TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Danville on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Officers' Salaries.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Officers' Expenses.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Election and Registration Expenses.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town Hall and other Town Buildings.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Police Department.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Health Department.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Vital Statistics.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Maintenance—Summer.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Winter Maintenance.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Road Aid, necessary to obtain State Aid.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Libraries.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Poor.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Aid to Soldiers and their Families.

19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Cemeteries.

20. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Old Meeting House Assn.

21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the County Tax.

22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Schools.

23. To see how much of the Parsonage Funds the town will vote to spend for preaching for the ensuing year.

24. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax Title Property.

26. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for having had State Tax Commission assessed property in the town of Danville.

27. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for defraying expenses involved, for a committee of three to work with the Selectmen in regards to locating an industry in the town.

28. To see if the town will vote to have the State Tax Commission assess all new and renovated property.

29. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Committee of three to handle all the business of the Fire Department.

30. On petition of Lewis Thorsen—

To see if the voters of the Town of Danville will vote to pay me my salary under article #8, March 1954, as the town fathers have made three different cuts in three

years. In 1955, they took \$100.00 away, to have a phone put in the Fire House. In 1956, they took another \$100.00. In 1957, they cut another \$50.00. They did not give me any notice in any way. In December they sent me a check for \$50.00. I returned the check to Mr. Harper, who said, the budget committee had voted this. This was a vote of the people at the Town Meeting.

31. On petition of ten and more voters;

To have a street light installed at the intersection of Route 111 and Brown Hill Road (So called) and/or South Danville.

(To be taken up under Article 7)

32. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

At two o'clock in the afternoon March 12, a legal meeting was called to order by the Moderator for the purpose of acting on the Town Warrant.

The warrant was read by the Moderator who then declared the polls open for the election of officers for the ensuing year.

It was voted to take up the Report of the Budget committee Article by Article.

Article 2. Voted to pass over Article 2.

Article 3. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,600.00 for Town Officers Salaries.

Article 4. Voted to raise an appropriate \$1,000.00 for Town Officers expenses.

Article 5. Voted to raise and appropriate \$125.00 for election and Registration Expenses.

Article 6. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the Town Hall and other Town Buildings.

Article 7. Voted to raise and appropriate \$250.00 for the Police Department.

Article 8. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the Fire Department.

Article 9. Voted to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for the Health Department.

Article 10. Voted to raise and appropriate \$20.00 for Vital Statistics.

Article 11. Voted to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for Town Maintenance—Summer.

Article 12. Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,748.50 for Town Maintenance—Winter.

Article 13. Voted to raise and appropriate \$189.44 for Town Road Aid, necessary to obtain State Aid.

Article 14. Voted to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for Town Libraries.

Article 15. Voted to raise and appropriate \$2,000.00 for Town Poor.

Article 16. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 for Old Age Assistance.

Article 17. Voted to raise and appropriate \$60.00 for Memorial Day.

Article 18. Voted to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for aid to Soldiers and their Families.

Article 19. Voted to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for Cemeteries.

Article 20. Voted to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for the Old Meeting House Association.

Article 21. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to pay the County tax as given by County Treasurer.

Article 22. Voted to pass over Article on Schools.

Article 23. Voted to use the interest received from invested Funds for preaching for the ensuing year.

Article 24. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Article 25. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax Title property.

Article 26. Voted to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for having had State Tax Commission to assess property in Danville.

Article 27. Voted to raise and appropriate \$200.00 to be used for defraying expenses involved for a committee of three to work with the Selectmen in regards to locating an industry in the Town.

Article 28. Voted to have the Selectmen select a committee of three to work with them in locating an industry in the Town.

Voted to adjourn the Business meeting at 8:50 P. M. There were 353 names on the check list, 159 ballots were cast.

To the Superintendent, School Board, and Citizens of Danville:

Health practices have proceeded as usual since the beginning of the school year.

The new Bausch & Lomb ortho-rater for eye testing has proved to be invaluable. When a notice goes home to a parent requesting examination by an eye specialist, it is sent with confidence that the school test has been done under the most accurate conditions possible. Of course, when defects are found in school, it does not necessarily mean that the child needs glasses—this must be the doctor's decision.

Thanks again are due Mr. Demming for his fine care of the building.

The hot lunch program is progressing nicely under the leadership of Mrs. White. However, it would be well for groups and individuals to visit the program and learn of its problems and needs. A program as small as yours cannot possibly be self-supporting. Besides salaries that have to be paid, transportation fees that should be paid to Mrs. White for the extra buying and banking, much food has to be bought to supplement the state's surplus foods. These latter are coming in very irregularly, and the state warns that they may stop altogether. Allowance should be made for this eventuality. This would include incorporating salaries of the lunch workers in the general budget of the school district.

First graders will not be admitted to school in the fall without vaccination unless they have a written excuse from the family doctor.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Danville:

It is with pleasure that I present my annual report to you:

It may be true that Russia leads the United States in the production of engineers and scientists. But that is only one side of the story. The other side raises many questions as to just how far education is extending among Russian youth, and how good that education is.

Does the average Russian child receive as much education as the American boy or girl? Is Russian education below, equal to, or superior to that of the American system?

A little intensive reading in this field of recent educational literature reveals that about one-third of the youth of Russia reach what compares with the upper three grades of an American high school. By contrast, in America, 75 percent of the young people reach these grades. As for higher education, less than seven Russians of every 1,000 are receiving university training at college level.

Facts indicate that two-thirds of the Russian children are denied educational opportunities beyond the seventh grade. The reason for this denial is acute shortage of classrooms! Despite the publicity of an expanded building program, half of the 195,000 local schools in Russia are inadequate because of space shortage.

The same overcrowding is extended to the university level; enrollment has risen 110 per cent since 1940, but available space has expanded at this level only 37 per cent.

Under such conditions, tens of thousands of Russian children—the majority—are removed from local schools at about 14 years of age and sent to work. Do we want this in our schools? I don't think so!

This unfortunate group constitutes a pool of cheap, mobile labor under the guise of educational procedure—procedure that terminates in coal mines and factories.

Russia is trying to impress the world through such scientific feats as Sputnik I and Sputnik II. True, Russia has increased its number of scientists, but at the expense of the majority of its citizens.

Russia is being criticized by Russians for the over loading of engineering students, leaving the students little or no time for independent study.

Alexander G. Koral, a Russian-affairs specialist at the Center for International Studies at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, stated recently that while Russia is expanding its whole educational program, chiefly to meet Communist military objectives, there is no immediate threat that Soviet education is about to match or surpass that of the United States.

I believe that much damage has been done to our educational system during the past twenty years by the disciples of PROGRESSIVE education. We are now ready for the pendulum to swing back to the essential methods and policies for our public schools:

1. Reading to be taught in early grades, with emphasis upon phonetics.
2. Cursive writing to be taught, starting in the third grade, with emphasis on drill.
3. Spelling to be taught as a subject, in conjunction with reading, with emphasis on phonetics.
4. Basic arithmetic to be taught in the first seven grades.
5. History, civics and geography to be taught as separate subjects.
6. The essentials of grammar and the structure of English to be taught in the early grades.
7. Greater use of written essay-type examinations should be made available.
8. A reasonable amount of homework should be required, and parents should be encouraged to supervise home study.
9. Promotion should be determined primarily by proficiency.

Your school board deserves much credit in giving so much time and thought in the preparation of the budget. They have made an honest attempt to see that the budget is well proportioned for the educational needs of your children.

In closing, I wish to express my thanks to the pupils, school board, P. T. A., citizens and teachers for whose understanding, patience and kindness have made the school year one of success.
