TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chester, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs. _

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday the eighth day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for salary of Librarian, and to defray the running expenses of the Public Library.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the decoration of Soldiers' graves.

6. To see if the Town will vote to repair the State

Highway and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

7. To see if the Town will vote to build the State Highway from Mrs. John W. Noyes' to the Brick School House.

8. To see if the Town will vote to rent 20 or more hydrants for fire purposes, provided a Water Company is organized for the purpose of bringing water into Chester Village for fire and other purposes, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money towards building a suitable fence around the Monument Common.

10. To see if the Town will accept the Trust Fund left by James P. Brown, M. D., of \$5000.00, the interest to be used for High School instruction in Chester.

11. To see what action the Town will take regarding the care of, and attendance with the Hearse.

12. To see if the Town will vote to put the Cage in the basement of the Stevens Hall.

13. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Piano for the Stevens Hall and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a sidewalk on the highway leading from the Town!Hall to Shackford's corner.

15. To see if the Town will vote to choose one or three Road Agents.

16. To choose Agents or Committees in relation to any article embraced in this Warrant.

SCHOOL REPORT.

Time has again brought us to the end of another school year, and following the usual custom, we submit to the citizens of the Town of Chester the following report:

The average session for the year has been a little over thirty weeks schooling in all. Five of the schools have had thirty-two weeks. Unfortunately on account of sickness of the teacher, the school in No. 7 district, "Walnut Hill," has lost three weeks, which we are in hopes will be made up this coming year. The School Board think they have been very fortunate in securing a good corps of teachers the past year. We believe that there is a fundamental truth in the declaration that it makes very little difference what you study, but that it is in the highest degree important with whom you study. As that distinguished teacher Phillps Brooks once said, "There flows from the living teacher a power which no text-book can compass or contain. Text-books supply information and discipline; teachers impart the life giving inspiration and impulse." The value of the well-trained teacher, alive to the best interests of his, or her school work, faithful and efficient in the performance of their duties, cannot be over-estimated. Under the old system education was largely a pouring-in process. This is gradually being superseded by a new conception, that life is more of an unfolding from within in response to influences from without. In much of the work still carried on, however, the trend is along lines of imitation. This has led to a narrowing of the individual, and kills the creative instinct, so that it is the exceptional man or woman who, at maturity, is not hopelessly bound by the narrow-minded shackles of convention.

Creative work on the other hand transforms the individual. Through it, alone, one grows till he or she has gained a personality that makes them different from others, more original.

Our Chester teachers are conscientious, faithful and efficient. Few changes have occurred in the corps the past year. During the summer vacation, Miss Carrie A. Under hill, of the Brick School, No. 3—one of our own town girls, and a very successful teacher for a number of years, resigned to enter into a matrimonial alliance, and Miss Sylvia Dinsmoor of Derry was appointed to fill her place.

Miss L. Evelyn Carter of Melrose, Mass., having taught the No. 1 "Grammar School" with very good success nearly a year, sent in her resignation in August, which necessitated another search, which resulted in the appointment of Mr. Thomas J. Cate, our Baptist minister. The choice appears to have been exceptionally fortunate. Mr. Cate has entered upon the duties with an energetic enthusiasm which promises to bring the school to a much greater degree of efficiency than has hitherto marked the work.

We were very sorry we could not retain the services of M'ss Eva R. Baker, teacher of the No. 1 Primary, until the end of the year. Her method and system with the smaller children in particular, was most excellent, she had that rare gift of interesting and enthusing her scholars. But the

School Board were again fortunate in securing the services of Miss Martha L. Coolidge, a teacher of several years experience, to fill her place. In all lines the teachers are responding with an earnestness that makes for progress, and with the assumption of a larger responsibility by the home, we are sure of securing good results in our schools.

There is apparent in many of the schools a careless, indifferent attitude, that is difficult to reach unless the parents can be induced to assume a greater interest in matters. We refer to the constant attendance of the pupils, which we are sorry to say has not for the past year been up to the proper There is a growing tendency upon the part of standard. many parents to allow their children to stay at home for trifles. The law recognizes no excuse except sickness. The work of all well-regulated schools is planned in such a way that a day's absence is bound to result in some loss. The child who is out a day every week, soon feels himself falling behind, and loses interest in his studies. The parent alone can bring the child to realize the importance of regular at. Aside from the loss which such absence brings tendance. in the line of studies, the habit of irregularity, the loss of training in punctuality and attention to what should be the child's first duty, is far too serious to be overlooked except in extreme cases. It is very important that children should form habits of punctuality in early life, it is one of the first and most important principles of a progressive business training. Children who are always "too late" or for one reason or another are allowed to absent themselves from school, are not the men and women who make a success in life when they go out into the busy world. Punctuality, perseverance and industry, with a good moral training, are stepping stones to sure success. The discipline in most of the schools is fair, and in some excellent. The idea of good discipline is to give each pupil as much freedom as possible without interference with others. The aim is to make the schools training places for good citizenship.

There are some schoolhouses much in need of repairs. At the last School meeting there was no appropriation raised for school repairs. Someone through a mistaken idea of economy raised the point that we (the School Board) could use 5 per ceut. of the school fund for the purpose of repairs, which meant taking two hundred dollars out of the money appropriated for schooling of the children. An oversight which came very near losing our State allowance which, we can claim only on condition that we have thirty weeks schooling. And right here we will state we have rereived the apportionment from the Superintendent of Public Instruction for the first time, the amount being one hundred and one dollars and some odd cents, which we sincerely hope will continue. We wish to thank the Grand Army and Woman's Relief Corps for their patriotic work in the schools. We were pleased to see by the registers that the parents and others have taken an interest in and visited the schools so generally. Itels very encouraging to a teacher to have the parents and friends visit the school. The School Board are thankful for and appreciate the hearty cooperation and strong support of the citizens of the town iu general. Recognition of public services of private citizens or of public officers is as important to the community as to those who are honored. It helps us all to acknowledge what has been

done by any one of us, and makes others the more willing to serve.

Ingratitude is as bad in communities as in individuals. Let us stimulate one another to good works by frank and frequent expressions of appreciation. This is the kind of criticism that best deserves the name, for real criticism is just valuation and not simple condemnation.


