TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, as recommended by the Budget.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes paid two weeks after approval of tax rate by the State Tax Commission.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy liability insurance on town labor and pay same out of the Highway Department.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$4,000.00 from Timber Tax Yield Fund to put into a trust fund for the purpose of matching State Funds to rebuild the bridge on South Barnstead Road.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 to add to the trust fund for a grader.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to approve the payment to Supervisors Twenty (\$20) dollars per election Spring, Primary and Fall.
- 9. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise Police from \$225.00 to \$300.00 per year.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a Road Grader and use grader fund in payment of same.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from Timber Tax fund the sum of \$2,800.00 and transfer the same to School District in part payment of appropriations.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

It has been some time since a report was made on the activities at the Library. The building itself has been thoroughly cleaned and repainted inside and out. The library books were removed and the shelves all revarnished. The books were cleaned and sorted out and hundreds were put down in the basement as being too old and out of date to be of demand. The present collection is far from up to date, but we have made a little room for newer books received. Fifty seven (57) new books have been purchased this year, and many others have been donated for which the trustees are quite grateful.

Mrs. Chloe Woods has been librarian for three years and with the cooperation of the teachers at the Center school, library hours have been on a school day, namely Thursday from 2 until 4 p.m. The pupils come down during the school hours, and many hundreds of books have been introduced to the older children in this way

The State Bookmobile comes five times a year, and

keeps us up to date with the newer fiction.

An oil burner was installed in 1954 and the building is now well heated, and is used for many events. Two mornings a week a kindergarten is conducted for the preschool children in town. Many committees use the building. The selectmen share in the operating expenses and it is very satisfactory all around.

Mr. Almon Woods has been our janitor and handy man and has been very faithful in the care of the

lawns and with the winter work.

We wish something could be done to the Memorial to the Veterans on the library lawn. We have had it repainted and the eagle remade, but it is in such bad need of repair inside, it certainly is not much of a memorial to the lives and sacrifices the boys gave for their country.

In closing, we would like to urge the people of Barnstead, especially the newer residents, to come and visit the library. We are sure you will be one of our regular

borrowers.

Be a Good Citizen — Cooperate

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 percent of the forest fires occurring in the state of New Hampshire in 1955 — 235 fires out a total of 463 originating from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 percent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 percent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local wardens issued 3,864 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The record shows only 2 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things — while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accomodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigar-

ette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated. Will YOU do YOUR share to bring this about?

REMEMBER

- 1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.
 - 2. Make certain they are dead before leaving them.
- 3. Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.

(B) REPORT FROM YOUR SUPERINTENDENT

NEW SCHOOL PLANS

The people of Barnstead have made some wise decisions. A capital reserve account has been established. The tax appropriation of \$4957 and \$800, received from the sale of the South School, have been deposited with the Trustees of Trust Funds. The school board is requesting another appropriation of \$5000 to increase this amount.

A meeting was called by the school board, which was attended by representatives from all sections of Barnstead. A majority of these people agreed that we should continue to accumulate funds for the new school.

Articles will appear in the March 1956 warrant so that a site committee can be chosen and money appropriated from the reserve fund for the purchase of any

lot selected.

We are watching closely the progress of the Maximlite type of construction in this part of the country. This type of school has proved very popular in the South and Midwest. We plan to visit one under construction at Lisbon Falls, Maine. No decisions can be made, of course, without authority from the District. However, we consider a new six-room school with a large activities room, the minimum desirable for present and future elementary, enrollments.

There is a possibility of state funds for building purposes, up to 20 percent of the annual bonded indebtedness. Also prospect for federal funds for poorer com-

munities seems brighter.

Those of us who recognize the inadequacies of the present buildings and the disadvantages of crowded classrooms must be patient two or three years longer. However, we must not wait so long that the price advances will use up our savings, or that the children will be seriously handicapped.

INSTRUCTION

All our teachers have completed professional courses this year. An extension course in Art Instruction was held weekly at Alton from October to January 18. Your teachers spent long hours in attendance and preparation.

Mr. Sloat is completing work for his Master's degree from the University of New Hampshire. He attended at Durham last summer. He also participated in a two week course at Laconia. During this fall and winter he has completed a three semester hour program in Mental Hygiene.

Last summer, our new teacher, Mrs. Hester Pickard, completed required work at the University of N. H.

We are so fortunate in having experienced teachers. They are faced with many problems in the crowded, double-graded situations that teachers in single grades with smaller numbers do not have. They work hard to help your boys and girls. Your cooperation, understanding and appreciation, together with a reasonable increase in salaries, seem very much in order.

TRANSPORTATION

The School District is under a three-year contract with Mr. Henry Knirsch for the transportation of our children. The system is working splendidly. Safe and comfortable facilities are provided. Because of the geography of Barnstead, the long school day for some children is unavoidable.

CONDITION OF BUILDINGS

Minor repairs were made last summer on the two buildings. Some interior painting makes the rooms more cheerful. The buildings are in good condition.

Our part-time janitors clean the rooms and toilets daily. Desks are so crowded together in some rooms that cleaning is difficult. Probably toilet facilities are inadequate for the large number of pupils. Oil heat in both schools maintains comfortable temperature.

We feel that our buildings should be kept in safe, healthful and efficient condition. However, in view of the now building proposals, no large expenditure for desirable improvements seems justified now.

CONCLUSION

As we approach the time when big decisions must be made, we should base our conclusions more on the facts than on sentiment. We need vision to make reasonably certain that decisions made now will provide adequately for educational opportunities five, ten or twenty years hence. As we study possible sites, educational offering and types of buildings, we must secure information and take advantage of expert advice. The welfare of your community may be closely related to the quality of thinking we do together in planning our educational program for the future.

PART V. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Townspeople, School Board and Superintendent of Schools of Barnstead:

The following is my fifth annual report of the school health work of Barnstead.

The year 1955 started out with an epidemic of the measles. Serious complications in this connection were two cases of pneumonia.

In April, the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association sponsored a TB patch test which is done every other year to detect tuberculosis in our community. Fortunately there is no evidence of TB.

Our humble gratitude goes to Dr. Jonas Salk for his discovery of the Salk Polio Vaccine. In May 1955, the State Health Department and "The March of Dimes" sponsored a polio vaccination program for the children in grades 1—4. I am sure we all are familiar with all the confusion from headlines, radio and TV that the error of the Cutter Laboratory caused. Consequently, it became a very hard decision to make for the parents. Some parents withdrew their permission for vaccination and the number of eligible children declined considerably. However, the vaccine is now guaranteed safe. New Hampshire will give free vaccine to all children from age 1 to 15 and pregnant women through chincs or private physicians. Private physicians will charge the regular office fee.

Physical exams are done each spring by Dr. Quinn of Farmington. The general health of the children is good.

Our major health problem is defective teeth. I am sure that this problem could be eliminated if we as parents would take our youngsters to the dentist regularly for a check-up. Dental bills will be considerably reduced if the children are checked semi annually. Adequate milk and fruit in the daily diet are equally important.

Barnstead was fortunate to have the Dental Hygiene and Sodium Flouride service during the spring of 1955, sponsored by the New Hampshire Department of

Health and Bureau of Dental Services. Children of grades 1—6 were included in the program. Eighty-four children were treated. Follow-up work indicated: 52 pupils were under dental supervision by parents; 14 were under dental supervision only when community dental program is operating; 12 in grades 1—6 and 4 in grades 7—8.

We had \$100 for our community dental program from local Red Cross and matching federal funds. Dr. Carpenter of Pittsfield completed dental work for 16 children for that amount. The more work he has to do on each child, the fewer children get in on the program. Dr. Carpenter has limited time for dental clinics. The best solutions is for each family to make regular dental appointments.

The routine vision and hearing testing have been done and a follow-up has been made of defects. Weight and height have been checked. Individual inspections, health education and home visits have also been done.

During the summer and autumn of this school year, we had a few cases of whooping cough. The attendance has been good until Christmas time, when there were a number of cases of intestinal flu, followed by respiratory virus infection and cough. In this connection, I wish to mention rheumatic fever, which is often usherin by a cold or sore throat. Usually this so-called "respiratory infection" precedes rheumatic fever by from one to three weeks. The prevention of rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease deserves the interest and support of every community.

I sincerely hope that Barnstead will have a new school in the near future. The Parade School is over-crowded. The toilet facilities are inadequate. The P.T.A. has raised money for playground equipment for the youngsters. However, the school does not own enough land around the school to put it in use.

The youngsters in our town lack adequate space in their classrooms, a hot luuch program and playground equipment. Other towns in the state are going ahead with construction of better schools in their communi-

In closing, I wish to mention Mr. Henry Knirsch and Mr. Wilbur Kidder, our bus drivers, who safely bring the children to and from school. A great responties.

sibility is in their hands. To the Parade Fire Department and the Library Trustees, a big thank you for lending us their facilities for our clinics. And to each and everyone who is helping to bring physical and mental growth to the children and youth of this town, thank you. Without your cooperation, a school health program would not be possible. May we all work together to help our children.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Barnstead, New Hampshire, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on Friday, the 16th day of March, 1956, at eight o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers, heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, and the state building aid, together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000.00 to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the new elementary school.
- 10. To see if the school district will vote to except any gifts, or state or federal grants, and the transfer of \$2,800.00 timber tax lunds to be put in the school district reserve fund.
- 11. To see what action the district will take in the selection of a suitable site for a new elementary school.

12. To see if the school district will authorize the acquisition of any real property for the location of the new elementary school; and to determine what sum of money the district will appropriate from the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of the site selected for the new elementary school and to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to pay over the sum voted to the school board, as agents of the school district, for the purpose of such purchase.
