TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, as recommended by the Budget.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes paid two weeks after approval of tax rate by the State Tax Commission.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy liability insurance on town labor and pay same out of the Highway Department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$5,000,00 from Timber Tax Yield Fund to put into a trust fund for the purpose of matching State Funds to rebuild bridge on South Barnstead Road.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to raise the sum of \$1000.00 to add to the trust fund for a grader. 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$2800.00 from the Timber Tax Yield Fund to be used for gravel resurfacing on Town Roads as suggested in the Town Road Improvement Program.

9. To see if the Town will vote to approve the payment of the following schedule of salaries: Selectmen \$400.00 Treasurer \$200.00 Town Clerk \$100.00 Police Officers \$225.00

10. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committies, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Trust Fund:

The sum of \$200.00 from the Mabel C. Perry Estate. The income to be used for the perpitual care of the lot in Riverview Cemetery, Barnstead, N. H.

12. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

WARREN G. REED Forest Fire Warden

Forest Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business

Carelessness is responsible for 97 percent of all our forest fires. This is a serious indictment of our interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbors. In too many instances this carelessness results in the destruction, not of the careless one's own property but of someone not even known to him.

Thoughtlessly thrown lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles by hikers, hunters and fishermen; the careless burning of debris during hazardous periods, high winds or in dangerous locations; improperly extinguished camp or cook fires - all add up to the CARELESSNESS that means serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

It points to the need of eliminating CARELESS-NESS so far as it concerns fire from our daily life. The rules are simple our cooperation is earnestly solicited.

1. Be careful with fire in or near woodlands.

2. Be sure that all lighted material -- cigars, cigarettes and matches - is completely out before discarding it. Use ash trays in autos.

3. Secure the required written permission to burn

from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not completely covered with snow. 4. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements

5. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

Let's remember that FOREST FIRE PREVENTION is EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS and our MOST IM-PORTANT undertaking!

(B) REPORT FROM YOUR SUPERINTENDENT...

"Both schoolmen and citizens must be clearly aware of their respective roles and responsibilities. Citizens have the ultimate responsibility for the welfare of their schools. They have delegated immediate authority for everyday policy and operation to the board and schoolmen, but they can never delegate their ultimate responsibility. The citizen holds the final authority, as a voter in the school elections. If we are to have good schools, he must maintain his willingness to study, to recommend and to support." (Henry Toy, Jr., Director of the National Citizens Commission for Public Schools)

INSTRUCTION

In this day of teacher shortage, we are fortunate in having a staff of competent and faithful teachers. Constant emphasis is being placed on attainment of the three R's. Though our facilities are limited, our teachers strive, also, to promote social development, appreciation and some skill in music, opportunities in art work and the practice of good citizenship. Our nurseteacher gives concientious attention to the children's health problems and cooperates with both parents and teachers.

Mrs Dorothy Cotton is teaching forty-one pupils in grades 1 and 2. In a very crowded situation, she is doing splendid work. Great teaching skill is required when the number is so large and diversified in ability.

Mrs Marguerite Alden brings many years of teaching experience and understanding to the boys and girls of grades 5 and 6 at Center School.

Miss Elizabeth Cole of Standish, Maine, replaces Mrs Golden, as a primary teacher. Miss Cole has a bachelor's degree, from Gorham Teachers' College and has had 17 years of teaching experience before coming to us in September. She is teaching our grades 3 and 4 at Parade School in a capable manner.

Mr Harold Sloat is our new teacher of grades 7 and 8 at Center School and is principal. In addition to a few years of business experience, he has a bachelor's degree from Boston University and will soon finish work on his master's degree in education at the University of New Hampshire. He has previously, had teaching experience in this state. The ample supply of good books, workbooks and general educational materials that you provide your pupils is very helpful, as enrollment increases make greater demands on the teachers.

It is nice to have the part-time services of Mrs. Grau as our music teacher. In addition to her regular work she is always willing to devote special time to plays, operettas and graduation programs.

REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENT

There seems no end to the repairs necessary in maintaining old buildings. New roofing has been completed. Desks were moved as pupils were assigned to different schools. Some painting was done during the summer and several minor repairs were completed. Sixty desks were re-surfaced.

The re-building of the front of the Parade School was the major project completed. The old wall was unsafe and had to be removed. New windows were added and strong support put in place. The interior of this wall was improved with tile.

You will recall that in recent years, automatic heat has been added, an artesian well has been drilled and new porches built.

Increased enrollment makes some of our toilet facilities inadequate. Whether to maintain our present facilities in the most sanitary way possible, while waiting for money to accumulate for a new school, or to add and re-build is a decision for the people.

We must do a minimum of repairs next summer, particularly painting, to make our present rooms reasonably comfortable and attractive.

OUR BUILDING PROBLEM

It becomes more apparent each year that our two buildings are inadequate. Our enrollment will probably remain in this vicinity of 130 pupils during the next five years. If our rooms were large and the numbers of pupils evenly divided between grades, this might be a condition we could bear for years to come. However our pupils are being handicapped now. Probably neither building was ever intended originally to house the present enrollments. Best teaching results are not possible when multiple grade enrollments exceed 25. We have no room for activities or a lunch program. Both are needed. At this time we really should have another classroom and teacher.

It seems most practical now to accumulate money in a capital reserve fund. By doing so, we can adjust our tax situation to the increased demand and reduce the actual cost of the new building when the citizens are ready to vote for it. Possibly, the General Court may recognize the great need of smaller and poorer communities for additional funds so that some of the cost will be borne by the state. The welfare of our own boys and girls should be sufficiently important to good parents and citizens, that Barnstead children will be provided educational opportunities equal to those in other communities.

I am most grateful that you are examining your school needs critically. Lay the ground work for real im provement in school facilities. Cooperation in this major project will demonstrate that you have faith in the future of your own community.

(a) Report of School Health Work

To the Townspeople, School Board and Superintendent of Schools of Barnstead:

The following is my fourth annual report of the school health work of Barnstead.

During the winter and spring months of 1954, we had 35 cases of mumps in schools. One case of spinal meningitis was discovered at a pre-school clinic: Fortunately, the child recovered and those children known to have been exposed to the disease were put on profylactic medication and excluded from school until the incubation period was over. No new cases developed.

During the spring of 1954, we saw the "March of Dimes" in action in our own community, not to heal a crippled polio case, but in the hope of preventing this dreaded disease. The biggest field trial in medical history was set forth in this nationwide polio vaccination program. The first, second and third grades participated, having received the consent of the parents. Sometime in 1955 we shall know for sure whether Dr. Salk's vaccine is the successful weapon against polio. The little Polio Pioneers have to be credited for their participation in this fight.

Throughout the fall of this school year, we had relatively little sickness. There was one case of viruspneumonia and scattered cases of colds and flu. This fine attendance ended at Christmas time, when there was a sudden outbreak of measles.

I do believe we all realize the crowded conditions in our classrooms and the necessity for more space. The school enrollment is steadily increasing. In 1954 4,000,-000 babies were born in this country, a record in American history.

Over-crowded classrooms also mean over-crowded toilet space. There has been some criticism of the toilets in our schools. These facilities are not modern or up to date. They are toilets of the non-flushing type and are close to the crowded classrooms. It is impossible to prevent odors in spite of all the efforts being made to avoid them. The toilets and the schools are kept clean and neat. The janitors have to be given credit for their effort, for this is an important part of a well-run school.

All mothers who are getting pre-school children ready for school, I urge to be sure that a physical check up is given these children before they enter school. Teach them the elementary health rules—when and how to use the toilet, washing hands after using the toilets and before eating, use of handkerchief or tissue when coughing or sneezing, Due to over-crowded conditions in the classrooms, this is an important factor in the prevention of the spreading of colds and eventual communicable diseases. If the little ones know these things when they come to school, it will be easier for them and lessen the burden for the teacher, who has too many to handle. The school needs the utmost cooperation from the parents, if the education of our boys and girls is going to be successful.

A lunch program has been promoted. However, lack of facilities and space postpones its functioning. Barnstead is one of the few towns in the state without a lunch program.

The annual physical check-up is preformed each spring by our school physician, Dr. Quinn, of Farming-ton.

Dr. Carpenter of Pittsfield, is having a dental clinic for the Barnstead school children. However, lack of funds makes it impossible to include all who need dental work done.

Everyone should make it a point to see the dentist twice a year. I am sure, as parents, we would be proud to see our children grow up with healthy, sound teeth, through good dental hygiene and regular visits to the dentist.

PART VII. WARRANT FOR SCHOOL DISTRICT..

MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Barnstead, New Hampshire, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on Friday, the eleventh day of March, 1955, at 8:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subject:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers, heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate the support of schools, for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. 9. To see if the district will vote to establish a capital reserve fund for the purpose of improving elementary school facilities, to include the acquisition of land, the construction and equipping of new school facilities, and for the remodeling, additions to, or renovation of existing school plants, and any necessary new equipment; and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000 to be deposited with the Trustees of Trust Funds, in accordance with Revised Laws, Chapter 160. (Maximum allowable by law - $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1% of assessed valuation, \$1.191,459-\$5,957).

10. To see if the district will vote to sell the Beauty Hill School, less any portion of these facilities or equipment therein that the voters may decide, and to deposit the proceeds of such sale in the capital reserve fund, or to determine what other purpose shall be made of such receipts.

11. To see if the school district will vote to instruct the school board to accept the offer of \$800.00 from Harold Smith for the South Barntead School, so called, and to deposit the proceeds of the such sale in the Capital Reserve Fund, or do anything in relation thereto.

12. To see if the district will vote to deposit the balance remaining of current school funds as of June 30, 1955, in the capital reserve account.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.


