SPECIAL TOWN MEETING
TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newington in said State qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Newington Civic Center in said Town at 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday evening, July 21 next, to act on the following subject:

To see if the Town will amend the Zoning Ordinances of the Town of Newington adopted March 11, 1952 as amended, by adding to the area classified as the Industrial District, in Article VII the following:

“Also that parcel of land lying southerly of Patterson Lane bounded as follows:

Beginning at a point on the Piscataqua River at the northerly boundary of land of Huntress; thence running southwesterly by land of Huntress about 1,192 feet to land of the Cohen Estate; thence turning and running North 31 degrees 43' West by a stone wall by land of the Cohen Estate 253.8 feet; thence turning and running northeasterly by a stone wall and land of one Coleman 280 feet; thence turning and running northwesterly by land of Coleman 352 feet; thence turning and running southwesterly by a stone wall and land of Coleman 1,492 feet; thence turning and running north 31 degrees 41' west by land of Cohen Estate 316.9 feet to a corner; thence turning and running north-easterly by land of Cohen Estate and land of George Beals to a corner; thence turning and running north-westerly by land of George Beals 451 feet to Pattersons Lane; thence turning and running northeasterly by

Pattersons Lane 102 feet; thence turning and running southeasterly by land of Bernard McCabe 160 feet; thence turning and running northeasterly by land of McCabe 100 feet; thence turning and running southeasterly by land of Yeaton 291.5 feet; thence turning and running northeasterly by other land of Yeaton, land of Sherman Spinney, land of Labrie and by a line drawn parallel to Pattersons Lane and distant 400 feet southerly therefrom to the Piscataqua River; thence turning and running southerly by the Piscataqua River to the point of beginning.”

RESULTS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

July 21, 1959

A Special Town Meeting was held on Tuesday, July 21, 1959, at the Newington Civic Center at eight o'clock in the evening, to vote on a petition of Bernard P. McCabe and a petition of the Gulf Oil Company to rezone a portion of their land. New England Tank Industries, Inc. has option to purchase the land referred to in the petitions.

The area in the petition consists of approximately thirty acres of land located Four Hundred feet (400) southerly of Pattersons Lane and runs from a point westerly of the McCabe Shoe Building to the Piscataqua River. There is an entrance with a frontage of One Hundred Two (102) feet on the southerly side of Patterson Lane adjacent to and including the McCabe Building. At the request of the Planning Board, the New England Tank Industries, Inc. (By Mr. Eliot W. Deneault, Sr. and Mr. Denault, Jr.) agreed to a buffer zone of 400 ft. wide between the southerly side of Patterson Lane and the area of their operations, so that they would be a long distance from the residential property and would not interfere with it.

The loading platform will be located adjacent to the present McCabe Shoe Building.

The voters at this special Town Meeting voted to grant the request subject to New England Tank Industries letter to the Voters and signed by Mr. Eliot W. Deneault, after which it was voted to adjourn.

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newington in the County of Rockingham and said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Newington Civic Center in said Town on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next at Ten o'clock (a.m.), to act upon the following subjects:

The polls will be open at Ten o'clock (a.m.) and unless extended by vote of the meeting, will close at six o'clock, p.m.

1. To choose in the manner provided by law, one selectman to hold office for three years; a Town Clerk; Overseer of the poor; Town treasurer; Highway agent; Collector of taxes; Superintendent of the Water Works; one Library trustee to hold office for the next three years; one Trustee of Trust funds to hold office for three years; Chief of Police.

2. To choose measurers of wood; surveyors of lumber, fence viewers; a pound keeper; constables and all other necessary town officers.

3. To see what action the Town will take for care and maintenance of Town land and buildings.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, or dispose of any real estate acquired or to be acquired by the Town through tax collectors deeds.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money on the credit of the Town in

anticipation of taxes, at a rate not to exceed the current bank rate.

6. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act thereon.

7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,300.00 as provided in the budget to be added to Newington share of the Town Road Aid fund in the amount of \$921.53 making a total of \$5,221.53 to be used as a joint fund for the purpose of improving Town Roads, in the manner and under the conditions noted below :

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all other expenditures for the year ensuing, as included in the budget.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (500.00) as included in the budget, for the purpose of having the Planning Board conduct a title search and survey of Town landing at the foot of Patterson Lane.

10. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Committee to compile a Police ordinance.

11. To hear the report of the Planning Board of its study and recommendations of Cemetery costs and administrative practice as requested and voted at last years meeting.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to execute the lease by and between the Town of Newington and the United States of America of approximately 21 acres of land as more particularly shown in said lease (under such terms, conditions and provisions as the Selectmen believe to be for the best interest of the Town.)

13. To see if the Town of Newington will vote to create a Licensing Board to consist of the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, the Town Clerk, and the Active Head of the Police Department, which board shall have delegated powers to investigate and decide the question of granting licenses under this article and it may grant revocable blanket licenses to fraternal and other like organizations.

Said Licensing Board shall within thirty days of their inception, establish reasonable fees for the issuance of a license for any Theatrical, Parade, Public Dance, Carnival, Circus, or other Public Gathering

whether an admission fee is charged or not, such license fee to be a minimum fee, payable to the Town Clerk.

Record of License: The license shall be recorded in the office of the Town Clerk, who shall be entitled to a fee of fifty cents for each license, to be paid by the person to whom it is granted.

14. REGULATIONS FOR OUTDOOR THEATRES in the TOWN OF NEWINGTON, N. H.

(1) One or more (the number in excess of one to be by agreement between the owner and the Chief of Police) uniformed police officers of the Town of Newington shall be in attendance during all public showings of the theatre, and for such reasonable time before and after as the volume of traffic incoming, outgoing and on the highway indicates as necessary to promote safety.

(2) During intermission, let out time and at such other times as the volume of traffic warrants, an officer or officers shall be stationed at such points at the discretion of the Chief of Police as to effectively regulate the movement of traffic.

(3) At other times during the showing, an officer or officers shall be stationed at such points at the discretion of the Chief of Police as to permit an effective view of the Theatre area, and to permit the officer or officers to be seen periodically by the people in and around the theatre area.

(4) The services of such officer or officers shall be paid by the operator of the theatre, and at such regular rates as apply to all others employing the services of Police Officers of the Town of Newington.

(5) It is the intent of this regulation, to promote Law Order and Safety within the Town, but in such manner of reasonableness and courtesy as to further the proper business interest of the Theatre.

15. Beginning with the annual Town meeting to be held in 1961 and annually thereafter: The Town meeting shall be called to order at 7:00 p.m. and no action shall be taken on either the Town or School District Warrant before that hour. The polls, however, in order to remain open for the number of hours required by law, shall be opened at noon and remain open until the close of the meeting or until all present qualified to vote shall have had the opportunity to cast their ballots.

16. (A) To see if the Town will vote to restrict the sale of Cemetery lots to bona fide residents of Newington only.

(B) To see if the Town will vote to require that the sale of any Cemetery lots or parts thereof, by individual owners of record, shall be only to the Town of Newington and at the price originally paid for them.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell forthwith and convey by deed with quitclaim covenants to the Newington School District for the sum of One Dollar, approximately two acres of land according to the plans submitted to the Selectmen by the School Building Committee.

18. To hear the report of the Town Clerk on the results of the election of Town Officers.

19. To transact such other business as may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE LANGDON FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

Hours: Wednesday 12 - 5

Saturday 1 - 4

Have you visited your Library recently? It is a pleasant place to come on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons. There are books for children and adults as well as a variety of magazines. This year about 300 titles have been added. We are always glad to consider suggestions for books that would help you in your work, in school, or for pleasure reading. Would you be interested in books on how to build a boat, quantity cookery recipes, on the presidential candidates, on New England or New Hampshire history, on the care of house plants, on early American homes, on hobbies, on teen-age problems? Have any of you become interested in the annual Congregational Church Reading List? We could supply the books. If we do not have the book you want we can get it from other larger libraries. Make the library a part of your living.

The Bookmobile from the State Library continued to supplement our own book collection. There is a constantly changing group of about 100 books from that source. Books from the State Library have also been available at the church for the residents of South Newington, at the home of Mrs. George Garland.

During the school year we had occasional film programs for the children using free films provided by the State Library. The school children have been our most enthusiastic patrons and it has been a joy to serve them. We will make every effort to give them complete library service even though the school will no longer be nearby.

For the sixth consecutive year the library has sponsored a series of speakers during the summer. Our program for 1959 included Alice Watson Kramer, Joseph Frost, Wallace Pickering Hale, Dr. Norman Meinkoth, Miss Toni Jean Mormando, Frederick Pickering, Dr. John N. Feaster, and Wild Life films shown by William LaBonte. These programs were all interesting and worthwhile and everyone is welcome. We have striven for variety, something for everyone's taste, including light music, geology, travel, old documents, and Fred Pickering's always entertaining comments on local history.

In the spring the librarian and trustees attended the meeting of the Vermont-New Hampshire Library Assoc. at Hanover. We were also represented at the N. H. Roadside Improvement Asso. This was the final year of our five year improvement plan on the grounds, and the \$25 received was one of the top awards. As in the previous years the money was spent directly on the grounds.

We were most fortunate in having Mrs. Pauline Knox Swasey as the librarian for the summer. Mrs. Swasey was formerly librarian of this library, and has had more recent experience in Lake Wales, Florida where she is presently assistant.

The townspeople have reason to be proud of the collection of books as well as the general appearance and condition of the library building and grounds. The town, encouraged by Mr. Langdon, built a substantial library to start with and it has been kept in good repair. Among recent improvements is a book return box located at the rear door. This has been installed for your convenience to use at times when the library is not open. Mr. Warren Witham kindly planted the at-

tractive urn in front of the library. Considerable investigation and thought has been devoted to improved lighting and we hope that it will be accomplished soon.

Joe Archibald, a native of Newington, presented the library where he "spent many happy hours as a boy" with two autographed copies of books he has written for boys. We are especially pleased to be so remembered by a home town author. Also presented to the library by the Beane family was a beautifully illustrated book "India in Colour" in memory of Mrs. R. Clyde Margeson. We are always happy to assist in choosing memorial books.

REPORT OF POLICE DEPARTMENT FOR 1959

The Newington Police Department wishes to report to the Taxpayers of the Town of Newington of their activities for the year of 1959.

This department has answered a total of 209 calls in the Town and travelled a total of 10,074 miles and worked a total of 1,015 hours for Policing the Town of Newington.

We have given out a total of 86 Warnings for Motor Vehicle Violations and for persons hunting in the Town of Newington. We have answered 56 calls for Accidents in the Town, we have investigated 10 calls for Breaking and Entering in the nighttime, and have been able to bring to the courts 4 subjects for that offense.

We have been called upon to try and locate 3 missing children in the Town of Newington. We have had in the courts at Portsmouth 18 for Motor Vehicle Violations, 2 for unregistered cars, 1 operating without a license, 3 travelling north on the south bound lane, 1 minor with beer in the car and had been drinking, 2 for speed, 1 careless operation of a motor vehicle, 3 taking a car without the owner's permission, 1 for failing to yield the right of way onto the Spaulding Turnpike, 1 for assault on another person, 1 stop sign violation, 2 for yellow line violations.

We have answered 14 Ambulance calls and travelled a total of over 600 miles at no charge to the Town or the persons taken to the Hospital or from the Hospital to their home. This has been a service that has been given to all Townspeople.

We have received from the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles our 6th consecutive Motor Vehicle Citation for having passed on January First 2,241 days since our last Motor Vehicle accident that was a fatal.

We have not increased our Budget for the year of 1960 and hope that the Townspeople will see fit to pass this for the year.

We wish to thank the people of the Town for their help in the past year and hope that it can continue.

I wish to thank all the members of the Police Department for their unselfish work and the outstanding job well done during the year of 1959.

NEWINGTON VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The year 1959 was the second year of operation of the Newington Volunteer Fire Department under Town ownership. During this year the Department has been called upon to answer 118 emergency calls. Four of these were out-of-town fires, answered in response to a call received from the headquarters of the inter-state emergency unit, which is the Central Fire Station in Portsmouth, N. H. The inter-state emergency unit is composed of 33 fire departments in the surrounding areas. If we have a fire in Newington and need help, all that the officer in charge at the fire has to do is make one call to the fire station in Portsmouth, telling what is needed in Newington, and they will automatically dispatch what is required without any additional calls.

The department has a membership of 32 men, divided into three companies, with company officers elected by the men of the respective company. We have Company No. 1, which handles the 800-gallon tank truck; the Captain is Robert LaBonte and Lieutenant is Walter Pickering, Jr. Company 2 handles the Ford 400-gallon truck; Captain Ernest Thompson, Lieutenant Richard Spinney. Company No. 3 handles the new 750-gallon pumper; Captain Ernest Kaddy, Lieutenant Guy Hayward. The Assistant Chief of the Fire Department is Harry Estey. The men make up the backbone of the department. We have a very efficient group of firemen and they have an excellent standing in the State when it comes to fighting fires. We were highly complimented by the State Board of Fire Underwriters on the progress made since we organized—they recently gave us a final inspection and confirmed the rates they had set up with the Town of Newington. The State Fire Marshall's office has complimented the department and the men on

the fine job they have done, and I wish to take this opportunity to thank the men personally for the excellent work they have performed.

Our apparatus has been maintained in A-1 condition; all the trucks have been checked very frequently, taken out and run on the highways for proper operation, and the pumps have been tested frequently by the firemen during their training programs. The equipment on the trucks is in very good shape, with the exception of the booster hose on one truck, for which we have requested a replacement from the Budget Committee, and also some of our 1½" hose needs replacing. We have also requested money for this through the Budget Committee. Our radios have to be put on the narrow band this coming year by the first of August, according to FCC rulings. This means an expenditure of \$800. This item has been presented to the Budget Committee and approved by them, as have all of the previous items. The Fire Department has presented the following budget, which has been approved by the Budget Committee:

I recommend that this money be appropriated and passed by the townspeople, as it is needed for the efficient operation of the department.

The Fire Department has conducted an inspection program and a training program for the personnel dur-

ing the past year. These will be expanded during the coming year. The department also took part in a fire prevention program and is cooperating with Civil Defense officials in any tests or programs which might be set up in a test alert or real alert that might take place.

Th alarm system is tested each Saturday at noon. The Fire Department telephone number is GENEVA 6-5737. THIS NUMBER IS TO BE USED ONLY FOR REPORTING A FIRE.

BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT ON NEW SCHOOL

The Building Committee of the Newington Elementary School appreciate this opportunity to report to the people of the Town on the progress of the development of the new school.

A Committee consisting of Ralph N. Sawyer, Chairman; David Russell, Clerk; Hervey Thomas, Ann Hislop, Pearl Hoyt, Wm. Young, Granville Knox, John Mazeau and John Holden was designated to represent the Town in the construction of an Elementary School.

Subsequent to a vote by the Town and the appropriation of \$128,000.00 the Committee entered into contract with S. E. LaPerle & Sons of Exeter, N. H. in the sum of \$104,068.00 for the construction of the building, and with R. G. Sweatt Construction Co. of Dover N. H. in the sum of \$12,991.00 for the site preparation and grading and landscaping of the grounds.

Construction was started in June under the supervision of the architectural firm of Irving W. Hersey Associates of Durham, N. H. who had previously been employed as the Committee's architect.

Perhaps a brief description of the building would be desirable at this time to acquaint those who are not familiar with it, to get an idea of what we have been doing. Basically the building consists of three class rooms, a 40 ft. by 60 ft. Activity room, Administration room, Nurses and Teacher's room, Janitor's storage, Kitchen with Storage room, Activity room storage, School Supply storage and Toilet facilities, all accessible from a central corridor and two entrances. In addition is the boiler and incinerator room, the entrance to which is by its own outside door. The building has a fire alarm system, ventilating unit, 6 point controlled hot water heating system which is large enough to allow for the addi-

tion of extra class rooms if the need arises. The building is as nearly fire proof as is possible to construct enabling the procurement of a very favorable fire insurance rate. The building is constructed of a cinder block wall with brick veneer, steel supported roof of poured Gypsum covered with tar and gravel.

Work has progressed with a minimum of lost time. The steel situation caused some anxiety at one time but the problem was resolved without any serious delay. Furniture and furnishings have been purchased and await only the completion of the building for their delivery. At the time of this report, the construction is better than 90% complete and by early April should be ready to transfer to the School Committee.

The only item left to be completed and not included in the construction contract is the paving of the walks and drives, familiar to you as "Hot Topping", and that has been included in the Budget for your consideration at the regular Town Meeting.

Co-operation within the Committee has been very gratifying as well as with the architect and the contractors and I wish to extend a personal thank you to Mr. Brunelle, the Superintendent of Schools for his valuable assistance and counsel and to Mrs. Virginia Rowe who has been our stenographer at the meetings of the Committee as well as any and all others who have been of assistance to us in bringing the completion of this project.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note.

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple—

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.

2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.

3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles — use your ash tray.

5. Don't burn at home. Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Newington qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Civic Center in said district on the 8th day of March 1960, at 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state Foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the Federal Works Agency, or other U. S. Government or State Agencies.

10. To see if the district will vote to accept the services of a helping teacher for Supervisory Union No. 56, as recommended by the Supervisory Union Board in accordance with RSA 186:11, XXIII, as amended by Laws of 1957, 252:1, and RSA 189:44 and 47.

11. To see if the district will authorize the school board to dispose of at public auction any articles, belonging to the school district, that will be of no use to the district in the new building.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

1959-60

The Newington School Board has had a busy and eventful year in its dual attendance at School Board meetings and at School Building Committee meetings, both regular and special. It has been most fortunate in the faithful attendance at all such meetings of Superintendent of Union 56, Robert Brunelle, whose patience and good judgment has been of incalculable assistance to the policy making deliberations of both bodies. His attention to administration detail has made the tasks of the School Board easier and his continuous advice, whenever requested, has speeded the planning of our new school. The Board is grateful for his competent help.

The Board effected a change in transportation facilities this year. After much discussion and the careful consideration of three independent bids, a transportation contract for three years was awarded to Walter Pickering, Jr. The decision has proved a fortunate one. The schedule has been maintained almost to the minute and there has been less criticism of the bus transportation of our children this year than ever before in the experience of present Board members. The Board wishes to congratulate Mr. and Mrs. Pickering upon a job well done.

The Board is most appreciative of the fine service of our teaching-Principal, Merle Eggert, and of our teachers, Mrs. Margaret Pickering and Mrs. Evelyn Salisbury. Mr. Eggert has performed his dual duties as administrative head of our school and as teacher of the combined fifth and sixth grades with diligence and skill. Mrs. Pickering has continued her excellent instruction of the first and second grades, so crucial to the fu-

ture success of our students. Mrs. Salisbury, as teacher of the third and fourth grades, has ably expanded the curriculum of her students. We are fortunate to have such a proficient teaching staff for our children.

Mrs. Marjorie Moore, our school nurse, has cherished the physical welfare of our children with regular examinations of eyesight, hearing and instruction in good health habits. She has been helpful in planning for adequate nursing facilities in the new school. Her genuine and enthusiastic interest in our students is appreciated. It has contributed much toward the general good health maintained in the school.

Mr. Richard Spinney has continued his custodial service to the school this year. The Board is grateful for his faithful attention to the upkeep of the building.

Music, recreational activities, and sports have been handled entirely by the staff this year. Several enjoyable and educational field trips were arranged by Mr. Eggert for various groups of the students to further their appreciation of their cultural heritage and to foster their interest in science. With the help of Federal funds provided by the National Defense Act, a combination science table was purchased, portable and well equipped, to introduce various branches of science to different age levels.

With the advice and help of the School District Treasurer, Leavitt Moulton, the Board arranged to borrow \$54,752.00, the sum necessary over and above the \$73,248.00 awarded the School District by the Federal Government, to erect and equip the new elementary school. This money was borrowed from the First National Bank. All sums were advantageously deposited in several banks to earn interest until needed to pay construction costs. The Board is indebted to Mr. Moulton for his expert advice and assistance in all financial arrangements. Walter Calderwood, School District attorney, was

also very helpful on many occasions during the year, whenever the Board felt a need for his legal advice. His interest, courtesy and competence were greatly appreciated.

(A detailed report of the Building Committee will be given by its chairman, Ralph Sawyer, elsewhere.) The Board was a part of this Committee and responsible for the construction payments. Special regard is accorded by Board members, Anne H. Hislop and Pearl G. Hoyt, to William Young, whose presence on this Committee and on the Budget Committee were of invaluable help both in long range planning and day to day inspection of all construction work on the school.

The Town should be justifiably proud of the fine new school building which should be ready for occupancy by Town Meeting time. The Building Committee has been untiring in its efforts to make the school as complete, functional and economical as possible. Board members made a number of field trips to inspect other school buildings and furnishings, to insure that they could make wise choices for durability, efficiency and economy.

The School Board meets, in open meetings, on the third Friday of each month at 7:30 P.M. at the School House. Parents and citizens are cordially invited to attend at any time.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Newington:

A great deal has taken place within the last year. A Building Committee has been meeting at least once a month for a good part of the year. Additional meetings have been held with the citizens in order that funds be voted for the new school. This school is now virtually complete, and is an accomplishment of which the entire community can be proud.

The School Staff:—We have been fortunate in that the staff has remained static for this year. Mr. Merle Eggert, the Principal, has continued to perform his duties in an exemplary manner. Mrs. Evelyn L. Salisbury continues as the third and fourth grade teacher. She has made some definite contributions to the school particularly in the area of Arts and Crafts. Mrs. Margaret Pickering, the first and second grade teacher, is a valuable asset. She is a fine teacher, and in addition is an invaluable aid to the other staff members because of her knowledge of the community.

The teachers are a team in the school. Newington is fortunate to have the above mentioned people working with their youngsters.

The Curriculum—Fundamentals are the first order of business. The student must have a good grounding in reading, writing, and arithmetic before he or she is able to go into any specific subject. This year we have concentrated on arithmetic with the emphasis being placed on understanding the number system rather than a rote learning of certain processes. As I wrote in my report last year “we do have a good school in Newington”.

Budget—Increasing costs, increased teacher salaries, and the additional cost of operating and maintaining a

larger building are all reasons why the budget is higher this year. In addition we must begin to pay for the new building in the next fiscal year.

1. Teacher salaries—we must maintain salaries at a level that will attract and retain competent personnel.

2. Operation of the school—heat cost will be higher, electricity will go up, janitor supplies will be required in larger quantity.

3. Janitors—we will require a man on duty at least five hours a day to clean and maintain the building and grounds, in addition this man will be required to be present whenever the building is used after school hours.

4. A major expenditure must be carried this year relative to having hot top applied to the walks and drive areas around the new school.

5. Payment of principal and interest.

The future looks bright for education in Newington. You have a modern school plant that will serve the youth and the people for many years. We have been able to hold our teaching staff intact; we are willing to pay what is necessary to obtain good teachers. We have been able to continue improving our text books through the replacement of books that are out of date, and through a replacement of books that are simply worn out. A music teacher will work at the school one half day each week next year; this will be possible due to a cooperative plan whereby a music teacher will work part time in all four school districts that make up Supervisory Union No. 56. Ceramics and work with clay is another area which we will add to the curriculum in a further attempt to broaden the experiences of the students.

The Supervisory Union Board has recommended the addition of a Helping Teacher to the Superintendent's

office. This person will work with teachers, students, and parents to improve the curriculum and the teaching in the school. Your Superintendent is so bogged down with building plans, finances, and just plain paper work that he does not have the time to supervise teachers. The Helping Teacher will fill this void.

I want to commend the Teachers, the Parent Teachers Association, and School Transporter for their help and cooperation this year. The Building Committee deserves praise for the work they have carried through this year which has resulted in a fine school building.

In closing I wish to thank the School Board for their wholehearted support and cooperation during the past year. The devotion of the Board to their work is a credit to our way of life.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE-TEACHER

To the Superintendent of the School District School Board and Citizens of Newington:

Once again it is my pleasure to submit to you an annual summary of our Health Program which was effective from September 1958 through June 1959.

Following are the approximate statistics which may interest you.

I visited your school twice a month and during this time I tested the vision and hearing of each child at least once, weighed and measured each one approximately 3 times and inspected them either individually or as a classroom often. We also administered the TB Patch Test for the first time in several years.

In order to supplement the Health Education in your

school, and with the helpful aid of your principal and teachers, I showed a movie called "How to Catch a Cold", showed a filmstrip and talked on "Germs and Health", as well as "How to Brush Your Teeth", "Care and Function of the Ears" and finally on "First Aid and Safety" as your child should practice it during the summer.

It may also interest you to know a school nurse is required to earn 6 college credits every 5 years. I have now completed this requirement by taking courses on "Principles of School Nursing, Speaking and Listening" and "Conservation of Vision". I know these have already helped me be more efficient in my work and will continue to do so.

I sincerely enjoy being a part of your school staff and working with your ever alert and understanding Superintendent, Principal and Teachers as well as each and every one of you as interested and cooperative citizens of Newington.
