To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year; as may be necessary for general expenses, election & registration, town bldgs., for protection of persons & property, including the police dept., health & sanitation, vital statistics, sewer maintenance, sidewalks,, street lighting, and general expenses of the departments, for education & the public library; for charities, including the decoration of soldiers graves; for recreation; for cemeteries; for interest; for new construction and improvements, for indebtedness to other governmental divisions and to pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.
3. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures; in anticipation of the collection of taxes.
4. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of two percent (2%) on all taxes except poll and head taxes, if paid within fifteen days after receipt of bill.
5. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the budget committee.

6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$72.00 in addition to that required by law.

7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to make application to the state highway department for state aid in rebuilding the bridge on Ash Swamp Road; and to authorize the selectmen to borrow on notes, the additional sum of \$3,400 for the town's share in replacing said bridge.

8. To see if the town will vote to have the State Tax Commissioners assess all property in the town of Newmarket

9. To see if the town will vote to establish a planning board of (5) five members with duties as set forth in sections 1-15, Chapter 36 of New Hampshire Revised Statutes annotated, 1955, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The board shall consist of one selectman and four (4) other citizens appointed by the selectmen as provided in Chapter 36, N.H. RSA, 1955.

10. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500 to black top Neals Mill Road and do the work this season.

11. To see if the town will vote to extend the present rubbish collection route on Epping Road, to begin at Clayton Bloom's residence and to terminate at the intersection of Epping and Ash Swamp Roads, and to raise such sums of money as may be necessary.

12. To see if the voters of the Town of Newmarket will vote to adopt the non-partisan ballot in the election of all town officers.

13. To see if voters of the town of Newmarket will vote to change the name of Poortown Road to Lang Lane.

14. To see if the voters of the Town of Newmarket will vote to extend the present sewer line on Bay Road to a point opposite the Jablonski residence and to raise the sum of \$1,000 for said project.

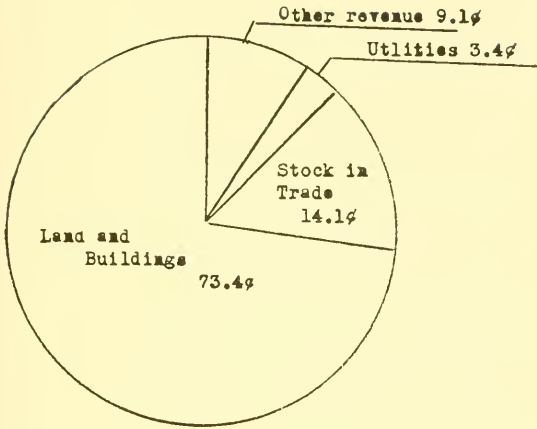

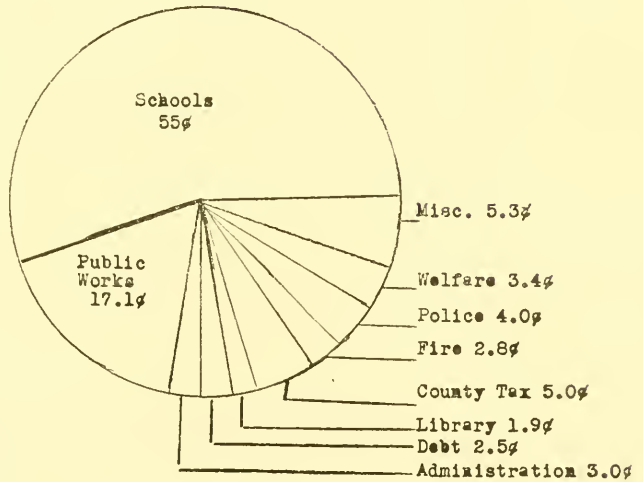

PROGRESS REPORT FROM THE OFFICE OF THE SELECTMEN

We respectfully submit to the citizens of the Town of Newmarket, a summary of the projects that were undertaken during the past year.

The Town Hall has been pointed up and several large cracks in the rear wall of the building have been repaired.

The widening and surfacing of New Road has progressed to a point approximately one and two tenths miles from its junction with Exeter Street.

The State Highway department has approved our plans for the replacing of the bridge on Ash Swamp Road; and has informed us that the necessary funds will be available in 1959 to complete the job.

After meeting with the State Highway Department on November 25, 1958, it was agreed that the State would rebuild route 108 from the Boston and Maine Railroad crossing to the Lamprey River Bridge. Completion date for the work will be June 12, 1959. The contract includes hot asphalt concrete resurfacing of the entire area. In the business section the new surface will be constructed of the entire width, curb to curb, providing a marked improvement to this area.

Between Church Street and Chapel Street the parking will have to be changed to parallel; to eliminate an accident hazard and to improve the flow of traffic.

The Public Works Department office has been opened, making it possible for townspeople to pay

bills during the week-day and furnishing all departments with the necessary clerical help.

The sum of \$3,500 has been raised and set aside for the future Public Works Department building on the town lot on Beech Street extension.

For the first time this year we are printing a list of the assessed valuation of all taxable property in Newmarket. In order to save money on the printing of the report we have not gone into detail on locations of property, but any further information desired may be obtained at the Town Clerk's Office. With the approval of the voters we hope to print these every three years.

Our regular meetings are held on the first and third Tuesdays of each month. All meetings are open to the public and we welcome your attendance. We wish at this time to thank all the townspeople and town officers for their help in making the past years work a more pleasant and gainful task.

Summary of Findings and Recommendations

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Newmarket for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Public Library and Municipal Court.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets

December 31, 1957 — December 31, 1958:
(Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1957 and December 31, 1958, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$7,560.68 in 1958.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations
and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual
Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$10,711.46, plus a revenue deficit of \$569.92, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$11,281.38.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures:
(Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is presented in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1958, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness:
(Exhibit G)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness, as of December 31, 1958, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Appropriation Overdraft and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

It is noted that in the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, there was a net overdraft of appropriations amounting to \$10,711.46. In other words, total expenditures exceeded total budget appropriations by this amount as indicated herewith:

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law the Board of Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee, petitioned the Tax Commission to expend \$5,900.00 in excess of budgetary appropriations. A certificate of emergency grant-

ing this authority was issued by the Commission under date of December 18, 1958. It is noted, however, that there still remained a balance of \$4,811.46 (\$10,711.46 —\$5,900.00) representing unauthorized expenditures in excess of appropriations.

Trust Funds

The audit of the Trust Fund accounts will be made at a later date owing to the fact that they were not available at the time of our regular audit.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Newmarket for their assistance during the course of the audit.

LIBRARY REPORT

The past few years have been busy ones for the Board of Trustees of the Newmarket Public Library. Over this period of time extensive and very necessary repairs have been made on the building. The roof has been completely renovated. A new furnace installed, and the broken plaster secured and patched. The ceilings have been whitewashed and the walls and wood work painted. The stone steps at the entrance which slanted dangerously due to frost upheaval have been raised and made level. New shutters were made and installed in the openings formerly used for coal shutes. The outside of all the window frames were puttied and received a coat of preservative. Screens were made to fit the transom between the hall and the main library room. The worst cracks in the brick walls have been filled. This job is not completed but your board hopes to do more work on this project this coming year, finishing the whole building in a two year period.

We have been able to purchase a new and much needed stand for the large dictionary and special reference books.

A complete set of the Britannica Encyclopedia and a set of Science Reference books have been added to the book shelves. We are happy to say that we have been able to give our librarian a small increase in salary this past year.

For 1959 your board hopes to sand and refinish the floors in the library room and to install adequate lighting fixtures. There is also a great need for stacks.

We are happy to report that there has been a marked increase in the number of books and magazines circulated as well as increased usage of all the library facilities. We continually strive to give the community the best and newest in fiction and fact.

Thanks are due to the members of the New-market Woman's Club for the repairs made in the Tower Room, the beautiful landscaping and the gifts of books. to the New Market National Bank for the fine rug that we shall use as soon as the floors are finished and to all friends who have contributed books, etc.

We extend a hearty welcome to all who wish to use the library.

The Newmarket fire losses were kept to a minimum due in large to the fine spirit of good-will and cooperation of the town people. The quick reporting, to the fire department, of fires before they develop into greater proportions has helped considerably to keep property loss down.

Permits for outside fires are necessary. Most people have been aware of this, but many are not. When permits are not obtained the Forest Fire Look-out at Stratham Hill calls the town Forest Fire Warden and the town warden must trace the smoke and find the cause. Some are of control. Some are not.

Permits do not lessen your responsibility for damage. It gives the Warden a better chance to let you know of any dangers at that particular time. (Dry weather conditions, high winds, no burning ban.) Having this knowledge it makes it unnecessary for the Warden or the fire department to make needless trips.

This past year a radio base station was put into operation at the Fire Station. This was obtained through Civilian Defense funds. We now have radio communication between two of our trucks and the

Fire Station, also with neighboring cities and towns.

The radio set-up will be a vital piece of equipment in our participation in the Mutual Aid system of this area.

The meeting hall has been painted, 600 feet of 1½ in. hose was purchased, a new type fog nozzle, and other small pieces of equipment were purchased to supplement the equipment that we had.

This coming year we would like a portable forest fire pump that is a much needed piece of equipment. The fire alarm system should be worked on to keep up with our long range program of modernizing and expanding.

The three regular men in the department in the course of the past year 1958 have put in a total of 7.852 working hours.

Our five special police officers in the course of the past year have been called upon to cover 323 assignments representing 1,292 working hours. Making it a total of 9,144 working hours put in by the department as a whole.

Our new police cruiser which was delivered to us on the 21st of July, has proven very satisfactory. It has been an asset to the department as well as to the town of Newmarket, in the performance of our duties. It may interest the community to know that, from July 21st to December 31st a mileage reading of 15,147 miles was registered, with a gas consumption of 1,144 gallons.

For the third consecutive year the Town has received from the State of New Hampshire a Certificate of Achievement, in recognition of outstanding highway accident prevention activities, and completing the past year without a fatal motor vehicle traffic accident.

And I would like at this time to take the opportunity to express my sincere thanks and appreciation to the different department heads, for the help and cooperation they have extended my department during the past year. My thanks and appreciation also to the citizens of the Town who have been patient and understanding when it was necessary. And I extend a special vote of thanks to the five special police officers, who have given their time and support when called upon to do so, when their cooperation was needed so that we could best serve the Community.

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Annual Report of The **WATER COMMISSIONERS**

The Commissioners were saddened by the death in February of 1958 of our highly devoted and experienced Superintendent, Harry Nutting, Sr., after many years of service.

At the March 11, 1958 Town Meeting, a favorable vote was expressed for Article 7 of the warrant authorizing the establishment of a department of public works and included the Water Works within this department. The Selectmen were authorized to appoint the Supervisor, establish his salary and the salaries of the employees of this department. The Selectmen subsequently appointed Mr. Richman Walker as Supervisor of Public Works.

A number of minor improvements to the pumping station were made, and repairs performed on the equipment have maintained the plant in good operating condition. No additions to the existing mains were made but an appreciable number of services were renewed during the past year.

The financial benefits that were expected from merging the Water Works within a Public Works Department have not yet materialized. It should be considered, however, that it has been necessary during the past year to train additional Public Works Department employees in the operations of the station in order to obtain greater flexibility. It has also been necessary for the new Superintendent to familiarize himself with operations in order to effect future economies. It is expected that these benefits may materialize during the forthcoming year and result in improved operations.

Until the present financial situation is improved,

the Water Commissioners cannot budget for, and undertake any of the improvements that they consider should be made to the station or the distribution system.

Some of the improvements worthy of consideration are:

(a.) The water main along Lamprey Street should be extended and joined to the main line at North Main Street opposite Evans Ford Garage. This would furnish improved service to the homes in this area and provide better fire protection. The expected cost for this extension is about \$3,500.

(b.) A survey has been made to develop new sources of water supply. A sum of at least \$3,000 would be needed to continue this project by the digging of test wells. The present capacity of the water resources available to this town could be a limiting factor to industrial expansion in this community.

(c.) The water main at Durell's Corner should be extended toward Moonlight Bridge along the Newmarket-Lee Road and probably from the same corner toward Epping Road if further building develops along this road.

(d.) Installation of controls and other equipment to obtain fully automatic operation of the Pumping Station. This should result in a considerable saving in operating labor costs.

(e.) The concrete structure of the purification plant has deteriorated and will require major repairs at some future date. At the present time, these repairs cannot be included in the budget without a serious unbalance.

In order to establish a more favorable financial situation, it is clearly necessary that drastic action must be taken by the Superintendent to keep labor

costs at a minimum in the operation of the plant. The only alternative remaining to the Commissioners is to increase revenue to the Water Department by an increase in existing water rates.

If any extensions to existing mains are voted at the Town Meeting, it will be necessary to raise the funds by taxation to pay for these since the operating budget of the Water Department cannot include funds for improvements or extensions.

The Commissioners take this opportunity to express their appreciation for the cooperation that they have received during the past year.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to

revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the District will vote to hereafter use a check list for the election of officers, beginning with the 1960 Annual Meeting, and will adopt as it's school check list the town check list, as provided in R.S.A. 197: 12A as inserted by Laws of 1957, Chapter 57.

10. To see if the District will elect to approve of the inclusion of its officers and employees in the Employees Retirement System of the State of New Hampshire, which system is provided for by Chapter 27-A of the Revised Laws, as inserted by Chapter 183 of the Laws of 1945, and as provided by chapter 201 of the Laws of 1945 and any subsequent amendments thereto.

11. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination of the accounts of the Newmarket School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1957 and June 30, 1958, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$7,067.33 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition

(Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations
and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenue

(Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,926.08 less a net revenue surplus of \$3,068.38, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$857.70.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures

(Exhibit E-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1958, is indicated in Exhibit E-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness

(Exhibit F)

A statement of long term indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1958, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit F.

Statement of School District Tax Account

(Exhibit G)

A statement of the School District Tax Account with the Town of Newmarket is presented in Exhibit G. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1958, the School District has received from the Town an advance on the 1958-1959 School Tax of \$7,000.00. This is included as a liability account in the Balance Sheet.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Deficit

The current deficit (exceess of current liabilities over total assets) increased from \$3,872.45 to \$4,805.12, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, as shown herewith:

Appropriation Overdrafts and Application of Municipal Budget Law

It is noted that in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, there was a net overdraft of appropriations amounting to \$3,926.08 (Exhibit D). In other words, total expenditures exceeded total budgetary appropriations by this amount. In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (Chapter 32 of the Revised Statutes Annotated), application should have been made to the State Board of Education for authorization to make expenditures in excess of budgetary appropriations.

It was noted that an emergency certificate was approved by the State Board of Education on July 14, 1958, in the amount of \$574.45.

CONCLUSION

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal)

shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Newmarket School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Many parents have asked how homework fits into the educational picture of Newmarket. Although there are many people who denounce all home assignments and will continue to denounce them, home study has had and continues to have a traditional place in our American educational system. Though it may change form from time to time and from generation to generation, it seems likely that some form of home study will be maintained. Most school systems throughout the country continue to give home assignments in one form or another.

When homework is assigned, it is important for the teacher to check upon this work, to see that it is actually accomplished, and to note that something is achieved thereby. Regardless of whether it be a home study assignment or a classroom assignment, the assignment made by the teacher must be called for by him. Little or no desirable learning is achieved when teachers make assignments and then rarely hold students responsible for them.

The amount of time that a child is expected to spend in home study varies greatly in different localities. In Newmarket, I believe that a maximum should not exceed two hours in the upper grades, and one hour in the intermediate grades. None should be given in the primary grades.

When homework involves writing or study, it is highly important that the child have a definite place to do it. He certainly will not get much accomplished if home assignments must be made in the family living room with other people either televising, listening to the radio, or carrying on different types of conversation.

Once the child realizes that homework is his own responsibility, it will be wiser for the parents to allow him to arrange the time he wishes to provide for

it, and then observe whether he holds to the time that has been agreed upon. If the child learns to budget his time, he will see to it that the home study is not neglected.

When work is assigned to be written it is of the utmost importance that the child do the work himself, rather than copy it after someone else has worked it out for him. When the latter occurs, little, if any, real learning takes place. The child only learns to get others to do his work. If the child has difficulty with a certain problem or other point in the assignment, a parent might help him over a difficulty by explaining the matter to him. This is entirely different from copying out answers worked by someone else, without understanding how they were achieved.

Homework can greatly aid in the development of the child's character and personality as well as his academic achievement. Properly assigned and properly fulfilled, home study can build habits of self-reliance and responsibility and, when group assignments are made, of cooperation and working with others. Again, when the nature of the assignment is such as to permit it, a considerable amount of learning in related areas can be achieved.

Our School lunch program under the direction of Mrs. Dearborn is one of which we can be proud. Mrs. Dearborn is providing well balanced meals for your children. This is evidenced by the large number of children who partake of these meals.

In closing, I thank the children, Principals and teachers for their efforts in making the educational program successful. I also thank the citizens and School Board for their part in making my task a pleasant one.

A REPORT FROM YOUR SCHOOL BOARD

To the citizens of Newmarket:

On the following several pages you will find a rather complete report of the financial, educational and physical condition of your public school system.

This brief report will be an attempt to fill in on some of the things that we, as your school board are attempting to do to improve the system.

When the children of the elementary schools return in September, they will find that all new desks and chairs have been provided for grades 1-6. This replacement has been going on for the past few years and will be completed this summer. These same children will also return to study from a whole new series of text books which have been provided during the past two years.

At the Stone School, all new lighting fixtures will be installed during this coming summer. This is a replacement of an existing bulb type system with fluorescent fixtures. We are also planning to provide combination windows at this school in an attempt to eliminate many of the drafts that exist on a cold day.

The High School now has a new library which has been built by the boys of the Shop Courses under the direction of Mr. Robinson. Our budget for next year includes provision for starting to build up the library with new reference books.

The old auditorium is now used as a study hall and the lighting is inadequate for that purpose. To correct this condition we are planning to install a whole new system of fluorescent lighting for this room.

The School Board also wishes to thank the fol-

lowing local businesses for many worthwhile contributions to our schools during the past year.

To the Gallant Mfg. Co.: For a tape recorder for the High School and two record players for the elementary schools.

To the Macallen Co.: for the gift of a duplicating machine for the High School.

To the New Market National Bank: for a fine leather bound reference book on the Presidents of the U. S.

By reading the following reports, we believe that you as citizens and taxpayers of Newmarket will get a clearer picture of where we stand today and where we hope to go in the future.

PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It is with pleasure I submit this annual report concerning the activities of Newmarket High School.

In view of the minimum standards set forth by the State Department of Education, a few changes were made in our curriculum and time schedule.

Time Schedule

In order to comply with states regulations it was necessary to increase our school day by twenty minutes. School commences at 8:25 A.M. and classes end at 2:59 P.M. The school day consists of six one hour periods with twenty minutes allowed for lunch and two minutes allowed to pass between classes. Physics, Biology, Office Practice, Home Economics and Shop classes meet five times a week and all other classes are in session four times per week. The above number of class periods fulfill all time requirements of the State Board of Education.

All students are required to take four years of English, one of Math, one of Science, one of Social Studies and Physical Education two hours per week each year.

It is hoped that in the near future that we may set up a complete program with four basic curriculums:

1. Science and Math Curriculum
2. Commercial Curriculum

3. College Preparatory Curriculum
4. General Curriculum (Shop and Home Eco.)

This type of program will depend largely on a new testing program now being developed by our Guidance Department.

Teaching Personnel

We are fortunate this year in having very little turn-over in our teaching personnel. There were a few changes; Miss McDonough replaced Mrs. Teeri, Miss Keene replaced Mrs. Shorey, Mrs. Ashton replaced Mr. Enos, and Mr. Landroche replaced Mr. Forbush. Mr. Thomas Makris replaced Mr. Landroche as Physical Education Director and coach of Cross-Country and Varsity Basketball. Mr. Kasiaras teaches English and Social Studies in the lower grades. This was necessary due to the increase in our enrollment and the subject we added in order to meet the State requirements.

Many times it has been said that teachers get their knowledge from books and have very little practical experience and therefore find it difficult to put across to the students the knowledge they should accumulate and how the students should put this knowledge to use. We are fortunate in Newmarket, not only to have teachers with College Degrees, but, also teachers with a wide variety of practical experience. Ski instructor, Camp Counselors, Waitresses, Salesman, Factory Worker, Pilots, Navigators, Grocery Clerks, Janitors, Construction Workers, are but a few of the professions in which our teaching staff has had a wealth of practical experience.

During the current school year I have put into practice many regulations concerning student activities during school hours and while attending school functions. It is only fair that the parents should

know what these regulations are and therefore I have included these regulations in this report.

Regulations Governing The Student Body

No student is allowed in the building before 8:00 a.m. Students will leave the building immediately after the last bell, unless they have detention, or are receiving help from a teacher.

Detentions will be served on the day given.

There will be no smoking at any time during school hours. This also means during the lunch period.

No one will be allowed to leave the school grounds during lunch period without special permission from the office.

No student will enter any car at any time from 8:27 to 3:00 p.m.

The first row in the parking lot is reserved for teachers.

No one will enter their car or anyone else's car during the day.

No one will use anyone else's bicycle at any time.

Anyone caught spinning their wheels or driving dangerously near the school will be reported immediately to the Motor Vehicle Department in Concord and told not to bring their cars to school from that day on.

Everyone will keep off all private lawns and out of the woods in the back of the school.

Students will keep off all private property.

Students must have a pass to go anywhere in the building.

No student will be allowed to hang around the outer office.

No student will enter any teacher's desk at any time, nor any other student's desk or lockers.

Students entering school in the morning will go directly to their lockers and then immediately to their home rooms and their own desks.

Students will not write anything on the blackboards without permission from the teacher.

Students will eat their lunches in a room, or outside. This is a privilege and if anyone throws paper around, all students will be required to eat in school.

All students are expected to dress in a manner suitable to school.

Telephones are to be used only in a case of emergency. Forgetting home work is not considered an emergency.

No person will be excused from school to fix a car, flat tire or any such thing.

Doctor's and Dentist's appointments are the only reasons one may be excused from school or class.

The following carries automatic suspension from school:

1. Using profane language in or around school.
2. Derogatory remarks to teachers.
3. Skipping school.
4. Skipping classes.
5. Smoking in or around the building.
6. Too many detentions.

If you are not passing at least three (3) subjects you will not be able to participate in any extra curricular activity this includes all athletic teams, clubs, plays, musicals or hold any office insofar as your class is concerned. If you do join a team or club you are expected to do as the advisor wishes and conduct yourselves in a manner that will bring credit to the school.

Remember that no one may graduate from High school unless they have passed four (4) years of English.

I should like to extend my sincere thanks to the Members of the School Board, Teachers, Parent - Teachers Association, Women's Club, Roger Cardin and Denny, and the many organizations that have taken an active part in the betterment of our school system.

Teachers

The teachers include Mr. Edward O'Connor, principal and fourth grade teacher; Mrs. Mildred Rooney, Grade 6; Mrs. Ruth Robie, Grade 5; Mrs. Irene LaBranche, Grade 3; Mrs. Frances Nesbitt, Grade 2; and Mrs. Carolyn Reed, Grade 1.

Changes and Improvements

There were a few changes and improvements at both the Central and Stone Schools this year.

At the Stone School, a new fire door was installed in the fifth grade room, and new desks were bought for both the fifth and sixth grades. This program of getting new desks for all the grades will be completed in the coming year when grades three and four will receive their desks.

At the Central School the Hot Lunch Room and the stairway leading to it were painted.

Testing

This year we are planning to continue with the program of testing, which was initiated in 1958, even to a higher degree. In order to obtain more information about each student, these tests are given. Thus, by the time the student reaches the sixth grade we will have a clear picture of his achievement in the elementary school.

This year intelligence tests will be administered in grades two, three, four, five and six. Achievement tests will also be administered in all the grades.

Appreciations

I would like to extend my sincere appreciation to the employees of the Gallant Manufacturing Co. for the gift of two record players, one for the Stone School and one for the Central School.

I would also like to thank everyone who helped to make our Minstrel Show a success. With the proceeds from the show we have purchased a new tape recorder for the Central School, and tone bells, film strips, and story books for the Stone School.

GUIDANCE REPORT

The guidance program in the Junior and Senior High School is carried on this year under the direction of Mrs. Lila J. Cobb, with the aid of Mr. Willis E. Cobb who works primarily with the boys. The program this year has been carried out with the following aims:

1. To provide opportunities for vocational and educational interviews with an experienced counselor.
2. To provide an adequate school testing program to give each student and teacher a better understanding of the student's abilities in vocational and educational subjects.
3. To provide cumulative records of student interviews, personal relationships, test results, teacher and parental recommendations, etc.
4. To provide opportunities for the students to have conferences with and attend lectures by people in the vocational and professional fields.
5. To provide vocational and educational information for the students.

Since the above program has been carried on in addition to full teaching schedules, interviewing time is limited. However, every effort is made to cover each student in the school with at least one interview, and more, if possible.

This year an annual testing program has been established which, starting with grade seven and continuing through grade twelve, will provide adequate measurement of each student as he progresses thru high school. These tests include three reading tests, six achievement tests, two aptitude tests, and three intelligence tests. The results of these tests are discussed with each student as they apply to the student's achievement in school and future ambitions.

These tests may also be utilized to compare our students' abilities and achievements with those of other schools, as well as to evaluate teaching procedures.

Cumulative records are now being established for each student through his years at Newmarket. An adequate collection of college catalogues and vocational information can be had by each student for the asking.

A new curriculum has been devised and will be put into effect as soon as facilities allow, the purpose of which is to help correct the present situation of post-secondary education bound students who have not fulfilled the subject requirements for advanced school entrance. Enrollment in the courses below depend on grade averages, test results, and student objectives. Diplomas will be awarded designating the courses completed if students have fulfilled the requirements of:

- Liberal Arts Course
- Scientific Course
- Commercial Course
- Home Economics Course
- Industrial Arts Course
- General Course

The success of the guidance program in this school, as in any other, can be achieved only through the cooperation between parents, teachers, counselors, and students. Any parent who is concerned with his son's or daughter's future is urged to discuss the situation of these matters with the guidance teachers, the principal or subject teachers.

MUSIC REPORT

Elementary School

The elementary music program this year follows the same basic outline as the program of last year; an integrated program of vocal, rhythmic and listening activities, paced appropriately to each age group.

Grade one learns simple rote songs, tone matching, dances and rhythm band. The present grades two and three are learning simple note reading by syllables and sight from singing books, dancing and listening activities. Recordings are provided for use in the classrooms.

Grade four is reading syllables at sight, learning square dancing and writing simple songs.

With the help of the classroom teacher Grade five has purchased instruments for use in starting their own instrumental program. Each child has purchased his own musical instrument and class funds provide auxiliary instruments so that the class can learn to read music better, learn the elements of harmony and become acquainted with the playing of musical instruments.

Grade six is well on its way toward singing in harmony parts, learning to appreciate classical music, and dancing.

The regular music program has been augmented this year by chosen fourth, fifth and sixth graders who sing in the elementary chorus, which, if time allows, meets once a week for a half hour to sing songs that could not be presented in regular music classes.

Junior High School Music

General music classes this year have been singing in two and three parts, studying elementary har-

mony and musical expression through listening and drawing. The Junior High Glee Club, boasting of forty or more members, meets for an hour a week, and has added its talent to the Christmas Assembly and the Annual Talent Show.

Senior High School Music

Our High School Glee Club this year consisting of sixty-five members meets for three hours a week; needless to say we have been able to accomplish much in establishing a varied repertoire.

Last year, our performance of *Trial by Jury*, by Gilbert and Sullivan, was such a success that we decided to present Kurt Weill's "*Down in the Valley*" this year in March.

We are pleased to report that the group has finished the project of making and paying for choir robes, constructed by the Home Economics Department. We now have robes for each student to wear at performances which adds a great deal to the appearance of the group.

As was suggested in last year's report we have added a new course to our curriculum—Music Appreciation. To be eligible for this course, one must take two years of glee club and have an average of C or better. This course helps to satisfy one of the two fine arts courses required by the state.

I wish to thank all of those who have so helpfully cooperated in the music program this year.

SCHOOL HEALTH PROGRAM — 1958

To the School Board and citizens of Newmarket:

It is with sincere pleasure that I submit this, my first report of the school health services of this community.

I would like to mention with respect Myrtle Fletcher, R.N., who served this town faithfully and well during past years, and whose duties I have assumed.

Dental Clinic

During this school year there will be no dental clinic. It is felt that great progress has been made in the care of our children's teeth. Parents are doing extremely well in seeing that their children visit their dentist at least once a year, and give proper care to their teeth while at home. Keep up the good work!

Hot Lunch Program

The hot lunch program is still being carried on by the P.T.A., under the supervision of Mrs. E. Dearborn, and by the town in the Central School. Approximately 100-110 children from the Central and Stone Schools are served lunch daily. The food is nutritious, and skillfully served from a clean kitchen by Mrs. B. Miller and Mrs. M. Cashman. It would be wonderful if the children of St. Mary's School could have the advantage of a hot lunch program.

Pre-School Clinics

Two clinics were held in the spring to examine children who were to enter school in September.

The number attending were: Central School, 20; St. Mary's School, 47.

Parents who have children who will enter school

in September, 1959, must have their child vaccinated before entering school. The child must be 6 years of age before January, 1960. It would be wise to see your family doctor about polio and booster inoculations, if you have not already done so.

Inspections

New equipment is to be purchased so that the vision and hearing of all the children will be checked before June, 1959. Thus far, only regular health inspections including heights and weights have been made.
