GRAVE FOREST SITUATION FOLLOWS SEPTEMBER HURRICANE

Woodland problems of timber salvage and fire control created in many towns by the September hurricane are of the greatest importance. **GOOD CITIZENSHIP CALLS FOR PERSONAL AND WIDESPREAD ACTION!**

The salvage of every thousand feet of logs which can be sold means money for landowners, wages for workers, employment for trucks, teams and machinery, as well as reduced forest fire hazard for all. If owners of wind thrown timber have not yet acted, they should communicate with those who can help. TOWN CHAIRMEN are fully informed; STATE ADVISORY AGENTS can help to start

logging by suggesting names of operators and giving other useful advice; FEDERAL AGENCIES are increasing the number of log storage places as rapidly as possible. **INDIVIDUALS MUST NOW COOPERATE!**

Forest fire danger for several years will be greater than usual. So much work must be done by public agencies to reduce hazard along roadsides, near improved and other exposed areas that many places will remain hazardous for some time to come. **INDIVIDUAL LANDOWNERS MUST TAKE A PERSONAL INTEREST!** Aid in clean-up work through the Agricultural Conservation Program is available to any woodland owner at \$4.00 per acre on areas up to 15 acres. The County Agent should be consulted.

Support your local Forest Fire Wardens and Deputies. They are planning, with State and Federal agencies, an intensive campaign to control fires. Help them by strict observance of the fire laws. Kindle no open fires without a permit from the Warden except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooperate by reporting fires you may see and in other ways. Fire fighting tool supplies are inadequate and should be reasonably increased by many towns. **YOU CAN HELP, AND IT WILL PAY, TO PREVENT FOREST FIRES!**

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

Town of Madbury

March 14, 1939

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:—

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March, A. D., 1939 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

- ART. 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year
- ART. 2. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.
- ART. 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To choose two Auditors for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.
- ART. 7. To choose a Road Agent for one year under direct supervision of the Selectmen.

- ART. 8. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- ART. 10. To see what action the town will take as to acceptance of state aid for road construction:—
 To vote to raise \$546.00 to be matched by \$1,092.00 by the State for State Aid Road or,

 To vote to raise \$247.98 to be matched by \$991.91 by the State for Class V Roads.
- ART. 11. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$30.00.
- ART. 12. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.
- ART. 13. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS IN MADBURY, N. H.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF MADBURY:

This is my 10th annual report. The statistics are for the school year ending June 30, 1938.

From the comparative statistics you will note a slight falling off in the total enrollment. The number attending Dover High School is the same this year as last, 14.

The attendance has been very good with no epidemics. We have a truant officer to comply with the Law but I doubt if the pupils even know his name. The number of tardy marks last year was more than doubled, spoiling a fine record of the year before.

Miss Beatrice Gerrish was released to Durham and Mrs. Mabel Thomas of Dover succeeded her at the Center School. The building here has been much improved by having the ceiling insulated and an automatic stoker installed. The stoker is proving very satisfactory. Thanks are due to Colonel Edward Putney, who loaned the stoker to the School District, helped install it, and also directed the insulation at small expense to the School District. The matter of supplying drinking water to both schools is still a problem that has to be solved by the pupils acting as carriers.

Miss Macdonald continues as our efficient school nurse. She will again hold a Dental Clinic. Parents have given her, as well as the teachers, splendid cooperation.

As I write these words, the pupils are taking the Metropolitan Achievement Tests, given at the middle of the year Union No. 56. Last year the standing of the Madbury schools was very creditable. In June the eighth grade pu-

pils will be given the Standard Graduation tests to help us to determine the fitness of our graduates to do high school work.

I recommend the screening of the Center School next summer, since the screening of the North School has improved conditions there. Any spare money could be spent to advantage on both school yards but I am not advocating the expenditure of very much money, as the time must soon come when the schools of Madbury should be consolidated as are those of Durham, Rollinsford and Barrington.

Our thanks are given to the School Board for continued support of superintendent and teachers.
