#### TOWN WARRANT

#### State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Orford on Tuesday the 10th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects.

First to adjourn to act on the School District Meeting.

#### Articles

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year: Also to choose one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds and one Library Trustee.

2. To hear the budget of the Town and raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or pass any vote relative thereto.

3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges for the ensuing year.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town Winter Roads for the ensuing year.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town property.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Electric Lights.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Free Library and Orford Social Library.

9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and administer property acquired by Tax Deed.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed one one-hundredth of one per cent (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on the assessment of 1952 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town together with other towns in the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee Region.

13. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of class V roads and raise and appropriate the sum of for that purpose.

14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.

15. To see if the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised laws relating to playing games of Beano, shall be adopted in this Town.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to cover the expenses of Memorial Day Celebration.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) for cleaning and care of the Mall.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for a Community Center Fund.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the control of Pine Blister Rust.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for a Community Building with Gymnasium.

21. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

School District of Orford

To the Inhabitants of the School District of Orford qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District, on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, 1953, at nine o'clock, in the morning, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for three years, and to fill any vacancies which may occur on the School Board.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board, and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income: the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. Article 9. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

Given under our hands and seals at said Orford this 6th day of February, 1953.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Orford:

I hereby submit my fifth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The schools of the nation are in a state of turmoil but fortunately the schools of Orford are not subjected to many of these causes of turmoil. There has been a slight increase in the total number of pupils attending school but as yet this has not caused us any serious difficulty. Our buildings are anything but modern yet we have fixed them up so that they serve our present purposes quite well. We have minor complaints about the school, which is a healthy sign, indicating that parents are interested and watching, but we do not have any organized groups which make vicious attacks upon our schools. Yes, I think I can truly say that in many ways we are very fortunate.

#### Teachers and Teaching

Our experienced capable faculty in the elementary school is the same group that has now been with us for many years. With the very serious shortage that exists in qualified elementary teachers, this is really a blessing.

Two members of our high school faculty have remained constant through the past several years. These same two people were here when Plymouth Teachers College operated the high school with cadet teachers. The other three members of the high school faculty have changed every year. This is neither good for the pupils or the teachers themselves. I hope that every possible effort will be made by the townspeople to encourage our present staff to become a real part of the town so that they will want to remain with us for some years to come.

There is little that we can do with our high school program in the nature of revision. At present we are teaching courses in College Preparation, Agriculture, Home Economics and Commerce. It is nearly as extensive a program as would be offered in a large high school and it can only be accomplished by alternating many subjects and giving each teacher practically a full day's program. This means that each teacher has more than a normal load and rather complicates the problem of making out a good schedule. About the only way we can make any changes would be to stop teaching one of our present courses or hire an additional teacher.

We are offering a good standard elementary program which we try to improve upon a little each year. We have under consideration some possible changes in the social studies program which may tend to bring us somewhat into line with the new program recently suggested by the state board of education. As has been true in the past we are continuing to emphasize the work in reading.

When Mrs. Horton left us we thought we might have to go without a teacher of music and art until it was learned that Mrs. H. R. MacGinnis had had training in this field and might be interested. Shortly after school started she began her work in these two fields, receiving the assistance of her husband in the teaching of art to the upper grades. This has proven to be a satisfactory solution and we are pleased that these two important areas are being considered in our schools.

A good program of extra-curricular activities is being carried on in our schools, several of the activities extending well down into the grades. Besides athletics the school puts on plays, socials, dances, produces a school newspaper and yearbook, and has a large number of clubs pertaining to specialized interests of the boys and girls. In the field of athletics we have soccer, softball, skiing, basketball and baseball. Mr. Fulton and his assistants should be highly commended for the outstanding work they are doing in training so many pupils in skiing. This is a natural and worthwhile activity for the Orford Area. The only real lack we have in sports is an adequate place in which to play basketball. The school appreciates the opportunity to use Bedell Hall but this is too small and has no shower facilities. There has been some agitation in town to build a gymnasium (which could serve as an assembly room, recreation area, for dramatics and many other purposes) to be built adjacent to the present high school building. Although the expense of such a building would be large for a town like Orford it might well be accomplished as a community enterprise.

The Veterans on-the-farm training program which has been conducted evenings by Mr. Guptill for many years is drawing to a close because of the lack of available veterans. Unless veterans of the Korean war desire a similar program we anticipate that next year will be the last year of operation.

#### Repairs and Buildings

We have continued with our planned repair program doing a little bit each year. As a result most of the rooms and hallways have been painted with bright and interesting colors. Likewise most of the floors have been sealed and waxed. Both teachers and pupils appreciate the improved environment in which to conduct their learning activities.

For some years we have had brief interruptions in the water supply at the Orfordville School but this year it developed into a serious problem. The well for water simply will not produce enough water to take care of the building and for many months we have had to truck water into the building. A complete investigation has been made of the situation and the only solutions seem to lie in sinking another well or drilling the present well to a greater depth. This should be done this next summer. This item costing \$1,500 is what causes the 1953-54 budget to exceed the current budget.

Word has been received from the water pollution board that sometime in the future we would have to stop running the school sewerage into the stream across the road from the Orfordville school. Complete details on this problem are not available but it probably means that we woud have to build our own septic tank. This does not have to be done this year.

The Commissioner of Education with the help of school boards and superintendents has been drawing up a revised plan for the supervisory unions of the state. Several such plans have been considered which would involve a reduction in size of some unions and an increase in the size of some others. These larger unions would then have an additional assistant superintendent of schools. A bill asking for these changes will be placed in the legislature but I do not think it will pass because it calls for the expenditure of an additional \$30,000.00. However it would help my work because it would drop Enfield from this Supervisory Union thereby reducing the area and number of teachers I have to supervise. At present I have more teachers in this union than any other supervisory union in this state, except the large cities.

A bill will also be placed in the legislature asking that state aid to education be doubled. The governor is recommending that state aid be increased by 50%. Certainly we need more state aid to help towns like Orford bear some of the burden of public education. However, if past experience is any criterion we should not count too heavily on any larger increase in our assistance from the state.

Both the school board and I wish to take this opportunity to thank Dr. Hammond for his splendid gift of so many books for our school library. We have needed such books for many years and I am certain that very good use will be made of them.

It has been a pleasure, as always, to work with the excellent Parent Teachers Association at Orford. The large numbers which turn out for the meetings, the interest they show in the schools, and their willingness to work for the benefit of boys and girls speaks well for the future of public education in Orford.

As I bring this report to a close I want to thank all those, school board members, teachers, janitors, and others who have worked so hard to assist me in producing good schools for Orford.

The nurse was assisted at these clinics by a Local Committee of Ladies with Mrs. William Green acting as local Chairman, also the Local School nurse assisting.

I wish to take this opportunity to extend thanks for all who helped make the clinics a success.

Home calls were also made in the town to mothers, new babies, preschool children, and arrangements for children to attend the orthopedic and heart clinics at Hanover.
