

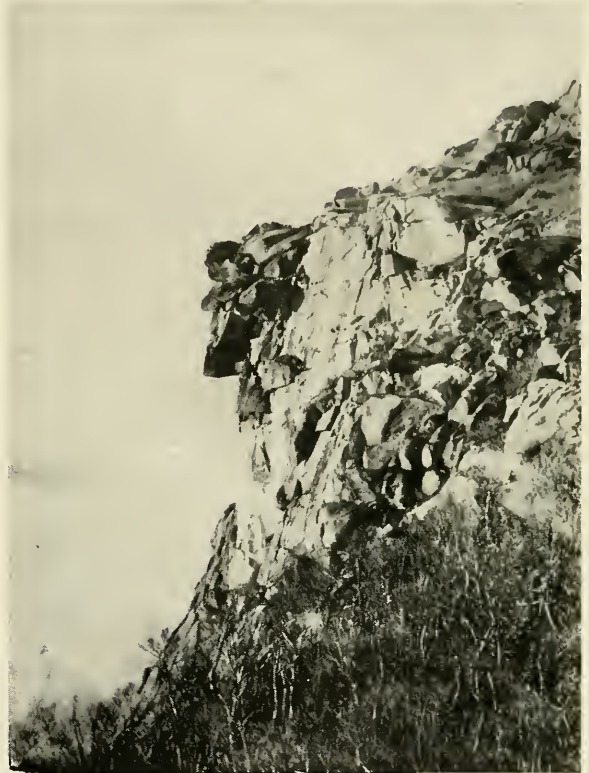

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building on the 8th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, one Trustee of Trust Funds, and two Road Agents.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing Beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting,—“Shall the Provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town?”

ARTICLE 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, General Expenses, Elections, Municipal Court, Police Department, Civilian Defense, Town Hall, Forest Fires, Blister Rust Control, Special Highway Account, Highway Maintenance, Town Road Aid, District Nurse Association, Health Officer, Hospital, Vital Statistics, Village Streets, Street Lights, Public Dump, Library, Old Age Assistance, Welfare, National Holidays, Veterans Convention, Parks and Playgrounds, Community Center, Cemeteries, Damage by Dogs, Advertising, Region Association, Social Security, Dredging River, Payment on Debt, and Interest on Debt, and all other necessary Town expenses.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town a sum not to exceed Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00), in addition to the sum of Eighty-five thousand dollars (\$85,000.00) authorized by vote of the Town at its Annual Meeting on March 9, 1954, for the completion of construction of the new road beginning at the Lisbon Road intersection and ending at Auburn Street.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town, and on behalf of the Littleton Water and Light Department, a sum not to exceed Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) for the purpose of defraying the expense of acquiring and constructing new fluorescent street lighting on Main Street, and a further sum not to exceed Twenty-five Thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) for the purpose of defraying the expense of acquiring and constructing new supplementary supplies to the existing water supply.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the use and enforcement of parking meters on Main Street, in Littleton, upon a year around basis.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1955, and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 8. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, committees, including Zoning Committee or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1954, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library and Municipal Court. The accounts of the Water and Light Department and the Village District were also audited and separate reports are being made for each of these divisions.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets:—Dec. 31, 1953—Dec. 31, 1954: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1953 and December 31, 1954, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the financial condition of the Town changed from a Net Debt of \$14,641.88 to a Surplus of \$4,160.57 in 1954.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of

the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

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Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1954, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net revenue surplus of \$8,273.01, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,622.45, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$4,650.56.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1954, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's

balance as of December 31, 1954, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Parking Meter Account: (Exhibit H)

A summary statement of the Parking Meter Account is presented in Exhibit H.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit N)

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1954, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit N.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

General Comments

Current Surplus:

The current surplus increased from \$19,238.12 to \$27,480.57 during 1954, as shown by the following statement:

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT1954

The Littleton Public Library loaned 33,774 books and magazines in 1954, an increase of 3400 over 1953 and 6400 over 1952, a healthy indication of use by the public in spite of other leisure time attractions. It is hoped that the library appropriation will make possible a larger book budget in the coming year to keep up with the demand.

Several other factors enter into the need for more books. The problem foreseen in our report of 1950 has caught up with us. The Littleton Elementary School is at a much greater distance from the library than the Kilburn School, and the children do not have such easy access to our books. The library sent 625 books to the new school as classroom collections in 1954 and on these books an actual circulation of about 4000 will be realized. So far we have been able to change these collections only once during the school year and even that is most taxing to the juvenile book stock. The change means in many cases a mere swap between grades. This, in itself, is not unsatisfactory, but when the next fall comes we are really in trouble if we are not to repeat books and children. Meantime the books remaining in the library for the use of the more library minded school children are too few.

An expanded program of outside reading for high school English students is being carried on based on a list provided by the faculty. In the course of a year nearly every Littleton school child depends on the library for material at one time or another. Special attention has been given to the books needed by these groups and new books ordered to supply what is required. Concentrated use of the listed titles has made it necessary to replace worn out copies and duplicates

of some would be justified if funds permitted. Many of the volumes in use are dirty and torn and should be replaced. Cooperation with the schools is an important function of the library and should be encouraged to the highest degree.

Costs continue to rise and average \$1 to \$1.50 more per book than a few years ago. Books of non-fiction essential to an adequate and up to date collection are especially expensive. We have borrowed nearly 300 books from the N. H. State Library and other libraries in an attempt to satisfy requests. We can continue to do this but it is a sign that our own book stock should be improved. In order that good provision for adult readers be maintained a larger book allotment seems the only solution. This should be the number one consideration in 1955.

Extensive improvements of the building and grounds were made in 1954. The lawn was reseeded, the wood floors on the main level of the library were refinished and a thorough cleaning was given walls, woodwork and book shelves.

Ten memorial books were presented in the names of Susan Nason Collins, Maurice Peter Drapeau, Henry V. and Lenna Dowse Kinne, Sam Strong, Arlin T. Doane, Esther Felch and Leslie Dow. Our thanks go to the donors and all others who made gifts. We hope with the interest and support of the board of trustees and the people of Littleton that the library will continue to grow in usefulness.

In a few years it is our wish to have this area grassed over with proper vegetation to beautify the contour of the park. Perhaps you have noticed Mr. Orr buzzing around the park with the new lawn mower and sulky. We thought the sulky would lighten his work so he could be with us many more years to continue his wonderful job at the park.

Little League baseball continued to be popular at Aphorp Common. We helped defray the expense of the scoreboard which made the game, from a spectator's viewpoint, more interesting. Our thanks to Don Ross for doing so well in maintaining the area for us. ·

The picnic areas at the Dells still continue to be popular.

This past summer was a wet one, and a problem showed at Remich Park. It was alleviated somewhat by plugging a break in an old water pipe, but still right center and right field on the ball field were wet. Of course many suggestions have been offered to remedy the situation. There has been some agitation to do a major face lifting in the whole outfield. It is our position that before any major work is to be started, the group interested should have an accepted plan and the money with which to do it. This winter the park commissioners were asked to lease and maintain the Mt. Eustis ski slope. It is our understanding that we do not have the power to sign a lease with regard to private property. The Chamber of Commerce tried to have it operate last year. Perhaps with real coordinated effort of all interested in the problem, something can be done for the kids in regard to winter skiing.

Report of the Board of Education

To the Citizens of Littleton:

The school board of the Littleton School District presents herewith its annual report. Included in this report you will find the audit of finances for the year 1953-1954 by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission; budgets and estimated receipts for this year and next year; and written reports by the superintendent of schools and the principal of the high school.

The budget this year is of necessity larger than that of last year. The major increase is that of principal and interest on debt. This is due to the issuance of bonds on the new high school. The other increases come under teachers' salaries and cost of operation. The school board is asking for four new teachers to take care of increased enrollments and expanded services.

Your school board recommends the employing of a full time teacher for the improvement of reading, an additional teacher for elementary grades so that every grade may be divided into two sections, a full time physical education instructor for all grades and an additional mechanic arts teacher.

Work on the new building is progressing at a reasonable rate. Critical materials necessary for construction are either on the site or stored in the community. All fabricated steel and structural steel has been delivered. Aluminum window frames are stored on the site and the roof has just been delivered. The committee sees no reason why the building will not be ready for occupancy in September.

The school board recommends an appropriation of \$242,087.90 for the ensuing year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my annual report relative to your schools.

This past year brought about six changes in the teaching staff in your schools. Mr. Bernard Bouchard of Chester, Vermont, a graduate of the U. S. Merchant Marine Academy and Arnold College, with three years' experience in Chester, Vermont was elected to teach physics, chemistry and biology and coach boys' basketball. Mr. Bouchard replaced Mr. Theodore Stopyra who resigned to accept a position in Middletown, Conn.

Mrs. Elizabeth Drew of Gorham, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College with a year's experience in Lisbon, was elected to teach business education and coach girls' basketball. Mrs. Drew replaced Mr. Wilfred Muse.

Mr. Lester C. Shiere of Strafford, N. H., a graduate of Albion College, and a Master's degree from the University of New Hampshire, with four years' experience in Pontiac, Michigan was elected to teach sophomore English and French replacing Mrs. Esther Kapala who resigned to accept a position in Hanover.

Miss Joan Lowrey of Whitefield, a graduate of Keene Teachers College with a year's experience in Conway was elected to replace Miss Evelyn Clark who resigned to accept a position in the mid-west.

Mrs. Alice K. Hyde, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire with graduate work at Harvard University and Johns Hopkins, with sixteen years' experience in Concord, Penacook, Somerville and Arlington, Massachusetts was elected to replace Mrs. Lila Nutbrown who was transferred to the elementary school in the fall.

Miss Patricia Bonardi, a graduate of Keene Teachers

College with one year's experience in Nashua, was elected to teach the second grade in the elementary school to replace Mrs. Simonds who was transferred to the kindergarten.

Mrs. Ruth Colby was employed on a part time basis to assist with the reading program in the elementary school.

A three day work-shop in the Improvement of Reading was held during the first three days of the school year and was most helpful to the teachers in both elementary and secondary grades. Speakers and consultants for this workshop included Mrs. Marie Capron, director of Elementary School Services, State Department of Education; Miss Mary Jane Jack, reading consultant for Scott, Foresman Company; Miss Marion K. Seavey, instructor of Elementary Education, Plymouth Teachers College; Mr. Norton R. Bagley, instructor of English, Plymouth Teachers College; and Austin Olney, professor of Visual Education, University of New Hampshire.

This year has been a most difficult one for the administration of the high school. The loss of the high school by fire on April 1 was a severe blow to the community. With the cooperation of the teachers, pupils and citizens we were able to salvage some books and equipment from the ruins. Some school districts in the state sent used books and many new ones were purchased. Emergency quarters were set up in the Kilburn building and by organizing the school on a two platoon system we were ready to start classes again with a loss of only five days of school. A unit kitchen was set up to provide for Home Economics classes. A small shop was set up in the basement where pupils could have shop class without the use of power tools. New books, where needed, were purchased and adequate supplies have been made available. Every effort is being made to give

your children the best instruction possible under adverse conditions.

Present plans call for the new school to be finished for the opening of school in September. Much of the steel work is completed in the old section and the major part of the critical materials are on the site.

Pupils in the elementary school were given achievement tests in the fall. The results were used by teachers for diagnosis and guidance at the beginning of the year. Mental maturity tests were given in January in the odd numbered grades as has been the custom in recent years. The University of New Hampshire Battery of tests will be given to grades nine and eleven in the spring. This battery consists of Interest Inventory, Clerical Speed and Accuracy, Mechanical Reasoning, Intelligence, and Speed and Comprehension of reading. Wide use is given to the results in guidance work.

The annual school health service report shows the following examination by the school doctors: 376 pupils examined, 14 teachers given the T.B. Patch test, 5 pupils vaccinated, 235 pupils given tuberculosis test, 2 were given chest x-rays and 283 were given laboratory tests. Of the above number examined, the following defects were found: Tonsils and adenoids 13, lungs 2, heart 9, orthopedic 5, hernia 2. These defects were reported and all were either seen by the family physician or treated.

The report of the school nurse shows that 1,067 children were examined for vision, hearing, height and weight. Of the number examined the following defects were reported as needing attention: Vision 74, hearing 10, skin 2, posture 5, speech 2, teeth 237, tonsils 13 and mental hygiene 2. Almost all of the above defects were treated or seen by the family physician.

Weekly dental clinics were held at which 68 pupils were treated. Two mental hygiene clinics were held. Two orthopedic clinics and two T.B. clinics were held during the year.

According to the State Department of Education the teacher supply situation will be most acute this year. It is estimated that approximately six hundred teachers will be lost this year to the profession through retirement, marriage and through moving to other states. Only two hundred will graduate from all our teacher training institutions. Such a situation is not good.

The school budget for this coming year will of necessity be higher than that of the present year. Principal and interest on bonds will be the highest increase. Increase in costs of operation will be higher and the other major factor is increased teachers' salaries and salaries for new teachers.

The school lunch program is operating very efficiently under the direction of Mrs. Minnie Maxwell, assisted by Mrs. Annie Lewis and Mrs. Blanche LaMott in the kitchen. Mrs. Grace Allen assists in the lunch room. Well over 200 children per day are participating in the program.

In behalf of the school district, I wish to take this opportunity to thank the Littleton Garden Club for the additional plantings of shrubbery at the elementary school.

In closing, I wish to express my personal appreciation to the teaching staff, school board and other school district personnel and to the citizens of Littleton for their cooperation and support.

CURRICULUM

The curriculum has remained basically the same with the addition of psychology being offered to juniors and seniors. We have tried to offer courses to fit the needs of our pupils and to group together those of like interests.

GUIDANCE

Our guidance program includes a battery of five tests administered by the University of New Hampshire Testing Service each year to the pupils of Grades IX and XI. The battery consists of the California Occupational Interest Inventory Test, a test of Primary Mental Ability, the Differential Aptitude Test of Clerical Speed and Accuracy, the Differential Aptitude Test of Mechanical Reasoning and the Cooperative Reading Comprehension Test. The California Test of Mental Maturity for Grade VII is administered each year. These tests provide a basis for further counseling and help to make our program effective. A follow-up and placement service is also a part of the program. Each

year in May the California Achievement Test of Basic Skills is administered to Grades VII and VIII. Individual consultations are held and opportunities and suggestions presented for consideration.

MUSIC

The music program under the able direction of Mrs. Cushing for vocal music, and Mr. McLure for instrumental music and band has made excellent progress this year. Numerous public appearances, plus attractive uniforms, have received very favorable comment.

THE TEACHING STAFF

We are pleased to report that the teaching staff here at Littleton compares very favorably with any of its size in the state and has cooperated with the administration very well.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Our school offers a full program of extra curricular activities which include music, vocal and instrumental, dramatics, athletics, socials, parties, dances and the school publication, "The Record" which is representative of our school and which we are making every effort to improve each year.

SERVICES TO THE COMMUNITY

We are pleased to report that the traditions of cooperating with our community established in the school is reflected in many worthwhile activities and services.
