Warrant

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Randolph in the County (L. S.) of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Randolph Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at 9:30 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose by ballot, all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, including one selectman for three years, two auditors, one road agent, one library trustee for three years, one trust fund trustee for three years.
 - To raise \$1,995.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year (i.e. \$1,300.00 for Town Officers' salaries, \$275.00 for Town Officers' expenses, \$420.00 for Town Reports) and make appropriation for same.
 - 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to repair town highways and bridges; that is, \$500.00 for highways and \$1,400.00 for snow removal and make appropriation for the same.
 - To see if the town will vote to raise \$1,600.00 for street ligman and make appropriation for the same.
 - 5. To see if the town will vote to raise \$300.00 for the care of cemetery and resetting memorial tablets and make appropriation for the same.
 - To see if the town will vote to raise \$250.00 for police patrol, to protect against theft, for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
 - To see if the town will vote to raise \$1,500.00 to assist town poor and make appropriation for the same.
 - 8. To see if the town will vote to raise \$200.00 for the support of Town Library and make appropriation for the same.
 - To see if the town will vote to raise \$500.00 for repairs and expenses of the Town Hall and other town buildings, and make appropriation for the same.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise \$125.00 to advertise the scenic beauty and accessibility of the Presidential Highway, which includes \$83.99 for the White Mountains Region Association.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$175.00 for public recreational services in sharing with the R. M. C. the expense of a caretaker for Crag Camp (\$125.00) and maintenance of Gray Knob Cabin (\$50.00).

- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed \$1,150.00 for garbage removal (i.e. \$50.00 for a suitable place for dumping garbage; \$35.00 for maintenance of the dump and \$1,065.00 for collection of garbage once a week during the winter and three times a week during the summer) and make appropriation for the same.
- To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$150.00 for maintenance of town reservations.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for lighting the honor roll.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$330.00 for the insurance of town employees and property.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$200.00 for the operation and maintenance of its Civil Defense Program.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for Fire Department, \$300.00 of this to be spent on additional hose and equipment.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise such sums of money as the State suggests to build Class V roads, State to pay \$126.32 and the town \$18.95 and make appropriation for the same.
- 19. To see if the Town will ratify the sale by the Selectmen of the Tom Milner property as was conveyed by said Selectmen to Arthur Holt. Sale was originally authorized in Section 22 of the Warrant of 1954.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to allow 2% discount on taxes paid before August 1 and 1% on taxes paid before October 1, 1956.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to use unexpended appropriations at their discretion.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to issue necessary temporary notes in anticipation of 1956 taxes.
- To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Report of Selectmen

Most prominent of last year's notable events was the Presidential visit. President Eisenhower's tour of New Hampshire included Randolph. Many townspeople gathered at different points by the way to wish him well. Within their memory no U. S. President, while in office, has visited Randolph before. The pictures in this year's reports commemorating this occasion, while not the best photography, are authentic. One at the town hall displaying the banner erected in honor of the occasion and one at Scates Corner shows "Ike" waving to the gathering.

This years' cover is another Randolph scene by Guy L. Shorey. Most of you will recognize this view from the Farrar farm; Mt. Madison, Mt. Adams and Jefferson with Mt. Bowman and the Cascade and Castle Ravines. We are pleased that favorable comment has been expressed on this type of cover. Mr. Shorey has several more Randolph views suitable for this type of cover.

The trust fund which previously has been listed as the Randolph Cemetery Fund was started in the early '20's by Mr. Vyron D. Lowe. It seems fitting and proper that this fund should bear his name. This change has been made and it is now listed as the Vyron D. Lowe Fund.

New Construction

Rev. and Mrs. Canaday have completed their new summer home on Stearns Road, Randolph Hill. George and Martha Schneeman have increased the capacity of the Mt. Jefferson Tourist Court by the completion of 2 new motel sections of 4 units each. The Alexanders of Sugar Plum Farm have a new barn and have added another bedroom to their camp. Other new additions include John Ogilby's cottage on the Hill, Frank Serafin's on the Dolly Copp Road, Maurice Legassie's house and 2 car garage on the Valley Road. On Route 2, Freeman Holden has considerably enlarged and changed the appearance of his home. This was accomplished a year ago, but due to an error on our part was not included in last year's report.

Change of Ownership

Arthur Holt has purchased the Milner house and property from the Town and has completely remodeled the building. Mr. and Mrs. Gene Martin sold their former residence, the Hunt Farm, to Mr. and Mrs. Van R. Woolsey and have purchased from Howard T. Woodward the Smith house on Randolph Hill Road. Fay Fount has changed hands again, Mr. and Mrs. John Clarke are the new owners, all of these new owners with the exception of Mr. Holt are in residence.

On behalf of the Town we welcome our new residents and home owners to Randolph.

This Year's Town Meeting

Last year it was decided to hold future town meetings in the evening, however complications have developed. March 13th is also the New Hampshire Primary. The annual Town Meeting combined with the State Primary if held in the evening could possibly result in

an all night session. With this thought in mind it would seem more practical to hold the meeting during the daylight hours as posted in the warrant.

This year's warrant Article #9 asks for \$500.00 for the expenses of Town Hall and Other Town Buildings. This is a \$200.00 increase over last year. Because a number of social functions are held at the town hall throughout the year it is becoming increasingly evident that kitchen facilities would be desirable. Most of this money would be earmarked for this purpose. This year's appropriation will not provide money enough to finish the job, but a good start can be made. It is also necessary to put new roofing on the storage shed.

Article #15 covers insurance on town employees and property and is an increase of \$255.00 over last year. It is not that our insurance rate has gone up, but Town property policies are written for a three year period and this is the year that they have to be renewed.

Although the Selectmen were authorized by the town in 1954 to sell the Milner Property it seems desirable from a legal point of view, for the town to ratify this action. Article #19 accomplishes this. As you will note in reading through the reports the Milner property was sold to Arthur Holt for \$4,300.00, \$128.00 of this had to be spent for a proper survey of the property and for legal matters such as deeds, etc. Thus the amount put into the Capital Reserve Fund is \$4,172.00.

Your Town Report again placed first for its class in the Town Reports Contest in New Hampshire last year and third place in the New England Municipal Reports Competition.

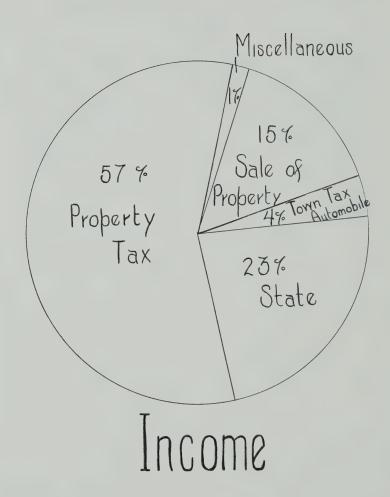

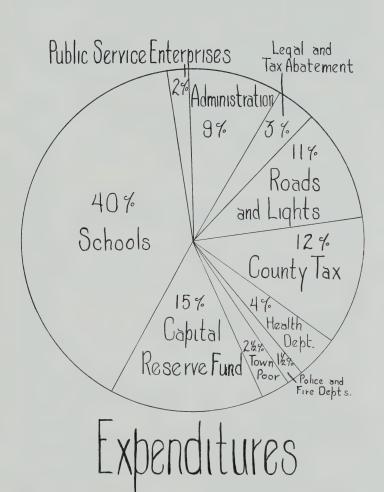

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize for the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- To see if the district will appoint a committee to study the possibilities of forming a Cooperative School District consisting of Gorham, Randolph and Shelburne, and report back at a later meeting.
- To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

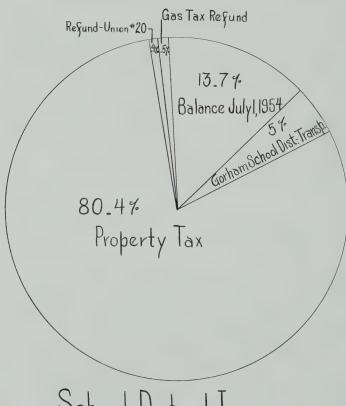

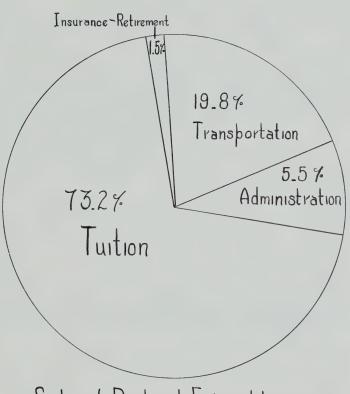

^{*} The starred items are required by law to be raised as determined by proper authorities. The district determined the salaries of the district officers. The supervisory union board decides the local share of the superintendent's salary and other union expenses. The district's share of the superintendent's salary for 1954-55 was \$223.00. Other towns in the union contributed as follows: Gorham, \$2,625.00; Milan, \$525.00; Jefferson, \$568.25; Dummer, \$218.75; Shelburne, \$262.50. These amounts are more than were raised for this purpose by the 1954-55 budget because of duplication of salary for Mr. Knightly for the month of May, 1955. By state regulations, he was entitled to 30 days leave which he had accumulated and the union had to contribute to this cost. The state treasurer reports the amount of per capita tax. The Teacher's Retirement Board assesses the amount for teachers' retirement and the State Employees Retirement Association assesses the amount for the superintendent's retirement.

Report of Superintendent

To the School Board and Citizens of the Randolph School District:

Foreword

The aims of our schools cannot be separated from those of society, since education is one of the bases on which our society rests. It has been a fundamental principle of American democracy that we should have free public education in this country. Without an enlightened citizenry, our nation would not have grown to its present heights. In New Hampshire, we generally agree that schools should provide the best education possible for each child, whatever his ability might be. Since the ability of every child varies, we should provide the best possible education to fit his individual needs. Our school must make provisions to handle the bright, the dull, the lazy, the industrious, the shy, the bold, the practical and the artistic.

In the short time that I have served as your superintendent, I would conclude that the schools of Union No. 20 do a good job in teaching the fundamental skills (the three R's). Tests that have been given prove this to be true. We should certainly maintain this good record and, if possible, show some improvement.

There is nothing that will take the place of a firm knowledge of the skills. However, there are some areas in which we should be doing more than we are at the present time. Students need more aid in the area of guidance—academic, vocational and social. More time could be spent profitably in the fields of music, art and speech. Effort should be made to provide a wholesome physical education program other than merely competitive athletics. These are not educational "frills" as some people would like us to believe, but are ways in which we can hope to accomplish the aims of education. What are these aims? Very briefly, I would list them as follows:

- 1. Mastery of the basic skills and tools of knowledge—the three R's.
- 2. Becoming a good citizen.
- 3. Being able to enjoy physical and mental health and understanding the laws of hygiene.
- 4. Appreciating art, music and literature.
- Being able to provide for needs by employment in the professions, industries, the arts and the sciences.
- 6. Being able to use increased leisure time wisely.
- Being able to understand the physical aspects of our world—a knowledge of science.
- 8. Being tolerant of others, regardless of race, creed, or color.

These aims mean that we must provide both an academic and realistic atmosphere in our schools. While we cannot neglect the traditional type of education, we must also provide practical learning that will fulfill the needs of those students not going on to schools of higher learning.

With an ever-increasing enrollment in our schools and the holding power of the schools growing, we have serious problems facing us. They can be solved only through a sincere interested citizenry who are willing to face the problems and attempt to do something about them.

Budget

The total budget asked for by the School Board is \$15,561.88 as compared to \$12,924.00 last year. The increase in the budget is caused almost entirely by added tuition costs and payment on the school bus. Tuition costs are estimated as \$1,275.00 more than last year.

Tuition

At the present time, there are thirty-five tuition pupils in Gorham and two in Berlin. In the spring the Coulter children moved back into Randolph, which assumes their tuition costs. With only two in the senior class and with five starting the first grade next year, we can expect approximately 40 tuition pupils next fall. The tuition rates are as follows:

Elementary \$200.00 a year High School \$300.00 a year

This plan has many features that would be beneficial to Randolph and the other towns, and it should receive careful study and consideration.

Because this report is being made for the year 1954-55, most of the details happened during the time my predecessor, Mr. Albert Knightly, served as your superintendent. I would like to take this opportunity to say that I am fortunate in following a man of his ability and efficiency. His work certainly gave me a solid foundation on which to look forward to the future in Union No. 20.

I would also like to express my appreciation to the members of the School Board, the parents, students and friends for their cooperation and help. With this feeling continuing, I am sure that we can maintain our good schools and also hope to improve them.

Your Town Report and Your People's Information

Your Region Association has had in 1955 one of the most active years. Naturally, the highlight was the Presidential visit in June, and we were honored by taking a direct part in various phases of the planning which went on for months previous. Seldom has the limelight been so directly centered on the White Mountains in a national scale.

Through all the complications and confusion surrounding that planning we somehow found time to carry on our normal schedule of work benefiting our towns. Much outside travel has carried the "message of the mountains" personally to Boston, Hartford, Springfield, New York, and Philadelphia. Events such as a Guides' Show and a Women's Golf Tournament were promoted and brought gratifying publicity. Stories and pictures were placed in many publications, and thousands of publicity folders distributed, as well as direct mail answering of several thousand letters and cards with information.

Our annual 4-H contest continues to have heartening results in encouraging young people's efforts through this fine organization. Another standby, the real-estate bulletin, has put property prospects in touch with property owners and realtors all over the region.

Is it all doing you, the tax-payer, any good? "Yes!" to that. We tracked down some of our mail inquirers in a random sample again this year. We found that out of just this small sample (500 letters and cards) we had 100 parties that spent just over \$17,000 in the Region! That represents over $2\frac{1}{2}$ times the amount appropriated by all our towns last year. We're sure you would all be glad to invest \$1.00 to get back \$2.50, any day.

Naturally this income isn't the only total we brought in, as there are many, many more we have no way of tracing. But it does show this is big business. It means that these people are paying big sums of tax money that doesn't come out of your pockets. With your continued help we can ease the burden of the tax load in all towns, bringing outside money to help pay for state and local services that otherwise you'd have to finance.
