WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING Town of Madbury March 11, 1941

To the lnhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town Affairs:---

You are herebly notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, A. D., 1941 at 11.30 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

- ART. 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.
- ART. 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To choose two Auditors for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. T choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.
- ART. 7. To choose a Road Agent for one year under direct supervision of the Selectmen.
- ART. 8. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- ART. 10. To see what action the town will take as to acceptance of state aid for road construction:
 —To vote to raise \$570.00 to be matched by \$1,140.00 by the State for State Aid Road or, To vote to raise \$257.17 to be matched by \$1,028.67 by the State for Class V Roads.

- ART. 11. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$30.00.
- ART. 12. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.
- ART. 13. To see if Town will vote to discontinue that part of so called Concord road from the residence of John Smith to that of Chas. Knibbs.
- ART. 14. To see if Town will allow the Selectmen to purchase a wing for the snow plow equipment, to be purchased from Town Maintenance winter appropriation.
- ART. 15. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS IN MADBURY, N. H.

To the School Board and Citizens of Madbury:

This is the twelfth annual report which I have submitted. The report of the Nurse, Miss Margaret Macdonald of Newmarket, accompanies mine.

The statistics are for the school year ending in June, 1940. Please note in the table of Comparative Statistics that the total number of children enrolled was less than in any of the last ten years. I regret to say that the per cent of attendance was the lowest and the number of tardinesses the greatest. This poor record, however, was not due to the schools as a whole but to lack of cooperation on the part of a very few parents. I am pleased to say that the report this year will probably be much better. I have only praise for the work of our teachers and our nurse. They deserve the support of everyone.

Last spring term both of our teachers attended a course of sixteen lectures, given by Dr. Payson Smith of Harvard and this fall term Miss Boucher has attended sixteen more given at Dover High School by Prof. Linwood Chase, of Boston University. This shows good professional spirit.

Following the suggestion made in my last report the School Board has caused the two schools to be more equal numerically by transferring the transported pupils from the North to the Center School. This was done with a minimum of friction and I wish to thank those parents who so willingly made the transfer. At present the Center School enrolls sixteen pupils and the North School twenty.

We are printing the names of those who were in

Dover High School for the Fall term of 1940 in order that the citizens may see who are benefitting from the School District. The High School tuition rate this year has been lowered from \$100 to \$91 and a further reduction will be made next year.

We are expecting surplus products to be provided by the WPA to help in furnishing hot lunches for those who remain at the schools during the noon hour. One of the problems is to provide enough water for washing dishes and for cooking in addition to the amount used used for drinking. At the North School in September, only one pail of water a day could be spared to the school because of low water in the wells of the community.

The School Board found it necessary to spend more for repairs than the special appropriation called for. The law gives them the power, however, to expend not over five per cent of the budget in addition to the special appropriation for repairs. The balance from last year together with the Literary Fund, which was not otherwise expended, will enable them to just about keep within their budget.

The sanitary arrangements at both schools will have to be improved next summer. The old earth toilets are inadequate and should not be tolerated. We do our best to keep them clean and sweet but it it often impossible.

At the Center School we are recommending as we have done before, the building of an entry at the door.

As I write these lines we are again preparing to give the Metropolitan Achievement tests. The results of previous years have shown that our schools reach a reasonable standard. No pupil failed in the Standard Graduation tests of last June. In some respects our graduates are handicapped when they enter a large city high school, but they usually possess that quality which makes them overcome difficulties and "make good." In October a Rural Teachers Institute was held at the Church with a dinner at the Town Hall, furnished by the ladies of the church. Everybody stayed and enjoyed the dinner and I am sorry that they did not make more money from their efforts. I want to extend to them the thanks of the State Department of Education.

We thank the Grange for giving each school an electric clock. Our thanks are also given to this organization, the Ladies Aid, the Men's Club and the Red Cross for making possible a Community Christmas tree and for furnishing money to continue the dental clinic.
