

March 12, 1940

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town Affairs:---

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday, the twelith day of March, A. D., 1940 at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

- ART. 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.
- ART. 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To choose two Auditors for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.
- ART. 7. To choose a Road Agent for one year under direct supervision of the Selectmen.
- ART. 8. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- ART. 10. To see what action the town will take as to acceptance of state aid for road construction:
 —To vote to raise \$546.00 to be matched by

\$1,092.00 by the State for State Aid Road or, To vote to raise \$247.98 to be matched by \$991.91 by the State for Class V Roads.

- ART. 11. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$30.00.
- ART. 12. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.
- ART. 13. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS IN MADBURY, N. H.

To the School Board and Citizens of Madbury:

I have the honor to present my eleventh annual report. As in previous years the statistics are for the school year ending June, 1939 and the table is for the last ten years, in order that you may note comparisons.

This year we have 22 pupils attending Dover High School, the largest number ever attending secondary schools from Madbury. Our financial budget carried an estimate of 14 pupils so this large increase will cause a deficit in our present budget and it will be necessary to make an additional appropriation at the March meeting to meet this deficit.

This year the number of pupils at the Center School has dropped to 9, while the North School has 26. This difference in numbers could be easily overcome and the number be made nearly equal in each school by transferring those pupils now transported to the North School to the Center School. In all probability the State Board of Education would refuse to continue State Aid to the small Center School unless this adjustment should be made.

As I have pointed out in previous reports it would mean ultimate economy as well as increased efficiency if these two schools could be brought together under one roof and each teacher be given four grades instead of all eight as now.

The matter of supplying drinking water at each school is still an unsolved problem. Wells are so low in the vicinity of the home of the driver of the transportation car that he is not bringing water to the North School as planned. The teachers this year are Mrs. Mabel Thomas at the Center School, and Miss Blanche Boucher at the North School. Miss Macdonald is still our efficient nurse and her report accompanies mine. We have had very few cases of contagious diseases, although the per cent of attendance was below the fine record of a year ago. It is still very satisfactory. We are carrying on the same testing program as elsewhere in the Union. The Metropolitan Achievement Tests are being used in the middle of the year and the Standard Graduation Tests in June for the pupils of Grade 8. Where as no especially high records were made the pupils made a creditable showing last year.

We wish to thank the Grange for supplying weight scales in both schools. These make the work of the nurse easier and more efficient. It is a pleasure to have the Grange take an interest in the good of the schools.

The North School needs some minor repairs inside and out and the Center School could be made warmer if a portico could be built at the door. I also recommend the screening of the windows here. The screens at the North School are certainly appreciated. No unusual amount of money will be needed for repairs. There is always an opportunity to improve the school yards.

The School Board have given loyal support to the Superintendent and Teachers and this is appreciated. We believe that the money invested in your school is well spent and that a dollars value is returned for every dollar expended. This is real economy.
