissioners, the precinct commissioners, selectmen and the Water & Light Department for the many services rendered throughout the year. I would like to publicly express appreciation to Mr. Trevor Mooney for his help in supervising all the work on the elementary school lawn. Mr. Mooney gave many hours of his time to this project at no cost to the district. I would also like to thank the Littleton Garden Club for the plantings of shrubbery that it so generously provided for the elementary school grounds. Such acts of friendship add much to the joy of working for and in the community.

In closing, I wish to express my personal appreciation to the teaching staff, the school board and other school district personnel and to the citizens of Littleton for their cooperation and support.

CURRICULUM

In order to insure a maximum efficiency we have tried to place people of similar interests, abilities and needs together wherever possible. This has improved our instruction considerably. We have a class in Problems of American Democracy required of all seniors. We feel that this course will help considerably in giving our graduates a better knowledge of the world situation and the problems they face.

RECREATION

The recreation program, under the direction of Mr. Arthur Chartier, a graduate of Boston University, has continued to make progress. This program reaches a very large percentage of our pupils and its effects are far reaching. Mr. Chartier has given a tremendous amount of time both in the community as well as in the schools.

GUIDANCE

Our guidance program includes a battery of five tests administered by the University of New Hampshire Testing Service each year to the pupils of Grades IX and XI. The battery consists of the California Occupational Interest Inventory Test, a test of Primary Mental Ability, the Differential Aptitude Test of Clerical Speed and Accuracy, the Differential Aptitude Test of Mechanical Reasoning and the Cooperative Reading Comprehension Test. The California Test of Mental Maturity for Grade VII is administered each year. These tests provide a basis for further counseling and help to make our program effective. A follow-up and placement service is also a part of the program. Each year in May the California Achievement Test of Basic Skills is administered to Grades VII and VIII.

MUSIC

The music program under the able direction of Mrs. Cushing for vocal music, and Mr. McLure for instrumental music and band has made excellent progress this year. Numerous public appearances, plus attractive uniforms, have received very favorable comment.

THE TEACHING STAFF

We are pleased to report that the teaching staff here at Littleton compares very favorably with any of its size in the state and has cooperated with the administration very well.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Our school offers a full program of extra curricular activities which include music, vocal and instrumental, dramatics, athletics, socials, parties, dances, and the school publication, "The Record" which is representative of our school and which we are making every effort to improve each year. An active sports program is conducted by Mr. Chartier every Saturday and after school whenever possible for sports in season.

SERVICES TO THE COMMUNITY

We are pleased to report that the traditions of cooperating with our community established in the school is reflected in many worthwhile activities and services.

CONCLUSION

It has been a pleasure for me to work with you, Mrs. Howland, the teaching staff, the school board and the people of Littleton. Your cooperation with our efforts and your interest in and support of our school is sincerely appreciated.

LITTLETON SCHOOL DISTRICT

Report of special committee appointed to inquire into the advisability of district owned busses.

At the regular Littleton School District meeting held Saturday, March 14, 1953 it was voted to have the moderator appoint a committee to look into the advisability of district owned busses. The committee appointed by the moderator to act on the motion adopted at the meeting consists of Joseph C. Duranty, Clarence Allard, Allan Downing, Dr. Stephen Eaton and Trevor Mooney.

At the first meeting a questionnaire relative to school transportation in the state was prepared to be sent to the various school superintendents in the state. The results of this questionnaire revealed that 17 school districts out of 235 owned their own busses.

It was further found that the capacity of the busses varied from 32-60 pupils. The cost of busses varied from a low of \$3,700.00 to \$7,200.00. Janitors and teachers were used for the most part as drivers. The cost per mile varied from a low of 20c per mile to a high of 38c per mile. Littleton's cost at the present time is 28c per mile. A survey of costs for transporting athletic teams revealed that in the northern section of the state the cost varied from 40c to 50c per mile. Littleton's charge for transportation of athletic teams is 50c per mile. After studying the results of the questionnaire, the committee requested more detailed reports from districts the size of Littleton that operated their own busses.

Information from some of these districts was confusing because in certain cases cost data on the busses was not available. In several cases no garage rent was charged. In one case no depreciation was charged. In several cases repairs were completed at no cost to the

district by the town mechanic who did work on town trucks. Some districts stated that their experience with district owned buses was limited to such a short time that no valid figures could be submitted.

One member of the committee attended the New Hampshire School Transportation Conference, sponsored by the New Hampshire State Department of Education in Concord on November 21, 1953. This conference touched on the administration of a school transportation program and school bus standards and road operation. No recommendations relative to the advisability of district ownership came from the meeting. It was brought out that local conditions would be the determining factor in many cases.

The committee arrived at the following conclusions:


- 1. It is doubtful that the district can operate school busses cheaper than it can purchase transportation of the type we now have.
- 2. As the mileage requirements of a school district bus increase, the cost per mile for operation decreases.
- 3. Such variable factors as the availability of good drivers, costs of housing, costs of repairs and cost of liability insurance affect materially the cost and efficiency of such a program.

Recommendation:

The committee feels that it is not advisable for the school district to own and operate its own school buses at this time.
