## COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

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### *To the Citizens of Sullivan County:*

The Commissioners of Sullivan County submit their Annual Report for the year ending December 31, 1926, together with the Reports of the Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction, Treasurer, Clerk of the Superior Court, Sheriff, Solicitor, Chaplain, Physician, and Auditors, for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1926.

Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Putnam, after nearly twenty years of faithful and valuable service for the County, on Feb. 16, 1926, tendered their resignations as Superintendent and Matron, with the request that same should take effect not later than April 1, 1926. After considering the matter with them, and learning that they felt a change was necessary, on account of their health and a much-needed rest, much to the regret of the Commissioners, we informed Mr. and Mrs. Putnam that we would try to fill their places as requested. After considering a large number of applications for the positions of Superintendent and Matron, an engagement was made with Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Grout of Northampton, Mass., to fill the positions. They began work April 15, and their service has been very satisfactory. They seem very much interested in their work, and are very kind to those under their care.

The Commissioners secured the services of George A. Worcester as a herdsman in April, 1926. His service has been quite satisfactory in the management of the herd of

pure-bred Holstein cows, and in checking up the pedigrees of the herd. We find that under his management the County Farm has a number of high-producing cows, one of which has the highest record in the County.

We did not enter our work with the expectation of making any great changes or any great saving to the County in our first year. We have, however, made some improvements which we considered necessary for the welfare of the inmates and the institution, also considerable repair work which naturally has to be done every year to keep the buildings in proper condition. This work has perhaps been somewhat expensive owing to the fact that we have been obliged to hire quite a little of this work done.

Our inmate working force is somewhat depleted as quite a few of our inmates who in previous years have been quite active in the work around the institution have fallen out owing to old age and disability, making it necessary to hire more or less extra help.

In closing we wish especially to express our appreciation for the helpfulness and cooperation of the Board of Commissioners. They have been untiring in their efforts to lend their assistance wherever and whenever needed. We feel that their advice is always acceptable.

We wish also to thank Mr. and Mrs. Putnam, the former Superintendent and Matron, for the assistance given us by them in starting our work here; they have always been more than willing to assist us in all ways; and the ladies

from both Claremont and Newport who have so kindly remembered the inmates at Christmas and New Years and at other times by giving them presents and a few hours of entertainment; also the help in the institution who have co-operated and helped us along with our work.

*To The Commissioners of Sullivan County:*

At the March 1926 term of the Superior Court one defendant was indicted on a charge of the embezzlement of public funds. On a plea of *nolo contendere* the Court imposed a suspended sentence.

In September the grand jury indicted one for manslaughter, one for arson, two for statutory offences, one for grand larceny and four for breaking and entering and committing larceny. The arson case is continued as the defendant fled. The defendants in the breaking and entering case were in custody in another jurisdiction. The other cases were disposed of by the Court. An old indictment for murder was tried at this term, and a plea of guilty to second degree murder finally accepted by the Court, and the respondent given a sentence for a term of years in the state prison.

In addition to the above were certain appealed cases from the municipal courts of the county.

There is no civil case pending in which the county is interested.
