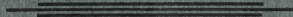

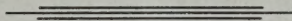

*COMMISSIONERS' REPORT*

*To the Citizens of Sullivan County:*

The Commissioners of Sullivan County submit their Annual Report for the year ending December 31, 1927, together with the Reports of the Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction, Treasurer, Clerk of the Superior Court, Sheriff, Solicitor, Chaplain, Physician, and Auditors, for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1927.

To Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Grout, the Commissioners acknowledge with a spirit of gratitude the faithfulness and kindness displayed by them at all times in the discharge of their duties as Superintendent and Matron.

The herd of over eighty head of pure bred Holstein cattle are in fine condition for which great credit is due our herdsman George A. Worcester.

At a meeting of the Sullivan County Delegation held at the County Farm February 11, 1927, it was recommended that some provision be made for a separate apartment for the care of the sick and infirm. After proper consideration by the Commissioners, plans were made by Hira R. Beckwith for the remodelling of a building adjacent to the Superintendent's apartment. The building is composed of a reception room, eight sleeping rooms, bath, etc., costing approximately Six Thousand Dollars. The furnishings were donated by friends to the amount of Seven Hundred Dollars for which the Commissioners wish to

express their appreciation. In the completion of this building there is afforded one of the greatest comforts for the sick and infirm that there has been for years at this institution.

We wish to thank the Overseers of the Poor of the several towns for their faithfulness in looking after the poor.

*SUPERINTENDENT'S AND MATRON'S REPORT*

---

In starting in the new year we wish especially to express our thanks to the Board of Commissioners for the courtesy shown us the past year, our relations have been always very pleasant and they have helped us wonderfully with our work and we feel much gratified that we have such a commission to work with.

We wish to thank the County Delegation for the appropriation allowed for our new ward which was badly needed, and we find now it is indispensable, as the inmates can be much better cared for and also giving them an opportunity to get out on the spacious verandah and get a breath of outdoor air which was impossible in the old building. We desire also to express our thanks to the people of both Claremont and Newport who have so generously donated toward furnishings and we wish to extend a hearty invitation to all to make us a visit, and inspect the institution, so that they may see that the money has been well expended.

Regardless of the unseasonable weather, we consider the past season a very prosperous one as we had an abundance of crops much more than the previous year with the exception of potatoes which crop was not up to the 1926 crop, however, think we will have sufficient to carry us through.

Our list of inmates has been somewhat larger than in years past but we are pleased to note that the cost per inmate has not gone beyond reason, even lower than some previous years.

Repairs and improvements have been quite extensive the

past year, also we have found it necessary to replace a considerable amount of farm machinery as most of the farm tools and machinery were very old and hardly in working condition.

We are very much gratified to note the increase in our milk production, which has a little more than doubled in the last two years and we are beginning to show a very substantial net profit on our herd of purebred Holsteins, also we find we are able to command much better prices for the stock we have for sale. This we credit to our Herdsman, Mr. George Worster, whose services have been very satisfactory.

We have been gradually going into berry raising principally for our own use. Last year we raised about four hundred quarts of strawberries and we have started several hundred raspberry and blackberries, a bed of asparagus and set out a considerable number of rhubarb plants. These we consider will make considerable saving especially for canning as there was nothing of this line on the farm previously. Our canning makes a very great saving. During the year past Mrs. Grout canned something over 2700 quarts of vegetables and berries which are used for both the inmates and help.

In closing we desire to express our thanks and appreciation for the efforts of the people of Claremont and Newport in giving presents and entertainment to our inmates at Christmas, New Year's and at other times, also to Dr. Sanders our attending physician, and Mr. Sawyer, chaplain, who helped us out in our work.

Both Mrs. Grout and myself have enjoyed the work and it is our aim not to allow the Institution to go backward but to try and bring it up to a par with any other institution of the kind in the state.

We wish also to express our gratitude to those of our employees who have cooperated with us in our work.

## SOLICITOR'S REPORT

---

Claremont, N. H., Jan. 1, 1928.

*To the Commissioners of Sullivan County:*

The Grand Jury for the March, 1927 term of the Superior Court indicted ten individuals. Two of these were given house of correction sentences for a statutory offence; and the sentence of a third for a similar offence was suspended. Another was sent to state prison for larceny; and one served time for forgery at the house of correction. An indictment for manslaughter was disposed of by a fine. Of three jointly indicted for cruelty to animals one was convicted after trial by jury at the following term of court. The last one of the ten wanted for a statutory offence was not apprehended as he had fled the country.

In September nine were indicted. One of these was charged with murder and at a special session of the Court in November was sentenced for twelve to fifteen years in state prison. Of two wanted for conspiracy to defraud one was apprehended after the term, and this case is the only one on the continued docket. The other has never been found; nor has another indicted for grand larceny. Two were given suspended sentences for statutory offences. Another was given a suspended sentence for forgery of a check; but as he continued to use bad checks, his sentence has been called for and he is now serving time in the house of correction. For assault with intent to kill one was sentenced to

state prison for a term of years. For embezzlement another was given a suspended sentence.

At both terms appealed cases from the Municipal Courts were disposed of, and there has been the usual amount of prosecutions in these courts during the year.

They have exceeded their budget for the last two years. Mr. Sanders submitted the following report:

Mr. H. N. Wells gave a very interesting and complete report about the Farm Bureau work. Following are some of the subjects taken up by Mr. Wells:

1. Tuberculosis Eradication Follow-Up Work
2. Organized Selling of Surplus Livestock
3. Conducted Campaign for Growing Legumes Such as Alfalfa.



4. Conducted Loan Association
5. Introduced Seeds of Known Origin
6. Co-operated in Farmers Exchange Work Handling about \$100,000 worth of Farm Supplies Co-operatively in Carload Lots
8. Started Fertilizer Tests

He read an editorial from the New England Homestead of February 5, 1927 which will be found below:

*Records of Which to Be Proud*

There are five subscribers to New England Homestead on this farm, and we are all staunch supporters of the old reliable paper. We would like to know how we rate with some of the other large farms in Massachusetts. We keep from 75 to 80 cows in milk and produce around 1100 quarts milk per day. Our cows are nearly all grades, about 40 per cent Guernseys and Jerseys. For the year 1926 our cows made an average of 10,278 pounds milk per cow. These cows were all brought in the past three years from Sullivan County, N. H. We have a very modern and well equipped dairy and are glad to be free from bovine tuberculosis. (Harry Lovejoy, Herdsman at Heywood Farm, Gardner, Mass.)

Here are records at Heywood Farm worth mentioning. With production exceeding 10,000 pounds milk per cow in so large a herd, it is obvious there is very commendable management. We trust that the weekly visit of five New England Homesteads at the Farm is a helpful factor in the success being made. What other large farm in New England can equal or excel the records named?

Incidentally, note the very handsome testimonial as to the sort of dairy cows being raised in Sullivan County. For several years breeders in this aggressive New Hampshire county have been freeing their herds of tuberculosis and working on a

constructive program of herd improvement. That it pays is evidenced above. It should cause those farmers in Vermont who are opposing the area test to sit up and take notice of how these things work out. Those who are unwilling to progress with the times are sure to be lost in the struggle. Will readers please answer the questions of Mr. Lovejoy?

Some of the activities of the Club Agent during 1926:

1. Worked in 33 communities
  2. Number of boys and girls enrolled—522
  3. Number of meetings held by club members—425
  4. Number of clubs organized—40
  5. Projects carried on were as follows: Among the boys, Forestry, Fruit, Pig, Dairy, Potatoes, Poultry, and Garden
  6. Among the girls: Food, Canning, Clothing
- 1925 work was practically the same.

Mr. C. T. Rossiter supplemented Mr. Wells remarks on the Farm Bureau Work.

The following motion was made by Mr. Etsler seconded and voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5400.00 for the Farm Bureau of Sullivan County for the year ending December 31, 1927, also a like sum for the year ending December 31, 1928.

Upon a motion made by Mr. Etsler seconded and voted the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

RESOLVED, that the members of the County Convention here assembled extend to Mr. and Mrs. Groul their hearty thanks and appreciation of the efforts and courtesies extended to the members of the Convention and their guests.

Mr. Lewis called our attention to the fact that this year was the 100th anniversary of Sullivan County. Mr. Etsler made

the motion and it was carried that the Chairman, Mr. Lewis and the Commissioners, Mr. Sanders, Aiken and Barton be made a committee to see about having a suitable celebration.

Mr. Barton, the Sheriff, gave us some very good reasons why the Sheriff's salary should be increased from \$500.00 to \$800.00. Mr. Davidson made a motion that the clerk prepare a House Bill to have the salary of the sheriff of Sullivan County increased from \$500.00 to \$800.00.

The motion was seconded by Mr. Balloch and it was a vote.

RESOLVED, That the County Commissioners of Sullivan County are hereby authorized under the provisions of Chapter 59 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire to issue bonds or certificates of indebtedness in the name and in behalf of the County of Sullivan to the amount of Thirty-six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000.00). Said bonds or certificates of indebtedness to be in denominations of One Thousand Dollars each and payable in such sums and at such times, not exceeding twenty years from their date, as the County Commissioners shall determine. They shall



bear interest not to exceed four and one-fourth per cent per annum, payable semi-annually and have interest coupons attached to each bond. Such bonds and coupons shall be signed by the County Commissioners and countersigned by the County Treasurer and shall be made payable at such place or places as the County Commissioners shall designate and shall be deemed a pledge of faith and credit of the County.

The Clerk of the Superior Court of the County shall keep an account of all such bonds countersigned by the Treasurer showing the number and amount of each bond, the time of countersigning, the time when payable and the date of delivery to the Treasurer. The Treasurer shall keep an account of each bond showing the number thereof, the name of the person to whom sold, the amount received for same, the date of the sale and the time when payable. The County Commissioners in selling such bonds, shall appoint a time and place when and where they shall receive sealed proposals thereof at a price not less than par and shall publish a notice in some newspaper published in the County setting forth the time and place, when and where they shall receive such proposals. Said publication shall be at least thirty days before the day appointed to open said proposals. At the time and place appointed the Commissioners shall open the proposals received and the highest bidder shall be entitled to the amount of bonds for which he bids, providing that his bid equals or exceeds par, upon the payment thereof. Such bonds that are not sold may be sold by the County Commissioners at private sale at a price not less than par.

After a short discussion moved by Mr. Etsler to adopt the resolution.

It was a unanimous vote. Meeting was adjourned subject to call of the chairman.
