

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sandwich, in said County and State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles:

- 1. To hear reports of Town Officers or committees and take any appropriate action thereon.
- 2. To see if the Town will determine by vote the salaries to be paid any of its officers and agents.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To raise and appropriate \$133.92 to pay interest of School fund Note.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the support of the Library in addition to the amount required by law. The sum recommended to be raised as a whole is \$1200.00.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the observance of Old Home Week. The sum recommended is \$150.00.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the observance of Memorial Day. The sum recommended is \$150.00.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$142.00, for Lakes Region Association.

- 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate money for maintenance of the Notch and Dale Roads. The sum recommended is \$1000.00.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Road Aid (T.R.A.) and vote to raise and appropriate for that purpose the sum of \$855.71.
- 11. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for construction of Class II roads, and raise and appropriate for that purpose the sum of \$2143.00 the State contributing \$4,286.00.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the Maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges and for winter care and to pass any vote relating thereto. The amount recommended is \$16,000.00.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400.00 for the repair of Berry Hill on Coolidge Road.
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust control.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Fire Department.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$860.00 to purchase pump for the Fire Department.
- 17. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the Laconia Hospital and \$50.00 for Huggins Memorial Hospital.
- 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the care of Cemeteries.
 - 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and

appropriate the sum of \$75.00 to restore five of the old cut-stone sign posts.

- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to purchase three blade-type truck plows for snow removal purposes.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for cleaning out Whiteface Brook Bed and \$300.00 for Jake Brook.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for repairing (finishing) the road from Durgin Bridge to David Peaslee's. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to take \$200.00 from surplus if needed and to take any other vote relating thereto.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to repair the road to Noss residence.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000.00 for paying Town charges for the ensuing year.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000.00 to pay the expense of General Government.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for painting the Town Hall, also for screens and shades.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for recreational purposes. To be administered by the Sandwich Athletic Club.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to pay from surplus such sums as are necessary to pay the charges for surveying or assessing timber for Town purposes.

- 29. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 30. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to breaking door-yards and to raise and appropriate money for that purpose if necessary.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 as the second annual installment to repay the loan from The Sandwich Town and Grange Fair Association.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200.00 to complete the Tractor Shed.
- 33. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to Fire Escape for the Town Hall. To raise and appropriate money for that purpose.
- 34. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to purchasing an Oil burner and blower for furnace in Town Hall. To raise and appropriate money for that purpose.
- 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the Selectmen's Association.
- 36. To choose by ballot all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Board of Selectmen Sandwich, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

In accordance with the vote of the town an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Sandwich has been made by this Division. This audit covered the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945, and the period from January 1st to June 10, 1946. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report which is submitted herewith. The report is made up in three sections as follows:

Section I - Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1945 Section II - Period January 1st to June 10th, 1946 Section III - Statistical Tables Covering Ten Year Period

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Wentworth Library, Volunteer Fire Department, Old Home Association and Sandwich Sports Program.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Revised Balance Sheets - December 31, 1944 - December 31, 1945: (Exhibit A)

Revised Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1944 and December 31, 1945, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Surplus decreased by \$324.10 during the year. The factors influencing this change in financial condition may be summarized as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations & Expenditures - Estimated & Actual Revenues:

(Exhibits B & C)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945, are presented in Exhibits B and C. As indicated by the budget summary a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,561.57, less an excess of actual over estimated revenues of \$1,192.44, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$369.13. Summary of Receipts & Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is included in Exhibit E.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1945, and June 10, 1946, is indicated in Exhibits F and R, respectively.

TAX ACCOUNTS

Tax warrants for the levies of 1945 and 1944, and the tax sale account for the levy of 1945 and previous years were examined. Summaries indicating the activity in these accounts during the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945, are included in Exhibits G, H and J, respectively. A summary of the Special Poll Tax account is presented in Schedule I.

TOWN CLERK

The accounts and records of the Town Clerk were examined and audited. All funds received by the Town Clerk on account of the issuance of motor vehicle permits and dog licenses were properly accounted for through remittances to the Treasurer or cash on hand. (Exhibits K and S)

TRUST FUNDS

Savings bank books, U. S. bonds and other securities, representing the principal and unexpended income of the trust funds were examined. A summary statement of trust fund principal and income is included in Exhibit L.

TOWN OFFICERS' SURETY BONDS

A list of the officials who are required by law to furnish surety bonds is included in Exhibit Q. Also indicated therein is the amount of the bond and the surety company.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Table III, entitled "Statement of Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes," presents a comprehensive summary of the financial condition of the Town of Sandwich during the last ten years and the changes which

have taken place during this period.

It will be noted that with one exception each fiscal year has closed with the town in a surplus position. The assessed valuation has increased, except in the years 1938, 1939 and 1940, and the tax rate has been well under the average rate for the State up until the year 1945. In 1945 the gain in valuation was more than offset by the increase in the tax levy

which resulted in a tax rate of \$3.35, compared to the

average State rate of \$3.26.

A fine record of tax collections has been maintained throughout this period. At the end of 1945 the total amount of uncollected and unredeemed taxes was only a little more than one percent of the 1945 tax warrant.

The substantial income from trust funds for highway and other purposes is a very material aid to town

finances.

Some suggestions and recommendations relative to accounting procedure were made to the officials during the course of the audit. These included:

(1) Withholding Taxes:

In the collection of the withholding tax, the town simply acts as the agent of the government. Therefore the total amount actually earned by an employee should be charged to the proper appropriation account. For instance if the net amount paid highway employees in a week amounted to \$74.00 and the withholding tax amounted to \$6.00, the total amount earned would be \$80.00. Of this amount \$74.00 would be charged to "highways" when the employees were paid and \$6.00 should likewise be charged to "highways" when the tax withheld is sent to the Collector of Internal Revenue.

(2) Capital Reserve Funds:

In setting up the Capital Reserve funds in the Balance Sheet, the accrued income should be added to the original amount of the funds.

(3) Interest on Redemptions from Tax Sales:

A separate accounting for interest on redemptions from tax sales should be made by the Collector. When remittances on account of tax sales redeemed are made by the Collector to the Treasurer, the accompanying reports should indicate separately the amount of "tax sales redeemed" and the "interest" thereon. The Treasurer should make a similar record in his cash book.

Conclusion:

The accounts of all officials of the town which we

examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform methods

prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Sandwich for their assistance during the course of

the audit.

Exhibits as presented herewith reflect the activity for the complete fiscal year ended December 31, 1946.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Cemetery Trustees, Wentworth Library, Volunteer Fire Department, Old Home Association and Sandwich Sports Program.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets — December 31, 1945-December 31, 1946: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1945 and December 31, 1946, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Surplus decreased by \$5,267.71 during the year.

Report of the Forest Fire Warden

HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PREVENT FIRES — IT PAYS!

Prevention is one of the most important phases of all fire effort. This is particularly true of forest fire control work. Preventing forest fires preserves valuable forest growth and other property, conserves man power and permits their use in productive channels, saves taxpayers' money and conserves fire

fighting equipment.

The prevention of forest fires is the most important and difficult part of the work of your forest fire warden who heads a local organization set up primarily for the security of your community's forest property. Appointed by the State Forester, upon recommendation of the Selectmen, he is charged by law with the responsibility of local administration of forest fire laws, fire prevention and suppression. In his work he is aided by deputy forest fire wardens who, in emergency, may assume his power and authority. The warden is guided in his work by instructions received from the State Forester and by the District Fire Chief who represents the State Forester.

The importance and value of the work of the forest fire warden and his deputies is, perhaps, best appreciated during hazardous periods when fire danger is greatest. The public, however, looks to him at all times for speedy and economical suppression of going

fires.

To properly fulfill his mission, the warden needs the generous and understanding cooperation of the public at large. He attempts to secure this cooperation by the posting of caution notices, news items and by word of mouth, always carefully explaining the necessity of restrictions imposed. In the matter of giving cooperation, however, the public often fails. The record shows that an average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year. Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are,

consistently, the result of human carelessness and are

preventable.

The careless smoker fails to properly extinguish his cigar, cigarette or pipe ashes or thoughtlessly throws them from the car window; the debris burner fails or refuses to consult the warden, as the law requires when the ground is not covered with snow, before attempting to burn; campers fail to properly extinguish their fires or frequently build fires when conditions are unfavorable.

The elimination of human causes from the forest fire problem is the answer. This is not as difficult as it might appear at first glance. Let each one who

reads this —

 Use ordinary common sense with fire in and near woodland.

2. Comply with requirements on the use of fire in and near woodland and when the ground is not covered with snow, secure written permission to burn from the forest fire warden.

3. Be careful when smoking in or near woodlands. Don't throw lighted material from moving

vehicles.

4. Cooperate with and assist the warden and urge

others to do so.

5. HELP YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN PRE-VENT FIRES — his efforts are only as effective as is the cooperation you give him!

His loss is felt in all Town activities, but in none more deeply than in the Sandwich Red Cross.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Sandwich qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the eighth day of March 1947, at two o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the District will vote to build a new central school, acquire the necessary land for a site, and purchase the necessary equipment.

IF THE DISTRICT ADOPTS THE PROVISIONS OF ARTICLE 9

9 A. To see if the district will vote to elect two citizens of the district to act in conjunction with the

school board as a building committee, to select a site and to execute all contracts and agreements necessary, proper or advisable in connection with the purchase of land for a school site and the construction and equipping of a new central school.

- 9 B. To see how much the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a suitable site for a new central school.
- 9 C. To see if the district will authorize a building committee to engage an architect to assist in the preparation of plans and specifications for a new central school building, and to see how much money shall be raised and appropriated for this purpose.

IF THE DISTRICT DOES NOT ADOPT THE PROVISIONS OF ARTICLE 9:

- 9 D. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6000.00 to remodel the school buildings in use at present, to provide more space, also adequate light and heating facilities.
- 10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to sell the Chick's Corner School, together with any land at that location that may be found to belong to the District.
- 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

During the past year, 98 school visits were made in Sandwich and 129 pupils inspected. The pupils were weighed and measured twice. Tests of vision have been made with the telebinocular and hearing tests with the audiometer.

Dr. Robert S. Quinby made the physical examina-

tions with the following results:

Defective teeth 54 Defective tonsils 9 7 (all have Defective vision glasses) Defective hearing 1 Wax in ears 5

A dental clinic was held, and ten pupils had dental

work done.

One pupil was taken to Dr. Hunter in Dover for

eye refraction, and obtained glasses.

Toxoid clinics were held in January and February for the pupils in the first five grades and for pre-school children. This clinic was sponsored by the State Board of Health. Dr. Quinby was the physician in attendance, assisted by Mrs. Joanne Carter of the State Board and by your school nurse.

The Red Cross assisted financially in cooperation

with the Federal Government in procuring milk for the

children, who paid one cent a day for a half-pint of milk. This help from the Red Cross is much appreciated.

I wish to express my thanks also to all others who

have assisted in carrying out the health program.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Problems of Overcrowding

For the past several years, our one-room schools have been closed one by one, for lack of teachers, until last year only one — North Sandwich — remained in session. The rest of the pupils attended the two-room building at Center Sandwich. This school, before the end of the year, became too crowded for successful work and it seemed necessary to devise some means of relief. Opening any one of the three outlying schools (Chick's Corner, Lower Corner, or Whiteface) to care for pupils in that neighborhood would take care of only a few; and besides, no teacher who would accept a one-room school of mixed grades seemed to be available.

A Junior High School

The plan which the school board finally approved involved the transfer of all 7th and 8th grade pupils into one group, to be housed at Lower Corner School. This group was organized as a junior high school. The experiment has not been an unqualified success, largely because the building there is too small for satisfactory work with 20 pupils. The advantages of the enterprise seem to be as follows:

- a. Better instruction is possible when a teacher has only two grades. Special attention can be given to individuals, review where needed, etc.; and the stimulus of working with a larger group is an important factor.
- b. Activities of interest to the older pupils can be undertaken such as a Junior Hi-Y Club without interfering with the work of the younger children.
- c. The teachers at the Center have only three grades each, and can thus do more effective work than when they had the older boys and girls also.
- d. Graduation programs can be planned without the necessity of disturbing the younger grade groups, and without so many special rehearsals in which all schools join.

Disadvantages of our present setup are:

- a. Expense and inconvenience of transportation.
- b. Crowded conditions, making it impossible to do successfully work in manual training, domestic science, dramatic activities, or to carry on a lunch program.

A Centralized School Program (In old Buildings)

We seem to have developed, as a matter of necessity due to the shortage of teachers, a program that is almost equivalent to a centralized school program, but lacking many of the advantages that such a program usually can provide. There is only one outlying rural school — North Sandwich — and of the twelve pupils attending there only five walk to school; the other seven are transported from outside. The Center Sandwich two-room school, together with the junior high school at Lower Corner, comprise a sort of three-room centralized school, but maintained in two sections, two miles apart. The buildings used for these three groups are woefully inadequate, according to any modern standard of lighting, sanitation, heating, ventilation, or work facilities.

If these buildings are to be continued in use, it is imperative that steps be taken to bring them up to a reasonable standard without further delay. During the war, many matters such as adequate lighting had to be neglected because no materials were available. Now that such materials can be secured, let us not put off longer the program of school improvement that our children have needed for a long time.

A New Central Building?

Two years ago, a committee was created by vote of the district to consider the feasibility of a central school for Sandwich. Under the chairmanship of the late James S. Rogers, this committee made definite progress, and brought to the 1946 district meeting a report which contained many excellent suggestions. This committee was continued for another year by district vote, and with Dr. Robert S. Quinby as chairman, has had several meetings and conferences with

the school board in preparation for a further report to

the district on March 8.

A building of at least four rooms, which will take care of two grades in a room, together with such other facilities as could be afforded, and to which more rooms could be added in future years, seems to me the logical answer. Surely it does not look reasonable to spend much money on our present schoolhouses; and while building costs are high today, the great demand for buildings everywhere will probably prevent any considerable decrease in cost for several years. Many other districts in the State are finding it possible (and desirable) to plan now for new buildings this year or next.

I believe the boys and girls of Sandwich deserve the best that we can give them. If my house needs painting, and I let it go till next year when I can better afford it, it is not too serious a matter; but in a child's life a year is a long time. If his childhood needs are not provided for, the lack can never be fully made up in later life.
