Chap. 135

Sec. 47. Budget. At a meeting held before January first of each year the supervisory union board shall adopt a budget required for the expenses of the supervisory union for the next fiscal year, which budget may include the salary and expenses of supervisors of health, physical education, music, art and guidance, and any other employees, and expenses necessary for the operation of the supervisory union. The Supervisory union board shall apportion the total amount of the budget among the constituent school districts on the following basis, provided that each district shall be required to pay for only those services in which they share. The basis for the apportionment shall be one-half on the average membership for the previous school year and one-half on the last assessed valuation of the district. Prior to January fifteenth in each year, the board shall certify to the chairman of the school board of each constituent school district the amount so apportioned. Each district within a supervisory union shall raise at the next annual district meeting the sum of money apportioned to it by the supervisory union board for the expenses of services which each district receives in connection with the union office.

The elementary enrollment has almost doubled in the past 10 years. An increase of 93 pupils in such a period is unprecedented. A study of the actual enrollment by grades indicates that with the exception of grade III the enrollments are higher in the lower grades. The census figures indicate that this trend will continue with enrollments of approximately 30 or more pupils for each entering class for several years. This means that as the smaller classes in the upper grades graduate the physical plant may be inadequate to meet the actual enrollments. If such proves to be the case, the wisdom of providing for easy expansion of present facilities will be a boon to the community.

The increased enrollment of course is reflected in school costs. Certain items such as heat and light are not materially increased as long as the enrollment can be housed in the present plant. The same is true of salaries. Charges for the payment of bonds are also directly attributable to increased enrollments. Transportation costs are affected immediately. As the number of pupils increases the need for expanded transportation is apparent. As increased enrollment necessitate a program of expansion of plant the cost to the district for debt service is directly related to increased enrollment.

The number of pupils attending secondary school has been relatively stable compared to elementary enrollments. The district's financial responsibility has increased constantly. The state average cost has practically tripled in the past decade. This average cost is the district's liability. Increased enrollments and increased costs have created a serious situation in local communities throughout the state.

Personnel

The current year was one in which there was a turnover of half of the teaching staff.

Miss O'Leary, Miss Gomo, and Miss Hrepatsos all resigned to accept positions elsewhere. In a period when elementary teachers are in short supply the district was fortunate to secure teachers of experience to fill the vacancies. Geographic location has been a decided asset to the schools in this critical situation.

Mrs. Goddard, who had been teaching in Raymond, replaced Miss Hrepatsos. Her experience in the field of music helped considerably in that area in addition to her class room work.

Mrs. Rosenfeld was hired as a replacement for Miss Gomo and Mrs. Doukas replaced Miss O'Leary. Both are teachers of experience with understanding of children and a knowledge of the class room problems. The staff has worked conscientiously to give the boys and girls all the individual attention necessary to permit each pupil to make the greatest possible progress. It seems as though despite the number of changes that youngsters are making better progress than they were.

With increasing enrollments on a state and national basis the district is indeed fortunate to be able to secure the services of teachers of high caliber. The situation will not improve until such time as the supply of trained personnel more nearly equals the demand for teachers. It will be reflected in higher salaries on a national, state, and local level until the supply of teachers is more adequate.

Finances

The school board's budget shows an increase of \$2,675.45. The increases are due primarily to increased enrollments.

The largest items of increase high school tuition, transportation, and teachers salaries, are all directly or indirectly influenced by enrollment. The decrease in debt service makes the total increase in the school board's budget the above figure. Due to an increase in the number of elementary tuition pupils the cash balance and income are increased sufficiently to result in a decreased tax levy.

Despite this situation it is apparent that one of the major issues facing the next session of the General Court should be financial support of education. Local real property has not increased in value at the same rate as the increased cost of education. Committees on the edge of urban centers particularly have had an increase in population out of proportion to the increase in real property value. In this situation the need for increased state aid is important.

I am appreciative of the opportunity to serve the children of a district where cooperation of all is the usual attitude in connection with the progress of pupils.
