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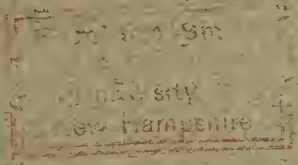

ORGANIZATION OF CITY GOVERNMENT

Tuesday, March 26, 1918.

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, members-elect of the city council for the municipal year of 1918 and the members from the previous council met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

The oath of office was administered to the mayor-elect, Hon. Clarence E. Rowe, by the City Solicitor, Frank M. Beckford.

The mayor administered the oath of office to the following councilmen-elect, viz.:

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

OF HON. CLARENCE E. ROWE, MARCH 26, 1918

Gentlemen of the Council:

There has been on previous occasions discussed in this chamber the danger of the tendency to generalize upon insufficient data—a tendency which is not monopolized by any group or body of individuals, but one which appears to be a common human attribute. Where principles are formulated, immediately there is manifested the tendency to extend its application to conditions with which it has no possible relation. Therefore the best way to anticipate the future is to read the past.

Gentlemen, with one exception our Council remains identical with last year, this difference being caused by the councilman from Ward 4 refusing renomination. The new member requires no introduction or recommendations.

The watchword of modern business is Efficiency—cutting out wasteful methods—getting full value for the money invested.

To build a great business two important laws must be observed: one the law of harmony and the other the law of mutual benefit.

The first one provides that all work in harmony and serve for the success of the organization, bringing mutual benefit to those whom they may represent. The success of a business or enterprise depends in no small degree upon the efficiency of its executives or individual members. There are two kinds: one is positive and the other negative. The first succeeds and attracts his helpers or co-workers; the second fails and drives his co-laborers from

him and his personality is destruction of loyalty, harmony and stick-to-it-iveness.

Let us render to our fellow citizens ability, reliability and stability, or if reduced to a single word—let us render service, never admitting that the work we lay out or the ideals we cherish can not be realized.

Our various departments have remained well within their appropriations and are worthy of commendation for service and efficiency rendered.

The Board of Public Works is the only department that does not render its accounts to the Committee on Accounts and Claims, but once a year, and that at the end of the fiscal year, whereas all other departments render theirs monthly.

I trust that these conditions may be obviated during the coming year.

This commission expended \$67,659.11 during 1917, or twenty-seven per cent of our appropriations.

STREET DEPARTMENT.

Gentlemen, I certainly am pleased with the work accomplished by this department, realizing as I do the adverse circumstances which were overcome. Fourteen thousand three hundred and twenty-two square yards of bituminous macadam being laid during the past year. The maintenance of all laid in our city since 1908 costing \$0.029 per square yard. Union Avenue, after many years of deliberation, is what may be classed as permanently improved, all street lines and layouts having been approved with one exception, the street department having expended \$17,740.54 from Main Street to Casino Square. This amount includes all sewer and surface drains entering from intersecting streets. Main street, from Canal to Church street, the most uneven piece of macadam in our city, has been reshaped, repaved and recovered with concrete. The Meredith-Laconia road along State highway during certain parts of the year, has caused many hard-

ships for our tourists, as well as our own citizens, but during the past summer these conditions have been alleviated, and in case there is no obstacle to prevent, this improvement should be completed this year.

We have approximately one hundred miles of streets and roads which must be maintained.

In the future our highways have a greater mission to perform than to be merely a means of taking an airing, viewing scenery and admiring autumn leaves. They are to be used for business by business. The traffic to be served is that which keeps the wheels of farming, industry and commerce turning and producing.

True economy is needed now above everything. Waste of either time, energy or material should be frowned upon; that which best serves its purpose is truly economical; that which does not, is extravagant at any price.

The dire necessity for improved roads is not all that should urge a consistent and continual improvement of our highways. The question of economy with high prices prevailing impresses highway improvement in a most emphatic manner.

Heavy traffic suggests that permanent improvements should be made on Bowman street between Academy and Main; Messer street as far north as second railroad crossing; Fair street, west of Court street and Franklin Square.

Numerous recommendations were made in my address one year ago which were not acted upon, for reason of high costs, etc., but I still believe they should have your consideration.

Relocation of Church street and proposed improvements will call for your attention but not appropriation.

By an agreement entered into between our city and the United States Government authorities we have perpetual use of three feet of land, running parallel with Church and Beacon streets on government property for sidewalk purposes.

The Street Department has one of the best equipped

storage yards in New England, and has fully met the expectations of the City Council. The truck recently purchased proves to be a good investment and meets a long felt need. Much credit for the success of this department is due the superintendent, Charles A. French, who has recently been honored by the New Hampshire Good Roads Association by being elected president.

The sewerage system of our city is not keeping up with the pace of other improvements. Eventually we must issue bonds and build for the health of our community. The Weirs must come into this consideration and will demand a large expenditure. Three thousand three hundred sixty-two feet of surface water drains were built during the past year. Among them was the Messer street drain which formerly discharged into the Adams dump.

Gentlemen, it is not consistent to make recommendations for a great amount of work along this line on account of poor shipments and war prices. However, we should grant all necessary petitions.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Our department has answered 23 bell alarms and 124 still alarms with a loss paid by insurance companies of approximately \$1500. The triple combination truck is a good investment for the city, although I understand there has been some criticism; this may be just or unjust, but I am confident that the purchase is along the right line. Our department is in excellent condition and its personnel is deserving of much credit.

We are informed that it is the expectation of the Underwriters to put Laconia in the same class as Concord and Manchester as regards insurance rates.

PLAYGROUNDS

The playground movement is a permanent fixture and rightly should be, with an average daily attendance of 275.

Physically and mentally it is a grand investment and the City Council should increase the appropriation.

PARKS

Laconia has two large tracts of land known as Opeeche and Leavitt Parks under the management of the Park Commissioners. This commission is to be congratulated for the active work and its successful accomplishments. The time is now at hand when these parks should be plotted and plans made for the future. Economical investment is the criterion. The Leavitt Fund will enable the Commissions to make this park one to be proud of; the Opeeche park will call for a special appropriation. I would suggest that the Park Commissioners secure the co-operation of the Board of Public Works in this undertaking.

To accomplish this work and not interfere with other departments I recommend that an appropriation be made for the purchase of one pair of horses, these horses to be used in the spring for plowing city gardens, etc. During the summer they could be used on Leavitt Park; a yearly income of over six hundred dollars being available; as well as other city work. During the winter months these horses are an absolute necessity at Central Fire Station. The income will be in excess of expense and depreciation.

LEGAL.

Due to the untiring efforts and ability of our city solicitor, F. M. Beckford, we have a most satisfactory report from our Legal Department. Court cases which have been on the docket for years have been disposed of and all in favor of the city. I am informed that but one trial case remains and that to determine the City-Weils Union avenue street line. The city is right or wrong; let the present session of court decide.

NOTE CANCELLATION.

Included in the liabilities of the city are \$101,362.-60 outstanding notes, the majority of which were borrowed in anticipation of taxes and owing to deficiencies from time to time have been extended without special authorization. I would recommend to the incoming Council that this indebtedness be taken up by the issuing of a series of refunding bonds a part of which should become payable each year until the entire debt is wiped out.

SUGGESTIONS.

As is published each year in the City Report there is a long list of accounts of Property sold city for taxes of various years and carried on the books as assets. It would seem advisable to take the property by tax deed and dispose of same thereby obtaining cash with which to maintain the departments of the City.

Your attention is especially called to the reports of the different departments. Digest every suggestion, read every word and act with moderation. The Public Library Trustees requests an increase appropriation; to be sure they have a good income but under existing circumstances are they not justified in their request.

The present crisis has caused many to endeavor to obtain birth records from City Clerk but to their dismay find there is no record. I would suggest that our citizens ascertain if their births are recorded, if not to file such copies with the Clerk.

In compliance with the request of the City Auditor I recommend that a uniform system of book-keeping be adopted by the City departments.

FOOD CONSERVATION.

The cities cause will not be helped by killing off a single legitimate expenditure that affords maintenance to American citizens. The thing to do is to conserve all resources,

waste nothing and make the most of everything. The sum of \$500. should be appropriated for Food Production and Conservation. Last year was experimental in this work, but proved satisfactory although we were laboring under difficulties. This expenditure should not be made however, unless under the supervision of some suitable person elected by the City Council.

RECAPITULATION.

Peace has reigned within our Council Chamber but outside our walls the dark cloud of war has encircled our men, our industries, our products, ourselves.

But should we try to suppress our industries, our commercial activities or our City improvements? Business should not slacken, it should be stimulated.

With these great activities comes, as a natural consequence, tremendous increases in the cost of every unit that enters into improvements, it is estimated to average over 37%. Therefore our power of production under present tax rates will be lessened.

And in closing let me emphasize the fact that intelligent economy is based on care and must be judged in the light of common sense; it means prudence and that we can help this nation conserve food, labor and wealth; while stupid economy can lead the nation only to disaster.

Appropriations should be made carefully; they should be spent wisely ever remembering that every part of our industrial and economic life should be maintained at its maximum strength, in order, that each may contribute in the fullest measure to the vigorous prosecution of the war.

Gentlemen, let us proceed to business.

MUNICIPAL REGULATIONS

FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS AGAINST THE CITY

All bills against the city must be approved by the persons authorizing the charge; and unless this is done, no action can be had upon the bill by the committee on accounts and claims, and no order will be given for its payment.

When bills are certified to as above, and left with the city clerk not later than Thursday at 12 o'clock m., preceding the last Monday of each month, they will be audited by the committee on accounts and claims, and if approved by them and allowed by the council, will be ready for payment on the following Wednesday, at the office of the city treasurer.

Meetings of the committee on accounts and claims are held on Friday preceding the last Monday of each month at 7.30 o'clock p. m., at the city clerk's office.

Department Reports

EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

Laconia, N. H., Feb. 12, 1919.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

In submitting this, the eighteenth report, this Board would express appreciation of your many helpful suggestions and hearty cooperation in our work of the past year.

Excepting the State Road work, the repairs of Fair Street bridge and the construction of but one sewer line, but little except general maintenance and the routine work, has been attempted; the high cost of labor and materials almost prohibiting new construction work that was not immediately necessary.

The State Highway construction was finished from the end of last year's work, to a point near the Weirs bridge, a distance of nearly seventy-five hundred feet; this work together with the work done by the State and Town of Meredith, the past season, completes the construction of the road between Weirs and Meredith and, incidentally, fills in the last section of unimproved road on the Merrimack Valley Trunk Line from the State line at Nashua to the White Mountains, which will meet with the hearty approval of all travelers.

Our usual maintenance work upon the streets of the city was necessarily curtailed particularly in the earlier part of the season on account of the labor conditions and our inability, on account of Government restriction, to secure but a very small quantity of oil. Our citizens generally, although accustomed during recent years to the benefits derived from an application of dust laying oil upon many of our dirt streets, realized the conditions and remarkably few complaints were heard.

Our motor truck purchased in the summer of 1917 is doing very satisfactory service, and works to good advantage in hauling ashes and waste, stone and road material. We desire to renew our suggestion in last year's report that another truck should be purchased for the use of this department as soon as possible. The two trucks used in conjunction could be profitably employed at times in hauling in gravel and resurfacing many streets now badly in need of such treatment; streets where the traffic is not heavy enough to require a macadam surface, but still demanding something different than old worn out material. From the fact that the gravel must necessarily be hauled in cases from some distance, the proper use of trucks will make possible much of this class of work the cost of which would be excessive if not prohibitive if it were to be performed by teams.

We have on hand materials for use on Fair Street improvement for which \$1,882.53 was expended, and an appropriation should be granted to enable us to complete this project the coming year; we also have on hand a quantity of paving blocks, available for use on Water Street, and as there remains but a short strip to finish paving this important street to the railroad crossing we would recommend a sufficient appropriation to enable us to complete it.

Other projects each possessing merit and backed by a considerable public demand are being actively discussed and it appears to be not so much of a question as to whether they should be approved and executed as to when, or rather the order in which they should be undertaken.

Conditions appear to us very favorable for an active year in the construction of public works, here, as elsewhere, and as we now possess an organization with considerable experience and a good equipment for road construction, we hope that sufficient appropriation will be granted this department to keep us busy throughout the season.

Leave of absence was granted last September to Mr.

Charles A. French, City Engineer, Street Commissioner and Superintendent of Sewers, he being called into the United States service being commissioned as a Captain in the Construction Division of the Army and ordered into service as Utilities Officer in a large hospital camp in North Carolina, concluding his duties only this month and returning to his position here.

During the absence of Mr. French the routine work of the office and the several departments has been efficiently directed by his assistant John M. Eldredge.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF STREETS

To the Board of Public Works:

GENTLEMEN:—

I present the following as the annual report of the Street Department for the year ending February 15th, 1919.

The Fair Street Bridge required many new timbers, new planking and the surface was given a coating of tar concrete, total repairs costing \$2,458.50.

Minor repairs were made to several other bridges as occasion demanded.

The system of patrolmen on outside roads was continued throughout the season with good results.

There has been collected 3,051 loads of ashes and waste and they have been disposed of at a cost of \$1.52 per load.

The usual work of maintenance such as patching and dragging of State Roads was carefully attended to throughout the year and the amount expended under the head maintenance is \$5,226.63, one half of which was furnished by the state. There is an unexpended balance of \$381.73 in the City Treasury on this account.

Under the head of State Road Construction there was built about 7,300 feet of water bound macadam extending from the Boston & Maine Railroad bridge at the Weirs north to the point where construction was left off last year. Total cost of this work was \$18,528.91, one half of which was furnished by the State.

A large amount of stone and tarvia was purchased for work on Fair Street but due to the conditions attendant with the war it was found necessary to postpone this improvement until next season.

Three water sprinkling carts were run throughout the season. Very little oil was applied because of the restrictions placed upon the sale of oil by the government.

The amount expended for the year ending Feb. 15th, 1919 is \$60,748.14, and I have itemized it under the following items:

FIRE DEPARTMENT

REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

In accordance with the requirements of the City Ordinance, I herewith submit for your consideration the report of the Fire Department for the year 1918.

The department responded to forty-eight bell alarms and eighty-four still alarms. The largest fires during the past year were in Ward 6, The Boulia, Gorrell Lumber Company with an approximate loss of \$68,000.00, partly covered by insurance and the W. G. & I. H. Chase Lumber Co. with an approximate loss of \$30,000.00.

Six new fire alarm boxes installed during the year, two at the Laconia Car Company, two at Scott & Williams plants, purchased and installed and paid for by said companies, one new fire alarm box was installed at the corner of Winter and Highland streets and one at the corner of Oak and Pleasant streets.

The departments purchased 500 feet of fire hose, one dozen rubber coats and expended five hundred dollars on the fire alarm system, installing a new storage battery and going over the line making extensive repairs. Repairs were made to the Lakeport Fire Station, the new floor and floor timbers laid. I would recommend that during the coming year the Ladder Truck and Hose wagon at the Lakeport Station be painted and varnished, also varnish to the apparatus at the Central Fire Station.

DIRECTIONS FOR GIVING AN ALARM.

To open the box, break the glass and turn the key. In each box there is a small bell called a telltale, designed expressly for the purpose of informing you whether an alarm is being transmitted the instant you open the door.

Open the box, and if this bell is not heard, pull down the hook the whole length of the slot once only and let go. But if this bell should be heard, it would indicate that another box had been pulled and it would be useless to attempt to pull another until the one already pulled had performed its mission. Unless your presence is most urgently required at the scene of the fire, remain at the box to direct the department.

Never open the box or touch anything pertaining to it except in case of fire.

Never give an alarm for a fire seen at a distance.

Be reasonably sure that there is a fire before giving an alarm.

Never give an alarm for a chimney fire unless there is imminent danger of the building catching.

The fire alarm system is under the direction of the Chief Engineer.

The fire apparatus is in good serviceable condition. The fire alarm system is in first class working order, a new storage battery having been installed and several repairs made on the line during the year.

The companies are trained and each member has been instructed as to his duties at fires.

In behalf of the several companies, I wish to express our appreciation to His Honor the Mayor and the City Council for raising our salary, also for the kind interest taken in our Fire Department.

REPORT OF PARK COMMISSION

Laconia, N. H., Jan. 31, 1919.

To the Honorable Mayor and the City Council of Laconia.

GENTLEMEN:—

The 5th annual report of the park commission is herewith presented for your approval and consideration.

The same conditions which created the war gardens of 1917, called for their continuance in 1918 and a considerable portion of both Opechee and Leavitt Parks was given over to them.

The policy of your commission in undertaking something of permanency each year in the line of improvements, has been continued in the gradual clearing of the underbrush at Opechee Park.

Lack of funds to do the big things, does not discourage the doing of little things, and with a basis for work provided by a vote of your honorable body on May 27, 1918, whereby the sum of \$150.00 was appropriated for a set of working plans for Opechee Park, the improvement can now be carried on systematically and intelligently.

With the taking over of the buildings at the entrance, for the use of the city, the commission recommend that they be made as attractive as possible, and that all improvements be made looking toward permanency, in providing an entrance in keeping with the surroundings, which Nature has showered upon us with such lavish hands.

From the point of utility and beauty, the grand stand should not be allowed to deteriorate, and should, if possible, be given a coat of paint or other preservative.

Each year sees an increased use of the park by the public, and although some complaint was made early in the season in regard to questionable behavior there, the prompt and vigilant co-operation of the police force, was successful in putting a stop to it.

We earnestly request all citizens who are at the park at any time to assist us in making it a proper place for our young people to spend their leisure hours.

The 4th annual fair of the Belknap County Pomona Grange was held here in September; these meetings are very gratifying to your commission, who desire to have the park used for all legitimate public purposes.

The generosity of the horsemen who donated the sum of \$160.69 during the past two seasons, to the commission, for the use of playground work, was gratefully received and acknowledged, as it makes possible, much that would otherwise be out of reach of the commission.

The work of grading was continued this year at Leavitt Park, it was done by the city team under the supervision of the city officials and proved so eminently satisfactory that its continuance is recommended.

The playground work for the city of Laconia completed its 5th season at Opechee park, and its 4th at Leavitt Park. The report of the supervisors follows:

To the Park Commissioners:

Opechee Playground opened its fifth season June 25, 1918. All were anxious to continue its previous year's successes, socially, educationally and industrially.

The directors for the season were Mr. Walter Boyson and Mr. Ralph Sanborn, with Miss Hazel Duke and Miss Ethel Farmer acting as assistant directors at Opechee Park, and Miss Alice R. Jones at Leavitt Park.

The directors endeavored to increase the patriotism of the children under their supervision, during the summer, by instilling into their minds proper respect for the American Flag. Fitting and respectful exercises were carried out each day, as the flag was raised and lowered.

The new equipment and improvements, including new swings, teeters, a tether ball outfit, several croquet sets, a diving raft, chest weights and several hammocks, were much appreciated by the children, as well as by the directors.

The industrial work for girls was particularly emphasized this year. At the end of the season a most creditable exhibit was shown. Two Red Cross quilts were completed, besides several fracture pillows for the Italian Relief. There was also a splendid display of basketry, raffia, tatted handkerchiefs, embroidery, knitting and waflo weave. During the season numerous orders for waflo weave sets were filled by the girls. This display, later exhibited at the Belknap County Pomona Grange Fair, drew a prize of five dollars.

All who visited the Park during the season certainly noticed the great improvements made in the pleasant grove, where so many children spent comfortably the hot summer afternoons. Each year this grove is being gradually cleared from unnecessary trees and underbrush. A great deal has already been done and the place is being filled with satisfactory playground equipment. The hammocks, settees, swings, teeters, sand boxes, volley ball, tether ball and croquet grounds are centers of great attraction. How-

ever, we would suggest that baby swings be added for the benefit of the many small children, who daily visit the grove with their parents. It is certainly an ideal grove and its improvement should, by all means, be encouraged.

The daily swimming periods, under the close supervision of the directors, were very enjoyable and successful. The new raft and diving board added greatly to the sport.

The weekly picnics also proved to be a source of great enjoyment to the children. Each outing attracted more and more of the girls and boys, until at last "picnic day" was most eagerly anticipated. On several different occasions, hikes were taken to Sandy Shore where "bacon bats" were enjoyed. The annual playground picnic was held at Lake Shore Park and a large number availed themselves of the opportunity of attending.

The periods devoted to organized play were certainly popular ones. Many and varied games and dances were taught. The tennis courts were in use a great deal, but it would be much more interesting to the players if backstops were erected. Croquet was the chief delight of many of the children and the sets were always in use when the weather permitted. Baseball and quoits were the most popular games among the boys.

The victrola and the new records proved to be as popular as ever. The children also participated in frequent "sing-outs" from the set of new song books purchased this year. The music seemed to lead to the greatly anticipated story hour which closed the day's work.

The big event of the season was the "Pageant of the Allies" in which nearly one hundred children participated. The pageant was read by the Rev. Mr. Caswell and the patriotic songs, which added greatly to the programme, were rendered by several of the city's best musicians. The Laconia City Band furnished music for the evening's entertainment.

The annual field day was held at the close of the season.

At this time cups and ribbons were awarded to those showing the greatest improvement during the ten weeks of playground activities; thus bringing to a close the fifth successful season of the Opechee Park Playground.

At Leavitt Park the playground season was cut short, and there was supervision only six weeks on the first five afternoons of each week. This was due to the lack of attendance.

There are certain factors which have to do with this matter of non-attendance, the chief of which perhaps last season, was the fact that most of the older children were at work, and the attendance was confined to the smaller children of the the west side.

The distance from the east side of the river, and the crossing of the railroad track, is practically prohibitive, as regards the attendance of the small children from this part of the city.

Another factor perhaps is that during the past two seasons so much of the land has been given over to the war gardens, or has been in constant state of upheaval, that there has been no suitable place for either croquet ground or ball field.

Considering the small attendance, much of real practical value was accomplished.

The directors at this time wish to thank all persons who in any way contributed to the success of the playground work of the city of Laconia.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of the Laconia Public Library:

Gentlemen:—

I have the honor to present to you my sixteenth annual report. The statistics of my report are for the calendar year 1918, while the report of the treasurer is for the fiscal year ending February 15, 1919.

Although the library was closed, by order of the Board of Health, from noon of the second day of October until the nineteenth of the same month, there was a gain of 2205 issues, or 6.7%, in the circulation at the main library and 2258, or 5.4%, in the total circulation. For the first time, magazines were bound in flexible covers and loaned as books for seven days. American Cookery, Century, Harper's magazine, Popular mechanics, Scribner's magazine and World's work were loaned throughout the year. Extra copies of Atlantic Monthly, Etude and St. Nicholas were circulated during the last half of the year. A second copy of Modern Priscilla has been ordered for 1919. The nine magazines were loaned 144 times, this being 1.36% of the circulation of the main library.

In June Miss Clark spent four days at the city library at Springfield, Mass., learning their methods of repairing books. Mr. Wellman and his staff did everything possible to make her visit enjoyable and profitable. Since that time, she has examined all books as they came in. She withdraws from circulation before any parts are lost the books that must be rebound. She repairs such as may be repaired, thus keeping them in circulation much longer

than they otherwise would be. This work should have been done from the opening of the library in this building, but there had never been helpers enough to make this possible.

Miss Black resigned as loan desk assistant in September and Miss Paine accepted the position. She had been trained in the work at the branch and soon learned the work at the main library; but time will be required for her to become familiar with the books and with the reference work. As it was difficult to obtain an assistant for all the evenings at the branch, she continued to serve there three evenings in a week and another assistant was employed at the main library. Mrs. Hawkins, who had served the library before her marriage, assisted four evenings each week while she was in the city. When she left town, Miss K. G. Danforth took her place.

Sixteen hundred and ninety-three more books were shipped for the soldiers and sailors. Miss Mary M. Melcher, with the assistance of other patriotic ladies, prepared the books for service in the war libraries. One hundred and sixty magazines were also shipped for the same purpose.

A neighborhood meeting was held at the library July 19th. Speakers came from Manchester, Concord, Derry and Tilton. Librarians were present from Meredith, New Hampton, Center Harbor, Rumney, Wentworth and Lincoln. Those present seemed to feel repaid for coming. It is hoped that such meetings may be held at least every spring and fall at some central point in this district.

Among the many generous and valuable gifts, only a few can be described here. A complete list of donors follows and to each grateful acknowledgment is made.

The copy of "Lakeport's ancient homes," presented by the author, Major Aldrich, will be treasured for its historical value. The same is true of the copy of the "One hundredth anniversary of the incorporation of Gilford,

N. H.' presented by the Hon. Martin A. Haynes who also gave us a copy of the "Poetry of the War," a choice collection of the best poetry inspired by the great world war. He calls it a "Scrap Book" but it is one that will be valued more and more as time passes. He set the type and printed both books himself. Late in the year Col. Haynes redeemed a promise, made to the local history committee early in its existence, by sending his set of the Lake Village Times to this library. The set is complete from the first number of the paper in 1868 to the end of the 15th volume in December, 1882. This set is invaluable as a contemporary history of the sixth ward and admirably supplements the nearly complete set of the Laconia Democrat as an original source of information for a history of the town and city.

Col. Elmer S. Tilton provided generously for the boys by presenting the books his own sons had outgrown. The younger boys will enjoy all of these one hundred and thirty-five books. Many of them have already come to rebinding. The Hon. R. C. Shannon, of Brockport, N. Y., presented another valuable genealogy in beautiful leather binding. The Vaughan family is the subject of this work which is of special interest in a city that owes so much to one branch of the family.

The Guaranty Trust Co., of New York, has liberally supplied the main library and the branch with copies of their valuable pamphlets on the business aspects of the war and the times. Mrs. Emma J. Miller gave us a package of old deeds and legal papers that date back about a hundred years. Lack of time has prevented a careful examination of the items but they will be carefully saved for the historian of our city.

LAKEPORT BRANCH.

Although the branch was closed from the second to the eighteenth of October, inclusive, on account of the influenza and notwithstanding the demands of the war upon the time of the patrons and the absence of so many in the service of the country, the circulation showed a slight increase in comparison with the previous year. Fifty-three more loans were made in 1918 than in 1917.

It was stated in my previous report that extra copies of the Century, Harper's magazine, Scribner's magazine, and World's Work had been ordered for 1918 that they might be loaned like books for home use. These magazines were so popular that the Atlantic monthly, Popular Mechanics and St. Nicholas were added to the list. As there was no copy of the Atlantic monthly in the reading room, one copy was used for both purposes, being kept on the table when not charged out. Three hundred and eighty-three loans were made of these seven magazines. Fifty-five loans were made in December, 7.7% of the total for all classes.

The hours during which the branch is open to the public were changed in September so that it might be open continuously after it is opened for the day. Since Labor day the library has not been open until noon, but it is not closed until nine o'clock. Miss Paine became loan desk assistant at the main library in October. She still tends the branch while the librarian gets his supper on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday evenings. Mr. Nelson M. Perkins has been employed for the other evenings. We now have three persons trained for the branch and there seems to be little danger of its being closed on account of sickness. During the summer, Miss Carrie M. Jones, a library student at Sim-

mons college, classified and cataloged the books belonging to The Ossian Wilbur Goss Reading Rooms that had not been cataloged. The cards for these books are arranged with the cards for the main library, but are distinguished from them by a "g" before the class number.

It was found to be possible to increase the shelving by moving the desk and card cabinet out into the room. About sixty-six running feet of shelving were built into the south-west corner. These will provide for normal additions for a few years, but a stack room to shelve about ten thousand volumes should be added to the building in the near future. Magazines, that are valuable for reference work, are accumulating rapidly. Friends are contributing useful books and sets frequently. Duplicate copies of the most popular books and a few good books of reference should be purchased for the branch annually.

During 1918, Major Aldrich gave a copy of his "Lakeport's ancient homes," a book of great interest and lasting historical value. There are very few persons living who remember the facts stated in this book. Hon. Martin A. Haynes gave a framed picture of Lake Village in 1883. He also gave two books printed by himself from type set by himself. One contains the addresses at the Gilford, N. H. centennial, June 17, 1912. The other is a compilation of many of the best poems inspired by the war. Through the interest of Mrs. L. E. Hayward, eighteen numbers of "The Stars and stripes," a paper published by our soldier boys in France, were received from Mr. Harry L. Bryant, who was one of the first to cross the ocean for service from this ward. Thirty-three pamphlets, 1 periodical and 3 leaflets about the war were received from Prof. W. Macneile Dixon, of the University of Glasgow. Books and pamphlets, bearing on the war, were received from others as follows: A book and a pamphlet from George H. Doran co.; two pamphlets from the Guaranty trust co., of New York; one pamphlet from Harper & brothers, two pamphlets from the

Library of war literature and thirteen pamphlets by mail with no indication of the donors.

Mrs. Charles A. Sleeper gave a set of the American encyclopaedic dictionary in four volumes. The Village improvement society set out two maple trees and a lot of shrubs. Mrs. Julius E. Wilson gave nine bound copies of the city reports, two reports of the Fish and game commissioners of the state, six manuals of the general court and forty-eight numbers of Picturesque America. It is difficult to get together a complete set of the city reports. Some of the scarce reports are among those given by Mrs. Wilson.

We would recommend the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars be appropriated for this department for the ensuing year.

CITY SOLICITOR'S REPORT

Laconia, February the first, 1919.

To His Honor the Mayor, and the City Council of the City of Laconia:

In obedience to the regulations and laws of the City, I herewith present for your consideration a report of my official acts as city solicitor during the past year.

It is with no small degree of pride, as well as pleasure, that I can report to you and through you, to our citizens and tax-payers, that no action, either in law or equity, has been brought against the city during the fiscal year. Three complaints and claims have been referred to this office for investigation by your Honorable Board. One of them being an accident on North Street, the claim being meritorious and the city at fault. With the assistance of His Honor, the Mayor, the damages were settled without action by the claimant. In the other claims investigation demonstrated that there was no liability, as it seemed to me, on the part of the city and the claimants were so informed. Inasmuch as no notice has been filed with the city clerk in accordance with the provisions of the Public Statutes and as the time has long since expired wherein said notice can be filed, I assume that the parties have abandoned their claims.

In my report of 1918, I called attention to the only cases in the Superior Court remaining untried or not disposed of, namely: Attorney General vs. L. B. W. Avery, et al. This is a petition to establish the boundary line of Union Avenue, so called, and originally envolved

twelve different parties. The one remaining defendant is Georgia B. Wells and the remaining question being where the line of Union Avenue is located in relation to the Dr. Wells' residence. This case was set for trial at the October Term but was obliged to be postponed for the reason that the city engineer, Mr. French, having been commissioned as a Captain in the United States Engineering Corps, was ordered to report for duty and was compelled to leave the city before the trial date was reached. Captain French has now returned and I am making an endeavor to have the case disposed of before the March Term of Court.

The case of Claribel Clark against the city is still on the docket, but my understanding of the matter is, that there is no legal ground for action against the city, the highway where the damage was claimed, being a part of the state constructed road.

In the matter of the petition of Arthur A. Tilton, special police officer, brought against the police commissioners denying their right to remove him without a hearing and for a reinstatement, the case has been tried in the Superior Court and the police commissioners' ruling sustained.

In the matter of Wesley B. Stevens. The case has been heard and Mr. Stevens has been licensed as a plumber in accordance with the decision of the Court and without expense to the city.

The revision of the City Ordinances, City Charter and amendments thereto have been completed and are in the office of the city clerk. About one hundred of these volumes have been sold in advance. The cost price of the book is \$1.50. The supply is very limited and I trust our citizens so far as possible (there being only 350 books available) will obtain a copy of the same for the information therein contained will be of increasing value as the years go by.

There has been many questions submitted to this office by the Overseer of the Poor regarding the city's liability for the support of those asking assistance. The question generally being whether the assistance should come from the city or the county. All the questions have been decided satisfactorily between the city and county with the exception of one. This question involves the right of a maiden lady to gain residence without paying taxes. The same will be submitted to the Superior Court for its decision upon an agreed case.

Various questions, ordinances, resolutions and other work have been referred to me by your honorable body to which I have given careful attention and made my report thereon.

The only remaining matter submitted is a long list of tax sales, which have been on the collector's books, some of them, many years. These various sales will require careful and painstaking work, but I see no reason why the records cannot be completed and either the taxes collected or the property disposed of.

In closing this report I deem it a duty that I owe to the City Marshal and the Police to compliment them on the splendid work of that department. I have found the City Marshal and Police extremely courteous at all times and our city is to be congratulated upon the efficiency of its police force. As city solicitor I consider it a great privilege to call attention to the fact, that with a population of 12,000 or more, that only 18 arrests of our citizens have been made for drunkenness during the past year as against 94 citizens and 95 non-residents, total 189 in 1917 as shown by the city report of that year and as against 595 arrests for drunkenness as shown by the city report for 1907, this being the last year of license in the city. The figures tell their own story, between license, near-by license, and no license.

Once again I desire to extend to His Honor, the Mayor, my sincere thanks for courtesies innumerable and to thank each and every member of the city council for their kindness and assistance to me in the duties of my office.

BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Honorable Mayor and Council of the City of Laconia:

We hereby submit our annual report for the year 1918.

About the middle of September influenza and pneumonia began to make their appearance, and by October an epidemic such as Laconia had never known was upon us. Appeals for doctors and nurses began to be so frequent that the demand could not be filled, and it was evident that some measures must at once be taken by this department to meet the urgent need. At a meeting of the board of health held with the mayor and board of public safety it was decided to close all public and parochial schools and all places of amusement, churches, etc. The trustees of the Laconia Hospital decided to give the hospital over to epidemic patients, and fifty-four influenza and twenty-three pneumonia patients were taken care of without regard as to ability to pay.

Two of our physicians and nearly all the city nurses were in government service. It was very difficult to ob-

tain any assistants on account of fear of contracting the disease. Otherwise churches could have been utilized for temporary hospitals, as was done in many places in the state. The board of health called for volunteers, women to do nursing and otherwise assist. Only two answered this call, Miss Louise Mowbray and Miss Beatrice Wallace. These two young ladies gave valuable and intelligent service at the hospital, and helped throughout the epidemic without remuneration. We employed the only available trained nurse, Miss Mary Hurley, who gave up private nursing to help. She called on people unable to get a doctor, making 170 calls, and giving some care and medicine to 298 patients under the direction of doctors. Two diet kitchens were established, and suitable nourishment was prepared and taken regularly to poor people by our Boy Scouts and young ladies who had cars, members of the Red Cross assisting.

The influenza and pneumonia epidemic came when we were wholly unprepared for it, and now it is gone we are still unprepared, should it or any other epidemic come again. Our not being prepared caused much suffering, misery, and loss of life, not to speak of the hundreds of dollars to the city, directly and indirectly. The board of health has recommended the building of an isolation hospital on the hospital grounds by the city for the last two or three years, both at council meetings and in our annual reports. The state board of health endorses it, the Laconia Hospital trustees recommend it, and are willing to give the land. Every doctor in the city is enthusiastic for it, and the Belknap County Medical Society voted to recommend and in every way help the realization of this plan.

Our old quarantine hospital could be sold, and the twelve beds and equipment which are now in it could be used in the new building. The new building could be run under the same management and supervision as

our Laconia Hospital, and in case of an epidemic would start with a system and a management all established. It should be a source of some income, for who would not rather take a patient suffering from scarlet fever or diphtheria to a suitable hospital where they could have trained care, instead of quarantining a whole household, as is sometimes necessary.

In comparison with other places the size of Laconia we spend nothing for board of health work. It is amazing how little interest the city and people in general take in the city's health. It usually consists in complaints of some unfriendly neighbor's pig pen or hen coop which as a rule does not cause disease. The city in the last few years has spent thousands of dollars on city streets, fire engine, trucks, monuments, and parks and many ways to make Laconia an up to date city. What has it done for the city's health, the most important of all?

I have been a member of the city board of health continuously ever since Laconia became a city. My first year's salary was \$425. Now the city appropriates \$500 for expenses, including salaries.

Our boys are coming home. While they were away they were educated to sanitary conditions. What would be more fitting as a memorial for them than an isolation hospital erected by the city on the hospital grounds, as above suggested? Mr. Mayor, and city council, we would respectfully ask you to think it over.

FOOD PRODUCTION AND CONSERVATION

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of Laconia,
Gentlemen:*

Having been appointed by your Honorable Body to supervise the City War Garden work during the season of 1918, I hereby render a report of its accomplishments with recommendation for the coming year.

Your ample appropriation of one thousand dollars and also the purchase of a team with which to do the work proved of valuable assistance in preparing the land for gardens seasonably early, for without the extra team no doubt most of the gardens would have been too late for success owing to the scarcity of labor and teams.

About one hundred garden plots of one eighth acre or more each were prepared for planting and allotted, beside the plowing and harrowing of many private gardens where the individuals were unable to secure teams seasonably to do their work, this work was commenced the latter part of April and by the 30th of May all but one or two small pieces were ready for planting.

The general report from those having the garden plots was very gratifying and there were scarcely any but what received a good return for their efforts. One of the gardeners produced nearly forty bushels of potatoes besides various other varieties such as corn, beans, etc., from his garden plot and this was from a plot that produced hardly anything the year before. This illustrates the difference

between a garden well fertilized and cared for as compared with one not fertilized and properly cared for on the same plot where scarcely anything was raised the year previous.

There are already many applications for these plots another year and it would seem advisable to prepare and furnish as many Victory Gardens as possible during the coming summer, this being urgently recommended by the National Food Administration.

Of the one thousand dollars appropriated, seven hundred eighty-three dollars and four cents was expended and three hundred eighty-four dollars and ninety-six cents has been repaid by those having gardens, leaving a net cost to the city of three hundred ninety-eight dollars and eight cents.

I would recommend that an appropriation of six hundred dollars be made by the new council at its earliest convenience, in order that the work may be started seasonably early the coming spring.

In behalf of those having the gardens and myself, I wish to express our appreciation to Hon. Henry B. Quinby and Arthur D. O'Shea for their generous contribution of land, the use of which was given free of charge for the good of the cause.

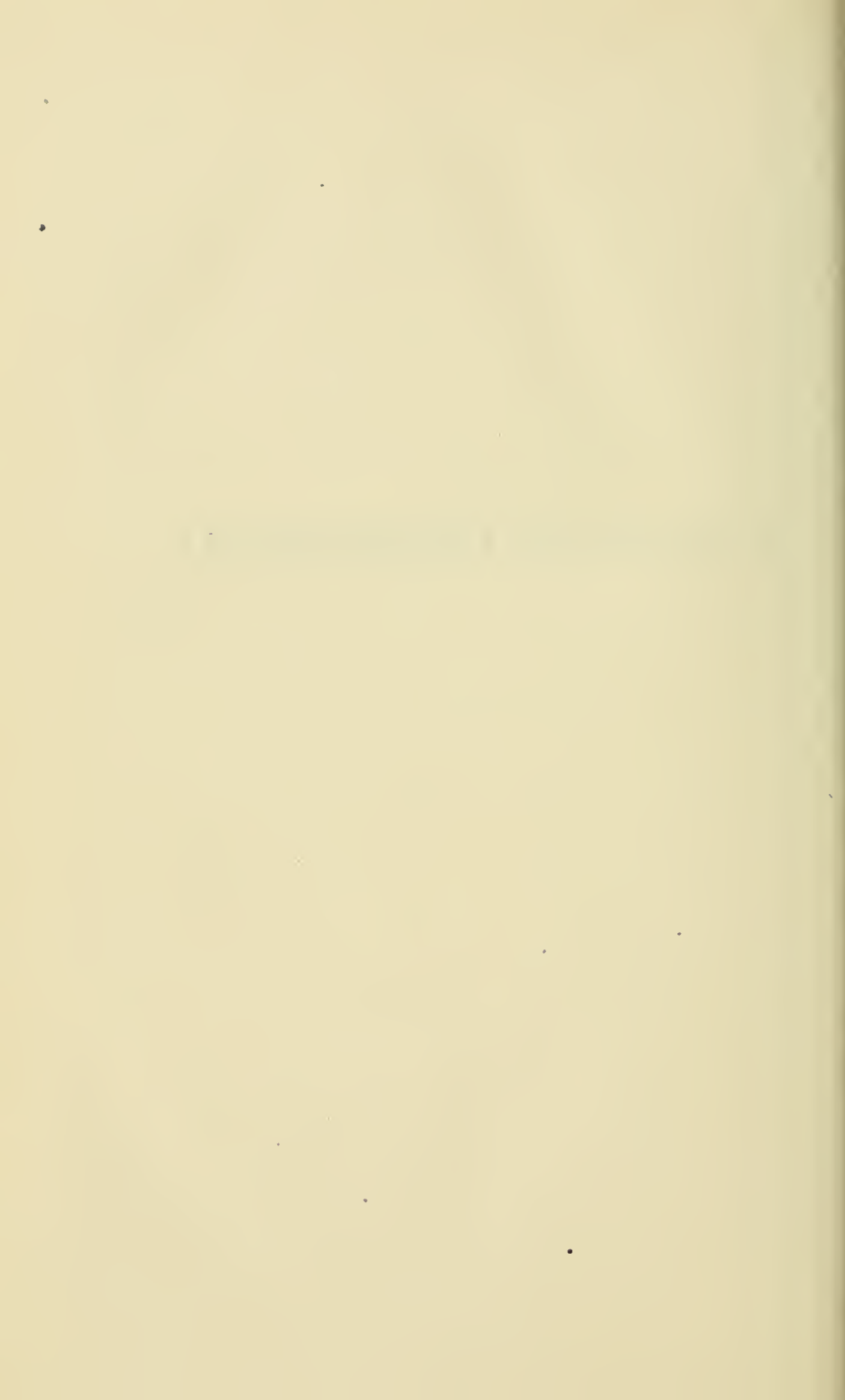
