#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deerfield in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Deerfield on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,244.94 for Town Road Aid, the state to contribute \$8,299.58.

4. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired through Tax Collector's Deeds.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000.00 to be used to improve the property deeded to the Town by Mr. and Mrs. John Petersen.

7. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Regulations as adopted at the Town Meeting, March 4, 1961 by adding the following: No building or trailer shall be erected or installed on less than a one acre site and there shall be no subdivision of these sites. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust in Deerfield.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Water Holes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to hold the Annual Town Meeting on the second Tuesday of March.

11. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action taken at the Town Meeting, March 9, 1965, and make available to the School District \$20,000.00 from the Charles B. Prescott Fund to be applied toward the new addition to the George B. White School, provided that a suitable plaque be erected stating that this is the Charles B. Prescott wing of the George B. White School.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for use of the Bicentennial Committee.

13. To see if the Town will vote to make the Town Hall available to the following organizations for the price of \$6.00 for each hall and \$5.00 for the kitchen: Fire Department, Fire Department Auxiliary, American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, Ladies Aid, Woman's Club, Deerfield Grange, Silver Lake Rebekah Lodge, Union Lodge of I.O.O.F., Deerfield 4-H Club, United Church of Deerfield, Jere E. Chadwick Woman's Relief Corp., Deerfield Police Department and George B. White School.

14. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, the road leading from Route 107, near the Old Barn Dance Hall, to the Epsom Line.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the Merrimack Valley Regional Association. 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following resolution:

"Whereas, the year 1966 is Deerfield's Bi-Centennial year, and,

Whereas, it is the custom at bi-centennial celebrations to hold "Beard Growing Contests", and,

Whereas, any celebration of this size requires the full cooperation of all the town's residents, and,

Whereas, some employment forbids its employees to sport hairy cheeks and chins,

Therefore, be it resolved that the Town of Deerfield enact a town ordinance requiring every male voting resident, to grow a beard between April 2, 1966 and July 9, 1966, and,

Be it further resolved, that failure to comply with the aforementioned ordinance will result in a fine of two dollors being levied against the lawbreaker, unless a "Clean Shaven Certificate", which shall cost the sum of one dollar, is procured from the proper authority, as designated by the Deerfield Bi-Centennial Committee.

This resolution to take effect between April 2, 1966, and July 9, 1966, and will terminate thereafter."

17. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Regulations as adopted at the Town Meeting, March 4, 1961, and as amended at the Town Meeting on March 9, 1965 by adding the following: No trailer park, mobile home park, or any like venture by any other name or any other description shall be allowed within the corporate limits of Deerfield. IB) No single trailer or mobile home site shall be allowed within the corporate limits of Deerfield. 1C) All distances shall be measured from the nearest limits of ownership. 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

\* On Tuesday, March 8, 1966, only Article 1 will be considered, pursuant to a vote taken at the Town Meeting held March 9, 1965, unless otherwise voted.

Late in December, the Draper Sears and Co., Inc. who have been advising the Trustees on financial matters, suggested we change from our present method of dividend receipts to a systematic Withdrawal Program which will provide a higher income to the Library. The Puritan Fund shares could be immediately put into this type of program. The 1625 shares of Puritan Fund Stock held by the Library are now held in the National Shawmut Bank of Boston in the name of the Philbrick James Library Fund. The Whitehall Fund could not be turned over into a Systematic Withdrawal Program and were sold as Mutual Funds stock cannot be traded one for another. The money received was invested for us in General Motors Corporation stock. We were able to procure 112 shares quoted at 103½ at the close of market on December 31, 1965.

#### **REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN**

#### AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

#### WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

- 1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely despose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush:
  - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
  - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 P.M.
  - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

#### **REPORT OF WATER COMMISSIONERS**

On December 6, 1965 the Water Commissioners met with the Selectmen. The main topic was House Bill 434, which gives to the Town of Deerfield the right to take water from Pleasant Pond as a Town water supply. This Bill was introduced in the General Court by our Representative, Ross Watts.

The Bill reads as follows:

HOUSE BILL NO. 434 Introduced by Mr. Watts of Deerfield Referred to Committee on Res. Rec. & Dev.

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixty-five

#### AN ACT

Relating to a water supply for the Town of Deerfield.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1. Water Supply. The Town of Deerfield is authorized to enter upon and take water from Pleasant Pond, a great pond, situated in the Town of Deerfield for purpose of obtaining a public water supply for the town, upon compliance with the general laws relating to municipal water systems.

2. Takes Effect. This act shall take effect sixty days after its passage.

#### SCHOOL WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Deerfield qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the fifth day of March, 1966, at one o'clock in the afternoon; business meeting to be held at one o'clock; to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against such appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

To see what sum of money, but not in excess of One 9. Hundred Fourteen Thousand (\$114,000) Dollars, the School District will vote to raise and appropriate by the issuance of serial notes or bonds of the District under and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 33 of the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, as amended, to alter and reconstruct the present elementary school building and construct and equip an addition to the elementary school building of one or more rooms: and further to authorize the School Board to determine the interest rate, the denominations and forms of said notes and bonds, the time and place of payment of principal and interest, and the terms of sale; and that the School Board be further authorized to sign and affix the seal of the District to said notes or bonds and the Treasurer to countersign the same; and further that the School Board be authorized to issue the aforesaid amount of bonds or notes or such lesser amount as the School Board shall deem necessary after giving effect to any available Federal Aid, either anticipated or received, which Federal Aid is hereby appropriated for the purposes stated above.

10. To see what sum of money, but not in excess of Eighty One Thousand (\$81,000.00) Dollars the School District will vote to raise and appropriate by the issuance of serial notes or bonds of the District under and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 33 of the Revised Statutes Annotated of New Hampshire, as amended, to alter and reconstruct the present elementary school building and construct and equip an addition to the elementary school building of one or more rooms; and further authorize the School Board to determine the interest rate, the denominations and forms of said notes and bonds, the time and place of payment of principal and interest, the terms of sale; and that the School Board be further authorized to sign and affix the seal of the District to said notes or bonds and the Treasurer to countersign the same; and further that the School Board be authorized to issue the aforesaid amount of bonds or notes or such lesser amounts as the School Board shall deem necessary after giving effect to any available Federal Aid, either anticipated or received, which Federal Aid is hereby appropriated for the purposes stated above.

11. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to construct an addition to the elementary school building and authorize the School Board to execute any and all contracts and agreements necessary, proper and advisable in connection with the construction.

12. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive in the name of the District such advances, grants, and aid for other funds for educational purposes or related thereto as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government or any state agency.

13. To see if the School District will vote to authorize the School Board to pay no more than the state average for tuition for High School Students of the District.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

#### 1965-1966

It appears from figures now available that the present trend of increased enrollments will continue and that soon we will have 200 pupils. We need eight classrooms, permitting a teacher per grade. It would appear highly desirable to consider a minimum unit of four rooms in order to permit a teachers' room, a unit for the nurse, a small library, and additional storage. Temporary or folding partitions could be used in the event additional classrooms become necessary faster than now seems probable. All predictions indicate continued growth in this section of New Hampshire. We hope that the building program and the necessary funds will be voted.

In the last analysis, the teaching staff is the heart of any school system. We have had fewer changes in recent years because we have been paying the "going rate." The time has come for us to re-evaluate our salaries, in view of increased minimums expected this spring of \$4,800 to \$5,300, with \$5,000 quite common in southeastern New Hampshire. We feel we must meet minimums even though the maximums of our larger schools are out of our reach.

The freedom of choice for tuition pupils and its predicted limitations of last year's report has come to pass. Deerfield must continue to give all avenues to educating its high school youth its most careful thought, and should not exclude any possibility.

#### FEDERAL AID

A brief summary of the newer aspects of Federal aid may be in order. This attempt will be inadequate at best, but may help to understand the basic ideas involved. Title I gives most districts funds to improve educational opportunities for the "educationally deprived" pupil. The money available depends on economically deprived youngsters as determined from the 1960 census. In theory, there is a great variety of possible projects; in practice, only time will tell!

Title II allocates money to each supervisory union for library books and resources, and audio-visual supplies. This union has \$6,500 for these purposes. All of these materials must be deposited in a central place and circulated among school districts as requested, much as a single book may be, but with longer loan periods permissible.

Title III is designed to encourage new ideas in education, to allow for experimental projects, and to encompass large areas. Some of these funds this year will be used for planning grants. Word has just been received that such a grant has been made to the Derry Co-operative School District to plan for a Psychological Service Center for Pre-School and Primary Grade Children for Rockingham County. Assistant Superintendents Ira Stickney of the Derry Union and Roland Schoepf of our office deserve credit for doing the lion's share of the work in preparing the application for this grant. We hope to see this planning grant fully implemented, and such a center established.

The funds under these three titles are "free and clear", and not matched by local funds.

Besides the above, Headstart Projects are still possible under the Office of Economic Opportunity. The planning for these is now at the county level. At the moment, we do not know whether or not we will have any pre-school projects this summer.

There are still funds under the National Defense Education Act for science, mathematics, language, and guidance. These funds must be matched by the local districts.

In the trials and tribulations of working with Federal funds, we are apt to forget that, under PL 89-10, they must be used in addition to regular budgetary funds to do things which would not be otherwise done, and to increase the learning opportunities of children. As in all things human, not all plans will produce results, but who is to say that the effort should not be made? As can be seen from the brief descriptions above, the primary purpose of Federal aid is to make possible a variety of projects and approaches to increase the educational opportunities of all children, with special projects designed for the educationally deprived. In our anxieties of various kinds, we must not overlook the pupils and what may be done to improve their learning opportunities.

We have spent much time and effort in studying these titles, attending meetings, preparing projects, etc. Paper work varies from title to title, with Title III requiring 30 copies of the application! After all is said and done, we are in education to do the best we can for our pupils; this we have done, and will continue to do.

We feel that good progress is evident in the Deerfield schools, which has been made possible by the fine support of the taxpayer and voter. We hope this continues in this "year of decision."

# DEERFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

Your School Board in addition to performing its regular duties in preparing the Budget and hiring the necessary teachers was confronted with three main problems. One was the necessity to take care of the increased school population and its resultant effect on the teachers and students. It was decided to employ an additional teacher and move the fourth grade to the Town Hall. The Town Selectmen and the School Board made an agreement for the use of the lower floor of the Town Hall for this school year. The removal of the fourth grade from the George B. White School allowed the departmentalization of the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades. This system makes use of the best talents of the individual teacher. For example, a teacher who is strong in teaching mathematics teaches all the mathematics for these grades. It also allows for the division of the pupils into similar groups where more assistance can be given to the individual needs of the pupils. It is to be noted that the salary for the extra teacher was squeezed out of the regular Budget appropriation.

The second problem of concern was the increased transportation needs. Bids for a new bus were asked for, and as a result a contract was made with Genest Ford in Manchester for a brand new 60 passenger bus at a lower rate than our other buses of a similar nature. In this contract, the Genest Ford Co. supplies the bus, insures the bus and its passengers, and maintains the bus. The School District pays only for gas and the driver in addition to the contract price.

The third problem concerned itself with the future.

The increased number of pupils in the George B. White School, and the known number of potential students presently in the District below school age required your School Board to make a study of buildings and plan to accomodate this increase. A partial solution was reached this year by using downstairs in the Town Hall for one class. This arrangement does not allow for the best instruction and discipline or the best arrangement for supervision. Furthermore, in order to qualify for State Aid, we must have one classroom for each grade. This means that to qualify for State Aid, we must have at least eight classrooms. Further state requirements include the setting up of some kind of School Library. The teaching staff is reaching a size where a room where they can meet and work is becoming more necessary each day. With the increase in pupils, more storage space is needed for supplies and books. Our present use of space under the stairs does not meet safe fire prevention requirements. Therefore an architect was employed. An architect who has had much experience in school building and one who is noted for checking the contractors for proper performance of their contracts and material used. The Architect submitted four rough plans for consideration of the School Board. Three of these were discarded because of higher costs. The plan selected by the Board has been prepared in detail and will be submitted for action by the School District at its annual meeting.

In order to determine that there was no cheaper way, a study was made of the use of temporary buildings, sometimes called relocatable buildings. These are assembled in sections on contract and rented by the year for five years. At the end of five years they may be purchased for a final sixth payment. These rooms are all heated by electricity.

Example: 2 rooms and toilet (each room to hold a maximum of 26 pupils).

1st year cost	\$ 7,670

The above figures do not include the cost of electric heat and other maintenance.

At current school growth rate, before ten years are up a second two rooms will be needed. Therefore if we project this for ten years the cost would be double the two room temporary building or \$84,300.

It is to be noted that no State Aid can be obtained on these temporary buildings.

Therefore when the School Board received the cost figure for the four room permanent building of \$81,000, it became obvious that temporary structures were not to be further considered.

The financing and cost to the taxpayer for the permanent building works out as follows:

Bond issue \$81,000 paid off at the rate of \$4,000 per year — State pays 30%.

Annual cost to town decreases as years go by.

An additional subject was considered by your School Board. The Deerfield Educational Fund proposed that they institute, organize, and conduct courses in Reading Improvement this summer, beginning about July 11, and running for six weeks. Since the Deerfield Educational Fund is to supply the teachers and be solely responsible for the summer session, your Board approved their request for the use of the George B. White School for this purpose.

#### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

It doesn't seem possible that this is my fourth message. The years have gone by quickly because they have been busy and active.

This school year saw an increase in the school population from one hundred sixty to one hundred eighty. This increase will be common in the years ahead. The increased enrollment prompted me to ask for another teacher. Also, in order to alleviate the overcrowded classroom conditions, I asked that the fourth grade be sent to the Town Hall. This arrangement is far from satisfactory, but due to the excellent cooperation of Mrs. Low, the students do not feel neglected.

Transportation still is and shall continue to be a problem. The replacement of the thirty passenger bus with another sixty passenger bus has helped considerably.

Due to these new needs, the School Board, Superintendent and myself have been hard pressed to stay within the budget.

The time has arrived when we must add to our existing school plant. Much time has been given to this. It is the concensus that we ask for a four room addition with storage rooms and a nurse's room. This will give the school eight classrooms, a library and a teacher's room. (The latter two being what is now the first and second grade classrooms.)

The 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th Grades were departmentalized this year. Our new teacher Mr. Beeman teaches Social Studies and Related matters, Mr. Perkins teaches Language Arts and Reading. I have the Mathematics and Sciences. (This is working out very nicely and next year with another teacher will be even more beneficial for the students.) We were pleased to have two students from Mount Saint Mary's College. The two, Miss DiGiacomo grade one and Miss Ford grade two, did an excellent job.

Deerfield can be proud of its hard working dedicated School Board, Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent and Teachers. Dollar for dollar, the community is getting its money's worth.

This administration thanks you for your past and present support. I trust that you will continue to do so in the future.

A progress report was made and mailed to each tax payer or voter in town. When ever any additional information is available a public meeting will be called to inform the people.

#### PLANNING COMMITTEE

#### **Minority Report**

Of recent years many changes have been evident in the meaning of certain words of our language. Thus, the same word may prove to be of different meaning to people although the word itself may be in common usage. Or, it may carry the intent of another word.

Hence, there is a deplorable confusion between "education" and "instruction". There is a vast difference. For one example *education* consists in teaching a child fundamental moral values leading to the notion of basic human dignity. *Instruc*tion consists in having a child absorb accumulated knowledge of mankind.

The idea, then, that the Deerfield children would be given a superior education in a multi-million area school brings the thought that the premise is not "necessarily so".

The townspeople attending the October 13, 1965 meeting on the proposed cooperative school heard this member of the Planning Committee warn of the blind acceptance of this proposal of such vast importance.

Turning our attention to the projected costs, it is to be noted that about two-thirds of our tax dollars are now being used for school support. The remaining one-third being essential for other town services. The point here is that add-on revenue *must* be add-on property taxes.

The introduction of building costs of an area school, the increase in teacher salaries, maintenance of the school, support of luxury courses, increase in transportation costs, could increase tax bills year after year. Deerfield taxpayers would be *told* of the amount that must be raised for school expense. Freedom to vote on school costs, controls held since the passage of the "Deluder Satan" law in 1647 requiring towns to provide rudiments of learning for the town children, would be dissolved.

All this under the banner that it is for our own welfare.

These are some of the reasons why I do not recommend, to the Deerfield townspeople, the acceptance of the cooperative school plan at this time.

As the October meeting did, in fact, take the Deerfield Committee officially out of the cooperative school study I then voiced continued interest, as a Committee member, in helping in other directions to solve Deerfield school problems.

The offer was not acknowledged nor was it answered.

The Deerfield Committee has not met since the official withdrawal from the Pawtuckaway Regional School Planning Board.
