(L.S.) STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Enfield, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Whitney Hall in said Town of Enfield on the 11th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose by ballot all necessary town officers required by law to be chosen for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose by ballot one selectman for three years, one library trustee for three years, and one trustee of trust funds for three years.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, and the sum so borrowed to be paid during the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Municipal Accounting Division of the State Tax Commission to audit the accounts for the ensuing year, of its several Town officers and raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for the same, or act thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in re-appraising the taxable property in the Town in order to secure greater equality between taxpayers and to insure the assessment of all property in the Town on the same standard of value, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to pay for the same, or act thereon.

Article 6. Pursuant to a petition of ten legal voters, to see if the Town will vote to erect a cable fence on Oak Grove Street and raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same, or act thereon.

Article 7. Pursuant to a petition of ten legal voters, to see if the Town will vote to provide a safe and adequate fire-escape on Whitney Hall, and raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same, or act thereon.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 as the Town's share of State Aid Construction for the completion of the 4th New Hampshire turnpike, the State to furnish \$17,500.00, or act thereon.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw that section of unimproved Secondary Highway System, running from Biathrow's house to the 4th New Hampshire turnpike, from the Secondary State Highway System, 1945 map, and contingent on that action, to see what instructions the Town may give to its Representative.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$849.07 as the Town's share of Town Road Aid, the State to furnish \$3,396.28, or act thereon.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Budget and raise and appropriate the sums recommended and posted by the Budget Committee, or act thereon.

Article 12. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Officers or Committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13. To take any vote or transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.

Polls will open at 9:30 A. M. and not close before 5:30 P. M.

BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

Fellow Citizens:

The budgets for the Town and School District Annual meetings are herewith submitted.

There are certain contingencies that may arise, between the date of the submission of the budgets and that of the Town and District meetings, which may affect the results of the budgets submitted. These contingencies are dependent upon certain bills. now before the State Legislature; and also, upon possible decisions of the State Highway Department.

The budget, as it severally applies, together with its increases and decreases and the above mentioned contingencies; will be fully explained at your annual meetings: and you are urged to appear at those meetings, to protect your own financial interests.

The Budget Committee, together with the Selectmen and School Board, prepare these budgets for your consideration: but YOU, citizens of Enfield, have the sole authority, to vote those appropriations therein; which YOU consider necessary: and thus VOTE YOUR OWN TAX BILL.

The probable increase in taxes required to fulfill both budgets, is approximately 25 percent.

About 350 books, including gifts and purchases, have been added to the Library this year and the Trustees wish to take this opportunity of thanking all those who have contributed to the same. The Library sustained a great loss when Mrs. Tobin was obliged to give up her work and again when William Stratton resigned as Trustee. We are glad to report that Mrs. Carl Cattabriga has accepted the position of Library assistant and that Mr. Wayne Campbell has consented to serve as the new Library trustee and treasurer. The Library was closed for about eight weeks this summer, the first time for about four years, in order to take a complete inventory of the book collection and discard old and out of date books, clean and varnish all the book-stacks, etc. Over 2000 catalog cards have been typed and filed. The Library has made good use of its loan privileges with the New Hampshire State library, both by mail, and through the Bookmobile and also with Dartmouth College Library. Readers are requested to notice the change in Library hours beginning the first of 1947. Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. This is particularly true of forest fire control work. Preventing forest fires preserves valuable forest growth and other property, conserves man power and permits their use in productive channels, saves taxpayers' money and conserves fire fighting equipment.

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. Appointed by the State Forester, upon recommendation of the Selectmen, he is charged by law with the responsibility of local administration of forest fire laws, fire prevention and suppression. In his work he is aided by deputy forest fire wardens who, in emergency, may assume his power and authority. The warden is guided in his work by instructions received from the State Forester and by the District Fire Chief who represents the State Forester.

The importance and value of the work of the forest fire warden and his deputies is, perhaps, best appreciated during hazardous periods when fire danger is greatest. The public, however, looks to him at all times for speedy and economical suppression of going fires.

To properly fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matter of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record shows that an average of 7,300 acres of woodIand are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

The elimination of human causes from the forest fire problem is the answer. This is not as difficult of accomplishment at it might appear at first glance. Let each one who reads this—

- 1. Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.
- 2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.
- 3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving vehicles.
- 4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge others to do so.
- 5. HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES—his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!



To the Voters of the Town of Enfield:

Pursuant to Article 9 of the 1946 Town Warrant "that the Moderator appoint a committee of three to investigate the needs and desires of the Town in regard to an all purpose community building, and said committee to report to the next annual town meeting," we submit the following report:

First: After a thorough investigation we found a need for a hall suitable for moving pictures, visual education and a larger auditorium for town and school functions.

Second: We found a need for gymnasium for town and high school basket ball games, indoor sports and an all purpose community center.

Third: It was brought to our attention that more class rooms were needed at the school to accommodate the increased enrollment.

Upon analysis of the foregoing requirements it appears to your committee that the building should be situated near or adjacent to the present school building.

We recommend this location because:

First: Need of both school and town for these facilities.

Second: Practically no conflict in time of use of building by school and town.

Third: Economy in operation.

Fourth: Lot and ample parking space available.

Fifth: Extra class rooms can be incorporated in a combined building at less expense than when built separately.

Architectural drawings will be posted for your inspection at time of town and school meetings.

Due to the impossibility of obtaining exact costs and shortage of material and labor your committee recommends that this project be left open for further study and a committee be appointed to make a report next year when perhaps costs are more stabilized and material more easily obtained.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Enfield:

Start of Year. I was first introduced to the Enfield School Board and the community one rainy evening in August when the question of closing the Enfield Center School was under discussion. I was fully in accord with the previous superintendent and the present school board to close the school.

School Visitation. Many persons stand on the sidelines and wonder what happens in our schools. Others take any little morsel of gossip as truth about school facilities and school programs. The best results are found when a community has faith in its schools and its teachers. One means of getting this is to visit and to see what is happening. Parents are especially welcome to drop in and see the children at work. The headmaster and teachers will be pleased to have you, and after a few visits the pupils will not pay any attention to you. So, ask a friend or another parent to join you and come and visit "our" schools. Such visitations will do much to clear up misunderstandings. It is the oil which lubricates the wheels of cooperation and mutual respect.

P-T. A. Probably the most significant thing that has happened in Enfield this year is the spirit which has enabled a group of persons to organize a Parent-Teacher Association. The meetings have been most worth-while and the opportunities for such a group are unlimited. The membrship may reach 100 before the end of the year, and this is one group that you may join and lend your energy to for better schools.

Staff. There is a very loyal group of teachers in the Enfield school. Eight of the 12 are new this year and this welding of new and old was accomplished in large measure through the efforts of the headmaster, Louis Ramsay. Adequate salaries, improved facilities, and good housing are some of the factors that aid in preserving a loyal teacher group.

Budget. The proposed budget was adopted by the school board at a meeting that lasted nearly 8 hours. It has in it a minimum amount of money to operate the schools for the coming year. The largest item is for instruction and this is as it should be for that is the reason why schools are operated. Two additional teachers are requested and with these we hope to accomplish among other things the following:

- (a) Free the headmaster from some of his teaching load to permit more time for supervision.
- (b) Provide better trained personnel in the shop program.
- (c) Allow Mr. Tenney to carry on an expanded program of physical education.
- (d) Give more help to the lower grade teachers to cut down on retardation.
- (e) If the proper person is found, to give some time for music in the curriculum.

School Board. The members of the Enfield School Board are sincerely interested in the education of the boys and girls. They need your help. So do I. This is a plea for a cooperative, constructive spirit on the part of all persons in Enfield. Teamwork is needed if Enfield is to have proper schools.

Enlarged Curriculum. The day will come in Enfield when there will be a curriculum offering good programs in shop, home economics, music, art, physical education, and kindergarten. These are accepted necessities in the best school systems in America. How long can Enfield afford to treat these as luxuries? ..

State Aid. The proposed program of state aid will benefit Enfield. Just how much remains to be seen. The present legislature has in its hands the power to give a big lift to the education of all New Hampshire children. Your attitude and influence can help this worthy program.

Problems. There are many problems facing us and two deserve special attention. One, improved lighting in the school and, two, a cost of living bonus of \$200 to all teachers. An editorial in a recent school publication stated the case clearly and in good taste for edequate lighting. I commend this to you. If you can't find it, visit the school to see for yourself.

Low salaries for teachers are well known in many places. Teachers need to be financially secure to do their best work. Your children are the beneficiaries, and you will be given an opportunity to express your opinion on this important matter.

Conclusion. There is a general awakening of interest in our schools in every state. New Hampshire is attempting to assert itself. The people are sensing the problems arising as a result of the great numbers of teachers leaving the profession. The hopeful note in Enfield is in three places: (1) a good staff of teachers that should be retained, (2) a growing, strong P-T. A. and (3) an enthusiastic school board.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors, or Committees necessary for managing District Affairs.

8. To see if the District will vote to have the Accounts of its Officers for the ensuing year Audited by the Municipal Accounting Division of the State Tax Commission.

.9 To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,400.00 to provide a \$200.00 salary increase for each teacher in the District for the year ending June 30, 1947; said deficiency appropriation to be made available during the present fiscal year, or act thereon.

10. To see if the District will vote to adopt the Budget and raise and appropriate the sum of \$45,726.34 as recommended and posted by the Budget Committee, for salaries of District officers, support of schools and other statutory requirements, plus any additional receipts of the District, or act thereon.

11. To see what action the District will take to provide more adequate facilities for Physical Education, Practical Arts for boys and girls, and additional classrooms.

12. To see if the District will vote to elect two citizens of the District to act in conjunction with the school board as a building committee, to purchase land if necessary, execute all contracts and agreements necessary, proper or advisable in connection with the construction and equipping of a new addition to the present school.
