Commissioners' Report.

In compliance with the General Laws of the State of New Hampshire we herewith submit the annual report of Belknap County, showing its financial condition and matters of interest, together with the report of the Superintendent of the County Farm, Treasurer, Clerk of the Court, Solicitor, Jailer, Sheriff, Physicians and Auditors.

The finances of the County are in a satisfactory condition. Since our last report we have paid the balance of the floating debt, amounting to \$4,513.39, which leaves the bonded indebtedness of \$50,000.00 as the only debt. Deducting the amount of cash on hand from that leaves as the net debt of the county \$32,137.59, a reduction the past year of \$4,578.81, and as we cannot pay any of the debt until 1914 we would recommend the establishment of a sinking fund so that when the first set of bonds (Court House) become due they can be paid without excessive taxation.

The expense of external poor the past year was \$11,783.73, being a reduction of \$1,415.90 from last year.

The expense of supporting paupers at the farm for the year was \$9,020.35, making the total expense for the care of the poor of the County for the year \$20,804.08.

The report of the Treasurer gives in detail the receipts and disbursements.

COUNTY FARM AND ALMSHOUSE.

This institution has been continued under the imme-

diate charge of Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Thyng, who are well qualified for the responsible position they hold, and words of praise come from every one who visits the farm for the neat and clean condition of the buildings and surroundings, and the kind treatment and care that the worthy unfortunate poor receive at their hands, and we congratulate the taxpayers of the county that we are enabled to secure their services another year.

The sanitary conditions are not what they should be and in our opinion should be completely overhauled. The buildings are in good repair, but there are some matters that should be promptly attended to. The insane ward should be thoroughly overhauled and repaired. The barn is not of sufficient capacity to take care of the large quantity of hay and grain that is raised on the farm each year.

The stock is also too crowded, and we think that by building a new horse barn the trouble would be remedied.

By referring to the Superintendent's report it will be noticed that the expense of the farm has been somewhat more than last year, the reason of which we will explain. It has been the custom in years past for the Commissioners to pay some of the expenses of the farm, such as insurance and permanent repairs, from their office, consequently those amounts have not been charged to farm accounts. This year we have charged up to the farm account every bill we have paid for the farm and we have the past year expended quite a sum blasting and clearing the pasture in front of the house, thereby adding a number of acres to the tillage of the farm; the average number of prisoners in the jail the past year which are chargeable to the County has been about double what it has been the past few years. With this explanation we feel

that we have no reason to make complaint of the increase of expense at the farm the past year.

The sanitary condition of the jail was in such a dangerous state by reason of broken water and sewer pipes that we thought best to make repairs, which cost quite a large sum of money, much more than we expected when we commenced; but we can now say that the sanitary condition of the jail is first-class.

It is well known that we have no House of Correction and we would recommend that some arrangements be made to keep the criminals sent to the House of Correction, where they can receive their merited punishment, instead of punishing the unfortunate inmates of the Alms-house by compelling them to associate with those under sentence for crime.

THE EXTERNAL POOR.

The Commissioners desire to call the attention of the Selectmen and Overseers of the Poor in the several towns and cities of the County to Chapter 27, Section 11, and to Chapter 85, Sections 1, 2, 4, 5, 11 and 14, of the Public Statutes, and inform you that no bills will be paid for more than 30 days' support previous to the proper affidavits being furnished us according to the requirements of the statutes. Proper blanks will be furnished you upon application to the County Commissioners, and we urge upon you the necessity of exercising great care in the management of the poor supported in the several towns. Investigate all new applications for aid and be sure that all such are deserving and legally entitled to such aid, and in every case where aid is furnished be sure that each pauper gets a dollar's worth of goods for every dollar paid.

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Physician's Report.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners and Citizens of Belknap County:

As visiting Physician to the County Farm, I herewith submit my report for the past year:

There has been more than the usual amount of sickness among the inmates at the Farm the past year, as the deaths and births will show, owing to the tramps and poor ladies being sent there for medical attendance.

The regular inmates are in good, flourishing condition, owing to the good care they have.

There have been four deaths: Mr. Whipple, age 25 years, consumption; Mr. Morrison, age 90 years, paralysis; Mrs. Snow, age 59 years, paralysis; Mrs. Dockham, age 79 years, paralysis.

There have been three births. People having no homes were brought to the Farm for care.

The sanitary conditions at the Farm are not what they should be, many of the sewer pipes being open into the laundry and other places.
