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

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at two o'clock in the afternoon, at which time the polls shall be opened and shall close not earlier than nine o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following articles: all articles not on the ballot will be acted upon at seven-thirty in the evening.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its highways and bridges.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Cemeteries.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Common and the daily raising and lowering of the flag.
- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the street lights.

- 9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the LaMott-Kenneson Post No. 76 American Legion for Memorial Day and other patriotic purposes.
- 10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Town Dump.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$421.16 to secure from the State \$2,847.76 to be extended for Town Aid.
- 12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of Publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in cooperating with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate towards the operation of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital in Plymouth, N. H.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the use of the Highway Equipment Reserve Fund to purchase a new truck and also authorize the Selectmen to sell or trade in the present highway truck.
- 15. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Bi-Centennial Committee.
- 16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to buy the present or a new dump site and raise and appropriate or borrow a sum sufficient for the same.
- 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase all or part of the Leslie Bunker Homestead for use as a parking lot and raise and appropriate or borrow a sum sufficient for the same.
- 18. If Article 17 is adopted to see if the Town will authorize the sale by the Selectmen of any parts of the Leslie Bunker Homestead not needed for town use.

19. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution.

Town of Rumney, County of Grafton, State of New Hampshire

Annual Town Meeting March 8, 1966

Be it resolved that the legal voters of the Town of Rumney do hereby instruct the Board of Selectmen of the said Town of Rumney to request the State of New Hampshire to make major improvements to the Stinson Lake Road, so-called, running from Rumney Village to Stinson Lake and more specifically from the foot of Bradley Hill, so-called, at the northerly and of Main Street in Rumney Village, northerly to the Loveland Bridge, so-called, being the second bridge crossing over Stinson Brook from Rumney Village to Stinson Lake.

Be it further resolved that said Board of Selectmen make this request in the form of letters to His Excellency Governor John King and Highway Commissioner John O. Morton.

Be it further resolved that it is the sentiment of the inhabitants of said Rumney that said highway is a very scenic highway and used by hundreds of summer and winter vacationists as well as townspeople, that it is in deplorable condition at present and should be improved to a modern standard including subgrade, drainage, gravel and a bituminous mix surface treatment.

20. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution:

Town of Rumney, County of Grafton, State of New Hampshire

Annual Town Meeting March 8, 1966

Be it resolved that the legal voters of the Town of Rumney do hereby instruct the Board of Selectmen of the said Town of Rumney to request the State of New Hampshire to make major improvements to Route 118, running from West Rumney to Canaan and more specifically from the Dorchester-Groton Town line southerly to the Streeter Mtn., so-called, a distance of approximately 1.8 miles.

Be it further resolved that said Board of Selectmen make this request in the form of letters to His Excellency Governor John W. King and Highway Commissioner John O. Morton.

Be it further resolved that it is the sentiment of the inhabitants of said Rumney that said highway is at present and will be more so in the future, an important highway link between Plymouth and Lebanon areas or more particularly between Interstate Routes 89, 91 and 93.

Be it further resolved that said highway be considerably improved to meet modern standards of highway construction including alignment, grade as well as the features of subgrade, gravel, drainage and a bituminous mix surface treatment.

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease, rent, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate or mineral rights acquired by the Town at any of its tax collector's sales.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 23. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this town.
- 24. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto and to transact any other business that

may legally come before said meeting.

Prospects for a Bi-Centennial

A Bi-Centennial is for once in a lifetime for Rumney. It is now or never. Rumney had a charter granted by Benning Wentworth of Portsmouth in 1767. So we look at 1967 for our Bi-Centennial.

About all we can do at this juncture is to whet the scythe of our popular hope and expectations. What we expect is for a Day of Days for the old town, a hootenanny that is a blockbuster, where nobody drags their feet and everybody jumps on the bandwagon in a mutual community effort. We'll throw in a good old fashioned Home Day to boot, to add flavor and excitement.

Two or three things we are planning: About the last Saturday in April, 1967, let's plant a few bi-centennial trees to replace so many of our shade trees that are gone. Let's get every boy and girl in the town between four and twenty who has a bicycle, to push pedals on that day in August (the second Saturday) with the biggest show of bicycles that the town has ever seen! Another biggest that the town has ever seen—a public showing of old documents in the handwriting of those who run the town before we were born. This will interest the old timers.

Rumney celebrated in 1876, the National Centennial by trotting horses in the Herbert Grove and Henry Herbert wrote a special poem for the occasion. If any one has their great grandmother's scrapbook, perhaps we could find a copy of the poem! About 1892 according to the late Fred Learned, the opening of the Belden Mill at Spaulding's crossing was an occasion when they drank lemonade in ice from the Polar Caves by the "wash boilers" full and they danced to the wee hours, and not one in the crowd had ever seen an auto. In 1952, Rumney had its first bi-centennial to John Stark

and David Stinson. The Boston Globe estimated that a crowd of 5000 surged into Rumney Village, and a lot of people remember that.

Now for 1967 draw in your breath and pop your eyes, for you "hain't seen nothing yet!" This is going to top all celebrations and one thing that will make it different, is this: You are going to see some slick-looking new books, containing the first history of Rumney! Hurrah!

Only about sixteen months left!

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

- To teach our children the danger in lighting match-1.
- To never discard lighted smoking material from 2. a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush;
 - Always get a permit to burn from the a. warden.
 - Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 b. p. m.
 - If burning a field or brush have equipc. ment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. never to enjoy.

The following is a report of the Health Activities conducted in Rumney, by the New Hampshire Division of Public Health—Public Health Nursing, for the year 1965. Please have this printed in your town report.

A Tuberculin Testing program was conducted at the school on April 15, 1965. A total of 144 tests were given and 6 reactors to the test. Due to the high percent of reactors the Sterneedle Test was followed by the Mantoux Tuberculin test on the reactors; this later was given by Dr. Prince, Director of Communicable Disease Control from the State Division of Public Health. Arrangements were made for the reactors and family contacts to attend the Chest Xray Clinics at Plymouth. Due to the high percent of reactors to the TB Test in April it was repeated in October for grades 1 and 8. At this time a total of 54 were tested, including students and personnel, and 2 reactors were found. These followed through with chest Xrays, and no active tuberculosis was found.

Several adults took advantage of the chest Xray clinics held at Plymouth, in April and October. These are sponsored and conducted by the N. T. TB and Health Association in cooperation with the N. H. Division of Public Health. Reports of chest Xrays were sent to all parties concerned.

Home visits were made on adults and preschool children and care as necessary was arranged for

through private physicians and various clinics. Assistance was given through N. H. Sight Conservation Program. Assistance was given with arrangements for a deaf child to attend Crotched Mountain School for the Deaf and speech therapy arranged for others.

Names were submitted to Plymouth Fireman's Operation Santa Claus. Three Thanksgiving Baskets were given by Hanover (through Social Service), these were distributed to worthy families.

The new Nursing Care Program of Medicare has been discussed with the town selectmen and they will be kept informed of further developments.

Rumney has a representative on the Anti-Poverty study group for studying the needs of Baker-Pemi-Valley.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fifth day of March 1966, at 7:45 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State foundation aid fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Title 1, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965), and to appropriate such

funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

- 10. To see if the district will authorize the school board to negotiate tuition contracts with other districts for the education of pupils grades nine through twelve.
- 11. To see if the District will authorize the School Beard to make application for and to accept on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or the United States.
- 12. To see if the District will vote to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year in a sum not exceeding \$500.00 in the budget within the provision of RSA 198:4-b.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The school year began with two staff changes. Mrs. Kelly and Miss Draper left our employ during the summer for reasons of professional advancement. Miss Elizabeth Taylor and Mr. William Driscoll were hired to replace them. The former, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire came to us after teaching three years at an elementary school in Florida. She is teaching grades four and five. The latter graduated from Plymouth State College in June and is teaching in the departmentalized upper-grades program. He is also doing a very capable job of handling the school athletic program.

Slowly but surely I think we are making changes in curriculum, textbook revisions, and use of audio visual equipment that makes it possible for better teaching and provides boys and girls with better learning experiences. More and more teachers are getting to the point where they realize they must attend summer school and extension courses to keep up with the repeatedly changing face of education. We adopted new English books this year to up-grade this department and next year I hope to have a new series of elementary science texts. At the present time, our policy of testing with achievement tests administered twice yearly and mental ability tests every other year appears to be adequate. However, some time in the future. I would like to see aptitude tests and personality inventories given in the seventh and eighth grades as part of the guidance program for placing this group within the high school curriculum for which they are best adapted.

You will be asked to make a decision in your district warrant concerning the acceptance and use of Title I funds under the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965 Public Law 89-10. There have been many questions raised around the state concerning the acceptance of this money. It is ironic that some towns for years have accepted willingly Federal Funds to operate a hot lunch program and have accepted funds under Title III NDEA to help purchase math, science and foreign language equipment all without fear of Federal control. I would agree that I personally would want no part of a program that in any way would bring Federal controls into our schools in terms of what we teach, who teaches it and the materials we use to accomplish our purpose. At this time I am not concerned that this is the case. Under the provisions of the Lunch program which we sign every year, agreement is made that Hot Lunch records may be subject to Federal inspection. In the nineteen consecutive years I have been connected with hot lunch programs, I have seen one Federal inspector. I think a great deal of good can come from the use of these funds and I recommend their acceptance. If the time comes when Federal controls enter the picture. I would most certainly then recommend that you consider your choice very carefully.

It is not definite at this writing whether or not the cooperative school will have been voted upon by the time regular school district meetings are held. If the voting meetings have taken place, and your town has accepted the provisions of the Articles of Agreement, then I congratulate you for I think you have made a wise decision. If the vote has not been taken, or your district has voted against it, I would hope you will take another long hard look before it is too late. As has been brought up at so many of the hearings, the 7th and 8th grade students, where an accredited Junior High School program is not available, are the ones where there is the most lask at the present time. With the broadened curriculum offering that ought to be

available for these young people, some districts with their low tax base cannot possibly financially afford to meet their needs. As far as the students in grades 9-12 are concerned, a broader curriculum offering with more students will make keener competition and produce better trained young people to go on to college or to enter the work force. A new and larger centralized school would provide many of the answers to better education for all. After wrestling with this problem for a number of years, I am convinced as I think most members of the Planning Board are that the solution your committee has approved is the best and most economical for everyone.

This has been a busy, satisfying and sometimes frustrating year, I think, however, we have made progress and with your help and support will continue to do so.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953, of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report showing the total salary paid to the superintendent, which report shall show in detail the amount derived from the per capita tax and the amount paid directly by each school district in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 48 during 1964-65 received a salary of \$10,050.00 which was made up as follows: \$4750.00 paid from the per capita tax and \$5300.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowances of \$1100.00 for travel within the union was also prorated as stated above. The several school districts numbered five in 1964-65. The School District of Warren became a part of Supervisory Union No. 48 as of July 1, 1965.

Russell School is now using the Economy Phonics Program and all indications are that the program has achieved great goals.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

January 1, 1965 to January 1, 1966

The nurse made forty-three visits to the school and twenty-two home visits.

Hearing tests were done on each child. A vision screening test was also done on each child. Frequent inspections were made. Held conferences with Principal, teachers, and parents and visited classrooms.

First aid supplies were purchased and delivered to the school and first aid and advice given as needed when there.

Each child was weighed and measured. A Stern needle T. B. testing was done by the State Nurse and school nurse with a follow-up on each positive reaction found. Notices were sent to all who attended the X-ray clinic and a second Manteaux test given to all who reacted to the T. B. test by Dr. Prince.

Checked for those to attend the Dental Clinic, participated in the Pre-School Registration and took children to the Concord Guidance Clinic. Applications were made out for sight conservation, Mental Hygiene Clinic, Guidance Clinics and Orthopedic Clinics.

The School Nurse attended the Speech and Hearing Workshop in Keene on May 7th, School Nurse's meeting in Concord in March and State Teachers Convention (School Nurses' Section) in October.
