TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deering in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will raise to repair highways and bridges, or pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for interest or take any action thereto.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to raise \$250.00 to apply towards P. W. A. Bond or pass any vote relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise \$2000.00 to apply towards truck notes.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for street lights, or pass any vote relating thereto.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise \$300.00 for blister rust control, or pass any vote relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise \$48.00 for the Monadnock Region Association, or pass any vote relating thereto.

- 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to deliver inventory blanks to residents when assessing.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise \$1000.00 for old age assistance and town poor.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise sufficient money to secure Town Road Aid for roads.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money towards the expense of Old Home Day.
- 14. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.
- 15. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for insurance or pass any vote relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to employ a State appraiser to re-assess the real estate and vote money to pay cost of same.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise money to buy road surfacing equipment or take any action relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise \$150.00 for the Deering Library.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to purchase a tract of land and maintain the same for a town dump.
- 20. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to plowing private driveways.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to adopt a by-law as follows:

(Under authority of S. 39, C. 233 R. L.) It shall be unlawful for any person to kindle or cause to be kindled a camp or outdoor cooking fire in this town without the permission of the forest fire warden.

- 22. To see if the town will vote to purchase a 38 cal. police revolver for the police department.
- 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING Deering, N. H., March 14, 1950

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of Deering, N. H., was called to order at 10:30 in the forenoon, March 14, 1950, by the Moderator, Howard E. Whitney. The warrant was read.

Upon motion made by Arnold K. Ellsworth, it was voted to take up Articles 2-19 at 11:30 o'clock. Article 1. Ballots were cast for all officers on the Aus-

tralian ballot as follows:

Selectman for 2 years: Arthur O. Ellsworth received 96 votes and took oath of office.

Selectman for 3 years: H. Lothrop Herrick received 33 votes; Gordon B. Rich received 75 votes and took oath of office.

Town Clerk: Dorothy J. Wood received 16 votes; Marguerite L. Dutton received 79 votes and took oath of office.

Tax Collector: Joseph M. Carew received 99 votes and took oath of office.

Town Treasurer: Dorothy J. Wood received 16 votes; Marguerite L. Dutton received 75 votes and took oath of office.

Overseer of Poor: Carroll E. Greene received 96 votes and took oath of office.

Highway agent: Winniatt K. Griffiths received 38 votes; Albert S. Johnson received 70 votes and took oath of office.

Auditors: Marjorie A. Holden received 97 votes and took oath of office; Eunice E. Willgeroth received 98 votes and took oath of office.

Library Trustee, 3 years: Lillian Murdough received 30 votes; Rosamond Herrick received 63 votes and took oath of office.

Trustee of Trust Funds, 3 years: Mary K. Griffiths received 27 votes; Gladys A. Ellsworth received 79 votes and took oath of office.

Trustee of Trust Funds, 1 year: Dorothy J. Wood received 77 votes and took oath of office.

Chief of Police: William J. Dumais received 94 votes and took oath of office.

Constable: Gordon B. Rich received 39 votes; Kenneth Fales received 58 votes and took oath of office.

Surveyor of Wood and Lumber: Everett Abbott received 96 votes and took oath of office.

Article 3. Upon a motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth, it was voted to raise \$4000 for highways and bridges.

Article 2. Upon a motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth, it was voted to raise \$2500 for town charges.

Article 4. Upon a motion made by Carroll E. Greene, it was voted to raise \$600 for interest.

Article 5. Upon a motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth, it was voted to raise \$250 to apply on P. W. A. bond.

Article 6. Upon a motion made by Marie Wells, it was voted to raise \$2000 to apply on truck note.

Article 7. A motion was made by Charles E. Reidt to raise \$400 for street lights. After a discussion by Charles McNally, Charles E. Reidt and Marie Wells on the motion, a vote was taken. It was in the affirmative.

A motion was made by Arthur O. Ellsworth to have Charles Reidt choose the location for the new light. A standing vote was taken, the result of which was 34 in the affirmative and 12 in the negative.

Article 8. Upon a motion made by Carroll Greene, it was voted to raise \$300 for Blister Rust Control.

Article 9. Upon a motion made by Charles E. Reidt, it was voted to raise \$54 for the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 10. Upon a motion made by Sherrod Ashby, it was voted to authorize the selectmen to deliver inventory blanks when assessing.

Article 11. Upon a motion made by Marie Wells,

it was voted to raise \$1000 for old age assistance and town poor.

Article 12. Upon a motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth, it was voted to raise \$814.50 for Town Road Aid.

Article 13. Upon a motion made by Sherrod Ashby,

it was voted to raise \$75 for Old Home Day.

Article. 14. Upon a motion made by Marie Wells, it was voted to authorize the selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.

Article 15. After a discussing of the article, a motion was made by Carroll Greene to raise \$250. The

vote on it was in the affirmative.

Article 16. Upon a motion made by Carroll Greene, it was voted to raise \$600 for insurance.

Article 17. Upon a motion made by Carroll Greene, it was voted to raise \$40 for the preservation of the town charter. A motion was made by Dr. Yeaple to have photostatic copies made of the restored charter, to be hung in the town hall and the original to be stored with the Historical Society in Concord. It was so voted.

Article 18. A motion was made and it was voted to rescind action taken by the town in 1947 in regard to letting of the town hall. Upon a motion made by Marie Wells, it was voted to let the Town Hall to citizens or organizations of Deering only.

Article 19. Upon a motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth, it was voted to have the selectmen appoint a

janitor.

The resignation of Carroll E. Greene as Selectman was read by the Moderator.

Upon a motion made by Chester McNally, it was voted to accept Carroll Greene's resignation.

Carroll E. Greene was then nominated by Marie

Wells to be Selectman for one year.
Robert Putnam was nominated by Chester P. Mc-

Nally.

Úpon a motion made by W. S. K. Yeaple, it was voted that nominations be closed.

Voting was done by written ballot. Arnold Ellsworth and Chester Durrell were named as tellers by the Moderator. The result was as follows: Robert L. Putnam had 22 votes; Carroll E. Greene had 56 votes and was declared to be elected. He was sworn in.

It was voted to close the polls at five in the afternoon.

Voted to adjourn without date.

REPORT OF SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION

To the Citizens of Deering:

I herewith submit my sixth annual report concern-

ing school problems in Deering.

To evaluate any contest or operation, we first have to know the rules of the game or the objectives of the program. The objectives of any good educational program are determined by the educational needs of the community which the program is to serve. Such objectives have little value however, unless they are thoroughly understood by the community. Any community which operates a school just because it always had one, is wasting its money except that some good may accidentally come from such expenditures.

The costs of educational programs are now so high in comparison to those of fifteen years ago, as are all other costs of living, that alarm causes us all to reexamine the program with critical eyes. To decide whether our results are worth the price or not, we should first determine what it is that we want.

Someone has pointed out that it is the privilege of the school to nurture the young to know and understand the world aright and, maybe, as they grow to

maturity to redeem it.

In our world today we are being threatened by a Russian power which is bent on controlling all peoples. The American way of life is called democratic because it operates under a government closely supervised by the people themselves. If the United States is to continue to be a democracy, its citizens must be free. If citizens are to be free, they must be their own judges and if they are to judge well, they must be wise about problems of their society. While our citizens are presently born as free citizens, they are not born wise. Therefore the job of liberal education in our democracy is to make our free men wise. If our democracy requires that the people shall judge, liberal education

must help people to judge well. There are today many highly regarded citizens who never having examined the problems of living in a democracy and of protecting it against a mental attack such as that of Russia; in desperation try to foist dogma on our programs instead of giving us sufficient funds and facilities to strengthen the democratic experiences and learnings of the future citizens now in our schools. James Madison long ago pointed out in his contributions to the Federalist Papers that mere election of public officials would never guarantee the proper perpetuation of our democracy. Schools can do the job if they are organized and administered in the proper manner.

Proponents of liberal education will be threatened by believers in dogma. The true liberal acts slowly; for the processes in which he has faith take much time. He must assay others' beliefs so that what he eventually does or says will be less narrowly conceived. It is much easier for the American with little understanding of democracy to act, for he just knows that he is right and because he is right he deserves power. If this type of authority builds up in a community, it results in those in power calling everything right if they agree or all wrong, if they don't. We all know that this is

the way to destroy truth and democracy.

The schools then must stand for liberal education if we are to preserve our democracy. There is every likelihood that they will have to put up violent struggles against authoritarian forces who may even

operate in a democracy.

Your pupils are being given good training in the fundamental processes of education such as reading and arithmetic. With these tools to work with, they may study the world in which they live. Many of their teachers then give them opportunity to experience the processes of a democracy in operation.

Deering continues to send most of its pupils to Hillsboro. This would appear to be a good arrange-

ment for the pupils and for Deering. It is also helpful to Hillsboro, financially. The tuition rates have been raised again for next year. They will still be less than the state average cost of instruction for the current year. The cost is probably lower than Deering could operate even a minimum program for and certainly

less than you could operate a suitable program.

The Deering budget is probably just enough to operate with next year. School costs have gone up just like everything else but while we're on the subject of money, so have wages, dividends and most other income. The transportation contract with Whitney Bus Service has just been extended for three years, until June 1954, at the same annual cost as heretofore. Transportation represents quite a part of the school cost and the close cooperation of your school board and the transporter in this contract extension is commendable since in view of rising costs everywhere, it represents further savings to the district and still provides the already proved transportation facilities. The new program of the State Highway department in helping to build local highways is in line with our previous pleas for highway planning in towns such as Deering where highways play such an important part in the school operation.

The East Deering school continues to serve the pupils in that area very well. The improvements have made it a much happier place to learn in. Mrs. Ruth Fisher has fitted into its life very adaptively as our new teacher. Her pupils are showing excellent progress, particularly in reading. Kenneth E. Jewett, Fine Arts Supervisor in the area, has worked with Mrs. Fisher twice a month at the school to promote learnings in Art and Music. His work with pupils is always inspiring and the pupils always await his return visit with eagerness. Mrs. Griffin has continued her health program at the school with attendant benefits to the

pupils' welfare due to her constant interest in their

problems.

In conclusion I extend my sincere thanks for your generous financial and moral support of our educational program. It has been a great pleasure to cooperate with Mr. Fales, Mrs. Herrick and Mrs. Willgeroth of your School Board in the administration of your educational services.
