ORGANIZATION OF CITY GOVERNMENT

Tuesday, March 27, 1917.

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, members-elect of the city council for the municipal year of 1917 and the members from the previous council met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

The oath of office was administered to the mayor-elect, Hon. Clarence E. Rowe, by the retiring Mayor, Hon. George P. Munsey.

The mayor administered the oath of office to the following councilmen-elect, viz:

Prayer was then offered by the Rev. John L. Shively, after which the mayor delivered his inaugural address.

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

OF HON, CLARENCE E, ROWE, MARCH 27, 1917

Gentlemen of the Council:

In the life of every man there is a sudden transition which seems almost miraculous. The cause which produces this sudden change may have been long at work within him, but the change itself is instantaneous and apparently without sufficient cause.

And thus today, gentlemen, the thirteenth mayor of your city, a native son, takes the oath of office, realizing that the executive heads who precede him were men much older in years, business and understanding.

No man achieves anything worthy until he learns the power of conviction. If we are deficient of courage, pluck or determination, we must develop these qualities, and then assert them vigorously.

We all find that the sane way to live is to be busy about something; to take a keen interest in concerns which do not directly minister to one's own vanity; to find occupation and pleasure in doing things for other people.

So we, as members of the Laconia City Council, in assuming office to-day, do it fully understanding the personal sacrifice of time, energy, and I am sorry to say, friends.

Let us, on entering this council chamber, leave behind all political animosities, if they unhappily exist, forgetting all ward and sectional feelings; remembering that we are to represent only the citizens and tax payers of Laconia. Never allow yourself to admit that you are inferior to the emergency confronting you, for this is to invite defeat. Let us also remember that courtesy is of commercial value, whenever in business a man comes in contact with his fellows. Many a transaction has been brought to a successful issue by the exercise of a tactful courtesy, which without it would never have been consummated.

Our personnel this year finds three new faces.

Councilman Avery, after fourteen years of most efficient service, retires and accepts an appointment from our President. Personally, I regret to see him sever his connections with this body. We can only wish him grand success in his new office.

We of the preceding council who return, greet those of the new, and I am well assured that our new members will do their duty.

Let us review the accomplishments of our City departments in the past year.

STREET DEPARTMENT.

Good results were obtained, although handicapped by wet weather, inability to secure supplies, and excessive cost of material. Gentlemen, let me emphasize this last item, excessive cost of material. We must not lose sight of the fact that in the past two years, supplies of this nature have advanced from twenty-five to one hundred per cent.

In view of this fact, our new construction will not make the showing of past years.

PLEASANT STREET.

This street during the wet seasons has always been a detriment to our city, but today we find from the railroad to beyond Tremont street, a paved, macadam street, regraded, granite curbed, sidewalks resurfaced, and all at a total cost of \$12,156.87.

There are many streets throughout our city which need similar improvements, and the city council of the future should use their best endeavors to appropriate at least ten thousand dollars per year for this permanent construction.

UNION AVENUE.

It was the intention of our Street Commissioner to construct tarvia macadam, and place curbing on this avenue from Casino Square southerly, but due to lack of help and inability to secure material, work stopped at Summer street. I would recommend that the work on this avenue be completed this year. Wherever there may be a dispute as to street lines, said lines should be established, and Union avenue from Casino square to Main street be thus improved.

When Church street is widened and bridge rebuilt, all traffic must be diverted over this avenue, and in its present condition it would be very unsatisfactory.

WEIRS BOULEVARD.

The construction of a state road at the southerly terminal of the business section of Weirs was one fully appreciated by our citizens and tourists, but was completed under difficulties, costing fifty-four cents per square yard more than that of Pleasant street.

Our street department, in eight years, has laid nearly eighty thousand square yards of tarvia macadam, the maintenance of which in 1916 was \$0.0216 per square yard.

These roads are giving entire satisfaction and have received high recommendations from United States authorities, who have made personal inspection.

Laconia now has in use 14.3 miles of surface drains, of which 3,642 feet were built in the past year.

One thousand, three hundred twenty-nine feet of sanitary sewers were also built in 1916, giving us a total sewerage system of 23.3 miles.

There is an absolute necessity that we build more sanitary and surface drainage, and I will suggest that perhaps it may be wise for Laconia to borrow money in a sum not to exceed twenty thousand dollars, issuing its notes therefor from time to time, as the money is required, for said sewers and drainage. And that said notes become

payable in sums not to exceed five thousand dollars yearly until the amount borrowed and used for said construction is paid.

CHURCH STREET.

In view of the fact that it is the intention to build a Government building on Church street this year, it does not seem wise for the city to undertake any extensive improvements at this time, as it would necessitate closing the street for several months, and this would impede traffic.

The heavy construction of the postoffice building requires good roads and short hauls. The bridge should be rebuilt at the time the street is widened.

Franklin square is a section that demands improvement of the permanent nature, and would meet with the approval of our citizens.

Some start should be made this year for the betterment of Academy street, and I will suggest that granite curbing be placed on both sides of the street, commencing at the junction of Academy street and Court street, and extending to Fair and Lincoln streets.

Our Park Commissioners are to be congratulated for the excellent service rendered, and I trust that the Council may be able to grant any needed assistance.

The Teachers Parent Association is giving to Laconia assistance which could not be obtained in any other manner. They are endeavoring to teach our children how to improve their idle hours, and I am pleased to say with grand success.

Our appropriation should be fully as large as 1916.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

It has been said that "the only disagreeable thing about popularity is the cost of maintenance," but, gentlemen, if we get for value received, should we ridicule?

I think our Fire Department is under excellent management. The officers and personnel are competent men.

The city has purchased an American LaFrance triple combination fire truck, which I think is a move in the right direction. Should it prove satisfactory, I trust that we may motorize other machines in the department.

At a recent test, this engine pumped seven hundred and seventy gallons of water per minute, throwing a spray two hundred and twenty-five feet away.

Through fourteen hundred feet of hose, it threw water fifteen feet over Scott & Williams' water tower, which is eighty-five feet from the ground.

This engine pumps as many gallons per minute as the pumps at the Laconia pumping station.

The department has disposed of three horses and five call men, which if they had been retained, would have cost one thousand and seventy-seven dollars per year to maintain.

Lectures on "first aid" should be given by our city physician to the members of this department, and a first aid case chould be placed on the new truck.

During the last year we have installed at Elm street station, an electric automatic air compressor for fire alarm service, and it has proven a good investment.

I would recommend that a similar compressor be placed in the central fire station on Water street.

Today we have in our city over four and a half million dollars of fire insurance.

LEGAL.

Our legal department is in the efficient hands of F. M. Beckford, Fsq., and he reports that at the present time thirteen cases are in court, many of which he is in hopes to dispose of at the present session of court. New ordinances have been introduced and passed at his suggestion. At the present time our city solicitor is compiling a history of the city officials, past and present, together with city ordinances, rules and orders of the City Council, Board of Public Works, etc., and when completed will make a very handy volume.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The Police Commissioners recommend, and I most assuredly approve, that a new police station be erected during the coming year.

The Fire Department asks for a new heating plant. I would suggest that a heating plant be installed in the central fire station large enough to heat both fire and police stations, the heater to be cared for by the fire department.

STREET LIGHTING.

The new system of lights installed in 1915 has met with general satisfaction.

Our electric light company should see that the lamps are kept at a higher degree of efficiency.

It should be well to ascertain what terms might be arranged for lighting the boulevard, so called, between Lake street and Weirs bridge, three months in the year, from June 15th to Sept. 15th.

The reports of Trustees of Trust Funds, Treasurer of the Laconia Hospital, Laconia Public Library, and Board of Health, are reports which I respectfully recommend that you read with deliberation.

Gold street bridge was ordered discontinued by the City Council after many hearings. A petition to prevent the discontinuance, brought by citizens, is now in court. I would recommend that a foot bridge be built if the old one should be removed.

School appropriations have been withdrawn from the supervision of the Council, and the department comes under the School District.

All departments will demand larger appropriations, and it becomes our duty to avoid extravagance, using our best endeavors not to clog the wheels of progress, but to give our city her just demands. The Finance Committee of 1916 have already recommended appropriations totaling \$151,000. Many improvements could be suggested, but

for reasons before mentioned as well as a greater state and county tax, they will be omitted.

On the recommendation of the Board of Public Works and City Engineer, the city purchased from the "New England Investment Co." the property located on Messer street, and originally built for coal and wood sheds, at a price of \$2800. This property includes a railroad trestle three hundred feet long, one half of which is enclosed and covering six bins about twenty feet square. The barn has twenty stalls, a good hay loft and barn cellar. There is also a set of platform scales.

It was imperative that the city should secure some location for the deposit of garbage and waste material. And this land, bordering on the water, seemed an ideal location, as was explained by the City Engineer.

With this railroad siding and trestle we are enabled to unload supplies, such as crushed rock, coal, tile pipe, tarvia and oil for future use and purchased when the market is low. A storage tank for oil is to be installed and general repairs made, which will call for an expenditure of some three thousand dollars.

I would recommend that as soon as practical, the stone crusher be moved from its present location to this new property and the Union avenue land sold.

One request in closing is that one of your first appropriations be for the sum of ten thousand dollars, to be known as a Reserve Fund, this fund to be used for two purposes, and as you may elect. Either for the reduction of city debt, or to be used for the aid of those families who may be called upon to sacrifice the earning power of their home in the defence of their country.

We are proud to have among our citizens, men who comprise Coast Artillery Corps No. 2, and being a coast company, they would be among the first to be called into National defense.

At the present time their strength is seventy-three en-

listed men, and orders have been received to enlist to war strength, one hundred and seven men.

In case of aid we might draw from the Support of Poor department, but these homes should not be classed as such. They may require aid, as far as worldly goods are concerned, but consider for a moment the richness in love of country and patriotism.

This flag must be protected. Let us as members of the city government, the representatives of our citizens, do all in our power to assist in this small way.

Harmony is the strength and support of all institutions, more particularly this of ours. Gentlemen, I ask you to carry this thought with you during the coming year.

FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS AGAINST THE CITY

All bills against the city must be approved by the persons authorizing the charge; and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the committee on accounts and claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the city clerk not later than Thursday at 12 o'clock m., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the city treasurer.

Meetings of the committee on accounts and claims are held on the Friday preceding the last Monday of each month at 7.30 o'clock P. M., at the city clerk's office.

A RESOLUTION authorizing the City Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:

That the City Treasurer be and hereby is authorized to hire on the credit of the city, a sum of money not exceeding forty thousand (\$40,000.00) dollars in anticipation of taxes for the present year, the same to be borrowed upon notes of the city, signed by the Mayor and Treasurer, and countersigned by the City Clerk.

Whereas, Scott & Williams, Incorporated, a corporation duly established under the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, is considering the erection of a new structure in addition to its present manufacturing plant now established in the City of Laconia, so as to increase materially its manufacturing capacity and its capacity for the employment of men and women in the industry in which it is engaged, and which new structure, if erected, will require to have placed therein, machinery, equipment and appliances of much in excess of that now in operation and used by said corporation.

And Whereas, the city will derive great benefit by the increasing and setting in operation of such an addition to said manufacturing plant;

Therefore, Resolved that the City of Laconia exempt from its city taxation the real and personal property or both, which said Scott & Williams, Incorporated, shall acquire, use and put in operation in addition to its present manufacturing plant in said Laconia in excess of the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars for the term of ten years from and after April 1, 1917. The taxes so exempted to said Scott & Williams, Incorporated, shall be those assessed by the city for city purposes, and this resolution shall not be construed to exempt from taxation the state and county taxes which shall be assessed in said city against said new construction and equipment, which by this resolution is exempted from said city taxes for the term aforesaid.

This resolution shall take effect upon its passage.

That the portion of the highway at the junction of Main street, Union avenue and Court street, and lying between the following lines: Beginning at the northwest corner near the residence of William F. Knight and continuing on the line of said main street, across Court street to the Harriman block, so-called, thence across line of said Main street in an easterly direction to the Melcher corner, so-called, thence across Union avenue on the easterly line of Main street in a northerly direction to Fogg's corner, so-called, thence across Main street to the point begun at, shall hereafter be known and designated as Walker Square.

An Order directing that a special meeting of the legal voters of Ward six be called to elect a member of the City Council to fill the unexpired term of Councilman Frederick W. Moore of said ward.

That a special meeting of the legal voters of Ward six be called in accordance with the provisions of chapter 48, section 11, of the Public Statutes, for January 22nd, 1918, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, at Grand Army hall, so-called, in said Ward six, to elect a member of the City Council from said ward to serve during the unexpired term of Councilman Frederick W. Moore, resigned.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

In the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seventeen.

An Act to amend section 17 of chapter 451 of the Session Laws of 1893, entitled "An Act to establish the City of Laconia."

SECTION 1. Amend section 17 of said chapter as follows: Strike out the word "six" in the last full line of said section and insert in place thereof the word nine, so that said section as amended shall read as follows: Sect. 17. Department Reports



SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS.

LACONIA, N. H., Feb. 12, 1918.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

In submitting, this, the seventeenth report, the Board desires to express its appreciation of the approval of its recommendations for appropriations deemed necessary to earry on the work of the several departments, and your suggestions and coöperation in all matters of mutual concern.

While for several years past, much has been accomplished of a permanent nature in the improvement of our main thoroughfares, we are satisfied that the past season has added its share.

The work upon Union avenue, including the installation of an adequate surface drainage system, the establishment of lines and grades, placing of stone curbing and the surfacing with bituminous macadam, a detailed description of which appears in the report of the Street Commissioner, is a public improvement which we believe meets with the approval of our citizens.

The extra appropriation granted by the council to finish the work on this thoroughfare the past season enabled us to complete the entire section between Baldwin street and Summer street, and it is worthy of note here, that Union avenue now has a macadam surface its entire length through the city.


Another improvement accomplished during the latter part of the season, that will meet with deserved approval not only of our local people, but of thousands of tourists, is the grading and surfacing with stone, of a section of the Merrimac Valley State highway, from the Meredith town line southerly about 3,000 feet.

This work was done in coöperation with the state, the state-contributing equal funds with the city. Under those favorable terms and considering the great public need of the completion of this work to The Welrs bridge, we urge an adequate appropriation to continue construction here the coming season.

While the conditions attending the war and the prevailing high cost of labor and material, probably render it inexpedient to attempt any projects of magnitude within the city this year, although we have a number such upon the waiting list, each backed by a considerable public demand, yet it eems to us that public sentiment here, as generally in the country at large, seems to demand, not only the efficient maintenance of such improved roads as we have, but the continuance of construction work to an extend consistent with our resources, and in recognition of this demand, and considering the fact that we now have excellent organization and equipment for such work, whether a sufficient appropriation should not be made to keep them in use through the greater part of the season, in spite of apparent adverse conditions is a question for careful consideration.

The truck purchased for the street department last summer has been used to great advantage in the collecting of ashes and waste, and in hauling stone and other material for use in road work. As soon as seems best, the city should purchase another truck of similar capacity; the two used in conjunction could be used in surfacing with gravel many streets now in need of such treatment; streets where the traffic is not heavy enough to require a surface of crushed stone, but where some new surfacing material is needed to cover the old worn out earth.

The especial need for trucks in this work lies in the fact





that gravel suitable for this surfacing is not to be found in the compact part of the city but must of necessity be hauled from some distance, and it is obviously in the longer hauls that the truck show their higher efficiency.

Owing to the increase in wages granted employees and the advance in cost of practically all material, we are obliged to recommend larger sums for the different departments than heretofore.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF STREETS.

To the Board of Public Works:

Gentlemen—I present the following as the annual report of the Street Department for the year ending Feb. 15, 1918.

BITUMINOUS MACADAM.

Tarvia macadam pavement was laid as follows: Court street (resurfacing a section of the state road), 2,433 sq. yds. at a cost of 92½c per sq. yd. This surface was laid on the old water-bound macadam which was built in 1907; Union avenue, 5,282 sq. yds., at a cost of \$1.08 per sq. yd.

The total area of bituminous macadam laid since 1908, inclusive, is 84,571 sq. yds.

The maintenance cost on 76,856 sq. yds., laid previous to 1917, was for the year \$2,234.78, or \$0.029 per sq. yd.

The sections laid in 1908 on Church street, Court street, and Union avenue required considerable patching in 1917, and it will doubtless be necessary to break up some of this area and rebind and resurface the same during 1918.

The electric car track, through the center of these streets, is the chief cause of this breaking up. The track is laid with a light rail, with small ties and poor ballast. It moves under the traffic, allows water to soak under the pavement, which expands in freezing, breaking the pavement. The railroad track also confines the greater portion of the traffic in two tracks on either side, instead of allowing it to spread over the street, thus causing greater wear than would otherwise be the case.

BRIDGES.

The Beacon street bridge was repaired, but it is not in very good condition. Either the canal must be enclosed in a concrete conduit or this bridge must be rebuilt soon.

The Gold street bridge has been discontinued by action of the court and county commissioners, to whom the matter was referred upon the appeal from the action of the city council.

The Main street bridge, built of wood, is now seventeen years old, and while it appears to be in fairly good condition, if it was taken apart it would be found that many timbers and the plank deck are badly decayed. It would be the part of wisdom to replace this bridge with a concrete structure as soon as possible.

The Fair street, Mill street, and Messer street bridges are built of wood and require much attention, but may have a few more years of life.

A new deck was placed on the Weirs channel bridge, and the same given a coat of tar. This structure is in very good shape at present.

COLLECTION OF ASHES AND WASTE.

Two thousand, three hundred and seventy-one loads of ashes and waste were collected during the year and disposed of at a cost of \$1.44 per load.

There is a tendency to disregard the regulations of the Board requiring that ashes and waste should be set out in separate receptacles, and that papers should not be set out. It is very necessary that these regulations should be observed. Ashes should be set out in cans that can be readily loaded into the truck by two men, not in hogsheads that cannot possibly be handled. Ashes that are wet and frozen into cans cannot be handled.

The three and one-half ton truck, bought during the past summer, has been an efficient aid in collecting ashes and waste.

SURFACE WATER DRAINS.

The following surface water drains were built during the past year: Grove street, 85 feet; High street, 553 feet; Jewett street, 436 feet; Lakeside avenue, 459 feet; Messer street, 189 feet; School street, 190 feet; Spring street, 574 feet; Union avenue, 896 feet. Total, 3,362 feet.

The outlet of the Messer street drain was changed from the Adams dump to the lake under the tracks of the Boston & Maine R. R. The drain now discharges from Messer street onto a piece of low land which was purchased by the city for that purpose, and a 24-inch castiron culvert was built under the railroad embankment to the lake. This was a much-needed improvement, and it will relieve an exceedingly bad condition which has existed at the corner of Messer and Irving streets for a long time.

The drain through Jewett street from Union avenue was taken up and relaid with a larger pipe to accommodate branches which were run northerly on Union avenue and on Spring street, taking care of a very badly drained area.

The Union avenue drain from Pitman's mill was ex-

tended northerly to High street, thence easterly on High street to Avery street, also taking the drainage from Locust street.

The most urgently needed drains at the present are the Gilbert brook improvement, with a branch drain through Jolliette, Baldwin, Lovell, and Merrimac streets. The conditions in the above-named streets are extremely bad, and a start should be made to remedy them.

A drain should be built from Highland street through High street to Beaman street.

An ordinance should be passed prohibiting the setting of Carolina poplars for shade trees in the highways, as the roots of these trees get into the drains and sewers and cause much damage.

GENERAL REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE OF ROADS.

The policy of assigning patrolmen to sections of country roads and outlaying streets has been continued with excellent results.

If the money was available certain roads could be surfaced with gravel to advantage.

A great deal of work was done in removing boulders and ledges the past season but much more remains to be done.

The coal ashes, collected during the winter, were used in surfacing outside roads, with good results.

MAIN STREET PAVEMENT.

The portion of Main street from Church street to Canal street, surfaced with water bound macadam in 1906, became badly worn. The surface was loosened, reshaped, and rolled. The gutters were repaved and the macadam base covered with a three-inch surface consisting of one inch of binder and a two inch wearing surface of tar concrete.

MESSER STREET YARD AND BUILDINGS.

The City Council purchased the property on Messer street, owned by the New England Coal and Ice Co., and

turned the same over to the street department for a storage yard.

The buildings were repaired, the railroad trestle was rebuilt, and a 9,500 gallon oil tank installed, at a cost of \$4,006.08.

The city now has a splendid arrangement for receiving and storing crushed stone, road oil, and supplies, so that material may be bought and stored when prices are the best and deliveries fairly sure.

In addition there is afforded a dump at the lake shore where many acres of valuable land may be made for material storage.

SIDEWALKS.

About 4,700 lineal feet of sidewalk was graded and a part surfaced with gravel, crushed stone, cinders, or tar concrete.

This department was unable to construct the walks for which some money was appropriated, on the southerly side of Whipple avenue and on Union avenue north of Clark avenue, owing to the scarcity of labor and teams.

STATE ROAD MAINTENACE AND CONSTRUCTION.

Under the head of maintenance there was expended \$4,312.85, one-half furnished by the State highway department.

The work done consisted of patching, dragging, oiling and tarring the various sections of state road and resurfacing of the section of water bound macadam at the south end of Court street.

There is an unexpended balance in this account of \$5,990.08 which we were unable to use on account of the scarcity of labor, and which will cover the work necessary for the coming season.

Under the head of construction there was expended \$6,052.25, one-half of which was from the State department.

This covered the construction of a section of water

bound macadam, beginning at the Meredith-Laconia line and running southerly for 3,000 feet. About 1,000 feet of this section had a rubble stone base under the macadam.

There is an unexpended balance in this account of \$452.29.

An appropriation of \$6,000 from the city and a like-amount from the state should about complete the road asfar south as the Weirs bridge. This work should be done this summer, if possible, as we have on the ground a stone crushing plant belonging to the town of Hopkinton that was leased from them for this work and must be returned to them as soon as the job can be completed.

STREET SPRINKLING AND OILING.

Three water sprinkling carts were run throughout the season and about 100,000 square yards of street surface was given one or two applications of road oil.

By reason of an early contract for our road oil in 1917 we were enabled to save from \$500 to \$600 on our supply of oil for the year.

If we were equipped with a motor flusher and street sprinkler we could do the work of three sprinkling carts; could save a large bill for water as the machine could fill itself from the river at either end of the city, and it would allow the night cleaning of paved streets by means of flushing, instead of the present unsanitary method of night sweeping with a horse-drawn sweeper.

Union Avenue Improvement.

An appropriation of \$10,000 was made by the city council for the continuation of the permanent improvement of Union avenue, and the street lines, which were indefinite, were fixed by a new layout from High street to Pitman's mill.

As the work progressed, the council decided that the job should be completed, and authorized the additional expenditure necessary. The total cost was \$14,264.36, and the work consisted of the extension of the Union

avenue drain from Pitman's mill to High street, thence up High street to Avery street. The Jewett street drain was taken up and relaid with larger pipe, extended to Spring street, and easterly on Spring street about 600 feet.

The old drains in the street were rebuilt in part and new catch-basins built throughout. Granite curbing was set the entire length of the street.

The old retaining wall along the Tilton mill property was torn out, and a new wall built along the new street line, surmounted with steel and woven wire fence or with iron pipe railing. A retaining wall was built along the Huse property.

Union avenue, High street, Mill street, Arch street, Jewett street, and Summer street were brought to the new lines and grades.

The street was surfaced with a bituminous macadam pavement and the sidewalks with tar concrete.

That portion of Mill street which was regraded was paved with granite blocks.

This work will make a good detour for much of the traffic which passed through Main and Church streets, and relieve the congestion at the corner of Church and Main streets.

WINTER EXPENSES.

Owing to the exceptionally severe winter of 1917-18, and the very heavy fall of snow very early in the season the expenditure listed under Winter Expenses is much more than usual.

The department is equipped with ten sidewalk plows to cover the streets in Laconia proper and Lakeport, and it takes from three to four hours for each plow to cover its route. When the snowfall is heavy or drifted it is impossible for one horse to pull a plow, and two must be used, with two men to a plow. If delays occur during bad storms and blows, citizens should make allowances. When a storm commences in the evening or early part of the night, the plows start out at two o'clock in the morn-

ing, in an endeavor to have the walks opened by six o'clock. There is a limit to the physical endurance of men, and especially the horses, and too much must not be expected.

GENERAL.

The conditions attendant with the war are agreat handicap to the department, and only those pieces of work which are most needed, and which can be carried to completion should be undertaken.

There is in use at the present time the following areas of street pavement, not including sidewalks: Granite block, 4,803 sq. yds.; brick, 245 sq. yds.; bituminous concrete, 17,319 sq. yds.; bituminous macadam, 84.571 sq. yds.; water bound macadam, 17,000 sq. yds. Total, 123,938 sq. yds.

Total area oiled in 1917, 111,000 sq. yds.

Total area tarred in 1917, 76,856 sq. yds.

The amount expended for the year ending Feb. 15th, 1918, is \$67,659.11, and I have itemized it under the following items:

REPORT OF THE CITY ENGINEER.

To the Board of Public Works:

GENTLEMEN:

This department attended to the usual engineering work such as surveys and estimates, lines and grades for construction work, street surveys, etc.

The street lines on Union avenue from Pitman's mill to Arch street were relocated and satisfactory adjustments made with the abutting owners.

A plan was made of a proposed relocation of Canal street, but as no satisfactory adjustment could be made with some of the abutting owners, the matter was dropped.

The relocation of Church street, from Main street to the river should be made as soon as possible.

A plan is on file at this office, showing in detail the proposed relocation.

Mr. J. H. Killourhy, who has been connected with the department for twenty-one years consecutively, enlisted in October in the U. S. Army, Engineer Corps. He was given an appointment as Master Engineer in the 23d U. S. Engineers and will be engaged in highway work in the foreign service.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SEWERS.

To the Board of Public Works:

GENTLEMEN:

No sewer construction, except a private sewer on Foster avenue at The Weirs, was undertaken by reason of the scarcity of labor and the high price of material.

Although there are sewers badly needed on several streets, the war conditions are such that it may be impossible to do any work during the season of 1918.

Only about one half the usual maintenance work was done on the sewer system, owing to labor shortage, but this matter must be attended to the coming spring, even to the exclusion of other important work.

Very few blockages occurred in the system the past year and we are experiencing little trouble at present, but the extremely cold winter may cause some freeze-ups when the frost begins to start.

Twenty-four permits were issued to connect buildings with the public sewer. This is less than half the usual number of connections made every year.

PLUMBING.

The Board of Examiners of Plumbers gave two examinations to applicants for a journeyman plumber's license and one for a transfer of a license from Manchester to Laconia.

All having successfully passed the required examinations they were granted licenses.

One hundred and eleven permits to do plumbing were issued.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

In accordance with the requirements of the City Ordinance I herewith submit for your consideration the report of the Fire Department for the year 1917. The department responded to twenty-three box alarms and one hundred and twenty-four telephone calls for fires and six engineer calls.

Following are a list of fires and their causes, as nearly as could be ascertained, with the names of the owners or occupants and the insurance recovered in each case.

The department responded to more alarms than ever before in a single year. There was but one dangerous fire, that of April 6th, and as conditions were unfavorable, there was some difficulty in getting the fire under control.

The apparatus is in good condition and no extensive repairs are required.

The department purchased eleven hundred feet of red cross fire hose, one dozen rubber fire coats and two nickle-plated nozzles with shut-off valves of the most modern type.

'The roof of the Lakeport fire station was repaired and put in serviceable condition; also changing the fire alarm whistle from Woods' mill at Lakeport to the fire station, which makes a saving to the city of two hundred and fifty dollars a year for rent and makes the electrical apparatus more efficient for service. Several fire alarm boxes had to be moved, owing to widening of streets and changing of poles, which made a large expense on the department appropriation.

The fire alarm telegraph system is in first-class condition, owing to the burning out of the motor generator, caused by lightning, August 7th, and the purchasing of a new machine from Holtzer Cabbott Company and installing same at an expense of \$175.00. It was found necessary to renew the battery elements.

The Board of Engineers recommended to increase the weekly pay of the drivers from sixteen to eighteen dollars per week and seventeen dollars per week for the driver at Lakeport, with one day off in two weeks.


I respectfully recommend the purchase of five hundred feet of $2\frac{1}{2}$ " hose and two fire-alarm boxes, one in that section of the city near the fair grounds, so-called. Also some arrangements should be made to install the hydrants recommended by the City Council, one located on Walker street and one at the end of Sheridan street, removing a hydrant near Beech street. Several hydrants are too low and should be raised when the streets are graded. It is almost impossible in winter time to connect a line of hose to these hydrants on account of snow and ice.

The triple-combination chemical and hose wagon and pump purchased by the city saved a large expense of maintenance of three horses during the year and I would recommend the construction of the chemical horse-drawn wagon made over and equipped with a motor chassis this year.

The personnel of the fire department is as follows: Arthur W. Spring, chief and superintendent of fire alarm; 1st assistant, E. H. Kennedy; 2nd assistant, E. C. Sargent; 3rd assistant, H. H. Shorey; 4th assistant, Joseph H. Roucher.

DIRECTIONS FOR GIVING AN ALARM.

To open the box, break the glass and turn the key. In each box there is a small bell called a tell tale, designed

expressly for the purpose of informing you whether am alarm is being transmitted the instant you open the door.

Open the box, and if this bell is not heard, pull down the hook the whole length of the slot once only and let go. But if this bell should be heard, it would indicate that another box had been pulled and it would be useless to attempt to pull another until the one already pulled had performed its mission. Unless your presence is most urgently required at the scene of the fire, remain at the box to direct the department.

Never open the box or touch anything pertaining to it except in case of fire.

Never give an alarm for a fire seen at a distance.

Be reasonably sure that there is a fire before giving an alarm.

Never give an alarm for a chimney fire unless there is imminent danger of the building catching.

The fire alarm system is under the direction of the Chief Engineer.

PARK COMMISSIONERS.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and the Board of Councilmen for the City of Laconia.

It is a pleasure to present to your honorable body the fourth annual report of work accomplished by the Commission the past year. This includes, not alone the work usually devolving upon that body, but that of the playground as well.

Early in the season many complaints came to the Commission that people were using Opeeche park as a common highway, to lessen the hauling of loads from one side of the city to the other, for their own convenience, to the detriment and danger of the people using the park, as well as to make the park unsightly.

Your Commission investigated these complaints, considered them just, and caused to be erected suitable signs at each entrance, and also published in the local newspapers proper rules for the use of the park by the public.

This policy has received the commendation of the public, and the rules have been willingly obeyed.

It has been a source of gratification to this Commission that this was so, for, since its appointment its policy with its park properties and privileges has been "The greatest good to the greatest number", and to make it effective, the coöperation of the public is necessary.

In accordance with the policy stated above, at the first meeting of the newly-appointed board, in the spring, permission was granted the Gun club to continue the use of the grounds at the north end of the park. An effort was also made to protect the race track, so that the horsemen might have the privilege of indulging in the perfectly legitimate sport which they enjoy, under as favorable conditions as possible, and signs were erected directing automobiles and vehicles of all kinds to keep to the outside when going around the track.

The coöperation of the horsemen in the increased care taken of the children (who are present in large numbers) was noted and appreciated, and the most cordial relations exist between the organization and the Commission.

The offer of as much land as was needed for war gardens was made public through the newspapers, early in the season, and quite a large area was given up for that purpose. As this year will probably see a much larger call than the one just passed for garden plots, and if the city continues the policy of last year in preparing the same for the seed, also taking into consideration the unsatisfactory results of the teaming part of the labor in making further improvements at Leavitt park, we would ask your honorable body to consider the advisability of the purchase of a suitable team to do this work. This would enable your Commission to proceed in a definite way with the work, and be sure in a large measure of avoiding the trouble and disappointment they have had in the season just passed.

The use of the grounds evenings has been encouraged, and the Victrola concerts inaugurated by the playground directors were so well patronized that the city, appreciating, doubtless, the importance of encouraging the movement of making the park more of a community center, appropriated money for five band concerts, the arrangements for the same being left in the hands of your Commission. Three were given at Opeeche park, and one in Franklin square at Lakeport. Owing to the lateness of the season, before the concerts were started, it was necessary to omit the last one at the Lakeport end of the city.

With the experience of last year, the Commission would

most heartily recommend that the concerts be continued next season, and that they commence with the opening of the playground in June.

In September, the Grange held a successful fair on the grounds. This is the third year it has done so, and the spirit of coöperation and mutual desire to promote the best interests of Laconia, existing between the Belknap County Pomona Grange Fair Association and the Park Commission, indicate that this fair may become a permanent institution.

The unsightly rubbish piles near the main entrance have been removed and considerable progress has been made in cleaning up other portions of the park; before another season it is the policy of the Commission to remove such trees as are decayed and unsightly, and which are of no value except for firewood, which will give the park a much cleaner appearance and contribute to the local fuel supply.

At Leavitt park, the conditions of a wet spring and inability to secure help retarded the work, but in spite of this much was accomplished in the nature of permanent improvements in the digging of ditches, drains, etc. A large portion of the land was given over to war gardens, many of which were most satisfactory. The tennis court was completed, and was in use a portion of each day until late in the fall.

The playground movement, past its experimental stage in this city, was most successfully carried on at both Opechee and Leavitt playgrounds, in spite of being somewhat hampered through the loss of land used for the gardens. The Commission feel that the appropriation of \$500, last year, was invested in this way, at a much higher rate of interest than could be obtained in any other manner and respectfully ask that a similar sum be appropriated for playground work the coming season.

The great success of the work last season was doubtless due to the untiring energy and enthusiasm of the director, Clarence B. Phettyplace, of the Opechee playground, who was ably assisted by Miss Hazel Duke, (whose work the previous season was very satisfactory) and Miss Beatrice Hodgdon.

The work was carried along most systematically; the girls received instructions in the industrial arts, which will be of permanent value, and the boys were enabled by the loan of a work bench and tools from the school board. to have some instruction in manual training. Clipping for ambulance pillows for the Red Cross was done each Saturday afternoon. Two picnics on the lake, a visit to the moving pictures one afternoon, and the annual Fete day on Sept. 3, were perhaps the especial Red Letter days, yet the evening concerts on the victrola, and the presentation of Hiawatha, in the form of a pageant, furnished much genuine enjoyment to the large number of visitors. The increase last year in the number of parents and citizens who visited the grounds indicate an increased interest in the work. The average daily attendance of the children for the season was 275.

The Commission is pleased to acknowledge the following gifts of service and of material objects:

The use of a victrola and records, from the Parent-Teacher association, and one concert given by the president, Mrs. W. P. Lamprey; the Lougee-Robinson Co., for securing the records for Hiawatha, and for one concert given by them; to Mr. Leroy Thomas of the Laconia Flower Store, Mr. Ralph Morin, and Mrs. Annie Miller, for concerts; and to Former Mayor George P. Munsey. Mrs. S. B. Smith, and Mrs. Oscar Lougee, for iron settees; to the Horsemen's association, who gave the proceeds of a matinee race for playground work; to Mr. Buckley, of the Colonial Theatre, who entertained the children one afternoon; Judge F. M. Beckford, for two delightful excursions on the lake; and to the young ladies who sold ice cream and candy at the time of the band concerts. All of these, not for the financial assistance alone, but for the splendid spirit of mutual helpfulness manifested.

At Leavitt playground, Miss Alice Jones, who did such efficient work last year, was re-engaged as director; she was assisted by Miss Ernestine Hayward, who had charge of the swimming, a very important and popular feature of the playground activities. In accordance with recommendations made last year the grounds were supervised all day, instead of only afternoons, as in the first season.

The director labored under great difficulties, owing to the fact that much of the land was appropriated for the war gardens, while the remainder was in a constant state of upheaval, owing to the permanent improvements under construction. For this reason the season was shortened one week. The average daily attendance was 52, and should, under ordinary conditions, be greatly increased. Red Cross work, and a war garden were the special features; as a result, six pillow slips, a dozen or more ambulance pillows, several wash cloths, to say nothing of the beans from the war garden, were turned over at the end of the season.

The one gala day of this playground was on July 7, when a flag and staff complete was given the playground by Mr. J. Mooney Sanborn, a veteran of the civil war, and a well-known Grand Army man. The formal presentation was made by Judge F. M. Beckford, and accepted by the clerk of the Park Commission. The donor of the flag has shown his interest in many other ways, for which the Commission is grateful, as well as to Mrs. Henry Clow, who gave the use of a graphophone and records for the entire season.

The Commission also appreciate and wish to express gratification at the cordial relations existing between the public and the Board.

CITY SOLICITOR'S REPORT.

LACONIA, N. H., February 1, 1918.

To His Honor the Mayor, and the City Council of the City of Laconia:

Agreeable to the rules and regulaions connected with the office of City Solicitor, I herewith submit to you my report for the year ending February 1, 1918.

In my report of a year ago, I called your attention to the various cases on the docket against the city, giving you somewhat briefly the causes of action. I am pleased to report that the following cases have been tried or otherwise disposed of during the past year, and all in favor of the City:

- 2117 Independent Ice Co. v. Laconia.
- 360 Idella M. Locke v. Laconia
- 365 Tilton v. Sanbornton and Laconia.
- 366 Edwin P. Thompson v. Laconia.
- 368 William G. Cram et als v. Laconia.
- 369 Laconia v Winnepesaukee Lake Cotton & Woolen Mfg. Co. et als.
- 4143 Simon A. Beard v. City of Laconia.
- 4574 Sidney F. Judd, Admr. v. Laconia.
- 4833 Josephine Herbert v. Laconia.

The only remaining cases, previously reported but not disposed of, are: 2057, Attorney General v. Lyman B. W. Avery; 4596, Claribel Clark v. Laconia; and 2173, the matter of the petition of Wesley B. Stevens v. Charles A. French et als.

The first case is the Union avenue matter in which the court has been unable to give the length of time required for a trial.

The second case, Claribel Clark v. Laconia, will without doubt be disposed of at the incoming term of court.

The matter of Stevens against French is wholly a matter of law and it will probably be transferred to the Supreme court. There is no financial liability on the part of the city.

Two appeals from the laying out of Union avenue and damages assessed have been taken during the year, to wit:—G. H. Tilton & Son and W. D. Huse & Sons.

The suit of W. D. Huse & Sons has been settled in accordance with the instructions given me by the City Council, and my understanding is that the matter of Tilton & Son's appeal has been practically adjusted and agreeable to all parties concerned.

Arthur A. Tilton, a special police officer, has brought a petition against the Police Commissioners and it is expected that the same will be transferred to the Supreme court. The question involved is the right of the Police Commissioners to remove a special police officer without charges being preferred and a hearing thereon.

The publication of the revision of the City Ordinances, the City Charter and amendments thereto, together with the Acts of the Legislature relating to the Town and City of Laconia from 1855 to 1916, has progressed so far that all the material for the book is in the hands of the printer. Substantilaly one-half of it has been printed and the proof submitted for correction. About one-half has not yet been printed owing to the fact that the publisher is now working on the City report.

In my last report, I called your attention to the fact that one or two matters relating to the support of the poor between the City and Belknap County were held in abeyance awaiting the decision of the Supreme Court upon the question involved, which decision would settle the controversy between the City and the County.

The decision was in favor of the position taken by the City, and that decision has been agreed to by the County officials. The City is not now held responsible for the support of cases like those in controversy.

A claim for damages was made against the City by a party, who, in turning the corner by the Bayside cemetery, drove his machine over the wall, damaged it badly, and injured some of the occupants. The driver claimed that the City was liable. As City Solicitor, I refused to recognize the claim, and as the time long since has expired wherein notice could be served on the City, and no notice having been given the City in accordance with the statute, I assume that the parties have abandoned the claim.

Various resolutions, documents, etc., have been drawn at the request of the Mayor and the City Council, and legal advice has been given to the Supervisors and Assessors in connection with the duties of their offices.

Whenever I have been called upon by the City Marshal, I have been pleased to assist him, and have found him courteous, kind, and very efficient in his official capacity.

The City Engineer, Mr. French, has had various matters which came up in the discharge of his official duties, and in which it has given me pleasure to be able to assist him. I have always found that his records are accurate, and his rulings and decisions just and according to law.

In closing this report, I desire to extend to His Honor the Mayor, and each individual member of the City Council my sincere thanks for the kindness and consideration shown me.

It has been my endeavor to conduct the office of City Solicitor so as to avoid litigation and expense, and to relieve the City of the unusually large number of undecided cases. In my efforts, I have had the entire confidence and assistance of His Honor the Mayor and the City Council.

TRUST FUNDS.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES.

To the Auditor of the City of Laconia:

We respectfully submit herewith our report for the year ending February 15, 1918.

In accordance with plans outlined in our last report, the trustees have, during the summer, personally visited and carefully inspected every burial lot in the various cemeteries within the city limits in connection with which the city is holding a trust fund.

In the case of each lot special consideration was given to determine its present condition, and also that of the stones, monument or curbing as the case might be, and arrangements made for grading and making all other repairs to stone work where needed, to the extent permissible according to the available income from the fund in each case.

We would make special mention of the Dow lot, in the Dow cemetery, so-called, on the state road between The Weirs and Meredith, and the Samuel S. Blaisdell lot in Round Bay cemetery. Perpetual care of the former is provided for by a trust fund of \$200 given the city by Mary M. Dow, and of the latter by the Lydia F. Smith trust fund of \$100. On February 15, 1917, there was in connection with the Dow fund accumulated interest of \$41.94, and the Smith fund of \$13.38.

Both of these lots were found to be in bad condition, the Dow lot especially so, being sunken in, covered with brambles and some of the stones needing to be reset and nearly all needing cleaning. This work was arranged for and performed the past season, at an expense of \$27.10 in the case of the Dow lot and \$8.50 in the case of the Blaisdell lot.

We would pay our tribute of respect and esteem to our late fellow member, Edwin D. Ward, whose interest in the work of the board never flagged, notwithstanding the fact that his physical weakness prevented him from assuming any of the active duties of the position.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN.

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Laconia Public Library:

GENTLEMEN:-

I have the honor to present to you my fifteenth annual report. The statistics of my report are for the calendar year 1917, while the treasurer's report is for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1918.

The year 1917 was the hardest the librarian has known. His time and strength were taxed to the utmost. He lost seven days in March and eight days in April with the grippe and he did not recover his usual good health for some time afterward. Consequently, he did not catch up with his work and was compelled to neglect some of his duties. Books could not be cataloged and prepared for circulation as promptly as was desirable. Plans for making the library increasingly useful to the business interests of the city could not be carried out. He could not give the war the official support that he was anxious to give. \$335.19 was raised in this city for War service libraries. Three hundred and eighty-nine books and 160magazines have been shipped for the soldiers and sailors, and another case will be sent before this report is published. Signs have been displayed so far as space permitted. Circulars and pamphlets to aid and urge food conservation have been distributed. Books about the war have been bought and put into circulation.

Through the efforts of the New Hampshire federation of women's clubs, a most excellent general library law was enacted at the last session of the general court. The law was written by Major Chase, of the state library, and was introduced and supported by Major Brennan of Peterborough. The librarian was appointed a member of the Public library commission created by this act. After consultation with members of your board, he accepted the appointment with its added responsibilities. These new duties have taken time that was needed for local service, but the great needs of the state seemed to demand any service that could be given.

The crowded condition of the stack made it necessary to remove books to the basement to provide shelving for the new books received by gift and purchase. As there seemed to be no immediate prospect of the children's room being fitted up for their use, a rearrangement of the cases and books in the basement was made to provide space for additional wooden shelving. Provision has now been made for a normal increase for several years, but wooden bookcases must be built each year. The changes required the personal supervision of the librarian and kept him from other duties. The fact that an increasing number of books are stored in the basement and the fact that the librarian must leave his own work to get any of them that may be required during four hours of the day and evening cause considerable loss of time. There is not enough work that an untrained assistant could do to keep her busy during such hours, and the law against employing young people for evening service prevents an arrangement by which a high school student could study here and get the books as required. The cost of the services of an adult made it desirable to avoid such expense as long as possible, but the rapidly increasing use of the library for reference will make it a necessity in the near future, if full service is to be given. The number of books, pamphlets and periodicals issued for use in the building was 3052, a gain of 26% in one year. This number does not include the much larger number that were used in the reading and study rooms without the necessity of application at the desk. The use in the building is probably double the home use.

There was a loss of 5% in the number of volumes circulated; but the loss is mostly in fiction and may be ascribed to the war service of patrons. For the first time, the circulation of fiction was less than 80% of the total. An extra copy of American cookery, Century, Harper's, Popular mechanics, Scribner's and World's work were ordered for 1918 for the main library and an extra copy of four of these were ordered for the branch. Each issue is provided with a cover, as soon as received, and may be drawn for seven days for home reading. Such loans of current periodicals are greatly appreciated at other libraries and will doubtless prove equally popular here. Other periodicals and more copies of these will be provided if their use warrants it.

The slight increase in the appropriation by the City Council was appreciated, but it was not sufficient to offset the very considerable increase in the costs of all that the library must buy. Publishers are steadily advancing the prices charged for books; and supplies cost from 50% to 100% more than similar goods cost before the war. It had been the policy of the librarian to buy in such quantities as would insure the lowest prices. Owing to this fact, the library was fairly well supplied at the beginning of the war. During the war, while prices have been advancing, the former policy has been reversed and supplies have been purchased in small quantities as the necessity arose. Some supplies on hand could not be replaced at double the price paid for them. The slight increase in salaries paid to the staff was less than the actual advance in living costs. The librarian is very grateful for the increase given to him without solicitation; but he would be greatly pleased if his staff could receive what they so well deserve.

The Treasurer's report shows a larger balance than usual, but the supply of coal is small and this more than offsets the larger balance. Books were ordered to use the balances in the book funds, but war conditions prevented their arrival within the fiscal year. A card cabinet was

bought for a large accumulation of cards that had been kept in boxes. When all the cards are arranged in this cabinet, much time will be saved in looking up past records. Two copies of the Booklist are cut up each month and the descriptive notes are pasted on manilla cards and these are arranged in one alphabet in this cabinet. Thus an author list of the more important books will be easily accessible and the card, when found, will show whether we have a particular book in the library, and it can be used as an order slip for the book if we do not have it. The librarian can check any list of books and an assistant can find the descriptive note to be used as an order slip, provided that it has been published in the Booklist.

The members of the Local history committee of the Board of trade have been so busy with war services that it has not been possible to plan an organized campaign for historical sketches. Mrs. Arthur W. Putnam prepared a short history of the Congregational church that was published in the Democrat. Several other topics have been assigned and papers are being prepared. In the final rush on his report last year, the librarian failed to mention a gift of great local interest. Miss Laura B. Hibbard gave the library a box full of programs and reports that had been saved for many years. The collection is probably unique so far as this locality is concerned. During 1917, Mr. E. F. Dean brought in three fragments of what appeared to be a petrified snake of large size. These were placed in the case in Memorial hall. Mrs. Edmund C. Varney gave papers and a copy of the New England primer that were printed in the first half of the nineteenth century. Among the pamphlets that she gave were early reports of the town of Gilmanton, Mr. Carl F. Blaisdell, of the committee, gave us town reports of Meredith for 1847 and 1848; also a Report of the expenses of supporting the county paupers of Belknap county for the year ending March 1, 1863. Mr. George E. Stevens gave a little pamphlet containing the By-laws of Torrent engine co. 1874. Mr. Henry Cole Quinby, of New York City, gave a copy of the "Genealogical history of the Quinby (Quimby) family in England and America", including our distinguished fellow townsman, Ex-Governor Quinby. Hon. Martin A. Haynes gave a copy of the "Muster out roll of the Second New Hampshire regiment", another of the valuable historical works from his private press. A few more such public-spirited citizens would insure the much needed history of our city. The Laconia press association gave three copies of the bound volume of the Laconia Democrat for 1916. One copy was sent to the Lakeport branch. Our set of this local paper is often consulted and it will have a constantly increasing value in the future.

The bequest of Miss Martha A. Cummings was used to provide a cement walk and granite steps in front, in place of the board walk, and to grade and seed down the back of the lot. Both these betterments have greatly improved the appearance of the grounds around the building.

Almost one hundred dollars (\$99.92) were spent for new

books. These were bought too late in the year to be cataloged and put into circulation before this report was written, but they will soon be ready and will provide more new and popular books than have previously been available for circulation. Extra copies of the Century, Harper's, Scribner's and World's work have been ordered for 1918. They will be provided with flexible covers and will be loaned for home reading.

Every year, since the rooms were opened to the public, friends have added to the permanent collection. The number of books on the shelves is now 1804. Extra shelves have been added, a large revolving bookcase has been provided, a small bookcase for books to be used by the students at the high school is filled, and there is but little space left for future gifts. It is greatly to be desired that a stack should be built, back of the reading room, with a capacity of ten thousand volumes.

During 1917, six periodicals were given by Mr. John R. Brown. A pamphlet about the war was received from the Chambre de commerce de Paris. Hon. Martin A. Haynes gave a copy of his "Muster out roll of the Second New Hampshire regiment." Rev. W. C. Landis gave sixteen books. Mrs. Myra W. Lane presented a set of the works of Washington Irving in ten volumes. In compliance with the direction of his wife before her death, Mr. D. Stilman Lovejoy delivered a set of the Harvard classics in fifty volumes. This set, with its full index, is very useful for reference. Mrs. Henry B. Quinby gave four popular novels. Mr. Henry Cole Quinby gave a copy of his valuable "Genealogical history of the Quinby (Quimby) family in England and America." The Village improvement society furnished two English ivies.

A bound volume of the Laconia Democrat for 1916 was received from the publishers, the Laconia press association. The future historian will find here an ample and reliable record of current eyents.

COMMITTEE ON FOOD PRODUCTION AND CONSERVATION.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of Laconia:

GENTLEMEN.—In behalf of the committee I hereby submit its report for the year 1917.

As you no doubt recall a special meeting of your honorable body was holden on the evening of April 26, 1917, to consider the appropriating of money for the conservation, distribution and production of food, and at the same time a meeting of this committee was held and the objects and necessity of appropriating money to finance the work of preparing the ground for gardens was fully discussed.

A resolution was introduced, and later passed by the Council, appropriating \$500 to finance the work which gave our committee the assurance of funds to meet its expenses.

The City Clerk was appointed agent to receive contributions of land and also applications for garden plots.

The work was attended to and rushed ahead as fast as possible. Owing to the excessive rains the teams were forced to suspend work several times which caused some delay in all getting their plots early, however some one hundred gardens were staked off and planted, and taking them as a whole the project proved a marked success,

Land for these gardens was generously subscribed by Ex-Gov. Henry B. Quinby, Lewis S. Perley, John T. Dodge and Arthur D. O'Shea, and quite a tract was taken on each of the city parks and the new high schol lot.

Ex-Mayor George B. Cox very generously contributed twenty-five dollars to be given in two prizes of twelve dol-

lars and fifty cents each for the best production of potatoes and beans produced by persons who earn their living in some occupation other than farming and same were awarded to Mrs. Agnes McLaughlin, 18 Avery Ct., for the best production of potatoes, and Mrs. Raymond A. Potter, 15 Wentworth Ave., for the best production of beans.

The Laconia Democrat very kindly offered two prizes of fifteen and ten dollars for the two best gardens under municipal supervision and the same was awarded to Albert Champagne of 42 Water street, first prize, and William Cotnam, 61 Lyford street, second prize. The Laconia Democrat also offered ten dollars in three prizes of five, three, and two dollars for the best display of canned fruits and vegetables exhibited at the Belknap County Grange Fair, prepared and exhibited by girls under eighteen years of age. The prizes were awarded as follows: Evelyn Hill, Belmont, first prize; Ruth Hammond, Gilford, second prize, and Margaret Pynn, Meredith, third prize,

Taking the gardens as a whole, they proved a grand success and should be continued with still greater efforts throughout the duration of the war. It would seem to me proper at this time to advise the Council of 1918 to make a sufficient appropriation to acquire and own one team, with which to carry on this work and to be worked cooperatively with other departments of the City, such as the Park and Fire departments, and if possible, start the work at least one month earlier than the past year. Of the \$500 appropriated, some \$113.54 was repaid for team work by persons having gardens and the full detail of the expenditure and receipts of this department is shown in the financial report of the City.

In behalf of the committee and those having gardens, I wish to express our sincere appreciation to all who so generously extended a hand for the good of the cause and sincerely hope that although I have been called to serve my country in the army, this most helpful industry, which

I have had the honor to advise in, both as chairman of the committee and as County Agent during the past season, will be continued until such time as this, our country, shall be made safe for democracy.
