# WARRANT

## The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg, in the County of Coos, in the said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Pittsburg, on Tuesday the 9th day of March, next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To bring in your ballots for the election of Selectman, for three years; one Road Agent for the Lake District, one Road Agent for the Middle District, one Road Agent for the Lower District a Town Clerk, a Treasurer, three Auditors, one Overseer of the Welfare two Library Trustees, and one Trustee of the Trust Funds.

Also on your ballots this year you must vote on: Are you in favor of the adoption of the zoning ordinances, and subdivision regulations as proposed by the planning board?

2. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers not listed under Article 1.
3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money for same.
5. To see if the Town will vote to elect a committee to set a date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$737 for North Country Community Services, Inc., or to raise the sum of \$1000 for the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$414.22 for the White Mountain Regional Association.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for maintenance of covered bridges.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to continue sidewalk construction.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500 as Pittsburg's share of the cost of perambulation of the Pittsburg-Clarksville Town Line on a 50-50 basis with Clarksville.
11. (By petition) To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire a full time police officer and raise money for his salary.
12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget and raise money for same.
13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Polls will not close until 6 p.m.

We have had six fires since then, two grass fires (at Tom Dorman's and Robert Covill's), and chimney fires at Arthur Johnson's and Coleman Keazer's. We had two fires in buildings, one at Martineau's camp and one at Powder Horn, which we were able to save. We feel we were able to save this building because of the new pumper and the fog nozzles we now have. Also, we had an opportunity to use our Scott Air Packs, which were very useful. The Town has made three more payments on our No. 2 Truck for us, so the members of the Department have agreed not to accept any pay for going to fires. This summer we plan to make some more places where we can get water for fighting fires.

# Report of Pittsburg Planning Board

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To the Citizens and Property Owners of Pittsburg:

The Pittsburg Planning Board was established during the month of November by the vote of a special Town Meeting. In accordance with state law, the members of the Board have been selected and duly appointed by the Selectmen of Pittsburg.

Since its formation, the Planning Board has held numerous working sessions to prepare information for consideration by the citizens of Pittsburg. Although much work has been done, the Board wishes to emphasize that much more remains. The success or failure of this attempt to preserve the rural, natural beauty of Pittsburg will depend on the cooperation of the people and this Board. If we move ahead together, then we shall succeed. If we lose sight of our basic purpose, to insure that the future development of Pittsburg is accompanied by forethought and consideration of the effect of this development on the basic nature of the Town, failure may well be ours.

In order to present in final form a plan for zoning which best meets the needs of the citizens of Pittsburg, two public hearings will be held. All interested persons are encouraged to attend and to offer comments, criticisms, and suggestions to the Planning Board's proposals. Through these meetings the Planning Board will be able to make the changes desired by the citizens of Pittsburg.

These revised zoning ordinances are to be considered by the voters of Pittsburg at Town Meeting, March 9. A special written ballot will be available through which each individual may express his approval or disapproval of the proposed zoning ordinances.

4. To bring in your ballots to see if the town will accept the proposal to build an addition to the present school building based upon the findings of the advisory committee.
5. To see if the District will vote to raise the sum of \$1400.00 to supplement the School Lunch Program.
6. To see if the District will vote to raise the sum of \$120.00 to transport school students, Grades I through VI, within Town limits on extremely cold and windy school days.
7. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of the School District Officials and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District.
8. To see if the town will vote to create an Auth-

orized Regional Enrollment Area (AREA) planning committee consisting of three qualified voters of whom at least one shall be a member of the school board.

9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or the United States for the ensuing school year.
10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting

# Report Of The Superintendent

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Housing the school program and providing sufficient space for pupils is becoming an ever increasing problem. With changes taking place within the basic curriculum of elementary and secondary education and the addition of related services for pupils to include music, physical education, health, library, audio-visual, combined with an increase in the school population however slight, local communities are now faced with school plants that are or are becoming inadequate to meet all these changes and needs.

Although revisions in school facilities have been made through the years to accomodate the changing school program, this has not been accomplished without the sacrifice of existing space or the increasing demand on the local taxpayers.

Vocational education is now becoming an important aspect in the secondary program. Rapid changes now taking place in occupational opportunities and vocational fields available to a student upon graduation are having a direct effect on the responsibilities of the secondary school program. Since a major function of education is to prepare a student for the future and to assist him in securing gainful employment, thought must be given to present vocational education programs and to their possible expansions to best meet the needs of those students who may not be financially able or desire to pursue a formal four year college program.

The concept of shared services by local and north country area school districts has made possible the sharing of a speech and hearing therapist as well as workshops for local teachers in the areas of art, audio-visual, and reading. The sharing of school facilities on a tuition basis has long been carried on by local districts and this year the voters in a number of districts will be asked to establish a planning committee to investigate the feasibility of a long term tuition contract under an Authorized Regional Enrollment Area (AREA) concept.

With the increasing expansion of educational programs and facilities it is strongly recommended that local districts continue working together in meeting these needs and in providing the most financially feasible solutions.

## COUNSELING SERVICES DEPT.

Testing programs for achievement, ability, intelligence and interest take up a good percentage of the school counselor's time. In this report I will try to explain the implication and importance of these tests.

The first testing in the school year is required by the State of N. H. and records ability and achievement for grades 4, 6, 8 and 10—the tenth grade takes an additional (SCAT) School and College Ability Test under this program. 310 students were tested in this program totaling 2,399 student test hours.

Next there is the (PSAT) Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test given to juniors and seniors planning some form of education beyond high school. 48 of our students took this testing totaling 144 test hours.

For college bound students there is the (ACT) American College Tests and the (CEE)B College Entrance Examination Board (SAT) Scholastic Aptitude Test and Achievement Tests. These tests are taken on Saturdays throughout the school year and involve the juniors and seniors. Some 30 of our students will take these tests this year totaling about 150 hours.

The (NMSQT) National Merit Scholastic Qualifying Test is given to college bound juniors and if a student should qualify he would receive a \$1,500.00 merit scholarship. This year about 20 of our students will be tested covering about 60 test hours.

The (NEDT) National Education Development Tests record a student's intelligence and achievement in grades 7, 8, 9, and 10. The areas covered are English, math, social studies, science and vocabulary. 220 of our students are tested in this program totaling 1,320 test hours.

This year for the first time we will test our students "interests" — their likes and dislikes. This test, the (OVIS) Ohio Vocational Interest Survey, will be given to all seventh grade students and will total some 228 test hours. The interest survey results will be used with the other test scores and the students school marks to help determine what subjects in high school will best suit his needs.

In the 1970-71 school year over 700 students will be involved in these testing programs totaling more than 4,300 student test hours.

## SCHOOL HEALTH

The objectives of a school health program are to perform the necessary functions to maintain and promote good health of the pupils in our schools.

The following services are performed each year: checking heights and weights, vision and hearing; physical examinations for all students in grades 4, 8, and 11 and athletics; T. B. skin tests as recommended by the state T.B. Association; necessary immunizations; pre-school clinics for incoming first graders; and continuous supervision of general health.

A dental health clinic sponsored by the local towns and the state in what is called a Matching Fund Program was held two mornings a week from January through May. Fifteen youngsters received treatment at these clinics.

In April, 86 youngsters in grades 1-4 were immunized against German Measles with vaccine made available by the state.

Starting in November, a Speech and Hearing specialist equipped with a mobile lab, visits the area once a week to work with some of our students who have speech and hearing problems. This is made possible by North Country Education Service, a Title III Project.

Every year we strive to improve the school health program. With everyone working together it is hoped that we can achieve our goal in this endeavor.

### NOTES ON THE BUDGET

The School Board has requested for its budget, an appropriation of \$195,890.00 for the school year 1971-72. A sum of \$24,400.00 has been anticipated for estimated income, leaving a balance of \$171,490.00 to be raised through taxes. This is an increase of \$10,744.28 over 1970-71.

The overall increase in the budget is reflected largely in the following areas: Instruction, Teachers Salaries—\$4,143.00; Operation of Plant, Salaries—\$1,992.00; School Lunch, Federal Monies—\$800.00; Supervisory Union Expense— \$3,682.00; and a decrease in Transportation—\$900.00; Rent—\$500.00; Capital Outlay Equipment—\$500.00.
