

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at two o'clock in the afternoon, at which time the polls shall be opened and shall close not earlier than nine o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following articles: all articles not on the ballot will be acted upon at seven-thirty in the evening.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its high-ways and bridges.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Cemeteries.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Common and the daily raising and lowering of the flag.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the street lights.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the LaMott-Kenneson Post No. 76 American Legion for Memorial Day and other patriotic purposes.



10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Town Dump.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$476.34 to secure from the State \$3,175.63 to be expended for Town Aid.

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of Publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town in cooperating with other towns in the Lakes Region.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate towards the operation of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital in Plymouth, N. H.

14. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Bi-Centennial Committee.

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to buy the present or a new dump site and raise and appropriate or borrow a sum sufficient for the same.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$336.00 for the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency.

17. To see if the Town will vote that there shall be no additional junk yards established in the Town of Rumney and that the Selectmen be instructed to issue no licenses for same.

The term junk yard as used herein is to conform with the Revised Statutes Annotated; Chapter 267, Sec. 1-4 1955. Amended by Chapter 275, 1955

18. To see if the Town will vote to accept the parcel of land adjacent to the Town Hall containing one acre more or less as a gift from Lewis E. and Lorraine F. Downing.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer lease, rent, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate or mineral rights acquired by the Town at any of its tax collector's sales.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

21. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this town.

22. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## LIBRARY IMPROVEMENTS:

Your Library Trustees have embarked upon a program of improvement at the Library, which, it is hoped will make it more useful, more economical to operate and to keep clean, among which are:

The glass window in the ceiling has been covered over to conserve heat and to prevent the accumulation of flies and dust which has been a constant eyesore in the past.

An addition was made to the walkway consisting of stone sides and end, and cold top asphalt. This has stopped the tracking of sand into the library which was damaging the floors and making cleaning more difficult.

The top of the dry well which took care of the sewerage rotted out and caved in. This was replaced with heavy oak planking which should last for many years.

A new electric outlet and electric clock, a gift from Mrs. Lois Everts, has been put in to replace the original hand wound clock which has not been keeping accurate time.

A thick layer of fibre glass insulation has been put in the attic over all the ceilings to further conserve heat, which was being lost thru the ceilings and caulking has been put around all the windows on the main floor of the building, including the bookroom. We were able to save over \$40.00 on the cost of this improvement by taking advantage of a special sale of insulating materials.

**REPORT OF TRUSTEE OF TRUST FUNDS  
AS OF DECEMBER 31, 1966**

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During the calendar year of 1966 nine new Trust Funds have been established which makes a total of 175 funds to be administered the total amount of which when established amounted to approximately \$23,767.00. Our income from interest and dividends this year amounted to \$2,522.45 which was divided equally among the funds according to the amount of each at the rate of 7%. Although the market value of our stocks was not equal to that of last year our income was equal or better since we have gained in shares by stock dividends; having received 33 additional shares during the years. Since we do not plan to sell any of our stock its present depressed value has no particular effect on our operation of the funds.

Although we regretted to lose Mr. Harold Murdough as Caretaker of the Cemeteries, we feel that he has well earned his retirement and wish him many happy years. We are glad to report that his successor, Mr. Vernon Perkins has shown ability in taking up the duties and in most cases has been able to hold the same prices as before, thus helping to keep the funds in a growing condition.

**REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN  
AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF  
FIRE RECORD**

---

Fire records are made by people—those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire, working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966).

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owner's and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres—a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.
2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
4. Most important—Instruct your children that matches are not playthings.

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.
9. To see if the District will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed nine hundred thirty dollars (\$930.00) to install a draft inducer on the furnace at the school.
10. To see if the District will vote to accept the provisions of Public Law 89-10, designed to improve educational opportunities with particular reference to children of low income families, and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the District

under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the School Board. Further, to see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

11. To see if the District will, pursuant to New Hampshire R. S. ## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

There was only one change in the teaching staff when school opened in September. Elizabeth Taylor resigned and was replaced by Esther Wheeler. Mrs. Wheeler is a graduate of Plymouth State College and has a number of years teaching experience, the most recent of which was in Thornton. We were also able to secure the services of Diane Dickinson to complete the year as music supervisor. Miss Dickinson completed her work as a Music Major this Fall at Plymouth State College. Miss Dickinson is especially good with young children and music is again a popular subject.

It has proven very helpful to have someone work with the children who are not doing their best in school. The work of Miss Ashley is valuable and much appreciated. I am sure I speak for the teachers as well as myself when I say I hope this service will be continued.

We have been fortunate over the years in securing capable teaching personnel. I think it was more difficult this year than ever before to find qualified teachers and I think there will be no change in the immediate future. When schools started this Fall, there were 180 classrooms in New Hampshire for which there were no teachers. These positions were filled by substitutes. Salary is not the only answer but quite often it is a determining factor in attracting people from outside. I have just learned there may be some State Aid for teacher salaries by another year.

Our school budget this year will include new Social Studies textbooks through the eighth grade. This is the only area left where we do not have a modern up-to-date textbook series. A survey of new texts available is being conducted and after consultation with teachers and the Principal, a selection will be made before school closes. Otherwise, the expenditures in workbooks, textbook replacements and consumable supplies remains about the same as in other years.

Our hot lunch program continues to be one of the best in the state for the small schools. It should be called to your attention we are receiving less in the way of surplus commodities which in turn increases the local cost. Your School Board is aware of this situation but you should know it may be necessary to raise the price of the lunch next year.

I am sure an article will again appear in the warrant to accept Title 1 funds under P. L. 89-10 ESEA. The amount is approximately \$800 for the Rumney School District. I can truthfully say there has been no interference whatsoever in the programs that accepted funds last year. At times there was some question about the acceptance of a particular project but it was always worked out to the mutual satisfaction of everyone. The money is spent with the full knowledge and consent of the School Board. Thus, your legal representatives have full control of the expenditures. If the district approves acceptance of the funds, I would recommend to the Board they be used to help defray the expenses involved in the employment of a helping teacher at least for the next school year.

There will also be an article in the warrant to appoint a new committee to study a Cooperative or AREA school. It would take too much time and space to explain the problems and implications involved if Plymouth sells all of its school property to the State of New Hampshire. Needless to say, I think you would be wise to elect or appoint a committee to report the findings of the new Board and make recommendations to the district.

Please feel free to contact me if I can help you with educational problems.

## EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

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Chapter 189, Section 48 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district, and their share of same. Said report shall be filed with the school board of each school district involved and shall be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be made for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrator, if any is in service in the union."

One half of the supervisory union expenses is pro-rated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One half is pro-rated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of \$10,850.00 which was received by the Superintendent of Schools of Supervisory Union #48 during the 1965-66 school year was made up as follows: \$5,000.00 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$5,850.00 pro-rated among the several school districts which now include Warren. Allowances of \$1,300.00 for travel within the Union was also pro-rated as stated above.

Miss Ruth Buczynski volunteered her time as girls' basketball coach. She deserves much thanks for giving her time to make girls' basketball a success here.

I would like to thank the parents and school committee for all the cooperation given to the school.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

The nurse made forty-four visits to the school and twelve home visits. Interviews with Superintendent, Principal, and teachers held and worked in various grades on each visit. Also give first aid and advice when in the school. Transported children, when necessary, to Guidance and Mentally Retarded Clinics in Concord and Laconia.

Hearing tests were done on each school child on an Audiometer and notices were sent to parents on all who failed with advice to check with their family doctor.

Vision screening tests were done on each child and notices sent to parents for those who failed the test.

Inspections were made on hair, scalp, skin, teeth and for possible contagious diseases. Each child was weighed and measured and a health record kept on each. Contacts were made with parents for Dentists, Eye Doctors and help was given with applications for orthopedic, Sight Conservation, Guidance Clinics and Speech Clinics in Hanover; also the Crippled Children's Services.

A Dental Clinic was held for the first four grades. The Nurse registered pre-school children and talked with parents about the health of the children.

The nurse bought first aid supplies as needed. Notices were sent to all positive reactors on the T. B. Test, when Chest Clinics or an X-Ray was due.

The nurse attended two meetings for School Nurses in Concord and Teachers' Convention (School Nurses' Section.)
