# TOWN WARRANT

---

To the inhabitants of the Town of Jackson in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said Jackson on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate as follows:

3. A sum of money for summer highways and bridges.

4. A sum of money for snow removal from highways and sanding same.

5. A sum of money for street lighting.

6. A sum of money for old age assistance.

7. A sum of money for poor relief.

8. A sum of money for maintenance of cemetery

9. A sum of money for Memorial Day services.

10. A sum of money for library.

11. A sum of money for parsonage.

12. A sum of \$70.00 for White Mountains Region.

13. A sum of money for fire protection.

14. A sum of money for hospital.

15. A sum of money for Eastern Slope Region.

16. A sum of \$191.11 for T. R. A.

17. A sum of \$1,060.00 for State Aid Construction.

18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to recondition or replace town tractor and plow.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for the construction of sidewalk.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to complete payment on town truck.

21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction and maintenance of a skating rink.

22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Jackson Ski and Outing Club, fund to be used for general advertising, maintenance of trails, and development work.

23. To see if the Town of Jackson will vote to accept a contribution of one hundred dollars (\$100) from Arthur P. Gale upon condition that this sum be matched with two hundred dollars (\$200) of State or Town funds, the total amount of which shall be expended under direction of State Highway Department in connection with finishing reconstruction of that part of Carter Notch Highway beginning at Route 16A opposite Jackson Church and ending with driveway leading to Wentworth Castle, so-called, at the top of Jackson Falls Hill.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred thirteen and 65/100 dollars (\$113.65) to reimburse Arthur P. Gale, selectman of Jackson, for legal expenditures made by him in behalf of more than fifty petitioning citizens of Jackson in order to secure an injunction from a Superior Court Judge halting further Town spending upon

Town Vault until a pending Special Town Meeting — (held August 21, 1945) — should permit opportunity for citizens of the Town to decide the issue at stake.

25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$278.05 to complete payment on truck plow.

26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to purchase a Good Roads blade plow for town truck.

27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 to complete the work on vault building, painting, etc.

28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the improvement of hazardous places on town roads.

29. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow upon the credit of the town, not exceeding \$5,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

30. To see if the town will vote to impose a summons of \$ .20 on poll taxes uncollected after October 15, 1946.

31. To act on any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## Prevent Forest Fires -- It Pays

-----

An average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year destroying many thousand dollars worth of property of all description. It costs many additional thousands of dollars and requires valuable man hours, taken from other essential work, to extinguish them. Those losses affect the personal fortunes of the owners and town and state economies. Everyone loses because of them.

Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than



98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable!

We have been extremely fortunate during the past few years. Favorable fire weather and war time restrictions on travel which kept people off the highways and out of the woods have aided materially in reducing fire risks, keeping fires fewer and fire losses low.

We now face changed conditions. People can travel freely. Their love for travel and the freedom of the woods will bring them out in ever increasing numbers. This will step up fire risks materially. The accelerated cutting of the war years has resulted in additional thousands of slash acres. These factors combined with a possible dry season and human carelessness could easily produce a catastrophe. Everyone must, consequently, be on their guard. They should

- 1 Be careful with fire or when smoking in or near woodlands.
- 2 Cooperate with the local forest fire warden and his deputies by
  - a Abiding cheerfully with whatever restrictions it may be necessary to impose. They are intended only to be helpful.
  - b Securing permits to burn debris when the ground is not covered with snow.
  - c Seeing that others comply with requirements.
  - d Promptly coming to the warden's assistance when needed.

If these few fundamental practices are followed it will be possible to PREVENT a large proportion of FOREST FIRES from starting. — that PAYS.

This year the policy of having two teachers has again been continued. Mrs. Elizabeth Breen and Miss Nancy Klingensmith are teaching the primary and upper grades respectively. This is a good arrangement as there are practically no candidates for schools of eight grades.
