STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building on the 13th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for three years, one Park Commissioner for two years, one Park Commissioner for one year, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library and one Trustee of Trust Funds.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing Beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used as said meeting,—"Shall the Provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town?"

ARTICLE 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, General Expenses, Elections, Municipal Court, Police Department, Civilian Defense, Fire Department, Town Hall, Forest Fires, Blister Rust Control, Special Highway Account, Highway Maintenance, Town Road Aid, District Nurse Association, Health Officer, Hospital, Vital Statistics, Village Streets, Street Lights, Public Dump, Library, Old Age Assistance, Welfare, National Holidays, Parks and Playgrounds, Community Center, Cemeteries, Damage by Dogs, Advertising, Region As-

sociation, Social Security, Payment on Debt, and Interest on Debt, and all other necessary Town Expenses.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of seven members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board members shall consist of one Selectman and six other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,000 for expenses of the Planning Board.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to construct an outdoor swimming pool at a site to be selected at Remich Park, and authorize a Committee to be established made up of the Selectmen, the Park Commissioners and three voters appointed by the Selectmen, the Committee to decide on all details relative to site and construction specifications, and the completed project turned over to the Park Commission for operation and supervision.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Nineteen Thousand Dollars (\$19,000.00) for the revaluation and reassessment of the taxable property in the Town by an independent firm of appraisers to be chosen by the Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the Town a sum not to exceed Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) for the construction of an outdoor swimming pool, the loan to be repaid over a period of ten

(10) years and for this purpose to authorize the issue of serial notes of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1956 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 10. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including Zoning Committee, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 11. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the non-partisan ballot system for election of Town Officers is hereby rescinded and the Australian ballot system is legally adopted. adopted.

ARTICLE 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF LITTLETON ZONING COMMITTEE

According to the vote of the town meeting of 1955, this committee was appointed by the Selectmen to investigate Town Planning and zoning and make appropriate recommendations.

At the first meeting, general problems were discussed. Literature that had been procured from the National Chamber of Commerce through the Littleton Chamber of Commerce and the State Planning and Development Commission was distributed to the members for study. It was voted that a representative of the State Planning and Development Commission be called in for advice.

At the next meeting the State Planning and Development Commission Representative, after an inspection of the town gave the committee a report on the need for long range Town Planning. This can only be done through the establishment of a Town Planning Board.

The purpose of a Town Planning Board is to promote the growth of a town in such a way as to conserve property values, prevent congestion, protect health, and to place residence, commerce, industry, and agriculture in its logical place for the best interest of all townspeople. It also provides for economy in the conduct of local government through insuring orderly growth throughout the town. The disorderly growth of a town causes property values to diminish by harmful use of adjoining properties. This causes a serious tax revenue loss and puts additional burdens on other tax-payers in the town. Such conditions force people to leave, and discourage others from coming. A Planning Board could avert this condition. The future of a town can be one of long range development and prosperity.

At the next meeting, the committee voted to recommend to the Selectmen, that the town adopt the provisions of Chapter 36, Revised Laws State of New

Hampshire, 1955. This is enabling Legislation that empowers towns to create a Planning Board.

This Planning Board shall create a Town Master Plan, and may recommend zoning regulations, establish an official town map, regulate new subdivisions of land, cooperate in regional planning and may establish building regulations.

This committee feels that this act will serve the best interest of the townspeople. Therefore, we recommend that the following articles be placed in the Warrant of the next regular town meeting:

ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of seven members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board members shall consist of one Selectman and six other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1000.00 for expenses of the Planning Board.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year and ended December 31, 1955, which was made by this Division in accordance with the report of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library and Municipal Court. The accounts of the Water and Light Department and the Village District were also audited and separate reports are being made for each of these divisions.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1954—December 31, 1955: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1954 and December 31, 1955, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the financial condition of the Town changed from a Surplus of \$4,160.57 to a Net Debt of \$25,459.51 during 1955.

Analysis of Change in Financial Conditions: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$9,520.11, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$3,843.15, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$5,676.96.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1955, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Parking Meter Account: (Exhibit B-4)

A summary statement of the Parking Meter Account is presented in Exhibit B-4.

Statement of Long Term Indebedness: (Exhibit H)

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1955, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

General Comments

Current Surplus:

The current surplus increased from \$27,480.57 to \$29,540.49 during 1955, as shown by the following statement:

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT 1955

Your librarian is glad to report that real progress has been made toward improving service to the Littleton Elementary School, a need described in last year's report. The library qualified for State Aid in 1955 as having a recognized problem to loan enough books for classroom collections at that school, and as having made some headway independently by increasing the book budget and allocating some of the increase to the purchase of new books for the first five grades. To supplement this the library was granted \$250 worth of children's books through the N. H. State Library. Many of these books, chosen by your own librarian have already been received and will be of great use. By meeting standards set up by the N. H. State Library this library has benefited for the second time by the State Aid provision.

Work has been started on rebuilding bookcases in the stackroom, a much needed improvement. The shelves will be made adjustable to accommodate books of all sizes many of which previously had to be laid flat or shelved out of place. The new cases will provide better visibility and make the collection more accessible.

Book Week was celebrated in November with a display of new children's books, story hours at the school and library, and visits to the school by the librarian.

Ten memorial books were presented to the library in the names of Louis C. Steffens, Harold Goad, Bonnie Sue Black, Clifford A. Peabody and Mrs. George Hoyt.

A well attended neighborhood meeting of librarians was held at the library in October. The librarian at-

tended another in Berlin, and also the N. H.-Vermont library convention at Wentworth-by-the-Sea in September.

Many thanks to the board of trustees and the library patrons who made 1955 a good year by their interest and help.

Report of the Board of Education

To the Citizens of Littleton:

The school board of the Littleton School District presents herewith its annual report. Included in this report you will find the audit of finances for the year 1954-1955 by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission; budgets and estimated receipts for this year and next year; and written reports by the superintendent of schools and the principal of the high school.

The board wishes to take this opportunity to thank the many people who helped by moving furniture and equipment into the new building and to those who have loaned trucks and cars in transporting equipment and pupils to certain athletic contests.

The budget for this coming year is of necessity larger than that of the present year. The major increase in the budget is in the amount requested for teachers' salaries. This increase is due to the request for new teachers and salary increases for present teachers. Other noticeable increases are due to liability for tuition of foster children, janitor service, fuel, light, transportation and retirement. Some of the increase can be offset by increased receipts from tuition pupils of other towns attending Littleton High School and from state-aid on principal payments for construction.

The school board, therefore, recommends an appropriation of \$274,420.90 for the ensuing year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my annual report relative to your schools.

Changes this past year in the teaching staff, for the most part, were confined to the high school. The only change in the elementary school was the election of Mrs. Ruth MacKenzie of Littleton as teacher of grade five to replace Miss Ruth Millar, who resigned because of illness. In the high school, Mr. George Gray of Colebrook, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and with five years' teaching experience in Colebrook, was elected to teach General Science, Biology and Chemistry to replace Mr. Bernard Bouchard, who resigned to enter business.

Mr. Arnold Adams of Tilton, N. H., a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was elected to teach Business Education, replacing Mrs. Elizabeth Drew who resigned because of marriage.

Miss Colleen Crowley of Concord, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was elected to teach junior high Mathematics, to replace Mr. Chester Leone who resigned to accept the principalship of Bartlett High School.

Miss Nancy Ledoux of Littleton, a graduate of Mount St. Mary College, with two years' experience in Henniker and four years' experience in Newport, was elected to teach English replacing Mrs. Alice K. Hyde who was transferred to the Social Studies department replacing Mr. George Pasichuke who resigned to accept the assistant principalship of the Oyster River consolidated school in Durham.

Mr. Charles Ricardi of Twin Mountain, a graduate of Keene Teachers' College, with four years' experience in Lancaster, was elected to teach Social Studies in the Junior High. Mr. Ricardi was an additional teacher employed because of increased enrollment.

Mr. Kenneth Aldrich of Dalton, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, with two years' experience in Andover, was elected to teach Auto Mechanics, General Shop and Driver Education.

Miss Jane Crowe of Woodsville, a graduate of St. Elizabeth College, was elected to teach grade six. Miss Crowe was an additional teacher necessary because of increased numbers in the elementary grades.

John W. Smith of Groveton, a graduate of Rhode Island State, with five years' experience in Groveton, was elected full time Physical Education instructor and coach of basketball.

Mrs. Caroline Townsend, a graduate of the University of Maine, with a masters degree from Columbia and with fourteen years' experience in Maine and Florida, was elected as a special reading teacher for the system.

This past year was most difficult for the teaching staff and the pupils in the high school; however, as a result of excellent cooperation on the part of both, the year was completed with reasonably good results attained. Since the opening of school in the fall we have taken over space in the new high school and at this time we have full use of the entire building. Odds and ends that need finishing do not now interfere with the operation of the school. The building is well furnished and well staffed. I feel that Littleton has an excellent plant and should be very proud of its educational facilities.

The annual school health service report shows the following examination by school doctor: 300 pupils examined, 126 received polio vaccinations, 203 were given laboratory tests, 109 were tested for blood pressure and 5 received chest x-rays. Of the number examined by the doctor, the following defects were found: Tonsils and adenoids 10, heart 17, nervous system 1, orthopedic 11, nutritional defects 22 and hearing 3. Of the above 64 cases, 60 have received treatment or have been seen by the family physician.

The report of the school nurse shows that 1,089 pupils were examined and the following defects found: Vision 84, hearing 24, posture 3, speech 6, teeth 265. During the year the following received treatment from or were seen by the family physician: Vision 68, hearing 24, posture 3, speech 3 and teeth 406. All 1,089 children were found to have been successfully vaccinated with the exception of 3 who were excused by the family doctor. The above report includes 72 kindergarten and 316 parochial school children.

For the first time we have had the services of a special reading teacher in our schools this year. Mrs. Townsend has been working with pupils who have reading difficulties in Grades 3 through 8. Difficulties have been diagnosed and remedial work has been given. Children with similar difficulties have been grouped together in very small groups. In a number of cases children have been given individual help. The effects of the program are now becoming evident as reflected by the number of children whose reading ability has improved under the program.

Pupils in Grades nine and eleven have already taken the University of New Hampshire battery of tests. Results of these should be coming back to us soon. This year the superintendents in the North Country are cooperating with the State Department of Education in a testing program covering all pupils in Grades one through eight. These pupils will be given the California Mental Maturity tests and the Stanford Achievement test in March. After tests have been given, corrected, scored and the results tabulated, a one-day workshop is planned at which time the results will be interpreted by an expert in the field of testing.

The school lunch program at the elementary school is still operating very efficiently under the direction of Mrs. Minnie Maxwell, assisted by Mrs. Annie Lewis and Mrs. Blanche LaMott. The high school lunch program was started in January with Mrs. Kathleen Brown, Mrs. Ruby Kinne, Mrs. Rosalie Stoddard and Mrs. Bertha Harriman in the kitchen. Both programs are now feeding about 500 children every day.

Gifts to the school this past year include a piano for the high school donated by Mrs. Madeline Dexter, a combination radio-record player by Mrs. Theda Tilton, a punch bowl donated by Miss Helen Pearce, teachers' room furniture in the high school by the Colonial Club, a Bausch & Lomb Ortho-Rater to be used for eye testing by Dr. John H. Hall and black-out drapes in the elementary school by the Littleton PTA.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to the teaching staff, school board and other school district personnel and to the citizens of Littleton for their cooperation and support.

CURRICULUM

Our curriculum has remained basically the same with the addition of Automobile Mechanics offered to Grades XI and XII, and Health and Physical Education for all boys twice a week. The school offers the following courses of study—College Preparatory, Commercial, Home Economics, Industrial Arts and General.

GUIDANCE

This program is based upon individual and group conferences and has a testing program which includes a battery of five tests administered by the University of New Hampshire Testing Service to all freshmen and juniors, with selected tests for sophomores and seniors. The tests include the California Occupational Interest Inventory, Primary Mental Ability, Clerical Speed and Accuracy, Mechanical Reasoning and the Cooperative Reading Comprehension test. Testing in Grades VII and VIII includes the California test of Mental Maturity and the California Achievement test of basic skills.

MUSIC

Our new building lends itself to an expansion of musical activities both vocal and instrumental. The new music room promises to further music education.

HEALTH

The new health room gives Miss Bryant the necessary area to carry on her work in her usual efficient manner with added benefits for the student body.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

We offer an adequate activity program which includes music, dramatics, a well rounded athletic program, socials and dances, and the annual school year book, "The Record."

CONCLUSION

We are certainly fortunate to have such a beautiful new building for our children which will provide an atmosphere for the best in education. The addition of the National School Lunch Program in the excellent cafeteria so well equipped, should be reflected in the health of our pupils. Littleton's facilities now rank with the best anywhere. We hope to make the maximum use of these excellent facilities. In closing, I would like to thank you, Mrs. Howland, the teaching staff, the school board and the people of Littleton for their excellent cooperation. The student body also distinguished itself during the emergency conditions by giving us the

cooperation necessary to operate under those conditions. The future of education in Littleton promises much. May the spirit of the emergency continue.

Your Town Report and Your People's Information

Your Region Association has had in 1955 one of the most active years. Naturally, the highlight was the Presidential visit in June, and we were honored by taking a direct part in various phases of the planning which went on for months previous. Seldom has the limelight been so directly centered on the White Mountains in a national scale.

Through all the complications and confusion surrounding that planning we somehow found time to carry on our normal schedule of work benefiting our towns. Much outside travel has carried the "message of the mountains" personally to Boston, Hartford, Springfield, New York, and Philadelphia. Events such as a Guides' Show and a Women's Golf Tournament were promoted and brought gratifying publicity. Stories and pictures were placed in many publications, and thousands of publicity folders distributed, as well as direct mail answering of several thousand letters and cards with information.

Our annual 4-H contest continues to have heartening results in encouraging young people's efforts through this fine organization. Another standby, the real-estate bulletin, has put property prospects in touch with property owners and realtors all over the region.

Is it all doing you, the tax-payer, any good? "Yes!" to that. We tracked down some of our mail inquirers in a random sample again this year. We found that out of just this small sample (500 letters and cards) we had 100 parties that spent just over \$17,000 in the Region! That represents over $2\frac{1}{2}$ times the amount appropriated by all our towns last year. We're sure you would all be glad to invest \$1.00 to get back \$2.50, any day.

Naturally this income isn't the only total we brought in, as there are many, many more we have no way of tracing. But it does show this is big business. It means that these people are paying big sums of tax money that doesn't come out of your pockets. With your continued help we can ease the burden of the tax load in all towns, bringing outside money to help pay for state and local services that otherwise you'd have to finance.
