We have examined the combined financial statements of the Town of North Hampton, New Hampshire, as of and for the year ended December 31, 1987. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described more fully in Note 1, the combined financial statements referred to above, do not include property, plant or equipment assets balances and corresponding depreciation accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that the omission of the accounts described above results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the receding paragraph, the combined financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of North Hampton, New Hampshire, at December 31, 1987, and the results of its operations and changes in financial position of its proprietary fund types for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT TO THE TOWN

1987—the year of the tax increase. That is the sad lesson we have learned this past year. The new “rateables” did not come in as fast as the expenses went up. Water lines, fire trucks, and school renovations are needed, but they must be coordinated in a more suitable way than in the near past. The Selectmen and the School Board are no longer able to act as autonomous boards, but must be more aware of the needs of the other. We have taken steps to ensure this will be the case in the future.

Traffic continues to increase significantly along US-1 and now averages 19,000 cars a day. The new traffic lights will help, but they may need some fine tuning.

Household rubbish (now called solid waste) has been an educational, if time consuming, item this past year. The cooperation and ingenuity of our Highway Department working with the vendors has enabled us to continue our rubbish pick up on several occasions when there appeared to be a crisis and nowhere to go with the rubbish.

The Town, working with the so called “Super District” (of Waste Disposal) is working on a solution to this entire solid waste problem. The determined efforts of our representatives (Henry Mixter and David Raymond) are much appreciated.

Once again the Selectmen want to express their thanks and appreciation to all the volunteers who serve on the various Boards and Committees. Their time and effort go a long way in preserving the quality of life we have in North Hampton. A very sincere “thank you” to each of you.

Lastly—going on the theory that no news is good news, we have heard very little from the State on the Coakley Land Fill situation.

MATTERS OF GENERAL INTEREST

TO CALL POLICE—772-4716

This gives you the Rockingham Sheriff's Office which is in radio communication with our police cruisers 24 hrs. a day. To call the North Hampton Police office (open from 8:00 a.m.-12:00 and 12:30 to 4:00 p.m.) on other than emergency business, please call 964-8621.

TO CALL THE FIRE DEPARTMENT OR TO CALL THE AMBULANCE—964-8282

This gives you our fire Department, which is manned 24 hrs. a day, and which also dispatches our ambulance. To call the Department on other than emergency business, please call 964-5500.

OFFICE HOURS for the Selectmen's Office, the Town Clerk's Office, the Tax Collector's Office, and the Building Inspector's Office are posted on the front door of the Town Office Building. Currently they are as listed below.

POSTING OF NOTICES for meetings of the Zoning Board of Adjustment, the Planning Board, the Budget Committee, the Conservation Commission, and like organizations are normally posted inside the front door of the Town Office Building. When required, they may also appear in a local newspaper as for instance the Hampton Union or the Portsmouth Herald.

SELECTMEN'S MEETINGS are held the second and fourth Monday evening of each month, commencing at 7:30 p.m. All meetings are open to the public and public participation is welcomed. If a person wishes to address a specific problem they are urged to contact the Administrative Assistant before 3:00 p.m. by calling 964-8087, so that they may be placed on the agenda. The reason for this is that the heads of Departments normally make their reports first at the Selectmen's meetings, and this system saves time waiting.

VETERAN'S EXEMPTION FORMS (RSA 72:28)

Veterans who request these are required by law to fill out Form A-2, (a green sheet), listing their war record. This need only be done once.

ELDERLY EXEMPTIONS (RSA 72:43)

There are certain qualifications applicable and it is suggested that one contact the Administrative Assistant.

MATTERS OF GENERAL INTEREST Continued

SOLAR EXEMPTIONS (RSA 72:61) require the filing of the green form mentioned above.

WIND EXEMPTION

No exemption is allowed.

CURRENT USE

These Forms must be completed and filed by april 15th of a given year and need not be re-filed. They apply until the *land use* is changed, when a tax is assessed.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the School Building on Atlantic Avenue, in said North Hampton on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, 1987, at 10 a.m. in the morning, business meeting to begin at 7:30 p.m., polls to close at 7:30 p.m. and to reopen at the close of the business meeting, remaining open until all who wish to have voted; to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE I. To choose one Selectman for a term of three years, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes and all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing years.

ARTICLE II. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE III. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen or a majority of them to sell and convey the real property acquired by the Town by tax sale, any such sale to be at public auction to the highest bidder.

ARTICLE IV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year pursuant to New Hampshire Revised Statutes annotated Chapter 31: Section 95-b.

ARTICLE V. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the Town Officers.

ARTICLE VI. (ON THE OFFICIAL BALLOT) ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF THE ADOPTION OF THE AMENDMENT AS PROPOSED BY THE PLANNING BOARD FOR THE TOWN ZONING ORDINANCE, AS FOLLOWS:

To see if the Town will vote to amend SECTION 406 (Yard and Lot Requirements) by the addition of the following:

406.8 Industrial-Business/Residential lots shall include a land-

scaped buffer area around the perimeter of the lot. This area will be a minimum of ten feet wide along the entire property line. This landscaped area may not be used for structure, parking or access except where access is required and approved.

ARTICLE VII. (ON THE OFFICIAL BALLOT) ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF THE ADOPTION OF THE AMENDMENT AS PROPOSED BY THE PLANNING BOARD FOR THE TOWN ZONING ORDINANCE, AS FOLLOWS:

To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 409.3(b) (Permitted Uses in Inland Wetlands Conservation Areas) by deleting Paragraph 9 and substituting the following:

9. Fill involving less than 1000 cubic yards and less than 7500 square feet of surface area with approval of the New Hampshire Wetlands Board.

ARTICLE VIII. (NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to build a new police station and office for the Building Inspector and to demolish the present police station and to make needed repairs to the Town Hall. Further, to see if the Town will approve a bond issue of \$350,000.00 to be amortized over a period of ten years for this said purpose.

ARTICLE IX. (RECOMMENDED BY THE TOWN BUDGET COMMITTEE) Whereas the Town Meeting of 1986 failed to use paper ballots when voting on a bond issue to extend water lines to North Road and Park Circle, to see if the Town will reaffirm the vote to raise \$92,346.00, by a bond issue to be amortized over a five year period, for said purpose.

ARTICLE X. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$16,300.00 for the purchase of a four-wheel drive pick-up truck with snow plow for the Highway Department, and authorize the withdrawal of that amount from Capital Reserve Fund #10 (Highway Department), and authorize the Selectmen to act as agents for the Town in connection with the purpose for which the fund was established in accordance with N.H. RSA Chapter 35, Section 15.

ARTICLE XI. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:1-C which authorizes any Town or City to elect not to assess, levy and collect a residence tax.

ARTICLE XII. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$126,000.00 for the purchase of a pumper fire truck for the Fire Department as authorized by the Special Town Meeting of September 6, 1986, and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$32,686.00, plus any additional accrued interest, from Capital Reserve Fund #5 (Fire Department), established in 1977, and to act as agents for the Town in connection with the purpose for which the fund was established in accordance with NH RSA Chapter 35, Section 15, with the balance of \$93,314.00 to be raised by a bond issue to be amortized over a period of five years. Any monies received by the Town from the sale of the pumper fire truck being retired would be used to reduce the bond issue.

ARTICLE XIII. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint three (3) citizens to serve on a special unpaid committee to be known as a REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL PLANNING COMMITTEE, for the purpose of studying the advisability of establishing a regional refuse disposal district and drawing up a proposed agreement therefor, as authorized by RSA 53-B.

ARTICLE XIV. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$5,600.00) for the purpose of meeting the expenses of the REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL PLANNING COMMITTEE established in Article XIII.

ARTICLE XV. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will vote to discontinue Capital Reserve Fund #3 (Town Buildings) as it is no longer used or needed. The fund, consisting of \$286.85 plus income, shall be returned to the general funds of the Town.

ARTICLE XVI. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) On petition of Dorita Snow and ten (10) or more voters of the Town of North Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Hundred and Twenty Dollars (\$1,120.00) for the purpose of defraying the cost of services provided to the Town and its residents by Seacoast Big Brother/Big Sister of New Hampshire.

ARTICLE XVII. (NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from property tax.

ARTICLE XVIII. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$22,000.00 for the purchase of two new police cruisers, and authorize the withdrawal of \$15,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 and amendments thereto, with the balance of \$7,000.00 to be withdrawn from Capital Reserve Fund #6 (Police Department), and authorize the Selectmen to act as agents for the Town in connection with the purpose for which this fund was established in accordance with N.H. RSA Chapter 35, Section 15.

ARTICLE XIX. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$4,300.00 for the purchase of a lawn mower for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of that amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 and amendments thereto.

ARTICLE XX. On petition of Thomas L. Haggerty and ten (10) or more voters of the Town of North Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radioactive waste from the Seabrook nuclear plant shall be stored or disposed of within this Town of North Hampton unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the Town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot.

ARTICLE XXI. On petition of John T. Bottomley and ten (10) or more voters of the Town of North Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to protect the health and safety of all residents by directing Town public safety officials to ensure that Town emergency plans take into consideration the operation of Seabrook Station, providing that the cost of the plans would be borne by the Seabrook owners through existing agreements with the State of New Hampshire. These plans would be developed regardless of any decision to reduce the official Emergency Planning Zone around Seabrook Station.

ARTICLE XXII. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE XXIII. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

**REPORT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING OF THE
TOWN OF NORTH HAMPTON, N.H.**

March 11, 1987

A meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton qualified to vote in Town affairs was held in the Elementary School in said Town on the 10th day of March, 1987. Notice of the meeting had been duly posted as required by law and the alphabetical list of voters duly subscribed by the Supervisors of the Checklist, had been posted and was available.

The elected Moderator, Paul S. Cuetara, opened the polls at 10:00 AM. It was moved, seconded, and duly voted that the business section of the meeting would be held commencing at 7:30 PM that same evening, and that the polls would remain open through the day and long enough after the business meeting to enable everyone to have an opportunity to vote.

At 7:30 PM on the 10th of March, 1987, the business section of the Annual Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator. He stated his rules for the conduct of said meeting, introduced the individuals seated up front, and proceeded to take up the Town Warrant, Article by Article.

ARTICLE V: To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the Town Officers.

Motion was made by Mr. Robert Carrigg, seconded by Mr. Richard Lynch. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE VI: (on the official ballot) Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance, as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to amend SECTION 406 (Yard and Lot Requirements) by the addition of the following:

406.8 Industrial-Business/Residential lots shall include a landscaped buffer area around the perimeter of the lot. This area will be a minimum of ten feet wide along the entire property line. This landscaped area may not be used for structure, parking or access except where access is required and approved.

ARTICLE VI: 267 yes 85 no

ARTICLE VII: (on the official ballot) Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment as proposed by the planning board for the town zoning ordinance, as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 409.3(b) (Permitted Uses in Inland Wetlands Conservation Areas) by deleting Paragraph 9 and substituting the following:

9. Fill involving less than 1,000 cubic yards and less than 7,500 square feet of surface area with approval of the New Hampshire Wetlands Board.

ARTICLE VII: 216 yes 113 no

ARTICLE VIII: (Not Recommended by the Budget Committee) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to build a new Police Station and office for the Building Inspector and to demolish the present Police Station and to make needed repairs to the Town Hall. Further, to see if the Town will approve a bond issue of \$350,000.00 to be amortized over a period of ten years for this said purpose.

Mr. Robert Carrigg asked to withdraw the Article. It was not approved by the Budget Committee and therefore there would not be sufficient funds to run the Town if passed. Mr. Robert Carrigg MOVED to ask this Town Meeting to direct the Selectmen to investigate the feasibility of calling a special Town Meeting for the purpose of building a Police Station. Motion was SECONDED by Mr. Walter Lermer. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED.

Mr. Peter Simmons stated that the reason the Budget Committee did not recommend the Police Station was that they did not receive enough information and not because they are directly opposed to a new station.

Mr. Kirby asked about the special town meeting; discussion followed. Mr. Knowles asked about remodeling of the current Police Station. Discussion followed.

ARTICLE IX: (Recommended by the Budget Committee) Whereas the Town Meeting of 1986 failed to use paper ballots when voting on a bond issue to extend water lines to North Road and Park Circle, to see if the town will reaffirm the vote to raise \$92,364.00 by a bond issue to be amortized over a five year period, for said purpose.

Motion was made by Mr. Richard Lynch, seconded by Mr. Robert Carrigg. Vote was by ballot—Yes 127, No 25. MOTION CARRIED as written by a 2/3rd majority.

ARTICLE X: (Recommended by the Budget Committee) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$16,300.00 for the purchase of a four-wheel drive pick-up truck with snow plow for the Highway Department, and authorize the withdrawal of that amount from Capital Reserve Fund #10 (Highway Department), and authorize the Selectmen to act as agents for the Town in connection with the purpose for which the fund was established in accordance with N.H. RSA Chapter 35, Section 15.

Motion was made by Mr. Richard Lynch, seconded by Mr. Walter Lermer. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED. No discussion.

ARTICLE XI: (Recommended by the Budget Committee) To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provision of RSA 72:1-C which authorizes any Town or City to elect not to assess, levy and collect a resident tax.

Motion was made by Mr. Richard Lynch, seconded by Mr. Walter Lermer. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED. No discussion.

ARTICLE XII: (Recommended by the Budget Committee) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$126,000.00 for the purchase of a pumper fire truck for the Fire Department as authorized by the Special Town Meeting of September 6, 1986, and authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$32,686.00 plus any additional accrued interest, from Capital Reserve Fund #5 (Fire Department), established in 1977, and to act as agents for the Town in connection with the purpose for which the fund was established in accordance with N.H. RSA Chapter 35, Section 15, with the balance of \$93,314.00 to be raised by a bond issue to be amortized over a period of five years. Any monies received by the Town from the sale of the pumper fire truck being retired would be used to reduce the bond issue.

Motion made by Mr. Walter Lermer, seconded by Mr. Richard Lynch. Vote was by ballot—Yes 151, No 25. MOTION CARRIED as written by a 2/3rd majority.

ARTICLE XIX: (Recommended by the Budget Committee) To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$4,300.00 for the purchase of a lawn mower for the Highway Department and authorize the withdrawal of that amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 and amendments thereto.

Motion was made by Mr. Richard Lynch, seconded by Mr. Walter Lermer. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED.

Mr. Lynch stated that this is a necessary item due to the increased mowing within the town.

ARTICLE XX: On petition of Thomas L. Haggerty and ten (10) or more voters of the Town of North Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to instruct the Town's representatives to the General Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radioactive waste from the Seabrook Nuclear Plant shall be stored or disposed of within this town of North Hampton unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the Town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot.

Motion was made by Mr. Thomas Haggerty and seconded. Mr. Thomas Haggerty explained and spoke in support of this Article.

An amendment was made by Mr. Robinson to include the words "or any other source" after the words Seabrook Nuclear Plant. Vote was by a show of hands. AMENDMENT CARRIED.

An amendment was made by Mrs. Aggie Dowd and seconded to delete the words "the annual" before the words Town Meeting and to replace them with "a." Vote was by a show of hands. AMENDMENT CARRIED.

The Moderator asked for a vote of those in favor of the Article as amended. The vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE XXI: On petition by John T. Bottomley and ten (10) or more voters of the Town of North Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to protect the health and safety of all residents by directing Town public safety officials to ensure that town emergency plans

take into consideration the operation of Seabrook Station, providing that the cost of these plans would be borne by the Seabrook owners through existing agreements with the State of New Hampshire. These plans would be developed regardless of any decision to reduce the official Emergency Planning Zone around Seabrook Station.

Motion was made by Mrs. Patterson and seconded.

Mr. Miller asked about evacuation plans. Discussion followed.

Mr. Joseph Vought commented that emergency plans do not necessarily mean evacuation or just nuclear disasters.

Mr. Mixter spoke about the Article and asked voters to vote against it. Discussion followed.

An amendment was made by Mr. Joseph Vought to delete the words "providing that the cost of these plans would be borne by the Seabrook owners through existing agreements with the State of New Hampshire." The motion was SECONDED. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED.

A motion was made by Mr. Craig Kelleher to end the debate on the amendment. The motion was SECONDED. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED.

The Moderator asked for a vote on the amendment. Vote was by a show of hands. AMENDMENT DEFEATED.

A motion was made by Mr. Bedford and seconded to table the Article. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE XXII: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Motion was made by Mr. Peter Simmons and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,005,507.00 for the Town Budget.

Mr. Bedford asked what the impact of the total budget will be on the taxpayers. Mr. Walter Lermer estimated \$2.20 per thousand dollars assessed value.

Mr. Walter Lermer asked that any votes pertaining to salaries be done by secret ballot.

Mr. Peter Simmons presented the budget line by line.

ARTICLE XIII: (Recommended by the Budget Committee) To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint three (3) citizens to serve on a special unpaid committee to be known as a REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL PLANNING COMMITTEE, for the purpose of studying the advisability of establishing a regional refuse disposal district and drawing up a proposed agreement therefore, as authorized by RSA 53-B.

Motion was made by Mr. Robert Carrigg, seconded by Mr. Richard Lynch. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED.

Mr. Robert Carrigg commented that this is a study group only.

Mr. Paul Cuetara, Moderator, asked any interested citizens to submit in writing their interest in serving on this committee by 3/24/87.

ARTICLE XIV: (Recommended by the Budget Committee) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (5,600.00) for the purpose of meeting the expenses of the REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL PLANNING COMMITTEE established in Article XIII.

Motion was made by Mr. Robert Carrigg, seconded by Mr. Walter Lermer. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED.

Mr. Tager asked about the money involved if this is only a study group. Discussion followed.

ARTICLE XV: (Recommended by the Budget Committee) To see if the Town will vote to discontinue Capital Reserve Fund #3 (Town Buildings) as it is no longer used or needed. The fund, consisting of \$286.85 plus income, shall be returned to the general funds of the Town.

Motion was made by Mr. Richard Lynch, seconded by Mr. Walter Lermer. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED.

Mr. Lermer commented that this Article was based on the recommendation of the Town's CPA.

ARTICLE XVI: (Recommended by the Budget Committee) On petition of Dorita Snow and ten (10) or more voters of the Town of North Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of Eleven Hundred and Twenty Dollars (\$1,120.00) for the purpose of defraying the cost of services provided to the Town and its residents by Seacoast Big Brother/Big Sister of New Hampshire.

Motion was made by Mr. Walter Lermer, seconded by Mr. Richard Lynch. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED. No discussion.

ARTICLE XVII: (Not recommended by the Budget Committee) To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from property tax.

Motion was made by Mr. Walter Lermer, seconded by Mr. Richard Lynch. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED.

Mr. Peter Simmons explained that the Budget Committee took no action on this Article and therefore it is not recommended by the Budget Committee. Mr. Simmons stated that there has been a change in the RSA and he recommended voting in favor of this Article.

ARTICLE XVIII: (Recommended by the Budget Committee) To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$22,000.00 for the purchase of two new police cruisers, and authorize the withdrawal of \$15,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 and amendments thereto, with the balance of \$7,000.00 to be withdrawn from Capital Reserve Fund #6 (Police Department), and authorize the Selectmen to act as agents for the Town in connection with the purpose for which this fund was established in accordance with N.H. RSA Chapter 35, Section 15.

Motion was made by Mr. Robert Carrigg, seconded by Mr. Richard Lynch.

A point of order was brought to the attention of the Moderator, by Mr. Walter Lermer. Due to the fact that Article XVII deals with an RSA it must be voted by paper ballot. Mr. Paul Cuetara, Moderator, suspended the motion on the floor in order to conduct the paper ballot of Article XVII.

ARTICLE XVII: 117 yes 24 no

ARTICLE XVIII: The Moderator continued the Article with a motion and a second as originally stated. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED. No discussion.

An amendment was made by Mr. Walter Lermer to increase the total budget by \$12,402.00 which is the total of all town salaries that were not recommended by the Budget Committee. Mr. Richard Lynch SECONDED. This is an 8½% increase as opposed to the Budget Committee's recommendation of 6%. Discussion followed regarding the amendment. Vote was done by ballot. 85 yes 79 no
AMENDMENT CARRIED

Mr. Peter Simmons continued to read the budget line by line.

An amendment was made by Mr. Newman Goodwin, Fire Chief to increase the Fire Department Budget by \$6,000.00 for the purchase of a Defibrillation Unit at a cost of \$5,300.00 and training for the firefighters to use the equipment \$700.00. Mr. Walter Lermer SECONDED the amendment. Vote was by a show of hands. AMENDMENT CARRIED.

Mr. Peter Simmons finished the reading of the Town Budget with no further amendments or discussion.

A motion was made by Mr. Peter Simmons, and seconded to accept the corrected Town Budget for 1987 in the amount of \$2,023,909.00, seconded by Mr. Walter Lermer. Vote was by a show of hands. MOTION CARRIED.

ARTICLE XXIII: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Mr. Robert Carrigg thanked Mr. Walter Lermer for his 12 years of service to the Town and expressed his gratitude. Those present seconded by giving Mr. Walter Lermer a standing ovation. Mr. Walter Lermer thanked his fellow selectmen and all the town employees for helping him make his job easier.

Motion to adjourn was made and seconded. The 1987 Annual Town Meeting for North Hampton was adjourned at 10:30 PM.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the School Building, on Atlantic Avenue, in said North Hampton, on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, 1988, at 10:00 a.m., in the morning, the business meeting to begin at 7:30 p.m., polls to close at 7:30 p.m. and to reopen at the close of the business meeting, remaining open until all who wish to vote have voted; to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE I. To choose one Selectman for a term of three years, one Selectman for a term of two years, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing years.

ARTICLE II. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE III. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen, or a majority of them, to sell and convey the real property acquired by the Town by tax sale, any such sale to be at public auction, to the highest bidder.

ARTICLE IV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, to accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, money from the State, Federal, or other governmental unit or private source which becomes available during the fiscal year pursuant to New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 31, Section 95-b (NH RSA 31:95-b).

ARTICLE V. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the Town Officers.

ARTICLE VI. (ON THE OFFICIAL BALLOT) ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF THE ADOPTION OF THE AMENDMENT AS PROPOSED BY THE PLANNING BOARD FOR THE TOWN ZONING ORDINANCE, AS FOLLOWS:

To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 409 (Wetlands Conservation Areas) by adding another paragraph thereto:

409.1(d) To assist in the interpretation of soil types, the High Intensity Soil System (HISS) as delineated by the Society of Soil Scientists of Northern New England shall be used in conjunction with any applicable reports from qualified soil scientists.

ARTICLE VII. (ON THE OFFICIAL BALLOT) ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF THE ADOPTION OF THE AMENDMENT AS PROPOSED BY THE PLANNING BOARD FOR THE TOWN ZONING ORDINANCE, AS FOLLOWS:

To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 409.1(b) (Inland Wetland Conservation Areas) by substituting the following:

409.1(b) The Inland Wetland Conservation Areas are those areas which are inland wetlands or poorly drained soils or very poorly drained soils as defined in Sections 302.31, 302.32, and 302.33.

ARTICLE VIII. (ON THE OFFICIAL BALLOT) ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF THE ADOPTION OF THE AMENDMENT AS PROPOSED BY THE PLANNING BOARD FOR THE TOWN ZONING ORDINANCE, AS FOLLOWS:

To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 409 (Wetlands Conservation Areas) by adding a new paragraph, Section 409.4, to read as follows:

409.4 No structure or impermeable surface shall be permitted within 75 feet of any tidal wetland or very poorly drained soil or poorly drained soil.

ARTICLE IX. To see if the Town will authorize the Planning Board to prepare and subsequently amend a recommended program of municipal capital improvement projects projected over a period of at least six (6) years to aid the Board of Selectmen in their consideration of the annual budget, all as authorized by NHRSA 674:5-8.

ARTICLE X. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed Nine Thousand Six Hundred and Sixty-Nine Dollars and no/100 (\$9,669.00) for the purchase of a new police cruiser, and to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw not more than Three Thousand Dollars and no/100 (\$3,000.00) from Capital Reserve Fund No. 6 (Police Department) to defray part of the cost of said cruiser, and to authorize the Selectmen to act as agent for the Town in connection with the purpose for which this Fund was established in accordance with NHRSA 35:15.

ARTICLE XI. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of NHRSA 53-B:1-11, inclusive, providing for the establishment of a regional refuse disposal district, together with the Towns of Brentwood, Danville, East Kingston, Exeter, Fremont, Hampton, Hampton Falls, Kensington, New Castle, Newton, Rye, Sandown, and South Hampton, and the City of Portsmouth, and the construction, maintenance, and operation of a regional refuse disposal facility by said district in accordance with the provisions of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen.

ARTICLE XII. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Nine Thousand One Hundred Forty-Three Dollars and no/100 (\$29,143.00) for the payment of the Town's share of the budget of the Southeast Regional Refuse Disposal District for the fiscal year of said district ending March 31, 1989; to authorize the Treasurer to pay the appropriated amount to said district in four (4) quarterly installments commencing on April 1st and continuing on or before the first day of each successive calendar quarter; and to take action relative thereto.

ARTICLE XIII. (RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred and no/100 (\$7,500.00) to fund a study of all Town Buildings, including but not limited to, a proposal to be brought to the 1989 Town Meeting regarding a new police facility.

ARTICLE XIV. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Optional Adjusted Elderly Exemption as provided by the State Legislature for those with assets not in excess of \$75,000 (excluding the value of a person's residence) according to the following schedule:

For 65 to 74 years of age	- \$20,000.00
For 75 to 79 years of age	- \$25,000.00
For 80 or more years of age	- \$30,000.00

[To qualify, a person must have been a resident of New Hampshire for at least 5 years, must own the real estate, individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by the wife, they must have been married for at least 5 years and have a net income of less than \$10,000 (or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000.00).]

ARTICLE XV. On petition of Grant H. Seaverns and more than ten (10) of the legal voters of the Town of North Hampton, to see if the Town of North Hampton will change the "No Parking" ordinance on Appledore Avenue and Boulters Cove Avenue (both known as "Fifield Island") to "Parking by permit for North Hampton Residents only." Further, that the Selectmen develop and operate a system of permits for the residents' vehicles to be parked. Such permits to be without charge.

ARTICLE XVI. (RECOMMENDED BY THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION; NOT RECOMMENDED BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE) On petition of Mary Lou Wollmar and more than ten (10) legal voters of the Town of North Hampton, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand and no/100 (\$25,000.00) (or other appropriate sum) to be added to the Conservation Fund as may be necessary for the purpose of matching State funds which may be made available for the purchase of Conservation lands.

ARTICLE XVII. On petition of Charles F. Rowell and more than ten (10) legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes.

ARTICLE XVIII. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 76:15-a providing for the semi-annual collection of taxes.

ARTICLE XIX. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 31:94-2 providing for the adoption of an optional fiscal year. A single eighteen month accounting period is adopted running from January first of the calendar year following adoption and ending June thirtieth of the next following year. Thereafter, accounting periods shall run from July first to June thirtieth of the following year.

ARTICLE XX. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

AUDITOR'S LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

The Board of Selectmen
The Town of North Hampton
Atlantic Avenue
North Hampton, New Hampshire 03862

We have examined the financial statements of the Town of North Hampton, New Hampshire, for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1987. Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library Trustees, and Trustees of Trust Funds.

As a part of our examination, we reviewed and tested the Town's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing, and extent of other auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements.

The objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived, and also recognized that the evaluation of the factors necessarily requires the use of estimates and judgements by town officials.

In conjunction with our audit report dated February 10, 1987, we noted the following:

A.) General Accounting Systems

The town maintains its General Fund and other funds on a cash basis system. In order to prepare annual financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles a considerable amount of effort must be expended to adjust these records to an accrual basis. In addition, the town officials are unable to review interim financial information prepared in a proper manner. In order to remedy this situation we recommend:

- 1.) The town implement a complete accounting system that includes records up to and including a general ledger.
- 2.) Accounts Receivable Billings, Taxes Receivable, Accounts Payable and other accrual entries should be posted on a daily basis to the accounting system and reconciled to the control documents and ledgers monthly.
- 3.) Interfund transactions should be properly accounted for by use of specific accounts in the accounting system including receivable and payable entries.
- 4.) The town has control of various monies which are not reflected as revenues or receipts in the town records. Example of these are road bonds, gravel bonds and taxes collected for others. At present there is no accounting control of these funds. These funds must be reflected in the accounting system as escrow accounts.

In order to implement these recommendations and insure the maintenance of a proper accounting system, the town must recognize that additional support in terms of staffing and automated systems will be necessary.

At present, the Town Administrator is preparing all the accounting records in addition to other jobs. Although the individual is very capable of her present bookkeeping duties, the continued growth of the town, and the necessity for a full accounting system with the corresponding internal controls require that the town recognize her time constraints. We recommend that the town employ an experienced systems/accountant. We also recommend that the town purchase a computer system and corresponding computer software designed to meet the accounting and information needs of a municipality.

B.) Internal Controls

Our audit disclosed that several checks for school district disbursements were improperly made out in the name of the school district treasurer instead of the school district.

C.) General Fixed Assets Accounting

In general, accounting for fixed assets provides information for estimating the amount of insurance needed, monitors asset utilization, provided a safeguard over the asset, and allows for depreciation to be estimated when applicable. The town does not maintain records for its investment in property, plant and equipment.

Fixed asset accounting should be considered in the future accounting system of the town. Revenue sharing and certain grants, as well as generally accepted accounting principles, requires that adequate fixed assets records be maintained.

In closing, we complement and thank the selectmen and staff of the Town of North Hampton for their competent assistance during the course of our audit.

Note 1.) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the Town of North Hampton conform to generally accepted accounting principles for local governmental units except as indicated hereinafter. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies.

Basis of Accounting

The accrual basis is used for all fiduciary funds. Governmental funds utilize the modified accrual basis whereby revenues are recorded when measurable and available. Expenditures are recorded when the liability is incurred (accrual basis) except:

- A. Disbursements for inventory items (material and supplies) are considered expenditures at the time of purchase.
- B. Prepaid expenses are not normally recorded.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment acquired or constructed for general government services are recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. Funds used to require general fixed assets and/or debt service payments on borrowing in connection therewith are accounted for as expenditures in the year payments are made. This is contrary to generally accepted accounting principles which require separate fixed asset grouping of accounts and separate liability accounts for debt procurement and servicing.

Investments

Investments are stated at cost.

Types and Purpose of Funds

- A. General funds are intended to provide recurring general services. They are controlled by a budget approved by the voters.
- B. Special Revenue Funds - Used to account for specific restricted revenues and expenditures for various purposes. Receipts and expenditures of each fund are governed by the terms of contractual agreements, statutes, or local law.
- C. Other Governmental Unit Funds (Agency) - The town collects taxes for the Winnacunnet School District, North Hampton School District, Rockingham County, and the Little Boars Head Precinct as required by law. These taxes are accounted for as agency funds.

Types and Purposes of Funds (continued)

- D. Capital Reserve Funds - Used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities.

- E. Property Taxes - Property tax revenue recognition requires disclosure of property taxes receivable, which are to be collected beyond a period of 60 days subsequent to December 31, 1987, are recognized on the balance sheet and not reserved. The Town of North Hampton recognized, without reserve, all taxes receivable at the end of the fiscal year. This accrual practice is consistent with other New Hampshire municipal entities and more appropriately matches the liability to the school districts at December 31, with collections intended for school district payments through June 30 of the following year.

Property taxes collected by the town include taxes levied for the following governmental units as required by law. The town is responsible for all collections

The town raises revenue through taxation for abatements and refunds of property and resident taxes by an amount set as overlay. The tax overlay for 1987 was \$19,591 and abatements amounted to \$24,542.

Other General Accounting Policies

Retirement System

Several members of the Police Department, Fire Department, Highway Department, and Town Office are members of the New Hampshire Retirement System. Under this plan, participants contribute annually a percentage of compensation which is fixed by law. The Town's contribution rate for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the state plan as of June 30, 1987, at varying rates by occupation. Since the valuation is based on the entire state plan, the amount of excess vested benefits over fund assets is undeterminable for the town. The town has no past service cost obligation.

Note 5.) Contingencies and Unasserted Claims

During 1984 the Town of North Hampton was identified by the State of New Hampshire and the United States Environmental Protection Agency as a potentially responsible party in relation to clean-up costs resulting from the contamination of a landfill site located within the town.

As of our audit date no legal proceedings have been asserted by any party.

The clean-up costs at the site are expected to be substantial. If claims are asserted and judgements are adverse to the town it is reasonable to anticipate that the effect on the town's financial position would be significant.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT FOR THE TOWN OF NORTH HAMPTON

The growth in the number of businesses in Town continues at a rapid rate. Last year we listed 32 more business establishments than we had the year before, bringing the total to 265. Additional business space is opening up every month along US-1.

Traffic has again increased on this busy road. We had a traffic count of over two million cars for the months of June through September on Lafayette Road. We feel the installation and renovation of the traffic lights here has improved safety tremendously. We can recall when the traffic people in Concord said that when I-95 opened up "grass would grow in US-1." Such is hardly the case. In addition to the increased traffic on our major highways we have several new developemnts to patrol.

We continued our work with the Elementary School. One of our programs there has been the (entirely voluntary) fingerprinting of the children. The kids seem to enjoy this and the completed prints are sent home with the oldest child. The Police do not retain any copies. We are also instituting our "Officer Phil" program. This is a safety program originating with the State and supported by local businesses. It gives the children an idea of who the police are, what they do, as well as some of the dangers in this day and age. We thank the businessmen for their assistance.

We also want to thank the community for the support given our Department—community support is essential to the efficient operation of any Police Department. A breakdown of our activity follows:

REPORT OF THE NORTH HAMPTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

Your Fire Department responded to 217 calls during 1987. These consisted of 79 structural fires, 47 mutual aid calls, 9 automobile fires, 36 automobile accidents, 4 grass and wood fires, 33 miscellaneous calls, and 8 calls for public assistance. In addition the ambulance responded to 188 calls in 1987.

This drive was very successful and has enabled us to purchase this vital piece of equipment. REPORT OF THE FIRE WARDEN

One of the duties of the Fire Warden is the enforcement of the State Timber Harvest Regulations. These are varied in nature and extensive. They include patrolling of certain logging operations, ensuring that the required "Intent to Cut" Forms are on hand, (RSA 79:3), that notices are posted, etc. Anyone observing any violation of these regulations in a logging operation are urged to report the same to the Chief of the Fire Department who is also the Forest Fire Warden. New Hampshire is the second most heavily forested State in the Nation (after Maine) with 87% of our total acreage in forests. At the current rate of development this is expected to be reduced.

Forest fires are a continual hazard. We would point out that a written permit is required for any fire (except when the ground is covered with snow—RSA 224:27-b.) Further, it is suggested that even with a permit burning be restricted to after 4:30 p.m. when more Call Firemen would be available.

Should one own the forest land where logging is taking place, you are responsible for the timber tax payment. Currently no bond is required. Contact the Selectmen's Office for timber tax forms.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION TOWN OF NORTH HAMPTON

Conservation was busy in 1987. We sponsored two students from the Elementary School to attend a week at Conservation Camp near Hillsborough, N.H. This activity is run by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests and is supported by numerous State Conservation Commissions. The two children evidently benefitted from the experience and as a result of her interest the Selectmen have appointed Kimberly Cronin to the Commission. Also appointed to fill out the term of David Peters was Dick Wollmar of Walnut Ave. We welcome these two new members.

Because of the continued pressure for development in our Town we have assigned one of our members to the Planning Board (as is permitted under RSA 36-A:3) on a continuing basis. Most developments originate here and many may have an impact on our wetlands. All Dredge and Fill Permits are submitted to Conservation and in most cases one or more of our members investigate them.

In this connection Conservation sponsored three new amendments to our Zoning Laws. Prospective additions to these laws must first be presented to the Planning Board, receive two public hearings, and then be voted upon—to endorse or reject—in order to go on the ballot. These three amendments received unanimous approval. They are:

- a) To implement the HISS system of soil classification. (HISS stands for “High Intensity Soil Survey.”) This system, already in use by many towns, provides a definitive method for describing what kind of soil is present in a given location.
- b) To clarify the classification of soils within the Inland Wetland Area as “Poorly drained” or “Very poorly drained.”
- c) To add a section to our Zoning Law prohibiting a structure or an impermeable surface within 75' of wetlands. Current law prohibits a septic system within 75', but we have had individuals who wish to locate their residence within a foot of marsh wetlands.

We are patrolling our town Conservation lands to ensure that the trails remain passable and safe. And for safety reasons we will post the Conservation lands against hunting. Some of these lands are very close to habitations—one developer in fact located his driveway

on Town land. As available open space shrinks, deer and other wild animals are crowded closer and closer to inhabitants.

There is the possibility that the Town may receive additional lands for conservation. This is sometimes possible by purchase through, or with, the assistance of the Society for the Protection of N.H. Forests. We are exploring this. We would like very much to develop a ‘green belt’ along Little River and the Winnicut River—but the lure of ‘developable’ house lots may prove too great.

As of January 1, 1988 Conservation had \$17,816.88 in a fund set aside for possible use in land acquisition. With current land prices, this amount of money would not go very far, but it might suffice to option.

We welcome public interest. All of our meetings (usually held the second Tuesday of each month) are open to the public. Come and lend us a hand.

REPORT OF THE NORTH HAMPTON MOSQUITO CONTROL COMMISSION

The war with insects rages on. Control efforts in this town are aimed at reducing the mosquito as a carrier of disease as well as a pest species. Increased knowledge of insect lifecycles and habitats add insight to new strategies for control. Yet, effective control of a pest species requires cooperation by many individuals, developers, corporations, and federal, state and local government agencies.

An example of the close relationship between insects and industry occurs in the used tire trade. The United States imports nearly 4 million used tires from Asia each year for retreading. Many of these tires are discarded in tire dumps in this country. This adds to the estimated 2.8 billion discarded tires in the environment.

In August 1985, an Oriental mosquito, *Aedes albopictus*, first became established in Houston, Texas. By 1987, this mosquito had become established as far north as Delaware. This is not good news since *A. albopictus* transmits several diseases, among those are Dengue, Encephalitis and Dog Heartworm. This mosquito was imported in the used tires from Asia and continues to breed not only in tires, but in any artificial container. *A. albopictus* has not reached N.H. to date, although several other disease carrying mosquitoes breed in tires as well.

To aid in the control of mosquitoes and to prevent the spread of disease, individual homeowners should get rid of any stagnant water in tires, cans, bottles, barrels, etc. Source reduction is the most effective means of mosquito control. If the potential source encompasses a large area, then call the Selectmen's Office and leave a message for the Mosquito Control Department. Mosquitoes only breed in stagnant water, but not all stagnant water breeds mosquitoes. This is why the mosquito control crew surveys each site before applying insecticides. This eliminates unnecessary use of chemicals.

If the mosquitoes have hatched into the air, then adulticiding, spraying adult mosquitoes at night, is the only alternative. Therefore, it is important to control mosquitoes in the vulnerable, aquatic stage.

Adulticiding is conducted in the evening when mosquitoes are most active and to avoid spraying beneficial insects such as bees. Bees are daytime flyers and return to their hive at dusk.

The purchase of a new-used pick-up truck was a welcome addition to the Mosquito Control Commission. 1987 was the first year in many without mechanical breakdowns. Both the truck and the truck mounted sprayer functioned properly all season. This must be a record.

During 1987, a large section of Little River salt marsh between Appledore Ave. and Atlantic Ave. was found to breed many mosquitoes. This section of mosquito breeding salt marsh had gone undetected for many years.

This acreage increased our summer larviciding workload by 100%. This was a burden since the size of the crew remained unchanged. This Commission recommends an increase in the amount of seasonal labor hired next season to adequately cover this additional area. This amounts to an increase of approximately 195 hours of labor for the season.

Two recurring questions I received this past season concerned (1) the black boxes on the salt marshes and (2) AIDS. This was the third season of use for the greenhead traps on the salt marshes. These traps attract the flies by the location and the color of the traps. No insecticides are used. The flies enter the traps through a narrow slit in the bottom and rest on the screen at the top. They eventually die from dehydration. Many other insects and spiders enter the traps to take advantage of the free food.

The other common question I received last season was the risk of mosquitoes transmitting the AIDS virus. Based upon the reports I have read, there is NO evidence that mosquitoes transmit AIDS. Tests have shown that mosquitoes are capable of picking up the virus, but they are NOT able to pass the virus to a victim.

Mosquitoes are more than just a pest at the family cookout. They are medically important too. Mosquitoes transmit many diseases. Several occur here in N.H.. The primary goal of the Mosquito Control Commission is to reduce the number disease carrying mosquitoes in your area in an environmentally safe manner. This difficult task is accomplished through the cooperation of many. The Commission would like to thank the residents of North Hampton for their continued support.

REPORT OF THE NORTH HAMPTON RECREATION COMMISSION

The Recreation Commission has directed its efforts this year on the further improvement of Dearborn Park. The most significant accomplishment has been the paving of the parking lot. This improvement should make the parking situation at Dearborn much safer and more efficient. In conjunction with the paving, landscaping work has been done around the tennis courts and parking lot with the hope of improving the overall appearance of our town's recreation facility. We have also purchased picnic tables for Dearborn Park, to be installed in the Spring of 1988.

This year the mowing of Dearborn Park was taken over by our Highway Department, after many years of having been contracted out. The Commission members feel that this has improved the appearance of the park and we would like to extend our thanks to the Highway Department for a great job. With the help of the Highway Department, we have cleared brush from the hill side on the East end of Dearborn Park with the hopes of creating an area for local residents to enjoy sledding. The parking lot will be plowed to permit parking during the winter.

Our 1987 Summer Recreation Program, held for six weeks at the school, was again a success, with 147 children registered. A six week tennis lesson program was also offered for North Hampton residents, with approximately 30 children taking part. The Commission also sponsors weekly co-ed volleyball at the school on Monday nights throughout the Fall and Winter.

We welcome any suggestions for programs or other recommendations from residents.

REPORT OF THE NORTH HAMPTON YOUTH ASSOCIATION

In 1987 the North Hampton Youth Association continued to experience increased youth participation. Additional girl's softball and boy's baseball teams are anticipated in the upcoming year.

Field space continues to be our main concern. The soccer program was conducted at two sites with the Dearborn Park soccer field divided into three small fields. The baseball and softball programs were conducted at four separate sites throughout the Town. REPORT OF LAMPREY HEALTH CARE

Lamprey Health Care will mark seventeen years of providing services in 1988.

Two medical offices, one in Newmarket and one in Raymond, provide general medical care, preventive health services, community outreach, social services and short term counseling with referral to mental health agencies.

Services also offered by Lamprey Health Care include Senior Citizen Transportation and Information and Referral Services for Rockingham County.

Lamprey Health Care's medical team consists of six physicians: Sarah Oxnard, MD, Pediatrician; Cynthia Rasmussen, MD, Obstetrician-Gynecologist; and four Family Practitioners, Edward Benoit, MD; Karen Brainard, MD; Paul Friedrichs, MD; and our newest member, Micki Kantrowitz, MD. Also on staff at Lamprey Health Care are Michael Lewis, Certified Physician's Assistant; Barbara Janeway, Nurse Practitioner; Anne Fawcett, Nurse Practitioner; and John Mark Blowen, Nurse Practitioner. Registered and Licensed Practical Nurses round out the Medical Team.

The addition of physicians in recent years allows Lamprey Health Care to respond to the growing demand for services.

Under the direction of Dr. Rasmussen, Lamprey Health Care operates a prenatal program which includes prenatal, delivery and postpartum care along with nutritional counseling, prenatal and parenting classes and social services and/or referral.

Lamprey Health Care continues to operate the Senior Citizen Transportation Program. The transportation services enables senior citizens to remain independent, self-sufficient and active by providing the means to needed services, including medical, food shopping and recreational trips. Three of the five busses operated by Lamprey Health Care are equipped with hydraulic lifts to provide services to the handicapped. For further information, call 659-2424 or toll-free 1-800-582-7279.

Lamprey Health Care also operates The Rockingham County Info-Center which provides information and referral services to the residents of the county. Information is available to callers through a toll-free number on a wide range of subjects. The toll-free number is 1-800-582-7214.

Tel-Med is a taped library of "non-diagnostic" health information designed to provide basic facts about certain diseases, conditions

or health issues. The library contains 200 taped messages which are accessible 24 hours per day seven days a week by households with touch tone phones and Monday-Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. by households with rotary dial. The numbers to reach Tel-Med are 433-3232 and 433-3242 and 659-7514 and 659-7516. The Tel-Med program is funded by The Foundation for Seacoast Health of Portsmouth. Our fiscal year runs through June of 1987, and during that time, of the 8,980 total calls we made, 1752 were made for the residents of North Hampton. The breakdown of these calls is as follows:

Nursing	937
Physical Therapy	265
Speech Therapy	24
Occupational Therapy	38
Home Health Aide	488

Of these calls, 318 visits were made to 111 patients free of charge or at a reduced fee. Skilled nursing services are available twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. No call is ever refused due to monetary consideration.

At present, 29 children from North Hampton are enrolled in our Well Child Clinic. Funding for these services is provided, in part, through the New Hampshire Division of Public Health Services, Bureau of Maternal and Child Health. Well Child Clinics are held twice a month to serve children from birth to six years of age from families who meet federal income guidelines (O.M.B.). Dental Clinics, staffed by Dental Hygienists from the State of New Hampshire Dental Bureau, are held twice a year for children, ages three to six years old. Further treatment, when needed, is provided by the Bureau of Dental Health. The school nurse may send children to our office at no charge during the school year if the students' immunizations need to be updated as required by law. Our agency has developed a Toddler Car Seat Program, whereby a car seat may be borrowed for short-term use or for as long as two years for a small rental fee.

Blood Pressure Clinics are held weekly at Palmer's Pharmacy and monthly at the United Methodist Church in Hampton, as well as at the Seabrook Recreational Center following Senior Citizens Meetings. This past year we have had 72 North Hampton residents make 265 visits to our office for injections, diabetic teaching, blood

drawings or blood pressure monitoring. Flu Clinics are held each Fall in our office, as well as at local health fairs. Vaccine is also provided for homebound patients. A Basic Foot Care Clinic has been added to the many services we provide. Anyone sixty years of age and older, or individuals unable to perform own foot care due to visual problems, difficulty with manual dexterity, etc., are eligible for these clinics. Individuals with Diabetes or circulatory problems will require a physician's approval for participation. This service is by appointment only and at a minimal fee.

Our staff consists of six (6) full-time Registered Nurses, three (3) part-time Registered Nurses, two (2) Physical Therapists, one (1) Occupational Therapist, one (1) Speech Therapist, one (1) full time Home Health Aide, one (1) part-time Home Health Aide, a secretary and a bookkeeper. We also contract with Area Homemaker/Home Health Agency which enables us to refer local residents for homemaker assistance.

On the advice of our accountant, the Board of Directors of the Seacoast Visiting Nurses Association has voted to request each town to increase their per capita appropriation by ten cents (10¢). We feel this is necessary to continue to provide the same high quality care to residents of this area. Due to cutbacks in the Federal Budget, we have had to face a continuous reduction in Medicare and Medicaid contributions during the past year. Your Town's contribution to our Agency expenses is a vital resource to our successful delivery of home nursing care in North Hampton.

REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY SAFETY COMMITTEE

1987 was mostly the culmination of plans made in 1986 concerning the enlargement of the Factory Outlet Center. The owners were very cooperative and we feel that the placement of the new traffic lights between the Factory Outlet and the Post Office, together with blocking off the southern entrance of the Factory Outlet has relieved the hazardous situation there.

The increased signalization of US-1 and Atlantic Ave. has also improved that intersection. You have probably noticed that these lights are the new "smart light" type—there are sensors under the roadway which react to those waiting to turn left.

Long range plans for US-1 are in the works but we fear that they are some distance away. It is evident that the State is making improvements at certain locations (as for instance Ocean Road in Rye), and these are most helpful—but they are also costly.

AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the School Board
North Hampton School District
North Hampton, New Hampshire

We have examined the general purpose financial statements of the North Hampton School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1987, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the North Hampton School District, at June 30, 1987, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the North Hampton School District. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL NORTH HAMPTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

I have been your principal now for slightly more than a year. In that time, I have been continually impressed with the concern and commitment, shared by community and staff, for quality education. This commitment is evidenced by open and frank communication, by volunteerism and generosity, by budgetary and vocal support, and by joint efforts to plan for the future. In my first report to you a year ago, I shared my initial observations concerning our school. I expressed serious concern about our facilities and equipment. I wrote with cautious optimism about the curriculum and programs. Finally, I spoke with genuine enthusiasm of our students and staff. Your response to that report and its accompanying budgetary requests was positive and supportive. Let me review what your response has meant to your school:

Facilities and Equipment

We have made important strides in upgrading and improving the facilities and equipment which house and support our school. The removal of asbestos from the school, the renovation and repair of the heating and ventilation system, the carpeting of several classrooms, the installation of acoustical ceilings in cafeteria and several classrooms, the painting of classrooms and part of the exterior, the addition and replacement of furniture, the addition of computers for classrooms and offices, and the "retirement" of many broken, unused, outdated, and space-consuming items throughout the school have made North Hampton Elementary a safer, cleaner, healthier, more attractive, and better place to live, learn, and teach.

A year ago I referred to our school as "a fundamentally sound educational facility". I continue in that assessment but I must add my belief that we will soon exceed the useful capacity of the existing building. The "Report of the Facilities Review Committee", presented to the School Committee in December as the result of months of investigation, clearly document the population and program pressures which will soon force us to make unacceptable choices without additional space. I urge you to visit the school, read the report, and learn the facts so that you will support the facility expansion program to be presented at the Annual District Meeting.

A year ago, I wrote "It is my responsibility as your principal to inform you of the facts and to make sound recommendations for the

future. . . we must repair what we can, replace what we must, and begin the process of systematic maintenance and replacement. In addition, we must examine the future and develop plans. . . to address the physical needs of the outstanding educational system which we. . . want to provide for our children." We have begun that process, but have more to accomplish. I continue in the belief that an adequate and appropriate facility is the foundation of that educational system.

Curriculum and Programs

My optimistic observations in this area continue. North Hampton and S.A.U. 21 are still places where good things are happening. Our curriculum is comprehensive, well-structured, demanding, current, and growing. Children have the opportunity to learn essential basics, to encounter excellent enrichment opportunities, and to receive appropriate remedial and developmental help. Efforts to improve and upgrade the schools' curriculum are ongoing. Co- and extra-curricular opportunities are abundant and challenging.

Several areas of growth and improvement are noteworthy. Our reading and writing programs are of exceptional quality. Science and social studies have become more appropriate and meaningful as children are increasingly engaged in hands-on, participatory learning. Math instruction is improving thanks to extensive staff efforts through inservice workshops and college course work; additional developments are expected as an ongoing analysis of our curriculum and instructional methods and materials continues. A variety of plans and activities are the direct result of a teacher-task force effort to develop a comprehensive, school-wide approach to enrichment and critical skills education. Computer use has increased dramatically this year as we aim toward a consistent and organized approach toward teaching and using this essential tool. We have new and improved offerings in art, music, and physical education. Our library utilization is improved and our programs in health, drug, and alcohol education continue to become more appropriate. Our special education program is excellent.

Everyone associated with our school agrees that we have plenty of room for growth and improvement. Besides needed revisions and refinements in the programs already noted, we identify a serious need to provide more offerings for students not destined for prep school or college; the development of an allied arts program is the subject of current study. The issue of foreign language curriculum

and instruction is also a topic of current discussion. We anticipate and currently seek an enrichment coordinator to direct and facilitate this expanding program and effort.

Students and Staff

I continue to be extremely impressed by the effort, achievement, involvement, and commitment of our students. Most of our students like school and take pleasure in learning. A large number of students are involved in extra- and co-curricular activities. Their standardized achievement scores continue to be well above the norm. They have responded to our added enrichment programs and to our improved offerings in guidance and special services. Our graduates continue to achieve noteworthy success in high school, prep school, and in post-secondary endeavors.

Our staff continues to demonstrate a remarkable level of professionalism in their planning and in their instruction. They are universally involved in in-service training programs and professional growth. They demonstrate daily a high degree of concern and caring for their students. They take initiative in seeking solutions to instructional and organizational problems. I am proud to work with them.

In conclusion, I would assess my first fourteen months in North Hampton as a beginning. Together, we have established a direction and commitment to quality education and to improvement of that quality. I wish to thank Dr. Katner, Mr. Worthley, and Mr. Englebach and their staffs for their assistance and support. I thank the School Board for their continued confidence in me. I thank the many parents and citizens who have continued to go out of their way to make me feel at home and to work with the school. Thanks again to the Boosters, who continue to make such a tremendous contribution to the life of our school. Finally, I offer thanks to Mrs. Sarno, Mr. Elliot, and Mr. Wigode for their daily contributions to our school; without their help, North Hampton Elementary simply would not run.

I continue to believe that you have the finest elementary school in New Hampshire; together we will maintain and improve that status.
