REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy — both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area – 4,350,000 acres - is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense:

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.

2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from your children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.

3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches

are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire

record in 1965.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V roads and raise and appropriate money for the same. The Town must raise \$249.29 and the State will contribute \$1,661.96.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the Town for non-payment of taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for tarring. (Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 7. To see if the Town will increase the annual salaries of the three fire wardens to \$75. with an additional \$25. for the chief. This increase in salaries is based upon the understanding that it will cover all of their time, except for actual fire fighting, in performing all of the duties and responsibilities of the office. These duties include the primary responsibility for the proper condition and up-

keep of all fire equipment. (Selectmen and Budget Committee)

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000. to acquire title to land on Jacques Brook, including Cold Spring Pond, and to make such repairs, alterations and improvements thereto as are necessary to protect the public water supply. (Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 9. To see if the Town will authorize the appointment of a committee of four, appointed by the moderator, who together with the Board of Selectmen would be authorized to execute a contract for the purchase of a new town truck at a cost not to exceed \$8,500. Also to authorize the selectmen to issue serial notes to fund this purchase. (Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 10. To see what action the Town will take regarding purchase of hose for the Fire Department and to raise and appropriate \$300. for the same. (Fire Department)
- 11. To see what action the Town will take regarding revisions in the pumping system of fire engine #3 and to raise and appropriate \$455. for the same. (Fire Department)
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift title to a certain tract of land offered to the Town by John Prentiss Weston situate near the shore of Lake Whittemore on the northern side of the highway leading from State Highway #31 to the shore of Lake Whittemore. (Selectmen and Budget Committee)
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to amend the "Regulations for the Use of Public Bathing Facilities at Whittemore Pond" adopted at the 1962 Annual Meeting by adding the following regulation: (Selectmen and Budget Committee)

"Use of that land given to the Town by John Prentiss Weston which is described in deed of said John Prentiss Weston to the Town, dated April 30, 1964, shall be restricted to residents and property owners of the Town of Bennington."

14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the follow-

ing ordinance relating to restraint of dogs: (Selectmen and Budget Committee)

"Every female dog owned or kept in the Town of Bennington shall be restricted from running at large at all times when such dog is in heat.

For violation of this ordinance an owner or keeper of such dog shall be punished by a fine not to exceed ten dollars."

- 15. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Statutory requirements and to carry the articles and appropriations of the School District into effect.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Your Fire Department wishes to thank the townspeople for the kind letters and comments concerning our firemen and fire department. Also the assistance you gave us for our auction and other projects we ran this last summer.

We purchased two Survival Air Packs and we were able to obtain matchings funds from the Civil Defense. It is our desire to start a building fund for a future fire station.

Our new truck was delivered January 23rd. We ran a successful underwriters test January 25th.

The engine was manufactured by the Maynard Fire Apparatus Company, Marshfield, Mass.

This was installed on a Ford 250 chassis supplied by Lindsay's Garage.

It is equipped with a 750 gal. per. min. waterous midship centrifical pump with a rotary primer. Host capacity of 1,500-ft. of $2\frac{1}{2}$ " hose, 500-ft. of $1\frac{1}{2}$ " hose. Tank capacity, 600-gals. of water.

We have also installed a mobile G. E. radio in the unit.

We want to thank the committee for the many hours they must have put in before making the choice. A job well done.

This last year was rather a busy year for fire calls, we had several mutual aid fires and in turn received mutual aid assistance.

Following are fires we attended: chimney fires (2), house fires (1), overheated oil burner (1), dump fires (2), forest fires (3), one in Greenfield, four mutual aid calls, one searching party.

We also had eight practices, some were conducted by Mutual Aid and the Fire Chiefs' Association. Four of our firemen attended and completed the course on air packs and operating fire engines, receiving certificates for same. This was held at the Meadowood Training Grounds. Five firemen attended a training school on house fires at East Swanzey.

Four firemen attended forest fire instruction conducted by the district chiefs in forest fire service.

Due to the shortage of water we delivered water for two families.

SOUTHWESTERN NEW HAMPSHIRE DISTRICT MUTUAL AID REPORT

I have received a brief outline on what the Mutual Aid did in this last year. The Control Center handled over 38,000 phone calls of every description. 16,000 radio transmissions on the fire frequency excluding tests, 14,000 radio calls on the police and ambulance frequency.

There were 99 requests for Mutual Aid in dispatching 573 pieces of fire apparatus to fulfill the requests. By far the largest year the Mutual Aid has ever experienced.

This does not depict any increase of fires but does, however, demonstrate the need and value of fire assistance and the fact that the Fire Depts. are more and more recognizing this fact.

Mutual Aid has also added more towns to the tone system. This has been most successful and will allow Mutual Aid to begin a pre-planning program for high value buildings with an automatic response by the usual Departments that would respond on the regular Mutual Aid call.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Bennington:

It is a pleasure for me to present my eleventh annual report for your consideration:

Federal

It certainly is obvious to any property owner living in the state of New Hampshire, that the efforts of local school districts to provide educational opportunities to their children comparable to the demands of modern civilization, that education is an expensive commodity.

Education is no longer a little red school house operation as it was at the turn of the century. On the national level expenditures for education are second only to the Department of Defense with highways running a close third. Defense has always been a responsibility of the federal government. Since 1956 it has assumed 90% of the cost of the nation's major highway construction program. Is it time for the state and local governmental units to look to the federal government for financial support for education in an attempt to ease the local tax burden? I know that some who read this will rise in horror at the thought and your judgments are respected, but this report is not an attempt to gather support for federal aid to education but rather to advise you that it is already here in a small way and is destined to increase. Schools in this supervisory union are now receiving federal aid to: (1) support home economics teachers' salaries; (2) subsidize the noon lunch program; (3) to support the guidance program; and (4) to provide equipment for the teaching of science, math and modern foreign languages.

During the school year 1964-65 this aid will be extended to the teaching of English, reading, civics, geography, and history.

It would not be surprising to see the Congress at the next session break through the impass between the public and parochial schools to enact legislation which will provide federal funds for school house construction, teachers' salaries and curriculum improvements. These are some of the things that President Johnson was talking about when he recently said, "I intend to put education at the top of America's agenda."

State

For the school year 1964-65 the State of New Hampshire expects to spend 56 million dollars for public school education. The State Department of Education asked the

legislature to reduce this expenditure by local tax payers by 10 million dollars in aid. Including the sweepstakes, this was reduced $7\frac{1}{4}$ million or 12.9% of the total needed.

For the school year 1965-66 it is estimated that 60 million dollars will be needed for public school education and the State Department of Education is asking that the legislature appropriate 13 million dollars or 22.9% of the local effort. When you read this I am guessing that it will have been established that the state contribution to the local effort will be less than 10 million dollars and equal to less than 15% of the need, and this will include the estimated four million from sweepstakes.

It is obvious that the State's effort is not keeping up with the expanding cost. The four million received from the sweepstakes will be less than the increased expenditures in the next fiscal year and what happens when the expected expenditures go from 60 to 65 million in the second year of the biennium?

There are those who feel that the state has no alternative but to find some new sources of income to more nearly accept its obligations to education as well as other state services. The state has the right and the obligation to set standards by which the schools within its boundaries shall operate but with it also goes the obligation to be more realistic in its financial support of its programs.

Each year the State Department of Education establishes the tuition rates that may be charged by local school districts based on the state average per pupil cost of the previous year. I submit these as an indication that a continuation of such growth would seem prohibitive for real estate revenues to support.

The above figures do not include transportation costs or that for capital outlay (debt service and new equipment). Therefore, between 75 and 100 dollars should be added to each of the above figures to obtain a more accurate picture. Yes — education is expensive, but if there is a salvation of our country, education is going to be the cause of it.

Local

It has been my pleasure this year to observe the Bennington school operating effectively and efficiently. It was our good fortune to obtain the services of Mr. James Holmes to replace Mr. James Grant when he left after one year of teaching to join the Peace Corps. It is our hope that this teaching staff will remain intact for a long time.

Our 1964-65 budget for tuition was for 39 pupils, we are now carrying 40 pupils. It is expected that eight will graduate from high school in June, but inasmuch as we will graduate nine from the eighth grade it will be necessary to budget for 41 pupils next year. If we take the present enrollment of the Pierce School and project it to the high school, we find that the number of tuition pupils will increase to about fifty in 1967 and will drop slowly to about 40 again in 1973.

Bennington youngsters are having their problems in obtaining transportation to and from high school. This past summer, several meetings were held in an attempt to alleviate the situation. Our only success was in obtaining a promise from the Whitney Bus Company to continue the daily run to Hillsboro on a trial basis. It is operating on those terms at this writing. Legally, this is not a district problem, but a parental one. However, the record shows that the only transportation that is available every day is one operated by a common carrier and not the use of private vehicles. There has been much discussion about the district assuming some of the financial burden involved, but it would appear that there are too many problems involved to gather very strong support.

In my report last year I spoke of two studies relative to cooperation between school districts. Several meetings have been held and your Board has been faithful in attendance. However, it is sad to relate that neither study could rally enough support to "get off the ground" and

their present status is real dormant.

Again I wish to thank the Citizens of Bennington for their interest in our various educational endeavors, particularly to the many parents of high school pupils who tried, without too much success, to solve their transportation problems. I want to thank the teachers for the fine job they are doing and the Board for its cooperation and sincere interest.

NEW HAMPSHIRE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION CONCORD

The State Board of Education adopted on December 30, 1964, the following policy for granting school building aid to local school districts in accordance with RSA 198:15-a - e. This policy is effective immediately.

POLICY OF STATE BOARD FOR GRANTING SCHOOL BUILDING AID

High School

Any school district contemplating the construction of a high school or an addition thereto with a current enrollment of 300 pupils or more to be housed in the resulting facility will be eligible for full reimbursement of school building aid under the provisions of RSA 198:15 a - e if all other requirements are fulfilled, including the approval of site, plans and specifications.

As contemplated by RSA 198:14-a, a high school with fewer than 300 pupils is prima facie not of sufficient size to offer a good education program at reasonable cost and will not be accepted for school building aid unless the contrary is proved to the satisfaction of the Board. Any school district contemplating the construction of a high school or addition with less than 300 pupils in the resulting facility must first present its project to the State Board through the Commissioner of Education before being considered for aid under RSA 198.

Elementary School

Any school district contemplating the construction of an elementary school or an addition thereto, with a current enrollment adequate to permit assigning one grade to a teacher will be eligible for full reimbursement of school building aid under the provisions of RSA 198:15 a - e, if all other requirements are fulfilled, including the approval of site, plans and specifications.

As contemplated by RSA 198:14-a, an elementary school assigning more than one grade to a teacher is prima facie not a good educational program and will not be accepted for school building aid unless the contrary is proved to the satisfaction of the Board. Any school district contemplating the construction of an elementary school or addition with a current enrollment that will not permit assigning one grade to a teacher must first present its

project to the State Board through the Commissioner of Education before being considered for aid under RSA 198.

REPORT OF STUDY COMMITTEE

Members of your Study Committee have attended several meetings held in Antrim to determine whether the districts in this area could find any mutual grounds on which a cooperative educational endeavor could be directed. Representatives from the towns of Antrim, Bennington, Windsor, Washington, Hillsboro-Deering, Francestown and Greenfield, have been in attendance. The State Department of Education, on invitation, has sent representatives on several occasions to these meetings.

It seemed pretty generally agreed that if a cooperative effort could be effected, that the education opportunities of our youth would be strengthened. However, that was about the extent of the agreement. Preliminary cost charts prepared by the State Department indicated that for such activity the price of education would be sharply increased at a time when local tax payers could ill afford the increased burden. This increase would be due mainly to increased transportation costs and improved services. Both Antrim and Hillsboro are in the process of increasing their plant facilities to care for their growing school population and in the local communities there seemed to be little interest one way or the other relative to the joint effort.

Therefore, at a meeting held late in the summer by the local chairman of the study group, it was decided that, for the present, it was probably necessary to discontinue discussions until such time as conditions changed to a point where it would be much more advantageous to operate jointly than appears to exist at the present time.
