# **BOARD OF SELECTMEN'S REPORT**

The Selectmen's Office is very pleased to see a great deal of progress being made in 1999. Some of our biggest changes are the completion and dedication of the new library addition, the landfill reaching it's final stages of closing, a new town reassessment being put into effect in the year 2000, the Fire Department's new tanker, the Troy Senior Housing Project which is now ready for tenants, a new Head Start Program at Troy Elementary School, the near completion and dedication of the Band Stand, and the dedication of the Heritage Marker on the Town Common. These projects have taken many hours of planning and hard work and we certainly thank everyone responsible for helping in forming Troy's future.

Although 1999 saw a lot of progress and change, the year 2000 will still have many challenges. Some of the projects that will be worked on this year will be renovating the Train Station, developing a tourism and business brochure, continually updating our town records and computers, work on developing a Historic District, changing the way we recycle at the landfill, and the need for a new ambulance. With the great number of volunteers and committees, these projects and others will be moving in the right direction.

Over the past year the town has been helped by many people and businesses which we would like to thank. We would like to thank the individual who paid for the voting booths in recognition of the many years Bill Matson has devoted to working with the youth in Troy; John Holman for building a ball field at the Sand Dam in exchange for the use of the town bulldozer, Troy Mills for materials from their pits for completing the landfill closure, the VFW for the donation of a new flag pole on the Town Common, and the Senior Citizens for purchasing a bench for the Town Common. The town is extremely grateful to these people and businesses for all their support.

The Monadnock Regional School District will once again have a major article to vote on for Troy residents. A 50/50 formula is once again being proposed. We currently have a 100% enrollment formula, and we are asking you to support a formula which would be 50% enrollment and 50% valuation. In 1962 when the Monadnock Regional School District was formed the court ruled that a 50/50 formula was the fairest way of

funding the district and we believe the same is true today. The passage of this article would help the Town of Troy with their continued high taxes for the school.

We are very pleased to have our new Police Chief, Rich Busick, on board and new patrolman, Jeff Clark. Rich was hired in September and Jeff recently graduated form the Police Academy in January. We look forward to working with Rich and his department in the years to come.

The town received a good report from our auditors, Vachon, Clukay & Company. We thank Cindy, Ralph, and Janet for their fine work in maintaining our town financial books.

We would like to express our deepest sorrow for the loss this past year of Phyllis Callahan and Junie Blaisdell. Phyllis, who has been very active in town, and the Postmaster for several years, will be greatly missed. We shall also miss a good friend to Troy, who always listened and was a very powerful voice for the town and that was our State Senator, Junie Blaisdell, who past away this past summer.

The Selectmen would like to thank all town employees, volunteers, and committee members for all your hard work in 1999. We would also encourage any town's person to get involved by volunteering to serve on one of our many committees.

#### ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT

I am pleased to present the 1999 Annual Town Report. This document provides a review of the year's activities and provides financial information for both the current and proposed budgets. This report also allows our citizens to judge the responsiveness of Town Government by review and approval of the proposed Town Budget.

1999 was a year of rebuilding for the Town of Troy. The Library renovation/addition project was completed, the Troy Landfill saw the transition to a Transfer Station/Recycling Center, and the Band Stand on the Town Common is so close, needing stain, some railings, and a weather vane. The VFW Post in Fitzwilliam donated and installed a new flag pole which is lighted on the Town Common, and the Troy Senior Housing Project revitalized the south end of the Town Common. Gap Mountain Bread, under the new ownership of Diane Kellner, was repainted and the white picket fencing rebuilt. Kimball Hall was also repainted and the kitchen stove was replaced with a commercial stove to accommodate the community use of the building. Jonathan Kirstein also reopened the Village Barn on the Town Common.

1999 was a challenging tax season for the Town of Troy, implementing the new state school tax rate, getting the second issue tax bills out with the new format, and getting the Town Offices Y2K compliant. It was also a challenging year for the Town Clerk's Office, issuing the new license plates.

We have completed the three-year, town-wide review of property. No changes were implemented in 1999, mostly due to the changes in the state school tax. A booklet will be sent out to all property owners in March 2000 with the new assessments. Hearings will be scheduled to review assessments and the final figures will be set in April. You will see your new assessment reflected on your second issue tax bill in the fall. Once complete, we will be able to adjust values without a town-wide revaluation.

#### ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT

Reviewing the year, I would like to recognize Phyllis Callahan. Phyllis was installed as the Postmaster in Troy on October 25, 1975. With appreciation and many fond memories, Phyllis' passing is a loss felt in many areas of our community and for many of Troy's citizens, she was their connection to the Town of Troy.

I would like to remind all Troy property owners that street addresses should be prominently displayed. Address numbers should be in clear contrast to the background on which they are attached and be clearly visible to emergency services responders from the street. Most properties have displayed their addresses since they were assigned but some homes are still not marked. It is important that emergency personnel are able to find an address quickly in the event of a fire or medical emergency. Mail carriers and delivery trucks also need to be able to find the street address.

If you are unsure of your E-911 street address, or how to display it properly, please contact the Selectmen's Office, 242-7722.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to the Board of Selectmen which has been tremendous and very supportive, and to all the town employees, committee members, and volunteers, who are Troy's greatest asset. Your contributions are appreciated.

## The State of New Hampshire Town Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy, in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs, you are hereby notified to meet at Troy Elementary School, the 14th day of March, next at 10:00 AM in the forenoon for balloting upon matters specified in Articles 1 and 2, listed below, and you are hereby further notified to meet at the Troy Elementary School on Wednesday, the 15th of March at 7:30 PM to act upon the remainder of the listed warrant.

**ARTICLE 1.** To bring in your vote for one Selectman for three years and other Town Officers elected by ballot as passed by Town Meeting or State Statute for the specified number of years.

**ARTICLE 2.** Are you in favor of the adoption of **Amendment No. 1** as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance, as follows:

To amend Article XIV, Administration and Enforcement, Paragraph A, to allow the Selectmen to designate authority for enforcing the ordinance, as follows: "The Selectmen may appoint an agent to administer (accept and issue building permits and inspect) and enforce this ordinance."

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance, as follows:

To amend Article XIV, Administration and Enforcement, Paragraph B, to require that 200 square foot accessory structures be subject to a building permit. (Currently they are exempt.) "It shall be unlawful to erect and use any structure without first obtaining a building permit."

Are you in favor of the adoption of **Amendment No. 3** as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance, as follows:

To amend Article XII, Non-Conforming Uses, Structures and Lots, Paragraph B, to allow the replacement or relocation of a non-conforming structure, provided the non-conformity is no greater than the original.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance, as follows:

To amend Article XII, Non-Conforming Uses, Structures and Lots, Paragraph C, to allow a non-conforming lot to be enlarged, even though the enlargement does not make the lot conforming.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety-Five Thousand Dollars (\$95,000) to purchase a new ambulance and to enter into a long-term lease/purchase agreement in the amount of Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000) payable over a term of sixty (60) months at a rate of Sixteen Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety-Seven Dollars (\$16,797) annually and to raise and appropriate \$16,797 for the first year's payment for this purpose from taxation; furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of \$20,000 from the Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. The 1990 Ford ambulance will be sold and the proceeds will go into the general fund surplus for the purpose of replenishing the Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee. (2/3 Ballot Vote Required)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to negotiate the sale of the land Kimball Hall sits on. The purchase price being equal to the cost of moving Kimball Hall to the Town railroad depot property and placing it on a foundation. Recommended by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500) for computer software for town offices. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 9.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to paint/stain municipal buildings. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) representing the Town's matching funds for a grant to develop the Cheshire Railroad Depot and Freight Sheds for use as a tourist, recreation, and historical center. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the project is completed or by December 31, 2002, whichever is sooner. None of these funds will be expended until the grant has been received. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) representing the Town's matching funds for a grant to publish and distribute a map and brochure directing visitors to tourist, recreation, and business sites in Troy. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the project is completed or by December 31, 2002, whichever is sooner. None of these funds will be expended until the grant has been received. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$17,500) for the care of the cemeteries and authorize the withdrawal of Sixteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$16,500) from the Cemetery Trust Funds established for that purpose. The balance of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) to be raised by taxation. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 13.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty-Five Dollars (\$12,755) for the purchase of a new pickup truck for the Cemetery Department and authorize the withdrawal from the Cemetery Trust Fund. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand One Hundred Thirty-Nine and 98/100 (\$4,139.98) to be placed in the Police Department Capital Reserve Fund. This sum to come from fund balance (surplus), the amount received from the sale of the 1992 Ford Crown Victoria and the 1993 Ford Explorer police cruisers, November 15, 1999, and no amount to be raised from taxation. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 15.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Four Hundred Ninety-Seven Dollars (\$5,497) for the final payment on the lease/purchase agreement on the 1997 Ford Crown Victoria police cruiser. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 16.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000) to hire a regional prosecutor or take any action thereon. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 17.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to be placed in the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund. This sum to come from fund balance (surplus), the amount received from the sale of the 1975 International tanker truck, November 8, 1999, and no amount to be raised by taxation. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 18.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Two Hundred Fifty-One Dollars (\$10,251) for the Fire Department to purchase nine reconditioned scott air paks, fourteen distress devices and sixteen air pak lights. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to reconstruct the dirt portion of West Hill Road and pave it. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) for the purchase of a used dump truck for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal from the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expend the Highway Block Grant of Forty Thousand Two Hundred Fifty-four and 31/100 (\$40,254.31) that the Town will receive from the State of New Hampshire during calendar year 2000 for the maintenance, construction, and reconstruction of Class IV and V Highways. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000) for landfill groundwater monitoring. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to require residents to deposit refuse in specifically designated bags to be brought to the Transfer Station/Recycling Center; furthermore, such bags shall be sold by the town at a reasonable price. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for the purchase of clear plastic bags for the Transfer Station and authorize the withdrawal from the Landfill Capital Fund established for this purpose at the 1992 annual meeting. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to replace the clay which was removed from Farrar Field to be used to cap the landfill as part of the closure plan and to authorize the withdrawal from the Landfill Special Trust created for

that purpose. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Twenty-Four Thousand Four Hundred Ninety-Nine Dollars (\$224,499) for the Water/Sewer Department operations. Income comes from collections of water and sewer rents. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee. Water/Sewer Commissioners recommend \$234,499.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-two Thousand Six Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$72,620) for the payment of Sewer Bonds. Income from the State of New Hampshire will be \$20,060. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 28.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-nine Thousand One Hundred Forty-Four Dollars (\$29,144) for the second payment of the \$200,000 Note for the Library Addition/Renovation Project. Recommended by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 29.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the funds listed to be donated to each organization as specified:

ARTICLE 31. To see if the voters of the Town of Troy will vote to discontinue that portion of Water Street beginning at the intersection of Route 12 and Water Street, westerly for 400 feet, to a point at the easterly side of the driveway of Kitrick and Karen Bradbury. To become effective upon passage of this article at Town Meeting. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 32. Polling hours in the Town of Troy are now 8:00 AM to 7:00 PM. Shall we place a question on the State election ballot to change polling hours so that polls shall open at 10:00 AM and close at 7:00 o'clock in the evening, for all regular state elections beginning in the year 2001.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 202A:4-d authorizing the Library Trustees to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the library for any public purpose, provided however that no acceptance of personal property by the Library Trustees shall be deemed to bind the town or the Library Trustees to raise, appropriate or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair or replacement of such personal property. This authorization shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of town meeting.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax lien and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction, or advertised sealed bid, or in such a manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require, until rescinded by a vote of town meeting.

**ARTICLE 37.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money, and pay charges and interest thereon, until rescinded by a vote of town meeting.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hear reports of committees, agents, or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.

### BUDGET COMMITTEE



### FIRE DEPARTMENT

1999 saw completion of our new tanker. We would like to thank the citizens of Troy for their support of this project. The new tanker should give many years of service to the town. It is equipped with a 1250 gallon per minute pump, 3000 gallon water tank and a Newton Quick Dump, which will allow the 3000 gallons of water in the tank to be dumped into a folding tank in two and a half minutes.

Also placed in service during the year was our light rescue truck. This truck is carrying special firefighting and medical equipment. The plan is to back up and assist TEASI when the ambulance is out of town on another call.

In this year's town warrant there is an article to upgrade and replace some of our self-contained breathing apparatus. When the purchase is completed we will have sixteen units in service. The Department responded to the following calls for assistance during the year of 1999:

# TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. During the 1999 season Forest Rangers were busy assisting communities with suppression of difficult and remote multi-day fires. Forest Rangers have also investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The 1999 fire season was a challenging but safe year for wildland firefighters in New Hampshire. The severe drought conditions throughout the spring and summer months combined with residual effects of 1998 Ice Storm, resulted in a dramatic increase in wildland fires. In addition to burning in excess of 452 acres, 35 structures were also impacted by wildfire. Wildland fires in the urban interface is a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their structures by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

### **GAY-KIMBALL LIBRARY**

There were enormous changes at the library during 1999. We started out the year with limited service at the Town Hall while the library building was being renovated and increased in size. On April 1<sup>st</sup>, volunteers, trustees, and staff started to move back into the new building. On May 9<sup>th</sup>, the library reopened and on May 16<sup>th</sup> there was an open house reception to mark the occasion. The improved facility has made the library to be completely accessible, offer more services such as computer terminals and meeting room space, as well as increased shelf space. More efficient work space and a beautiful new circulation desk, designed and made by volunteer, John Gove, have made for increased staff productivity while retaining the same number of hours.

Since the re-opening of the library, many more groups and committees have used the meeting room and activities for children and adults have increased. Exhibitions by local artists have been held now that there is sufficient wall space, summer reading program activities took place indoors and out, a holiday party was held in December, and ESL tutoring takes place weekly. Many library patrons use the computers for the Internet, research or word processing. Thanks to several large donations, we were able to buy a new computer, TV, VCR, chairs and a conference table for the meeting room. Furnishings for the main room include comfortable chairs, a reading table and computer tables. The children's room has new chairs, tables and a study carrel.

Fund raising efforts this year were headed by Kathleen Marrotte, Book Sales; and Kelly Budd, Turkey Raffle. Many other volunteers helped with these events to raise about \$3,000 for the building fund and for the library collection. Our thanks to all library volunteers.

The Trustees and staff wish to thank Ralph Wentworth, Building Committee Chairman, and the members of the committee as well as the many townspeople who helped make this up-to-date library possible. It is a credit to the Town of Troy.

### HELPING HAND CENTER

Helping Hand was established in February of 1991 and continually strives to assist people who find themselves financially stressed through lack of employment, poor health, or other unfortunate circumstances. The food pantry, though not refusing anyone, is primarily for people living in Troy and Fitzwilliam and others are referred to their local food pantries.

Between 100 and 150 households continue to be served though the families change somewhat because of people moving in and out of town. The clothes closet side is opened to anyone; suitable and clean clothes are available to anyone from anywhere. Networking for those in need of furniture is available.

We greatly appreciate the solid support from the Town of Troy for their appropriation of \$2,000 and the Town of Fitzwilliam for their appropriation of \$1,000. Food and other funding sources include funds from FEMA; food from USDA, scouting and the Troy School 'Have A Heart Campaign'. The Gap Mountain Lions Club and the Troy Senior Citizens also provide donations annually. Our own efforts at funding were through Second Sunday Coffee House, our annual bake and yard sale, and Christmas Dinner/Concert, as well as the sales of tickets sponsored by Troy Arctic Cat for a raffle. Though we applied for a grant from Philip Morris towards a new or updated van, it did not materialize; however, the Bishop of Manchester awarded us \$2,500 for our continued efforts to help others. Most of these monies go toward food purchases, utilities, insurance and maintenance.

The Board of Directors was reorganized to include the following: Sister Lucie Ducas as director, Joanne Petelle representing the Catholic Churches affiliated with Immaculate Conception, Cindy Satas for Town Welfare, Judy Matson for the Salvation Army, Lucille Decatur from the Gap Mountain Lions Club, Mary Frazier from the Troy Senior Citizens, and Warren Rasmussen who handles publicity.

Our thanks to the day managers and the many volunteers. To accomplish these many tasks we need and appreciate your continued support and recommendations. Volunteers are always needed. We welcome your participation in our efforts to help others.

### TROY HERITAGE COMMISSION







### INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY


The Industrial Development Authority (IDA) has given special attention in the past year to defining actions that will bring useful services and economic improvement to Troy while preserving our unique village character. Planning has been focused on the prospects for improving the Common and Depot areas as centers for tourism and service to visitors. Travelers to Troy may be interested in shopping opportunities to be developed, may be drawn here by Gap Mountain and Monadnock trails and can be introduced to historical and natural attractions not well promoted in the past. A proposal has been submitted for a grant to support rehabilitation of the Railroad Depot as a center for such activity. The IDA has cooperated with the Planning Board and the Southwest Region Planning Commission in the preparation of a Tourism Plan and brochure to promote Troy as a tourist destination.

It is not well appreciated that Troy is home to about 60 businesses ranging from one man shops to our familiar Troy Mills. The IDA has established a computer web page accessible at <a href="http://www.town.troy.nh.us">http://www.town.troy.nh.us</a> as a means for providing information about Troy and communicating within our town and near and far. The website lists Troy businesses and provides links to community events, local attractions, history and demographics. The IDA welcomes contributions to the website content as an electronic meeting place that will grow in usefulness.

### LANDFILL/RECYCLING CENTER



After several years of delay for removal of the 180 barrels of hazardous waste, resurvey of the landfill and meeting of the Solid Waste Committee with the consultants, the landfill closure and transfer station plans were finalized. The capping system for the landfill is a less expensive capping because the groundwater monitoring results obtained over the past two years have shown that the groundwater is not significantly affected by the landfill. As a matter of fact, one of the wells has been deleted from the sampling and the well has been removed from the site.

However, with the closing of the landfill it was obvious that other arrangements needed to be made for the managing of the municipal solid waste that has been going to the landfill. As a result, the Town's Solid Waste Committee and the consultant worked on developing a site plan for a transfer station area, additional storage capacity, and several new concrete pads for glass, metals recycling, construction debris and a new concrete block open burning pit for clean wood products.

The contract for closing the landfill and construction of the transfer station was awarded to Park Construction Corp. of Fitzwilliam, NH. Park started construction in late October and continued to work until mid-December when the weather became too cold to place any more capping materials. The work was shut down for the winter and will begin again in mid-April with completion by early summer.

The transfer station layout is designed for one way traffic with as little criss-crossing of traffic as possible.

The Town is keeping the cost of the project to a minimum by using an SRF Loan from the NH DES which reduces the interest on the loan. The Town will also apply for the 20% landfill closure grant for all of the eligible closure costs.

I would like to extend my thanks to my staff for their efforts during the transition and the Highway Department, Jim Dicey and Gary LeBlanc, for their assistance with the equipment, improvements made to the site, and coordinating work with Park Construction.

### MONADNOCK ADVISORY COMMISSION

The Monadnock Advisory Commission is charged by the State of New Hampshire under RSA 259:1 to advise the Department of Resources and Economic Development (DRED) on the management of their lands and leased lands of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests and the Town of Jaffrey. The lands are located on Mt. Monadnock, Gap Mountain, and Little Monadnock.

Saturday, June 16, 1999, the Commission met at The Inn at East Hill Farm in Trov. Business attended to was as follows:

- Discussion on the Monadnock Management Plan was tabled in light of pending legislation to fund a master plan for Monadnock, Gap, and Little Monadnock Mountains. The plan will be formulated sometime after the end of the year.
- Continued discussion on the Dublin Trail parking lot in Dublin.
- The republication of the Monadnock Guide.
- Legislation has been introduced to allow the Commission to accept gifts, grants, and donations and to have tax exempt status. The bill was subsequently passed.
- A time capsule will be buried somewhere at the base of Mt. Monadnock on or about May 1, 2000.

The pubic is encouraged to contact their Commission members with suggestions and comments.

Your ongoing support of our work is deeply appreciated, and we hope that our partnership in caring for the residents of Troy will continue. We work very hard to keep our costs down, and to identify, whenever possible, alternate sources of funding for this population.

In addition to the census report, materials are on file in the Selectmen's Office describing the services we provide.



### NH 12 TROY BYPASS PROJECT

### **Activity for Year 1999**

During 1999 the project was in transition from conceptual design to engineering design. The NH Department of Transportation (NH DOT) completed the Environmental Assessment. The Environmental Assessment was the basis for design approval from the Federal Highway Administration. Design approval is formal authorization to proceed with the use of federal funds to prepare the construction, purchase right-of-way, and construct the project. The NH DOT also submitted an application for a New Hampshire wetlands permit to the NH Department of Environmental Services Wetlands Board – and awaits receipt of that permit.

The NH DOT began the process of hiring a consulting engineering firm which will prepare the bypass construction plans. The State will advertise for a contractor late in 2002. Currently, the project is scheduled for construction funding in spring of 2004, however, if funds can be moved forward, construction could begin in spring 2003.

Locally, NH DOT began appraisals and negotiations for seven of the effected properties. These are "early acquisitions" undertaken at the request of the property owners.

### PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board was involved in several significant town issues in 1999. Most prominent was the development of the Southwest Community Services Elderly Housing Complex south of the common. The project is nearing completion and residents will soon be moving into 15 apartment units in the renovated Kimball Hotel and in the new building next to it. The house next to the Troy Market has been renovated and will contain meeting facilities. It is hoped that the entire facility will bring more vitality to the central part of the village. Undeveloped space remains in the two original buildings for future commercial use, which the Troy Industrial Development Authority is overseeing.

The Board is indebted to numerous community members, the Southwest Region Planning Commission, the Historical Society, Heritage Commission, Troy Selectmen and Fire Department for their participation in the development process to ensure that Troy got the best and safest facility possible. The project was a massive, and at times traumatic undertaking for a town our size and the configuration of the property posed serious challenges to the developer and Troy's land use boards. An offshoot of this project has been the complete revision of building permits so that key issues won't be overlooked in the future.

The historic depot property with the former railroad station and two outbuildings was purchased by the town this year. The Selectmen and Industrial Development Authority have submitted an application for grant funding to renovate the station for use as a potential visitor center. Other possible uses for this property will be discussed in future public meetings.

The Town of Troy was the fortunate recipient of a planning assistance grant which enlisted the services of intern Melanie Bedaw and Senior Planner Carol Ogilvie of the Southwest Region Planning Commission to draft a Tourism and Marketing Component to Troy's Master Plan. A number of individuals and town organizations participated in the two public hearings which the Planning Board sponsored. It is hoped that these documents will help focus future efforts to draw visitors to Troy's natural, historic and commercial features. Part of this effort is a brochure which could be used in local Chambers of Commerce, and tourist/visitor facilities to promote our town. There is a warrant article requesting matching funds to have this brochure printed. Copies of the Tourism Plan and mockup brochure will be available both in the Selectmen's Office and at Town Meeting for review.

### PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board supports the efforts of the Heritage Commission to make application to the United States Department of the Interior for the "downtown" area, with 169 historically significant structures, to be entered into the National Register of Historic Places. Troy enjoys the distinction of having one of the largest contiguous potential qualified historic districts in New England. This designation does not create a new zoning district, nor does it restrict the rights of property owners. Hopefully it will serve to enhance the community's self image and standing in the region. Most of the background research has already been completed by The Preservation Company as part of the NHDOT bypass study in 1995. Copies of the consultant's report, The Survey of Selected Historic Properties, are on reserve at the Gay Kimball Library. The Heritage Commission hopes to fund completion of the research and the application process through private sources.

The Planning Board is grateful for the services of Janet McCullough, Co-Chairman, who tirelessly and carefully attends to the increasing level of administrative details. Thanks also to Barbara Hatch for her clerical support and to Carol Ogilvie and the Southwest Region Planning Commission staff for their efforts on behalf of the town.

### POLICE DEPARTMENT

The year 1999 was a year of transition and change for the Troy Police Department. Former Troy Police Chief Theodore Smith resigned from the department to accept the job of Chief of Police in the Town of Lincoln, NH. During the six month search for Chief Smith's successor, Sgt. William Farnum took on the responsibility of Acting Chief of Police and handled not only the day to day calls for service, but the administration of the police operation. He did an outstanding job! Officer Wayne Kassotis, the Juvenile and DARE Officer for Troy, was sworn in as a full-time police officer in the Town of Swanzey and became the first School Resource Officer (SRO) in the region. He is currently doing an outstanding job at the Monadnock Regional Junior and Senior High School. When Officer Kassotis left his full-time position at the Troy Police Department, he created an opening for a full-time officer. That position was filled by Officer Jeffry Clark. Officer Clark had been a part-time officer in our Department. Officer Kassotis had agreed to stay on and serve Troy as a part-time officer.

On September 12<sup>th</sup>, I was sworn in as your new Police Chief. I bring to Troy over 23 years of diverse police experience. Upon being offered the opportunity to serve as your Chief, I retired from the Manchester Police Department in Connecticut to accept this honor.

complicate this year's activities, Officer Kassotis' responsibilities as Monadnock were such that he tendered his resignation from the Troy Police Department as a part-time officer in November. Officer Clark had to attend the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Academy in Concord to be certified as a full-time police officer. He has been at the Academy since the first week in October and graduates January 14, 2000. As a new police officer in New Hampshire, I too, had to attend the New Hampshire Academy in Concord. I needed to complete the "Law Package" component which consisted of over 100 hours of classroom training. At year's end we still had two part-time officer We have conducted background investigations and have recently finished interviews with numerous qualified candidates. We will be selecting the new part-time officers shortly and after training at the Part-Time Police Academy, which begins in mid-February, and a Field Training Program, these officers will be available to serve our community by spring. We will also be training a new DARE officer to serve at the Troy School.

### POLICE DEPARTMENT

The only constant in 1999 was the tireless work of Sgt. William Farnum and part-time Police Officer Robert Newell. They are to be commended for the countless hours and excellent job they performed under very trying conditions.

With all of this activity, the ,Troy Police Department continued to provide excellent service to the community. We thank our fellow law enforcement officers from the State Police, Sheriff's Department and area towns for assisting us in providing police coverage to our community while we were severely short staffed.

I will provide some statistical information with regards to the Troy Police Department but I need to advise you that the numbers are not an accurate representation of the activity that occurred in our Town. It is the number of incidents that Troy officers responded to and does not include all the times we had coverage from the other police agencies during our staffing dilemma.


