#### **Town Warrant**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Westmoreland in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

The polls will open at 1:00 P. M.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at seven of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee under the authority of the Municipal Budget Act. This budget may be considered item by item or as a whole but may not be increased more than ten percent, in any item as a whole.
- 4. To hear the reports of Agents and Auditors and take any action relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$861.00 as its fair share of operating costs of Elliot Community Hospital.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be deposited in the present Town History Saving's Account; the principal to be used toward the printing of a Town History and Geneology; the interest to be used for accumulating material for the same; or take any other action relating thereto.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote for Class IV or Class V roads construction, reconstruction or betterment aid, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$969.46, the State to contribute \$6,463.09.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$240.00 for support of the Monadnock Region Association.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control.

- \*10. To see if the Town will permit the Westmoreland Athletic Association, Inc., to play basketball in the Town Hall, in accordance with rules and regulations mutually agreed upon by the Association and the Selectmen of the year 1962 until the next annual meeting.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote for snow removal and sanding on either Class V or Class IV roads, or take any other action relating thereto to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to what is required by law for highways and bridges.
- 13. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jotham Lord Fund.
- \*\* 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to widen the turn at the junction of the so-called Poocham Road with the road leading from the Aldrich Home to the home of Donald Hale.
- \*15. To see if the Town will vote to install an acoustic ceiling in the dining room of the Town Hall to deaden the noise and improve the atmosphere, and modernize the lighting with new fluorescent lights. And to raise and appropriate not more than \$800.00 for same.
- \*\* 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money to open and improve the Old Stage Road, formerly known as the Estey Road, so it may benefit abuting landowners.
- \*17. To see if the Town will vote to reopen the road from the residence of Donald Hale to the residence of Griffith Royea. The road is presently closed subject to gates and bars.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to lease from Paul and Ruth Hatt the tract of land known as the "Hat Land". Said land containing eight acres more or less, and situated on the southerly side of the Glebe Road, and easterly of the Westmoreland Elementary School. This property to be a living memorial and to be used for recreational purposes for the benefit of the townspeople. Said lease to run for a period of five years, at the end of which time the lease may be renewed with the agreement of both parties. Terms of the lease would be an amount equal to, but not exceeding, the property tax on said land, plus fifty dollars each year. Furthermore, it would be a condition of the lease that the Town obtain liability insurance on the land sufficient to hold the landowner blameless in any liability suits, and property damage insurance in the amount of one thousand

dollars. The owners of the land to retain rights of final approval or disapproval of any structures erected or any excavations made, or any trees removed on said land. The Town to further agree that the property would be kept free of litter by means of a once a week maintenance during the period of use when there is no snow on the ground. If the Town agrees to the foregoing, the Selectmen will appoint a three member Recreation Commission to administer the use and development of said land.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for improvements to property leased by the Town for recreational purposes.
- 20. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than \$50.00.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$340.00 to pay the Librarians salary for one year, this salary to be paid by the Town Treasurer; or take any other action relating thereto.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Merton C. Leach and Gladys L. Ploof. The money to be held in trust, the income to be used solely for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Leach-Ploof lot in the South Village Cemetery.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Gladys L. Ploof and Merton C. Leach the sum of \$200.00. The money to be held in trust, the income to be used solely for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Henry Leach cemetery lot in the South Village Cemetry.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Gladys L. Ploof and Merton C. Leach the sum of \$200.00 to be held in trust. The income to be used solely for the perpetual care and upkeep of the George F. Kathan cemetery lot in the South Village Cemetery.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept from the Gertrude N. Makinen Estate the sum of \$200.00 to be held in trust. The income from the trust to be used for the perpetual care of the Makinen lot in the Village Cemetery.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Jessie M. B. Joslin, the income from same to be used for perpetual care and upkeep of the Edward N. Harris lot in North Cemetery (Cole Cemetery).
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Jessie M. B. Joslin, the income from same to

be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Mamie Keith Lund lot in the North Cemetery (Cole Cemetery).

- 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from S. Javadi, J. Pearson and O. Zinn, to be held in trust, the income from which to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Mike Russell lot, No. 15A, in the East Westmoreland Cemetery.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 30. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

#### TOWN MEETING

#### March 11, 1969

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 o'clock in the morning by Mr. Talbot R. Hood, Moderator The warrant was read and Mr. Hood then declared the polls open. It was further stated that the polls would remain open for the duration of the meeting. The warrant was again read at 7:05 o'clock in the evening and the business part of the meeting followed.

Mr. Robert Moore, Jr. moved that Article No. 2 be taken up with Article No. 3. Mr. David Adams moved that Article No. 3 be taken up item by item. Both motions were approved by voice vote.

Under Articles No. 2 and No. 3, the following sums were voted to be raised and appropriated:

Article No. 4. A motion was made that the Town Report be accepted as written. The motion was seconded and approved.

Article No. 5. The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$830.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of Elliot Community Hospital.

Article No. 6. The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be deposited in a savings account, the interest to be used to continue the work on the Town History, the principal to be used toward the printing of the history or, in case of revision of opinion, said fund to be returned to the General Fund of the Town to reduce taxes.

Article No. 7. This article, included at the request of Mr. Roscoe Perry, to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for permanent improvements to the South Village Cemetery was approved.

Article No. 8. It was moved and seconded that the Town close, subject to gates and bars, the road from the Noyce or so-called Bridgeman place to the old Stone cellar hole. After some discussion, including the question of legality of such closing, the motion was defeated.

Articles No. 9, No. 10 and No. 11 were approved by voice vote.

Article No. 12. This article was included in the Warrant by petition of a group of individuals. It was moved by Mrs. Robert Cox that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 to support the services of the Community Mental Health Clinic of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Services Act of New Hampshire. After some discussion, most of which was in the nature of seeking further information with respect to the services of the Community Mental Health Clinic, the motion was passed.

Article No. 13. It was moved by Mr. Wesley Staples that the Town raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,500.000 to purchase a tow behind roller for the use of the Road Agents. After some discussion regarding the necessity and advisability of such a purchase, the motion was defeated.

Article No. 14. The Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to be used for setting and repairing head stones in the cemeteries of Westmoreland.

Article No.15. The Town voted to permit the Westmoreland Athletic Association to continue to play basketball in the Town Hall until next annual meeting.

Article No. 16 and No. 17. These articles were taken up with the budget under Articles No. 2 and No. 3.

Article No. 18. A motion, made by Mrs. Alonzo Hudson, that the income from the Jotham Lord Fund be used for the Town Library, was seconded and passed.

Article No. 19. It was moved and seconded that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the Highway Department. After some discussion, the motion was amended to read "the sum of \$2,500.00" and the motion, as amended, was passed.

Articles No. 20, No. 21, No. 22, and No. 23 were considered together. The various sums of money were accepted for their specific use.

Article No. 24. The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Planning Board consisting of five mem-

bers, one of which is to be a member of the Board of Selectmen.

Article No. 25. This article was passed without discussion.

Article No. 26. Mr. Thomas Barrett moved that the Planning Board, approved under Article No. 24, go over roads that might be subject to gates and bars and make recommendations at the next Town Meeting. The motion was passed.

Mrs. Peter Provencher moved that the Selectmen instruct the Town Clerk to keep the office open to the last legal hour of any filing period for any Town Office. After a short discussion, the motion was passed.

There being no further business, the Moderator declared the polls closed and the meeting adjourned.

# Report of Forest Fire Warden and District Chief

Less fortunate than our northern towns, we had too many fires. Carelessness in burning trash and discarding smoking material and children playing with fire caused most of the fires. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

#### FIRE PERMIT

A fire permit is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be prior to 9:00 a m. and after 5:00 p. m.

#### EXCEPTIONS

Commercial or Industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The Warden can forbid such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds when fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

#### PENALTIES

1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of \$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.

2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum

fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.

3. For failure to totally extinguish a camp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.

4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland, maximum fine is \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

Article 1. To choose all necessary school district officers for the ensuing year.

You are hereby further notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on March 14, 1970, at 2:00 P.M. in the afternoon to act upon the following articles. (Polls will be open from 10:00 A. M. to 6:00 P. M.

Article 2. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Title I, II, III, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.

Article 4. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and use in the name of the district such advantages, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency.

Article 5. To see if the District will vote to establish an Authorized Regional Enrollment Area (A.R.E.A.) School Planning Committee, said committee to consist of three qualified voters of whom at least one shall be a member of the school board, or take any other action relating thereto.

Note: This District is currently in an A.R.E.A. arrangement with Keene for grades 9-12. For planning purposes this District should continue discussions with other Districts 7-8. Approval of this article makes no commitments for this as to the mutual problems of education, particularly grades District except to form a committee that will consider the future, meet with such committees from other districts, and report its findings at a future meeting of this District. Ap-

propriate discussion and planning for the future seems essential with pupil enrollment increases and the evolution of educational change.

Article 6. To see if the District will vote to authorize the employment of a Teacher Consultant for New Hampshire Supervisory Union No. 29 as provided in RSA 186:11 XII and XXIV as amended or take any other action related thereto.

Note: The School Board of New Hampshire Supervisory Union No. 29 (which includes the board members of this district) have voted to reorganize the administrative structure of the Supervisory Union. This reorganization includes the elimination of one Assistant Superintendent of Schools and in place of this position the creation of the position of Consultant. The change is a matter of a reassignment of responsibilities and functions with no change in the actual number of people and with no direct increase in the budget. The item appears in this warrant as dictated by law since official titles and functions will be changing. It is anticipated that the overall reorganization will result in increased efficiency while providing more service to this District, its school board, instructional staff, and students.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents trict.

Robert Moore Jr. explained the budget, item by item. Superintendent Day explained the Monadnock Childrens Center.

The motion was made, seconded and voted that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$160, 275.00 for support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

By a voice vote the motion carried.

Mr. Terry wished to see a show of hands. Yes - 42; No - 4. Motion carried.

Article 7. Robert Cox made appropriate remarks remarks regarding Robert Moore Jr. who has just completed his 12th year on the school board and is not running for re-election. It was moved that a rising vote of thanks be given to Mr. Moore for a job well done. Mr. Cox recommended that it be shown in the minutes of the meeting that the district took action to commend Mr. Moore for his work on the school board.

The motion was made, seconded and voted that the business part of the meeting be adjourned, the polls to remain open until 7 P. M.

At 7 P. M the meeting was declared adjourned.

Moderator — Marcius R. Butterfield received 124 votes and was declared elected.

District Clerk — Dorothy R. Rhodes received 126 votes and was declared elected.

Member of School Board for 3 years — Donald E. Hall received 102 votes and was declared elected.

District Auditors — Robert M. Cox received 117 votes and was declared elected.

Griffith Royea received 103 votes and was declared elected.

The officers were then sworn in.

# ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

To the School Board and the Citizens of Westmoreland:

The proposed budget shows an increase of approximately 8.3 percent. This is considerably less than an average 17 percent proposed budget increase for several districts that are in our area. It will, in the considered judgment of the School Board and administration, provide the funds to maintain your school system at the same level of accomplishment as last year.

Changes in teaching personnel require adjustment with and by other faculty members. They particularly affect the classroom pupils. Programs that are in the process of development or have been developed are familiar to the returning faculty. However, new people need considerable time and help to enable them to adapt to the philosophy, community, and requirements of the school. Faculty changes should be kept at a minimum if at all possible. Teachers salaries that are competitive for the area helps to retain a continuing faculty membership.

As stated in last year's report the major portion of school costs is born by property taxes.

This situation is emphasized this year by a loss of approximately \$10,000 in Foundation Aid income due to the increase in equalized valuation and insufficient funding by the State Legislature. The decision to change equalized valuation amounts is made by the Tax Commission.

Major budget increases occur in salaries, scholar supplies, contracted services, and tuition. The salary increases is a compromise between the request by the teachers and the school board. We should remain competitive in this area. The scholar supplies increase reflects increased cost of materials and the fact that we have used the surplus that was previously available. The major increase for contracted services is for continued membership and support of the Monadnock Children's Center. Originally this Center was funded by Federal Funds. It is now a non-profit organization and must be supported by the school districts it serves if it is to continue. School board members who serve on the board of directors are high in their praise of the services rendered by the Child Center.

The tuition increase is based on the information now available as to the number of pupils who will be eligible to attend Keene High School.

Only minor repairs were done this year including some interior and exterior painting, plus necessary repairs for the furnace. The major piece of equipment purchased was a commercial refrigerator for the school lunch program.

Westmoreland is a member of a successful A.R.E.A. high school program. The 1970 warrant contains an article that gives Westmoreland citizens an opportunity to vote to participate with several other districts in a study of the advantages and disadvantages or having a grade 7-12 A.R.E.A: We recommend that Westmoreland become a member of this study group.

Another article in the warrant gives Westmoreland citizens the opportunity to support the action of the Supervisory Union 29 meeting in voting to have a Supervisory Union Educational Consultant. An organization chart is included in this annual report. The administrators recommend your support of the Supervisory Union action. This is not an additional position, but a realignment of assignments.

Mr. Keach has been substituting on a part time basis for Mr. Cusick who left us on October 10. It is difficult for a change in personnel to continue the programs and policies of an administrator. It always means that there is an additional burden on remaining personnel. There will be an even greater challenge to keep abreast of requirements when Mr. Keach leaves in February.

The people in the Supervisory Union office wish to express their appreciation and thanks to the citizens, school board, and staff for their cooperation and support during the past year. We look forward to working with you in the future in our mutual endeavor to maintain a good educational program.

# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Westmoreland:

The 1969-70 school year opened on September 3, with 169 students enrolled. The enrollment has subsequently dropped to 166.

In my opinion, one of the school's major accomplishments over the past few years is the revision of curriculum materials. New materials are constantly coming on the market; more importantly some of these materials are distinct improvements over what has previously been available. I am happy to say that our teachers have been quite conscientious about choosing, not simply new materials—but those that mean better education in Westmoreland.

Several curriculum areas have undergone revision this year. New science books were purchased for grades 7 & 8. The revision in the mathematics program has been continued for grades 3, 4, and 5; we expect to complete this in grades 6, 7, and 8 for 1970-71. The social studies program has been revised in grades 4-8; grades 1-3 will receive new materials next year. We have updated the literature pro-

gram for grades 7 & 8.

Our library has continued to grow with the acquisition of many new general reading books, and several greatly needed reference materials. As in the past we have greatly

benefited from the generosity and interest of the P.T.A., the very successful "book fair" held in November, and the indispensable services of "mother librarians" being only two examples.

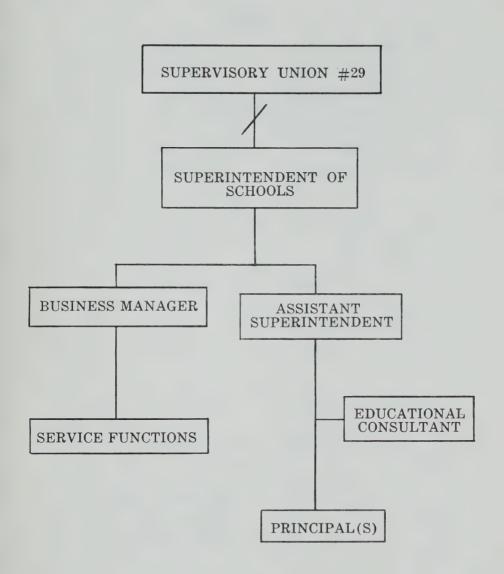
