REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

The past year has been noted for its epidemics in Bristol. There has been more typhoid fever, scarlet fever and diphtheria than for several years. The direct cause of this is unknown, but a direct remedy, at least in part, would be for the doctors to report all such cases to the Board of Health as the law requires them to do. The board have been severely criticised the past year for not attending to several cases, which were never reported to them and they only knew of them by general talk on the street.

The sewerage has been improved and completed as far as the junction of Lake and Pleasant streets, but all our sewers will soon be worse than open drains to the health of the village. Altho there is an excellent water system in every street, and the sewers need flushing at least twice a month in hot weather, we are not allowed to use any water for the purpose at any reasonable figure, and the town has no right to the water whatever. This in itself is a great drawback to the duties of the board.

SCHOOL REPORT

UNION DISTRICT No. 2

The schools have made the anticipated progress during the past year. At the close of the fall term it was feared that we might not be warranted in opening the schools on the first Monday in January, as prevailing sickness had greatly reduced the attendance in the lower grades and it seemed that an epidemic was impending. Fortunately, however, no new cases of sickness developed in the ranks of the pupils during the vacation of four weeks and the schools opened with good attendance at the time appointed.

In the course of the summer months some greatly needed repairs were made upon the school building. The ceilings were whitened and the walls were kalsomined. New desks were procured for the Grammar school and those which had been in use were transferred to another room for which they were better suited. The desks in the High school are grimed with long years of service and bear many an indented name and device of those who long ago took up the burden and dignity of citizenship. The question of replacing these old desks with new was mooted by the Board, but it hardly seemed advisable to risk further expenditure during the year.

The cases of truancy have been few, and in general excellent order has been maintained. We have good

reason to gratulate ourselves upon the efficiency of the teachers. An infraction of good order has obtained in which the parents are evidently in collusion with the children:—a number of pupils have repeatedly presented themselves at the opening of school, remaining a few minutes in order to be marked “present.” and then making excuse to be absent all the remainder of the half-day. Such indulgence is under the disapproval of the State officials and is not to be granted in the future.

The report of last year closed with a postscript to the effect that Miss Maynard had been compelled to withdraw from her duties as teacher on account of serious illness. She hoped to resume her work at the beginning of the ensuing school year. She died in May deeply regretted. She was a conscientious and valuable teacher to whom her pupils were greatly attached.
