THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Piermont, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Piermont on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same.
3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and Bridges.
4. To raise and appropriate money for the general expense of the Highway Department.
5. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.
6. To raise and appropriate money for the support of Library.
7. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the Fire Department, and decide if there shall be any change in equipment.
8. To raise and appropriate money for the relief of poor and old age assistance.
9. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day and choose committees for same.
10. To raise and appropriate money for Town Maintenance of Highways, with State Aid, or State Aid New Construction on Lake Tarleton road to continue on from last year's work.
11. To raise and appropriate money for Pine Blister Rust Control, with State Aid; the State asks for \$400.00.

12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.

13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by Town through Tax Collector's deeds or otherwise.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$66.00 for co-operative advertising in the White Mountain Region Association.

16. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division, and to make an appropriation for the expense of such audit.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
