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





REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Surry:

I herewith submit my second annual report as superintendent of your schools. In it, I shall make a brief survey of some of the accomplishments, needs and objectives of the past year.

Throughout the extent of our republic from Atlantic to the Pacific, from the Great Lakes to the Gulf of Mexico, school officers and interested citizens have asked themselves what vehicle or connecting link has brought us as a nation from the "Yesterdays," the time when we rode in wagons, plowed with oxen, harvested with the sickle or cradle, threshed with the flail, read by candle light, to the luxuries and modernized actities of the "Todays," when we ride in automobiles and airplanes, upheave the fields with tractors, harvest and thresh with the same operation, read and acquire knowledge by electric light and radio.

Out of the dark shadows of the past, comes the answer, yet wearing the scars of struggle and the stripes of toil, but bearing in triumph the wisdom of all ages. We call her education, the torch that enlightens the world, fires the imagination of man and gives wings to the visions of youth, saturates the dreams of the aged and renders might to hand and brain. We, having confidence in this parent of progress, creator of culture and moulder of destiny look forward with assurance to the "Tomorrows" of our Democracy, believing that education will provide for us the foundations of our future progress, that she will give the youth of our land the backbone of morals. Indeed, we trust our system of free education will become the conservator of the American home, the essential of citizenship and the inspiration for living.

The school is our workshop. Here we must stir the ambitions, stimulate ideals and forge the keys that open the door of opportunity to our children.

HEALTH ACTIVITIES

Dr. H. G. Williams, medical examiner of the Surry schools, submits the following results of his examination given last November.

Number of cases of defective vision,	4
Number of cases of defective teeth,	24
Number of cases of hypertrophied tonsils,	26
Number of cases of adenoids,	14
Number of cases of defective breathing,	2
Number of cases unvaccinated,	8

In looking over reports for several years, I note few corrections from year to year. Herein we fail to realize the greatest benefits from our medical inspection. Either parents should consider themselves responsible to see that defects reported to them by the physician were corrected or a school nurse employed who would attend to the follow up work, if we are to enjoy the full blessings of medical advice.

If arrangements could be made to unite a sufficient number of towns for the purpose of employing a full time nurse, a compensation of \$1.50 per pupil would be paid by the State.

Medical inspection in the schools serves a two-fold function. First, to find out the physical defects of the children and as far as possible to secure such treatment as will remedy the defects. This is the curative part of medical inspection. The second function is positive. It seeks not only to cure, but also to secure action and habitual practice in the rules which secure right and healthy living. It is not enough to cure physical weakness and disease. The boys and girls must be taught how to live in accordance with the principals of good health.

OBJECTIVES

Of the seven objectives of education promulgated by the National Teachers' Association and broadcasted over the United States, we have placed emphasis particularly on the first, second, fourth and seventh viz: (1) "Health," (2) "Grasp of Fundamentals," (3) "Good Citizenship," (4) "Ethical Character."

Reading, writing, arithmetic, English, geography, history and spelling comprises the backbone of our course of study. The efficiency with which these fundamental subjects are taught determines the strength or weakness of our schools. Fair results were obtained during the year 1923-1924.

The following standard tests were given to pupils above second grade: Thorndike-McCall Reading, Ayres Spelling, Charter's Language, Gregory's American History, Gregory-Spencer Geography and Stanford's Achievement Test. The results from all grades with a few exceptions were fairly satisfactory and compared favorably with the standards established for the various grades.

At the close of the school year of 1924, six pupils completed their eighth grade work and were presented certificates of promotion. These were as follows: Gale Hodgkins, Charlotte Scripture, Florence Britton, Pearl Kelly, George Malcolm and Peter Malcolm. All are continuing their studies at the Keene High School.

For the present year, Miss Edith Winchester continues her services at the West Hill school. Mrs. Etta B. Rowell has the village school well organized, orderly and moving along approved lines. At the North End, Miss Vera White began her teaching experience and is enthusiastic in her work.

All the teachers are devoted to their profession, alert to the needs of their pupils and are rendering valuable service to their respective communities.

From the statistics given in this report I note that Surry has maintained a lower per cent of attendance for the year

1923-1924 than the District or State. This is an unfavorable feature of our school work.

Punctuality and regular attendance are habits essential to the foundations of a successful life and have a direct bearing upon school progress and promotions. But a much higher per cent of attendance has been maintained during the five months of the present school year. If we can continue the good work, we can score a much higher rate for the school year 1924-1925. To accomplish this is worthy of your best efforts.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the School Board, teachers and citizens for their co-operation and support.
