Proceedings of the County Convention.

CONCORD, N. H., Jan. 13, 1897.

The representatives of the various towns of the county met in convention, as required by law, and organized as follows: Chairman, Stephen S. Jewett; secretary, Samuel H. Martin.

Meeting then adjourned until the call of chairman.

LACONIA, N. H., Feb. 5, 1897.

Convention met at Court House, S. S. Jewett in chair.

Commissioner Sanders recommended an appropriation of \$30,000 for 1897, and the same amount for 1898.

Commissioners Smith and Parsons recommended an appropriation of \$23,000 for 1897, and the same amount for 1898.

On motion of Clough of Alton, the Convention voted unanimously that the County Commissioners be authorized and directed to construct a suitable brick boiler-house, separate and apart from the other buildings, and that the boilers be there removed and connected with the other buildings, and that a sum not exceeding fifteen hundred dollars be appropriated for the same.

On motion of Martin of Laconia, voted to defer action on other appropriations to some subsequent meeting of the convention.

Meeting then adjourned until call of chairman.

CONCORD, N. H., Feb. 24, 1897.

Convention met at State House and Mr. Smith of Meredith was chosen Chairman, pro tem.

On motion of Tilton of Laconia, the convention voted that the county taxes for the year 1897 shall be \$25,000 and for the year 1898 shall be \$27,500.

On motion of McGloughlin of Laconia, Elmer S. Tilton and David B. Story, both of Laconia, were appointed County Auditors.

On motion of Gerald of Belmont, a committee of two were appointed to act in conjunction with the chairman of the County Commissioners to investigate the necessity of changing the location of the boilers at the County Farm and ascertain the probable cost thereof and report to the Convention at a future meeting.

Meeting then adjourned until the call of chairman.

Delegation met on call of Chairman S. S. Jewett.

Commissioner Sanders made report showing plans and specifications of boiler-house, re-piping, etc.

Mr. Story of Laconia moved that the sum of one thousand dollars be added to the previous appropriation for boiler-house, making a total appropriation of twenty-five hundred dollars for said purpose. Passed unanimously.

Voted that a committee of three be appointed to act in conjunction with the commissioners. Chairman appointed Story, Plummer and McGloughlin.

Moved by Gerald of Belmont, that the previous vote on ap-

propriations be re-considered, lost as question of quorum was raised.

Meeting adjourned to Mar. 18, 1897.

Convention met, S. S. Jewett in chair.

On motion of Story of Laconia, voted that the sum of one thousand dollars be added to the previous appropriation for county taxes for the year 1897, and that the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars be added to the previous appropriation for the year 1898.

On motion of Smith of Meredith, the Convention voted to authorize the County Commissioners to make with Alfred W. Abbott a permanent agreement for the maintenance of a common driveway between his property and the Court House, as the same has now been constructed and concreted under a temporary agreement; and also to convey to him the small piece of the county's land on his side of the driveway and accept from him a conveyance of the small piece of his land on the court house side of the driveway.

Commissioners' Report.

In compliance with the laws of the state the annual report of the commissioners is herewith submitted, together with the reports of the superintendent of the county farm, treasurer, clerk of the Supreme court, solicitor, sheriff, jailer, physician and auditors.

The appropriation for the current year was \$26,000—\$10,500 less than the previous year. The extra appropriation of \$2,500 for the erection of a new boiler house and removal of boilers is still in the treasury, as your commissioners have been unable to let the contract for doing the work within the limits of this amount, the lowest estimate being \$4,950.

The amount paid out by the commissioners for the support of external poor for the year ending Dec. 31, 1897, was \$14,593.48, an increase over 1896 of \$2,809.75. This increase was caused partly by a change in the public statutes by the last legislature, bringing the time of settlement up to within ten-years of date of application, throwing nearly all paupers supported by the city and towns onto the county; and the amount paid the city of Laconia during the winter months was excessive, owing largely to the shutting down of the car shops and many of the mills. The first six months there was paid out in Laconia \$4,738.30, and the last six months \$3,161.59, making the whole amount for the city of Laconia \$7,899.89—about the same as all the other towns combined. Most of this aid has been rendered to people with large families, that were out of work.

The county farm has been continued under the efficient management of the superintendent and matron, Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Thyng. We have made a much-needed addition to the barn, building fifty feet onto the north end, with basement for piggery, thus affording ample room for all stock and plenty of room for storage. A silo has been built, the old part of the barn reshingled and the barn and carriage house painted—all at an expense of \$1,260.99. You now have as good, if not the best, barn in Belknap county.

In taking the annual inventory your commissioners have conformed to the present market value, and, by so doing, have reduced the valuation of the personal property about \$1,000, but we cannot see any sense in carrying articles at a high valuation simply to make the books look well. We believe that every taxpayer should know, as nearly as possible, what the county has. We also present, in the superintendent's report, an itemized list, with prices, of articles that make up this inventory.

We also give you a statement of the different items of expense to the county for the year, as follows:

In addition to the above criminal prosecutions, complaint having been made to me of the open violation of the liquor laws of the state in the city of Laconia and town of Tilton, I at once instituted prosecutions in my own name as solicitor, before the sitting of the grand jury for September, and in one or two cases I felt called upon to accompany the officers in Sunday raids. As a result of these complaints five disreputable places have been closed, and I have collected for the use of the county, in fines before magistrates, for violation of the liquor laws, the sum of \$180.50.

In the matter of the claim of the New Hampshire Insane Asylum for the support of an insane person transferred from the prison to the asylum, the Supreme court has decided in favor of the county.

Auditors' Report.

To the Citizens of Belknap County :

The legislature of 1897 enacted a law that "the supreme court on or before the first day of April annually . . . shall appoint two auditors . . . who shall once in three months audit the accounts of the county commissioners, superintendent of the county farm, and county treasurer in accordance with the provisions of Chap. 24, of the Public Statutes," and "the auditors shall also audit . . . the bills of the county commissioners for services and expenses and report their findings to the court." The law also provides that the audit may be semi-annually or annual at the discretion of the court.

In accordance with this law the supreme court appointed the undersigned auditors for Belknap county and directed them to audit semi-annually.

We have performed the duties assigned to us and submit to the consideration of the taxpayers of the county the reports which we have made to the supreme court.

To the Supreme Court :

The undersigned, auditors appointed by the supreme court for the County of Belknap, have attended to the duties of their appointment, and submit the following report :

We have examined the several accounts of the county commissioners, for services and expenses from April 1 to July 1, 1897, the court having already examined, allowed and paid

the account of the commissioners from January 1 to April 1, and are of the opinion that the sums charged for services are for time actually spent in the business of the county, and that the sums charged for expenses are reasonable. A considerable part of the charges for services and expenses are incurred in attending to county business in places other than at their office in the court house and county farm, and it is impossible for the auditors or any one else to verify the charges, but on an examination of the bills, however, the auditors are satisfied that they are as small as could reasonably be expected.

We have also examined the accounts of the treasurer and find that he had on hand January 1, 1897, \$17,862.41, and has received from various sources the sum of \$1,015.64, making the total receipts \$18,878 03, and has paid out on orders from the county commissioners \$14,364.87, and on orders from the supreme court \$1,460.46, and interest on court house and re-funding bonds \$1,000, making in all the sum of \$16,825.33, leaving in his hands a balance of \$3,052.72 on July 1. We find the treasurer's books neat and in good order, the accounts well kept, and proper vouchers for all sums paid out. We have also compared the orders paid by the treasurer with the record of orders drawn by the county commissioners, and find that they agree, and that the treasurer has paid all orders drawn by them.

We have also examined the accounts of the superintendent of the county farm and find that he has received from the county treasurer and other sources the sum of \$4,584.88, and has paid out \$4,306.23, leaving a balance in his hands July 1 of \$278.65, and we certify that the accounts are correct and well vouched, and that the sums charged therein for articles purchased are according to the market value, and, in our opinion, such articles have been used for the benefit of the county.

We have also examined the books of the county commis-

sioners, and find that the commissioners have drawn orders on the treasurer aggregating \$14,364.87, of which \$7,761.10 was for the support of poor off the farm, divided among towns as follows :

From a reference to the above it will be seen that the county paid for support of external poor in the city of Laconia the sum of \$4,826.90 for six months. In this connection it might be worth while for the commissioners to consider whether it would not be cheaper and better for them to buy goods and

provisions at wholesale with which to supply the needs of the county farm, and furnish from that stock as much of the goods and provisions to those off the farm in need of such assistance as could be delivered cheaply and economically, than to give the trade to private individuals, many of whom are overseers of the poor and supply the needy from their own stores, with the county as a sure paymaster each month.

The auditors are of the opinion, and would recommend, that the commissioners should purchase all supplies for the county, at the farm or elsewhere, and that the commissioners furnish such supplies, as far as practicable, to the poor off the farm.

In their methods of keeping accounts and performing the office business the commissioners have driven in the same path as their predecessors, and as each successive board has followed the same path there has not been much improvement. The auditors are satisfied that all the orders drawn by the commissioners were drawn in good faith to the parties named in the orders, and they furnish the auditors with what purports to be receipts or receipted bills for the amount of each order drawn. The bills for the most part were not itemized, and very indefinite, many bills being like the following: "Flour, .50; tea, .13; sugar, .18; bytter, .50; \$1.31." Neither the auditors or any one else can tell whether the prices charged are market prices or not, and we are of the opinion that the commissioners ought to refuse to pay all such bills until properly made out.

The auditors also find a great many receipts for a certain sum of money, but without any definite statement as to what the money is for; and also find a great many receipts signed by one of the commissioners instead of the party to whom the order is drawn. The receipts in all cases should be signed by the parties to whom the order is drawn.

We find that the overseers of the poor of the various towns

furnish assistance and authorize others to do so, and each month gather up the bills unreceipted, and bring them to the county commissioners for payment, giving to the commissioners their receipts for the total of all bills. We think the practice should cease, and that the overseer should pay all bills and bring them in receipted. In this connection we find one bill where the overseer of the poor has given credit on the bill for money paid him on a previous bill for the aid of different people from those mentioned in the bill, and credited because it was not paid to the first applicant for aid by reason of their having received a pension.

Certainly if the commissioners had insisted that all overseers of the poor should pay all bills for supplies furnished before the commissioners would draw their order to the overseer for the same, no such unusual business transaction would have occurred. The taxpayers must remember that the overseers of the poor are not county officers, and that the commissioners have no authority over them.

Certainly no prudent business man would think of paying bills for supplies sold him unless the quantity was given in the bill so he could compare the amount delivered with the amount charged for. We think all parties furnishing any supplies for the county or county charges, should be required to comply with ordinary business methods and that the commissioners should refuse to pay any bills unless properly made out.

From an examination of the vouchers the auditors find that the sum of \$615.97 has been paid for rent for various persons between Jan. 1 and July 1. We think no bills for rent should be paid unless the commissioners have first investigated the case and directed the hiring of the tenement.

The commissioners have filed with the auditors a sworn statement, which is hereunto appended, of all bills outstanding July 1, the amount of which is very small.

The auditors would recommend that the law be so changed that all county paupers, whether on or off the farm, should be under the sole control of the county commissioners, instead of the overseers of the poor, as they now are.

To the Supreme Court:

We submit herewith our second semi-annual report of the audit of the several accounts as required by law.

We have examined the several accounts of the county commissioners for services and expenses from July 1, 1897, to January 1, 1898, and are of the opinion that the sums charged for services are for time actually spent in the business of the county and that the sums charged for expenses are reasonable.

We have also examined the accounts of the treasurer, from which it appears that he had on hand July 1, 1897, \$2,052.72, and that his receipts from taxes and other sources have been \$28,489.14, making the total amount of cash \$30,541.86. It also appears that he has paid out orders issued by the county commissioners, \$14,709.80. On orders issued by the court, \$2,843.29, and coupons of the court house and refunding bonds \$990.00, making the total payments \$18,543.09, which leaves a balance in his hands Jan. 1, 1898, of \$11,998.77. The treasurer produced proper vouchers for all payments made by him. We have also compared the orders paid by the treasurer with the records of orders drawn by the county commissioners and find that they agree, and that the treasurer has paid all orders drawn by them.

We have also examined the accounts of the superintendent of the county farm and find that his total receipts from the county treasurer and other sources, including the cash on hand July 1, of \$278.65, has been \$5,056.57, and that he has paid \$3,930.66, leaving a balance of cash in his hands Jan. 1, 1898, of \$1,125.91, and we certify that the accounts are correct and well vouched and that the sums charged therein for articles purchased are according to the market value and in our opinion such articles have been used for the benefit of the county.

In our July report we recommended that the commissioners should purchase all supplies for the county at the farm or elsewhere. We see no reason at this time for changing our recommendation and have been unable to find in the statute any law giving the commissioners the right to delegate to the superintendent the authority to handle any of the county's money.

We have also examined the books of the county commissioners and find that they have drawn orders on the treasurer amounting to \$14,709.80, of which \$6,832.38 was for the support of the poor off the farm, divided among towns as follows :

The commissioners exhibited vouchers for all orders drawn by them corresponding in amount to each order.

We would renew our suggestion "that the commissioners should refuse to pay any bills unless properly made out" and that they should require a receipt signed by the party to whom the money is paid, rather than to have a receipt signed by one of the commissioners for that party.

The auditors find an improvement in the bills over the voucher of the first six months. They are aware that it would be impracticable to change in one month or even a longer time, from the very loose methods which the overseers of the poor and others have had in making up their bills and statements to a method that would be sanctioned by a business man, and think that perhaps improvement has been made as fast as could be expected.

The auditors would call attention to the recommendations in their report of last July as stating the situation as it appears to them, to which they do not wish to add anything. They can only say that which appeared wrong to them then, in so far as it has not been corrected, appears wrong to them now, and that there should be no relaxation of the requirements neces-

sary to a thorough business-like administration of the county affairs.

The commissioners have filed with the auditors a sworn statement, which is hereunto appended, of all bills outstanding January 1, 1898, the amount of which is \$319.99.
