WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Webster, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Grange Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways and bridges.
 - (a) Summer Maintenance
 - (b) Winter Maintenance
 - (c) Tar Roads
 - (d) General Expense of Highway Department
 - (e) Street Lighting
4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$444.27 for Class V road construction.
5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for public welfare.
 - (a) Town Poor
 - (b) Old Age Assistance
6. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the support of the town library.

7. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for patriotic purposes.

(a) Old Home Day

(b) Memorial Day

8. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as may be necessary for the support and maintenance of the Hy-Mar Fire Department, including forest fires.

9. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for use in connection with the State program for the eradication of White Pine Blister Rust.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$820.00 to defray the town's share towards the permanent improvement to two sections of graveled Blackwater Road leading from Snyder Bridge to Tyler, this amount to be added to the Snyder Bridge Road Improvement Fund.

12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$135.00 toward the operating deficit of the Concord Hospital, this amount being based on the number of patients admitted from Webster.

13. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the town by the issuance of notes a sum not exceeding \$10,000.00 in anticipation of taxes for the year 1955, said notes expressly payable from said taxes within one year from the date of issuance, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the rate of interest on such notes and to provide for the sale thereof.

14. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to execute the necessary deed to transfer to the land owner of record the town's southerly

right of way from the town tractor house leading south easterly to Route 127, and to convey to the same for \$1.00 and other valuable consideration a portion of the tractor house lot being the Southerly section of the lot, making the new Southerly boundary of the tractor house lot a line running nearly East and West and approximately 50 to 60 feet South of the tractor house.

15. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$600.00, the Hy-Ma: Fire Department supplying \$200.00 as its share, for the purpose of purchasing a used truck with suitable water tank and a filler hose for the portable pump now owned by the town.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

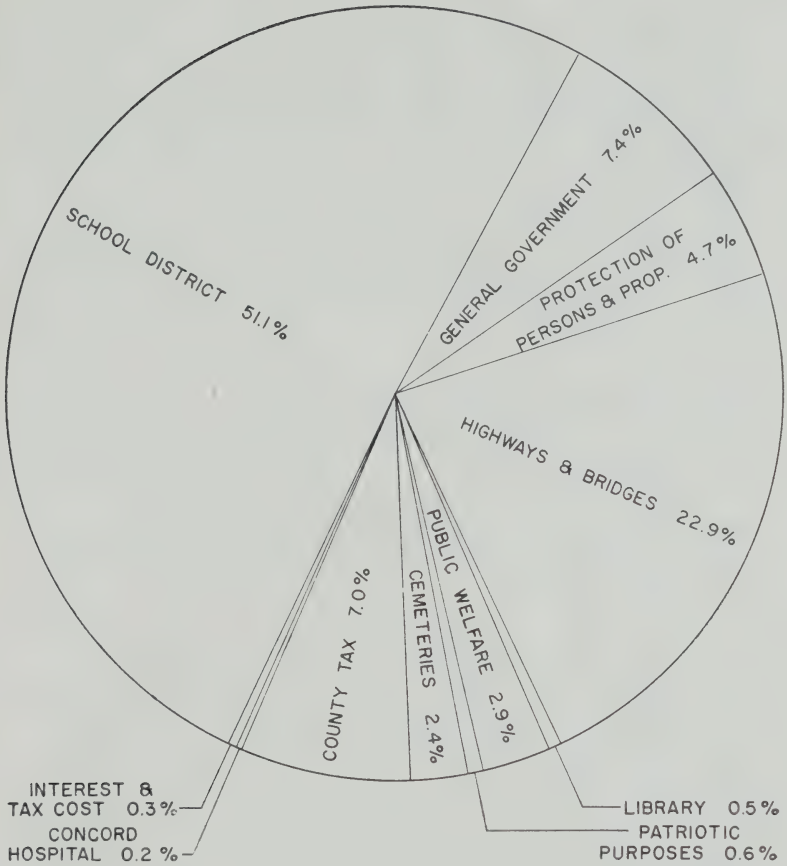

Pictorially it presents quickly and easily where your town maintenance money goes percentagewise.

TO THE TAXPAYERS

The purpose of this report is to provide pertinent information to the taxpayers in addition to that required by law or recommended by the State Tax Commission covering financial data.

The important undertaking during 1954 in the way of town improvements was the renovation of the Town Office and Town Library building. The following improvements were accomplished:

1. Pouring of concrete floor in basement
2. Construction of Town Officers' room
3. Stairway between floors installed and hallway re-decorated
4. Two heating systems installed
5. Partition in library removed and additional shelf space provided
6. Additional lighting throughout
7. Library ceiling and walls redecorated
8. Library floor oiled
9. Windows reglazed where necessary
10. Exterior painted
11. Fill added
12. Furniture repaired and improved

Some minor improvements were not undertaken but the cost of the same can be absorbed by our regular annual appropriation for Town Hall and other Town Buildings. These improvements include a sign and additional wiring in the Town Library and an outside light.

In spite of an over-run of the appropriation voted at the last Town Meeting, your Board was able to effect savings in other appropriations which resulted in a net cash under expended for the year of \$1,525.97.

Currently the people have a town building in excellent

condition and which should not require much maintenance for years to come. The building will be open for inspection on Town Meeting Day and our neighbors are cordially invited to inspect it. We are confident you will find it a credit to the Town.

The total amount expended for Tar Roads was \$2,682.27. In addition to the cost of mowing roadside bushes, cleaning ditches and scraping the dirt back from the road edges, approximately 2½ miles of hard surfaced roads were tarred using local personnel.

During the summer the State replaced the wood topping on the Clothespin Bridge with a concrete slab. This will eliminate recurring replanking expense to the Town in the future and it is an improvement worthy of mention.

The Town has continued its policy of installing a few additional culverts each year, all of which leads to better gravel roads.

Last year the Town voted the sum of \$820.00 as part of its share towards making permanent improvement to two stretches of gravel road leading from Snyder Bridge to Tyler. An article to raise a similar amount is included in the 1955 Warrant for consideration of the voters. The total Town's share is \$3,280. Upon inquiry to the N. H. Dept. of Public Works and Highways it was learned that the improvements will not be undertaken until the Town's full share has been raised and appropriated.

In addition to caring for the summer and winter maintenance of the Town roads, your able Road Agent handled the oiling of the tar roads and very expeditiously entirely rebuilt the bridge at the head of Lake Winnepocket which unfortunately was completely demolished by an over-loaded truck. The cost of this unexpected expense was absorbed by the summer maintenance appropriation (later recovered). The bridge should last for a long time now.

The Board is pleased to report an excess of \$529.02 in income over its estimate covering Motor Vehicle Permit fees. New cottages continue to be erected at the lake, as well as new homes in the Town, all of which increase our assessed valuation, and are signs of increasing growth of the Town.

The cemeteries are being well cared for under the current supervisor and every effort is made by him to keep them presentable at all times, especially so for Memorial and Old Home Days.

For the past two years it has not been necessary for the Town to borrow money in anticipation of taxes which has resulted in a saving of approximately \$150.00.

The Office of Chief of the Fire Department is filled annually by appointment by the Board of Selectmen. In the opinion of the Board this has been a happy appointment and is proven so by the alertness in which members of the Hy-Mar Fire Department respond to an alarm, and their approach to fighting a fire indicates excellent training and perseverance by those in charge. To assist your Fire Chief the Board bespeaks the regular attendance of all members. It is the all important duty of members to take advantage of all drills. It is impossible to measure in dollars and cents the actual value of our Fire Department, but let's give it all the support it merits.

While the Town Library does not come under the cognizance of the Board of Selectmen, we cannot help but be aware of the fact that the Librarian with cooperation from the Library Trustees has instilled new life in our local library. It is indicated by regular library hours, the arrangement with the State Library for supervision in removing out of date book and the setting up of a record system, all of which have been extremely lacking for a number of years.

From first hand knowledge, the library contains many good and new books and it should be better patronized. It could well convince the librarian that she was not working at a fruitless task if she saw more of the library books being loaned to her neighbors.

The following table has been prepared by general Departmental headings for the purpose of showing the distribution of your paid tax dollars on the basis of percentage of cost of each department to the total dollars spent for town maintenance. Also, there is shown the percent increase or decrease of 1954 expenditures over the 1953 costs.

REPORT OF THE LOCAL CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

While Civil Defense has been organized in the Town of Webster since September 2, 1950, this is the first year a report has been submitted to the people.

It might appear at first that Civil Defense is of minor importance to the community, but it is the opinion of the President of the United States, the Defense Department, and all people having in their hearts the good of our Country, now and forever, that Civil Defense has come to stay.

Inasmuch as this is so, the town of Webster should be completely organized and trained to do its share along with its sister towns.

A complete organization chart showing the assignment of Webster people has been posted at least twice in the two Webster stores. In addition to the assignments shown, all qualified persons are automatically members of the Warning & Communication and Ground Observer Units.

The Webster Civil Defense Organization has been established in accordance with New Hampshire basic directives—NHCD Document 50/2 and NHCD Document 52/1.

Numerous meetings were held with the Unit Leaders for the purpose of selecting appropriate personnel and to instruct each unit as to its duties as prescribed in "U. S. Civil Defense", copies of which have been supplied to each leader.

The members of the Police and Warden Unit have completed the State Police Civil Defense course as prepared by Colonel Caswell, head of the New Hampshire State Police. The members have been exercised in directing and stopping traffic whenever Red Alerts have been in effect.

April 29, 1951 was designated as Webster Civil Defense Day, on which occasion all units were exercised at Civil Defense problems. The operation was well attended and the interest shown and results obtained were very satisfactory.

Inventories of material and equipment required in case

of emergency were taken by each unit and submitted to the State Civil Defense Agency.

Eighteen people passed the First Aid Course sponsored by the Concord Red Cross and 30 women completed the Home Nursing Course on June 28, 1952.

A pot luck supper was held at the Grange Hall on April 4, 1952 at which Civil Defense pictures were shown.

Colonel Robert P. Hamilton, USAF, State Coordinator of the Ground Observer Corps, addressed the members of the Fire Fighting Unit and also showed pictures on two occasions. Our local fire chief has called numerous meetings of the Fire Fighting Unit for training purposes. Even though all Civil Defense employment is on a strictly volunteer basis, it is the opinion of those in charge that the attendance at these meetings is considered satisfactory.

Operation "Sky Watch" was discontinued on November 5, 1952 after being in effect approximately 6 months. In spite of the heroic efforts of the Unit Leader and his team captains to maintain interest, the watch continued to deteriorate to the point where too few people were doing the work for too many people. However, the experience gained by the people who cooperated can be considered as good training for any future emergency.

The local organization has received training and instruction in White telephone network tests, Yellow Alerts, Red Alerts and White Alerts. It is only by constant training that we become perfect, and anything less than perfect could well prove disastrous in an actual emergency.

Your Local Director in company with one or more of his Unit Leaders, has attended Civil Defense meetings in Boscawen, Concord and at the University of New Hampshire.

Numerous leaflets have been distributed to the Webster households, as well as Civil Defense plates, and arm bands.

Emergency windshield stickers are being held pending their need.

The Civil Defense Oath has been administered to many members of the Webster Organization.

The Webster Civil Defense Organization was the first in New Hampshire to report the complete personnel roster of the newly created Mobile Support Unit. Some equipment for this unit is still needed.

On May 13, 1954, Admiral C. A. Brinkmann, State Director of Civil Defense, attended a meeting of the Webster Civil Defense Unit leaders and sub-leaders, at which time he was given a verbal report on Civil Defense activities in Webster. He spoke briefly at the meeting on the urgent necessity for complete understanding and cooperation of the people to the end that Civil Defense will not be found wanting in time of emergency whenever that may come.

The cost to the taxpayers of Webster for the maintenance of Civil Defense in their town is as follows:

The work of the Civil Defense Organization in Webster is hampered by the lack of adequate signaling equipment and unsatisfactory telephone communication service. Some of the latter deficiency has been overcome by WCD Directive #5, copies of which have been furnished to all Kearsarge Exchange subscribers.

It goes without saying that all readers have seen articles in newspapers and magazines decrying the pathetic lack of interest shown by people across our land in the Civil Defense program. Only the individual reader of this report can determine in his own mind whether or not he or she is measuring up to his responsibilities as a citizen of the United States in the same manner as did our forefathers in 1776 and in subsequent years.

My personal opinion is that the necessity of Civil Defense has been determined by people in high places who are in a position to know a lot more about it than I do, and I presume more than a lot of other people.

In bringing to a close my services as the Local Civil Defense Director, I wish to express my appreciation for the assistance and encouragement extended, and at the same time bespeak for my successor an even greater amount of interest and cooperation.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing year.

There have been no teaching changes this year which is fortunate because teachers continue to be scarce. The prospects for the state and nation are not promising. We thought we would reach our peak in school population in 1956 but this past year the nation had its highest birthrate in history. This year may even exceed that of last year. Teachers must be found to take care of this increased population.

The small towns suffer because most of the teacher college graduates are being taken by our large city superintendents as early as January, and they have to compete with superintendents from Massachusetts and Connecticut. The salaries are high and the bright lights of the city look attractive. Each year the graduates demand and get higher salaries. Where they used to have offers to go into rural schools and were delighted for the opportunity, they now have five, six and even more offers to go into large communities. As our experienced teachers see beginning teachers command higher salaries, they look for higher salaries themselves.

Thus, on one hand, we are faced with paying teachers higher salaries and, on the other hand, we are faced with higher taxes on the real estate and personal property of the farm group. How long we can face this without a broad base tax and financial aid to the communities is a problem which sometime must be faced.

The enrollment in Webster shows a slight increase. There are thirty youngsters in the lower grade room and twenty-seven in the upper grade room. Mrs. Anderson has twenty pupils in the first two grades which keep her busy, let alone taking care of four third graders and six fourth graders. Fortunately, it doesn't look as though the next two first grades would be quite as large.

Four youngsters from Webster will graduate from high school in June. They will be replaced by six pupils graduating from the eighth grade.

I wish to thank the teachers and school board for their fine cooperation. It is a pleasure to work with them.

WHITE PINE BLISTER RUST CONTROL

Following is a comprehensive report dated February 17, 1955, received from the State Forestry Commission covering the progress of blister rust eradication in Webster since the conception of the program 36 years ago.

In connection with a recent recommendation by State Forester Messeck that an article be included in the 1955 town warrant to provide funds for White Pine Blister Rust Control, it was believed that a brief review of previous control measures in Webster would prove of interest to you and your Board. Consequently, the following statement was prepared.

White Pine Blister Rust Control, in cooperation with towns, cities and individual pine owners, was first undertaken 36 years ago. During this period the Town of Webster has appropriated funds for this purpose a total of 14 years; the first being in 1925. Previous to this, in 1922, Mr. J. B. Colby cooperated with this department by making available funds for control work upon his lands in Webster.

Appropriations were made by the town in 1926, 1927, with none in 1928. Funds were again voted in 1929, 1930 and 1931. Four years later—(1935) appropriations were resumed, being continued through 1936, 1937 and 1938. Allotments of funds from the Works Progress Administration in 1935, 1936 and 1938 were instrumental in giving additional employment to local labor, and also increasing materially the pine acreage protected. That wild currant and gooseberry bushes—(known botanically as Ribes) were abundant through the pine areas, and their immediate surroundings, was evident since the number destroyed up through 1938 aggregated 445,000.

In 1942, funds were recommended by the State Forester for the purpose of re-examining those areas worked in the earlier years of control. Experience, state-wide, has indicated that regardless of the completeness of Ribes destruction, these plants may re-occur upon some sites, due to soil disturbances by cutting operations, or wind-throw, as in the case of the 1938 hurricane. Such inspections, with town and state funds were conducted in that year, as well as in 1947, 1949 and 1952. A total of over 16,900 bushes were located and destroyed.

The land area of Webster has been determined to be 17,526 acres. Through detailed mapping and scouting, 5,582 acres have been eliminated from control since this acreage did not contain sufficient pine to warrant any expenditure for Ribes eradication. Included in this acreage is some 950 acres more or less, of the Blackwater Dam area. The present blister rust control area amounts to 11,944 acres. A "Control Area" is made up of white pine stands plus protective strips varying from a few hundred feet to not more than 1000 around the pines. This latter distance is the limit of infecting range from Ribes to white pines, under ordinary forest conditions.

Progress in control work has developed to the point where there is now, in Webster, 2,806 acres of the control area, which has been placed on a maintenance basis. This means that the Ribes population has been so reduced that the remaining few do not constitute any menace to the present pine stands, and that no further examination will be necessary for at least 10 years. The blister rust goal in Webster, and throughout the state as well, is to place all pine lands on a maintenance basis as fast as possible. Indicative of successful control on these lands is the fact that infection on the pines has sharply fallen off, as compared with the situation before Ribes removal.

Recent inspections of some of the areas first worked 25 years ago reveal the re-occurrence of Ribes bushes, and the resulting infection on the young white pines which had re-seeded the lands following logging. In the interest of protecting young and thrifty growing pines, these bushes should be destroyed as soon as possible.

It is owing to this situation that the State Forester recommended an appropriation by the town in 1955.
