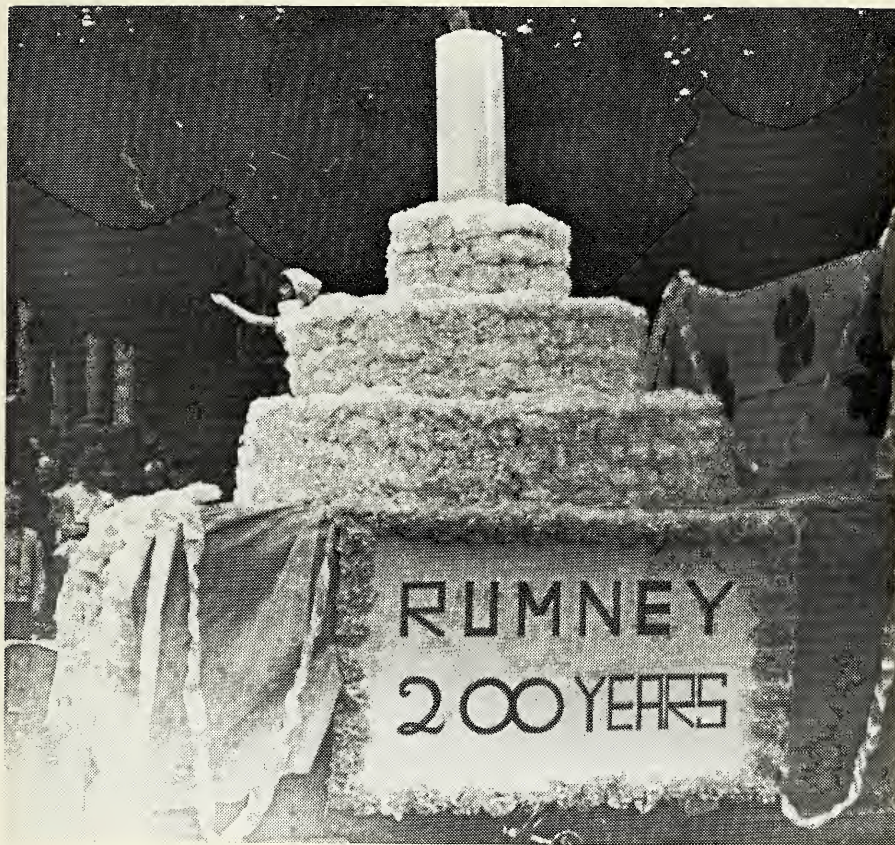

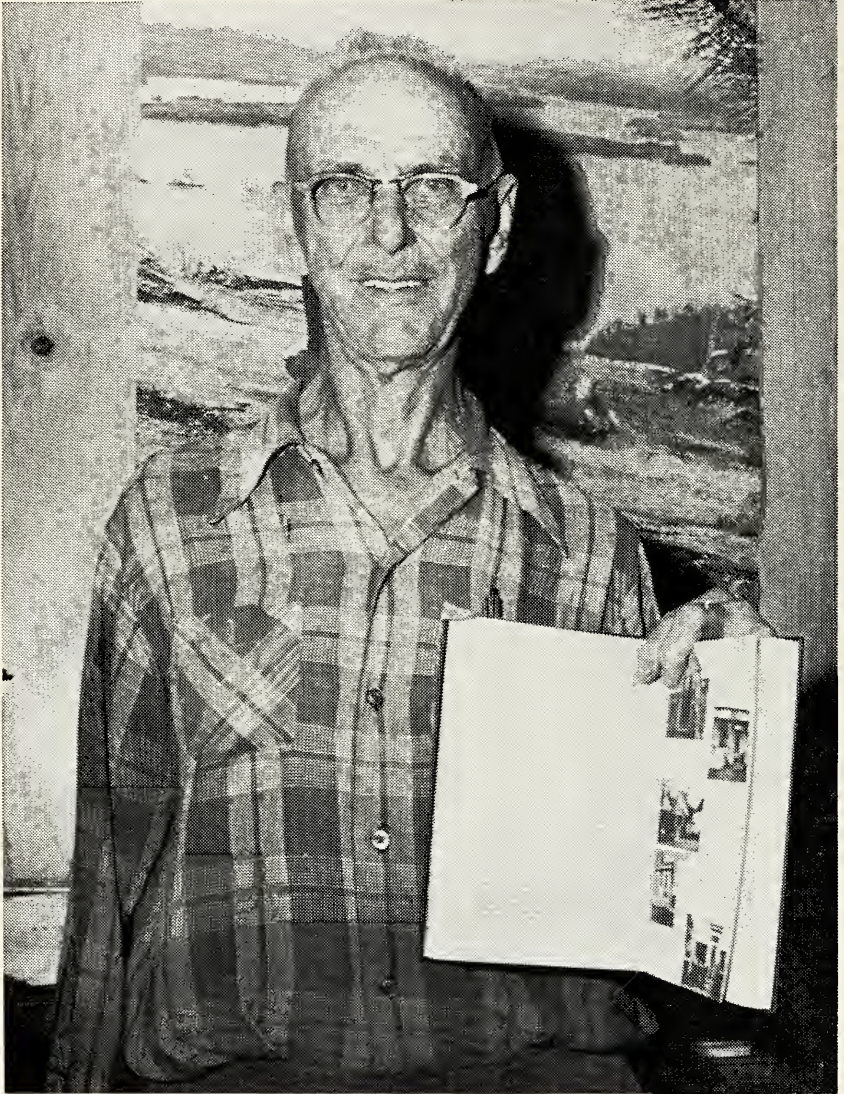

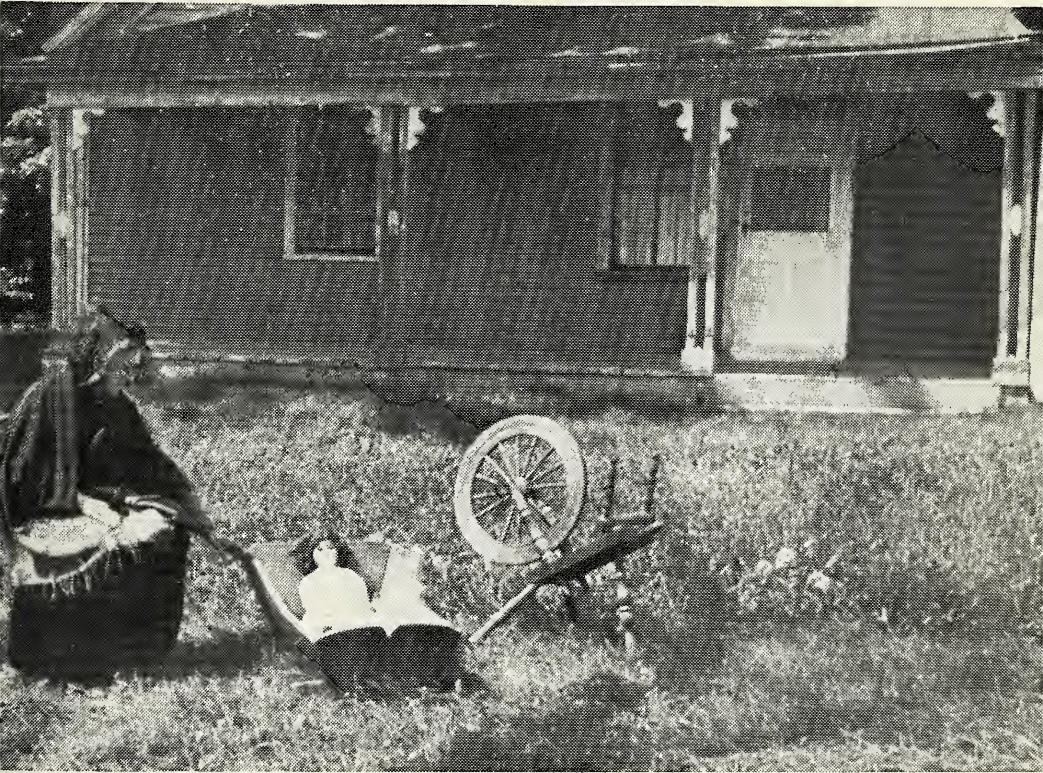

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Rumney in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rumney on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, at which time the polls shall be opened and shall close not earlier than nine of the clock in the afternoon to act upon the following articles: all articles not on the ballot will be acted upon at seven-thirty in the evening.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriation of the same.

3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its highways and bridges.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Library.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Cemeteries.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Common and the daily raising and lowering of the flag.

8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lights.

9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the LaMott-Kenneson Post No. 76 American Legion for Memorial Day and other patriotic purposes.

10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of the Town Dump.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$530.56 to secure from the State \$3,537.06 to be expended for Town Road Aid.

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperating with other towns in the Lakes Region.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate towards the operation of the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital in Plymouth, N. H.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$336.00 for the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or borrow a sum of money sufficient for the purchase of a new road grader for the Town Highway Department and authorize the Selectmen to sell or trade in the present Austin-Weston road grader.

16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to buy the present or a new dump site and raise and appropriate or borrow a sum sufficient for same.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of a summer recreation program. (By request)

18. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the old section of the Stinson Lake Road, between the Arthur Dewey property and the present Stinson Lake Road. (By request)

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, lease, rent, sell or otherwise dispose of any real estate or mineral rights acquired by the Town at any of its tax collector's sales.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

21. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing Beano be adopted in this town.

22. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Continued improvement in the matter of accurate, prompt detection and rapid effective suppression action can help to maintain this good, worthwhile record even though we do not have an abundance of rain as in the fire season of 1967.

It will help if we follow these simple suggestions:

1. No burning of debris and waste between the hours of 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. and then only with a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.
2. Take debris and waste to the town dump.
3. Maintain a clean, safe dump.
4. Keep matches away from young children.
5. Be sure matches and smoking material are dead out when we discard them.
6. Set good example for others in fire prevention.

However, from walking and costumed individuals to an airplane—historic floats and modern floats—horses and old cars to a new convertible—historical, patriotic and religious entries, depicting bygone days and Rumney in 1967—Commercial entries portraying business then and now—marching units from authentic descendants of American Indians in native costume, clubs, snappy drum and drill corps, drum and bugle corps, to bands—all contributed to the estimated two-mile long spectacular procession which commenced in Rumney Depot and ended on the Stinson Lake Road, via the Village and Mill Road.

The cooperation and enthusiasm of the participants and many, many others made it all possible and the gratitude to them has been expressed frequently by the spectators.

First prize in the Float Division and "The Best In Parade" Trophy were won by Fremont Swain for his "Village Blacksmith" entry.

The Royal Eagles Drum and Drill Corps of Plymouth was honored as Best of the Marching Units. In the Open Class the Bearded Titans entry in their "Parade of Progress" were First.

It is impossible to name every individual that lent a helping hand; however, in behalf of the Town of Rumney, a few are deserving of specific mention for their hours of planning, coordination and supervision. This list includes: Lloyd E. French, Jr., James Darling, Herbert Moses and Fremont Swain who were members of the Parade Committee and unselfishly gave of their time and talents to make the parade the success that it was. Chief Donald Young and his officers who were most helpful in maintaining orderly parade and spectator traffic and parking. Harold Webster, Jr. who did

a most commendable announcing job from the public address system on the band stand. Vera Lawson, Betty Roitman, Mr. W. Dean Holdeman, H. L. Baumgartner, Stanley Schmishkiss, Dick Shannon, Ken Trotter, Ed. Wheeler and Murray Meyers, all summer residents of Stinson Lake. These fine people not only did an excellent job as judges, but, more important, they demonstrated that the officers and membership of the Stinson Lake Association are good citizens of Rumney. Their spirit of cooperation and willingness to help, is sincerely appreciated.

The only regret is that each and every parade entry could not be saved to make a bigger and better Rumney Tri-Centennial Parade in the Year 2067. On second thought, there is one other regret—we won't be here to enjoy the Tri-Centennial!

Attendants in appropriate costume added to the atmosphere. The popularity of the display was attested to by the attendance of over 1500 while the town's interest was proven by approximately 60 donors of about 400 articles.

THE BICENTENNIAL OF 1967

To cram into a few paragraphs an overall picture of this four-day event requires dumping out most of the interesting details and hitting most of the high spots only. Since the officers and heads of committees appear on another page and since much of the diversity of the celebration has already been printed in the Plymouth Record, we will attempt to re-emphasize a little of the ground-work done in this purely cooperative effort.

We started two years ahead of time. The Town officially endorsed the celebration and required the selectmen to take steps to appoint a committee to get the wheels to rolling. From that beginning the momentum increased. Our men started raising beards, everybody jumped on the bandwagon; publicity, plans for exhibits, parades, registration, publishing a history buzzed onto the scene. Later were added, fireworks, tug of war, hoselaying, carpenter work and memorial plaques entered the picture. Publicity, especially as to interviewing the old timers, was broadcast over the radio, till everyone became "conditioned" to the bicentennial spirit, which was necessary for success. No one kept any account of their time nor handed in any bills. Our treasurer's report seems to show that we turned back to the town quite a nest egg!

I'll mention the two adult contests—hose laying and the tug of war, which were held about six p. m. on Thursday and Saturday consecutively. Each contest drew special crowds who were exceptionally interested people and the pictures obtained fairly well make them a visible part of our history.

Every evening the Town Hall was used. Thursday to Camp Wunnegan who filled the place, with future talented young people, doing their best and with exuberant gaiety. Friday while the teen agers had a "hop" at the yard of the Russell School, the older folk came to the Hall for an "Evening of History". Mrs. Eva Speare told most delightedly of her girlhood days in our Village. She represented in a distinct way what honorable age offers to everyone. Also on the platform we had a historian-artist, Peter Knight. He has written his college thesis on Daniel H. Craig who was born in Rumney in 1811 and was something of a genius in the field of communication. On Saturday evening the hall was used for the Bicentennial Dance.

The Big Day was Saturday, with the mammoth parade and the reception of notable guests. We must list these gentlemen: Hon. Noris Cotton (our senior Senator) gave a brief address and presented to our town fathers a flag that had flown over the Capitol in Washington; Hon. James Cleveland, also our representative in the Capitol, came as a fill-in for Senator Cotton in case he could not make it from Washington. There were four ex-governors present. This was probably the first time Rumney had so many of these gentlemen present. They were Charles Dale, Sherman Adams, Lane Dwinell and Wesley Powell. The writer enjoyed this get-together as he had served in the legislature under all these governors. The Speaker of the House, Hon. Water R. Peterson, Jr. was present and spoke briefly. Many other town, county and state officials were present.

Early in May under the hand of the Fire Auxiliary and the Mt. Stinson 4-H Club boys about 25 trees were planted on the Common. About a hundred years ago others had planted trees which had lived through most of their days of usefulness and many have been removed because of their dying condition. The Ex-governors assisted in the simple ritual of dedication of these Bi-centennial Trees. Each tree was dedicated in memory of those who have gone before.

Richard Bradley, Representative of District 19, presented to our Town Clerk, Ruth Moses, a resolution from the Legislature to the effect that the state wished us every success in our celebration.

The exhibits at the Library were the best and most numerable of any we have ever seen. The parade exceeded our best expectations, with a plane in the sky to help cover the route. Many of the creations for the parade were of skillful and ingenious work like the "birthday cake" of the Mt. Stinson 4-H Club girls.

Feeding the crowd. There were two dinners put on at the Grange Hall by the American Legion and Rumney Grange. The P. T. A. ran a snack stand. The Fire Auxiliary had a lunch on Sunday. The Fire Department had a hot dog stand. The chicken barbeque put on by the Pemigewasset Fish and Game Club was the only one to run short.

The Indian Village glistened in its colorful setting at the parking lot. The fireworks were superb. The Children's Parade went off on precision lines and got a lot of us "parade minded" ready for the big one set for the next day.

Much credit is due the Police Department. It was estimated that between six and seven thousand people attended the four-day celebration. On Saturday cars lined both sides of the road from Herbert Hill to Bradley Hill. The parking lot in Bunker's Field and side roads were also used. In spite of all these cars and people traffic moved smoothly through town.

There was a First Aid Station with ambulance on call.

On Sunday after all our churches had their own services, we met for the closing hour on the Common for a sacred concert by the New England Fellowship. We gave wrapt attention until the last classical "Amen" from Mrs. Carter's rendition of the Lord's Prayer made an excellent finale to the whole celebration. This was the last drop of the "curtain" to the 1967 Bicentennial.

REPORT OF THE SOUVENIR COMMITTEE

**REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS
AS OF DECEMBER 31, 1967**

During the calendar year of 1967 your Trustees have administered a total of 180 Trust Funds including seven new ones established during the year amounting to \$1,200. The total amount of the funds as originally established amount to \$24,967.00, and these have increased by interest and dividends to approximately \$42,000. Our income from these sources this year were \$2,583.54 making it possible to disburse equally among the various funds six percent.

Our income continues to increase moderately since interest rates are somewhat higher and we also gain in dividends through an increase in the shares of stock which we own, through stock dividends, this year having received 290 additional shares in that way. We made one change in our stock selling part of our Fidelity and buying American Business share in place to assure us of a somewhat better dividend. Our holding now consists of:

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Hereby submitted is my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The Russell School opened in September with three regular staff changes and one in Music. Principal Stearns has discussed these in his report. I would add that I have been impressed by the way this staff works together and the results they have achieved.

I do not need to tell you our lunch program under the supervision of Mrs. Lyon continues to prosper. The program is in a financially sound position. The surplus foods to date have been more plentiful, especially protein.

During the past two years your school board has wisely budgeted more funds for school repairs and maintenance. When a building is new there is little need to budget funds for upkeep but time passes quickly and suddenly comes the realization repairs are needed. After the work budgeted for this next summer is done, you should be in a position where an average yearly outlay should keep the school in good condition.

There has been some discussion in the district concerning the opening of a public kindergarten. I heartily approve of this. It has been my observation over the years that children who have had kindergarten training before entering first grade make a much better adjustment to school and their progress through the grades is more trouble-free. Your problem besides financing appears to be one of finding adequately heated and lighted space. It might be helpful to appoint a committee to report back with a recommendation.

It is my opinion you made the best choice possible when you voted to enter the AREA school in Plymouth. I realize the idea was not popular in some respects but

like anything new and unknown, it will have to be tried before judgment can be passed. A new high school will mean more to this section of the state than any one other educational development. Most important you have provided guaranteed space in the years ahead for the education of your high school pupils.

I appreciate the cooperation of the school board and the district. You have shown that a quality school program can be offered at the elementary level at a cost that is not prohibitive.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Chapter 189, Section 48 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the superintendent of schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district, and their share of same. Said report shall be filed with the school board of each school district involved and shall be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be made for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrator, if any is in service in the union."

One half of the supervisory union expenses is pro-rated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One half is pro-rated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000.) which was received by the Superintendent of Schools of Supervisory Union No. 48 during the 1966-67 school year was made up as follows: \$5000. paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$6000. pro-rated among the several school districts which comprise the union. Allowances of \$1300. for travel within the union was also pro-rated as stated above.

1967-1968

It is with great pleasure and satisfaction that I hereby submit my fourth annual report to the Town of Rumney.

The teaching staff of Russell School has four new members this year. Mrs. Ruth Tilson replaced Mrs. Ann Poisson in the first Grade; Miss Susan Dalziel replaced Mrs. Virginia Cushing in Grades Two and Three; Mr. Glenn Dore replaced Mr. William Driscoll in Grades Five through Eight. Mrs. Mary Nordstrom replaced Miss Diane Dickinson as Music Supervisor.

This past summer witnessed some much-needed painting and masonry repairs done to the school. Painting contractor Edward Currier applied a special hardening coat of paint to the lower halves of the walls throughout the building which not only improves the appearance but also makes the maintenance of the walls much easier. Wall cracks were pointed up and then painted. The outside steps on both ends of the building were patched up and built up on the lower level to prevent water from running into the building. At the same time water backup on top of the building was taken care of.

In the area of school curriculum, new social studies books were implemented this year. We changed from the Follett social studies series to the MacMillan series. Because of the community's unselfish support of the school, the children can stay on an even level with other schools with recent up-to-date textbooks.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the community for their excellent cooperation in insuring a quality education for their children.

REPORT OF SCHOOL DISTRICT NURSE

The nurse visited the school forty times during the school year, besides home visits and conferences with Social Service Workers and Health Departments, Doctors and Dentists.

The nurse purchased first aid supplies and gave first aid treatments when necessary during her visits at school.

Inspections were made for vaccinations and signs of illness and cleanliness on each student. Each child was weighed and measured and a health record kept on each. A vision screening test and hearing test was also done on each pupil and notices were sent home suggesting follow-up by family physician or specialist for those who failed the tests.

Dental inspections were also made and suggestions for follow-up where necessary. The State Dental Hygienist visited each class room and gave a talk and demonstration on good dental health. She also showed an interesting film strip. A Dental Clinic was sponsored by the P. T. A. The children were transported to Dr. Jamback in Woodsville. I assisted Dr. Kirk at a Measles Clinic at the school for pre-school children and those in grade one which was sponsored by the P. T. A. At the pre-school registration, birth certificates were also checked and information obtained for health records on those who would be entering school. Twenty home visits were made during the year.

The nurse attended an all-day workshop for School Nurses at Timberlane Regional School in Plaistow and two other workshops in Concord, in addition to the Teachers' Convention in Manchester (School Nurses' Section).
