SCHOOL DISTRICT OF NEW HAMPTON

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

It was considered best to transport the three children to Meredith until there are children enough to reopen the school again.

In our year's repairs we sheathed the Plaisted school entry, rehung the outside door, added a new door for entry, sheathed ceiling of piazza, shellacked and painted all the new work, whitened the ceiling with two coats, and newly tinted the walls.

The Hanaford school received most of our attention last year. We exchanged the seats of the Hanaford for the Winona school seats. The Old Institution school had its ceiling repaired, whitened, and walls newly tinted.

The Village school received new steps to its entrance, the south side was newly shingled, walls and ceiling were refreshed, and glass was replaced.

The Fiske school received several much needed repairs.

The Sanborn school (near Bristol) had grown so much and was the most poorly equipped school in town, so that we deemed it best to take some of the state aid money the state gave us last June and spent what we needed on that school. The woodshed was too small, and it was removed from the front of the building. A larger one was built at the back of the schoolhouse, with new toilets and cement vault. Several windows were

changed to give the correct lighting, walls were newly tinted, woodwork was painted, and the floor received two coats of paint. Twenty new adjustable seats and a teacher's new desk were added. The outside door was changed to make the entrance safer for children, grounds were graded for a nice playground, and to complete the job two coats of paint were put on the outside of the schoolhouse.

The Board recommends that any necessary repairs on any of these six school buildings for this year should receive proper attention. We should like to see some of our school-yards made more attractive and have more for physical development in these six schools.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the New Hampton School Board:

I take pleasure in presenting my first annual school report. My duties began the first of last August. When I assumed my duties as superintendent of your schools, the yearly budget had been made, the programs of studies for the various schools had been adopted, the teachers had all been engaged. Consequently in the main I have carried out the plans formed previous to my arrival. Now and then some things have been changed to meet the conditions of the present year.

The new supervisory union consists of six towns, namely: Ashland, Bridgewater, Groton, Holderness, Hebron, and New Hampton. Since I have been on the job I have managed to become acquainted with the geography of the various districts, with the school boards, the six groups of teachers, and the six groups of scholars. I have observed and studied the social, economic, and educational factors of the communities over which my duties extend.

In the course of this report I endeavor to give you an account of my activities, investigations, conclusions drawn, and suggestions and recommendations for improvements.

I have secured and furnished text-books and supplies for the teachers, and the janitors. I have visited schools frequently, and helped teachers with their class room problems. Teachers' meetings have been called in order to discuss our problems as a group. I have done all my office work without clerical assistance. I have attended board meetings no less than once a month in each of the six towns in the supervisory union. I have spoken in

the interest of the schools before various organizations in the different towns. These statements are made to give you some conception of the way in which the superintendent uses his time.

A Study of Retardation, Acceleration, and Normal Progress of the New Hampton School Children

I have asked the teachers of New Hampton to make out age-grade tables of this year's enrollment of pupils. I have used these tables to make a study of the school progress of children from the point of view of yearly promotion. All the children who have made one grade a year for the number of years they have been in school, I have considered as having made normal progress. The ones who have skipped grades are considered accelerated, and the ones who have had to repeat have been classified as retarded. The table below which I have prepared from the data collected tells its own story.

A word in regard to the interpretation of the above figures. The usual percentage of retarded, accelerated, and normal progress of school children throughout the country for every one hundred pupils is as follows: 22 per cent retarded, 18 per cent accelerated, and 60 per cent normal progress. The New Hampton children show up as follows: 12 per cent retarded, 15 per cent accelerated, and 73 per cent normal progress. The reader may draw his own conclusions.

During the fall term intelligence tests were given by the teachers under my direction in all the grades. These tests were given with a twofold purpose, to find out what we have to do with in the way of natural ability, and to see if lack of school progress is due to lack of ability or other causes. We find that out of fourteen pupils who are retarded one or more years in school progress, eight of them are somewhat below par in natural ability, and it is not surprising to find them retarded. The other six under ordinary conditions should be doing passing work, and be up to grade. There are many reasons why children often fail to make normal progress. Unsatisfactory home conditions, poor home training, continued absence, poor teaching, sickness, lack of guidance, failure to fit the school to the child's needs and capacities, all play a part. Let us eliminate as many of these causes as we can.

The following statistical account of the New Hampton schools for the year 1928-1929 is of interest.

Winona School: Teacher, Stella Pollard; number of pupils, 8; half days in session, 350; per cent of attend-

ance, 99.06; number of tardinesses, 16; number of visits by citizens, 5; number of visits by school board, 1; number of visits by superintendent, 9.

Village School: Teacher, Hattie Merrill; number of pupils, 36; half days in session, 342; per cent of attendance, 95.15; number of tardinesses, 54; number of visits by citizens, 63; number of visits by school board, 2; number of visits by superintendent, 24.

Old Institution School: Teacher, Ruth Prescott; number of pupils, 17; half days in session, 348; per cent of attendance, 94; number of tardinesses, 15; number of visits by citizens, 75; number of visits by school board, 2; number of visits by superintendent, 17.

Plaisted School: Teacher, Marion Woodman; number of pupils, 12; half days in session, 346; per cent of attendance, 96; number of tardinesses, 2; number of visits by citizens, 19; number of visits by school board, 1; number of visits by superintendent, 10.

Fiske School: Teacher, Elva M. Thurber; number of pupils, 23; half days in session, 344; per cent of attendance, 96; number of tardinesses, 42; number of visits by citizens, 20; number of visits by school board, 1; number of visits by superintendent, 20.

I have made inquiries from the various schools where New Hampton children attend, and I am pleased to report that the pupils in question are doing good work. I have made visits to the New Hampton School for Boys which in a sense is the high school of the district. I am favorably impressed with the educational program carried on in the institution, the personnel, and the organization.

It is pleasure to see so many New Hampton young people continue their education in secondary schools, after they go through the New Hampton Elementary schools. We have arrived at a point in American life when any one without at least a high school education will be at a great disadvantage in his struggle for a

living, and in his enjoyment of the institutions of life.

Judging from the interest which the school board take in the educational welfare of the town, the splendid attendance of the children, the number of children in high school, the efforts made to retain good teachers, the financial support which the community extends to the schools, New Hampton is contributing its share to the present and future happiness of its young people.

New Hampton has great possibilities for development in the way of agriculture, fruit growing, as a summer resort, and in other ways. If we develop an educational system in keeping with these possibilities, the schools will contribute greatly toward attracting ambitious and energetic people to settle here, and transform this little community into a greater center of human activity.

This is all I am ready to say at this writing, five months after I am on the job. I am aware of a few elementary and secondary school problems facing the community. I am leaving these problems for further consideration. In due time I shall submit before the school district, through the school board, the results of my continued study, investigations, and observations, with my suggestions to raise the New Hampton school system to a higher level.
