TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bath qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bath on Tuesday March 12th 1940, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, one or more Highway Agents, a Cemetery Agent, and all other necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of officers and agents heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the town officers' salaries and expenses, for repairs, maintenance and construction of highways and bridges, for the support of the Town Library, for Old Age Assistance and the support of the Town Poor, for the observance of Memorial Day and Old Home Day, and for all necessary town charges and expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class 2 road on the Pettyboro Road, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1335.00, or to accept State Aid for the construction of Class 5 roads, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$616.01.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$100., based on 1-100th of 1% of assessed valuation, for the town's share of cooperative participation in the White Mountains Region Association.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for a dental clinic in the schools of the town.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to acquire by purchase or condemnation, land for an addition to the Swiftwater Cemetery, to raise and appropriate money for that purpose, and pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 2% on 1940 property taxes paid in full on or before July 3rd 1940.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to dispense with the delivery of inventory blanks until April first.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired through tax collector's deed.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Since the last annual school meeting certain repairs and improvements have been made in the school. The hallway has been painted, some new adjustable desks installed in the primary room and the pipe bringing water to the building put in order. It is a decided advantage to have enough pressure to make the drinking fountain entirely sanitary. It is also a great convenience and matter of safety to have running water upstairs in the laboratory. A dental clinic caring for the children of both the Union and Town districts was held. According to a ruling of the State Board schools may furnish dental inspection but not treatment. Thanks to the generosity of the citizens money for necessary treatments was raised at the regular town meeting. We are hoping for a like appropriation this spring in order that this work may be continued.

There are several repairs and additions to the equipment which we should like to recommend. There is still need of more adjustable desks in the primary room, a modern duplicator, and two pump type fire extinguishers for the whole building. The steps going down over the bank are so worn out they should be replaced by new ones. The budget as planned will, we think, take care of all these repairs. It is a help in meeting the elementary school expenses to receive state aid once more.

The best results are obtained when there is close cooperation between the school and the home. To foster this cooperation parents are, therefore, cordially invited to visit the school and offer such suggestions as they feel may make the work more effective.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

Mr. Edward A. Janes, Superintendent of Schools Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my second annual report as headmaster of Bath High School.

The halfway mark in the present school year is just passed. We are enjoying a most successful year even though the duties of students and school officials alike are as pressing as ever.

The attendance record to date has been very good. The gradual increase in per cent of attendance of the previous year has not been realized because of frequent illness and periods of irregular attendance. The per cent of attendance for the second four-week period was 97.27 and at no time has it fallen below 93.00.

The effort to raise the academic standard of our school has produced very favorable results. It is not intended that all pupils shall meet on a common plateau of scholastic ability, for variance in this ability must ever exist and be recognized. However, by changing the grading scale to one of a higher level, each pupil may work to raise his or her index of achievement. Thus the upward extension of our standard is one of proportions.

The athletic program for the fall and winter terms consisted of touch football and basketball, respectively. The school did not enter the Ammonoosuc Valley Basketball League this winter because of circumstances beyond its influence and control. Nevertheless, the season has proved a successful one in many ways.

The single session school day is continued again this year and holds to all the advantages previously recognized.

The high school students chose to manage the affairs of the school through the Student Council. This is a very direct and efficient method of carrying on the business and extra-curricula activities in which the students and school officials have joint interest. The training in parliamentary procedure and the delegation of responsibility to members of the student body by its own members are probably the highest of esthetic values derived from such student participation.

The National Youth Administration program offers an opportunity for students who so desire to perform tasks pertaining to building and ground maintenance, clerical work, athletic activities, etc., and receive reimbursement at a prescribed rate. The quota for each school in the state is limited and we are fortunate in having two students assigned to N. Y. A. work. The program is announced at the beginning of the school year, then securing the work is left entirely to the students. Any student is eligible for work providing he or she satisfies the demands and prerequisites established by the National Youth Administration and school authorities.

Those of us who make the school our place of work and study are appreciative of the repairs, new equip-

ment, and supplies that have been made or purchased during the year. The better the tools with which we work, the better the finished product.

I take this opportunity to express my thanks and appreciation to the townspeople of Bath, to fellow teachers, to school officials, and to the students who help us attain the standards and goals of our public educational program.

I am glad to report that through the enterprise of the teacher and pupils of the Pettyboro school and the kindness of the community enough money has been raised to make possible the installation of some swings. I know these will be a source of pleasure to the children and help in keeping them off the road.

It may not be amiss in this report to mention some of the objectives toward which the schools are striving. The most obvious of these aims is the imparting of such knowledge as seems needed for participation in modern day activities. In addition to this the cultivating of certain habits and attitudes is vitally important. To be successful in school and in later life a child must learn to be prompt, industrious, orderly, responsible, self-reliant and honest. He must learn to cooperate and get along with his mates. To attain these objectives the schools need the help of the homes. The physical well-being of the children depends largely upon the parents. As we all know not all children learn with equal readiness. Encouragement by parents to slower learners to put a little more effort and a little more time upon their work will often cause these children to succeed in the long run. Parents are cordially invited to visit the schools and offer any suggestions which will make their work more effective.
